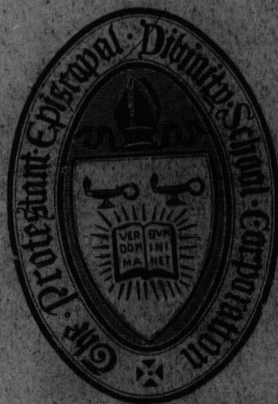

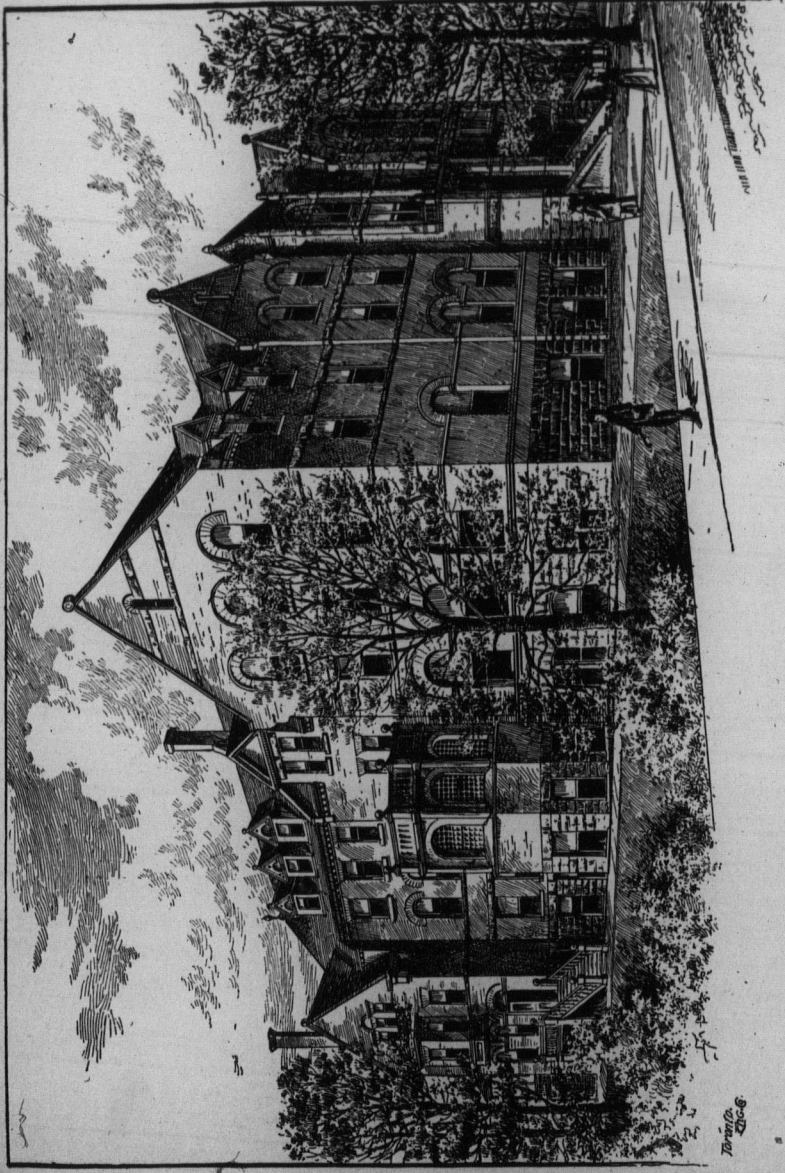

THE ORIGIN AND POSITION
OF
WYCLIFFE COLLEGE.

WYCLIFFE COLLEGE originated in the spontaneous and voluntary action of a number of earnest and loyal members of the Church of England in the Diocese of Toronto who were deeply impressed with the gravity of the present crisis in the history of the Canadian Church, the dangers which threatened it through the prevalence of sacerdotal assumptions, and the growing alienation of the great body of the Protestant laity from a large section of the clergy who had ceased to be in sympathy with the spirit and principles of the Reformation. They recognised the urgent necessity for united action in the maintenance and propagation of those principles of Evangelical truth, upon fidelity to which, they believed, the strength and efficiency of the Church depended. The conviction grew that the only adequate remedy for the evils they deplored must be found in the provision of distinctive Evangelical teaching in the training and education of candidates for the sacred ministry; and out of this conviction, deepened by thought and prayer, originated Wycliffe College. Moreover, they were of the opinion that a thorough, general, and liberal education was an essential factor in the training of theological students, and that such could not be obtained in an isolated theological college, with inadequate resources, and with the danger of falling into the groove of a narrow ecclesiasticism, devoid of sympathy with the people. Thus, they were led to the fundamental positions upon which the work and methods of Wycliffe College are based, namely, distinctive evangelical teaching in theology, and affiliation with the Provincial University.

In October, 1877, the work of the College, then known as the Protestant Episcopal Divinity School, was begun in a very unassuming way in the School-house attached to St. James' Cathedral, where a little band of students assembled and some six of the Evangelical clergy of the city gave their valuable and gratuitous services as instructors. In 1879 the College was incorporated. In 1882 a building was

erected upon College Street, to supply the accommodation and appliances, without which the work could not be efficiently carried on. In 1885 the building was enlarged. In 1890, when further additions were in contemplation, opportunity was found to dispose of it, and the foundations of the present commodious structure were laid. In the autumn of 1891 the new building was completed, and the work of the College transferred to it.

DISTINCTIVE EVANGELICAL TEACHING.

Distinctive Evangelical teaching in Theology forms the first great principle which underlies the work of Wycliffe College. The late Canon Blakeney, author of a well-known work on the Prayer-book, stated that:—"He believed the great ignorance of the truths of the Reformation which existed was due to the fact that those important branches of knowledge had been overlooked in our educational establishments—that even our Universities had failed to supply an adequate course of Theological study for our Divinity students * * * *. There was no definite, clear teaching in the Universities, and consequently some of the young clergy went forth to grope their way. Indeed the bias which they received was not good, and the result was seen in the disorder and anarchy which now disturbed the peace of the Church, and sadly impeded her in her holy mission of saving souls."

In regard to the essential truths of evangelical theology there can be no *via media*. Either Holy Scripture is the only authoritative rule of faith, or tradition and Scripture are co-ordinate authorities. Either sinners are justified solely by the merits of Christ, and salvation is God's free gift; or, they are made righteous by some infusion of sacramental grace, and salvation is dependent upon the due performance of certain priestly acts and functions. Either the ministry is a body of pastors whose word is to unfold the Scriptures and to testify of Christ; or, it is an order of sacrificing priests, without whose intervention there can be no union with Christ and no certainty of salvation. Upon these vital questions there cannot be at once yea and nay. It is inconceivable that any earnest and enlightened man can be in an attitude of indecision or indifference in regard to them, especially in view of the conflict which is now waged, and in which the distinctive truths of the Reformation are questioned and assailed. The work of Wycliffe College is based upon the conviction that in an efficient

Theological School there must be clear, decided teaching in relation to the great fundamental principles of the Gospel.

Wycliffe College stands in two important educational relationships: the one literary—to the University of Toronto: the other ecclesiastical—to the Church of England in Canada.

FEDERATION WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

The minister of God's Word ought to be a well-educated man. In no other place in the Province of Ontario can intellectual training be provided so effectively and completely as in the Provincial University. This noble Institution originated in the grant of 125,000 acres of land set apart by the Canadian Legislature for the purpose of maintaining an University open to all classes and creeds without distinction. This enlightened scheme was, for many years, hindered by circumstances which must be sincerely regretted by every friend of liberal education in Canada. In 1849 this state of things was, however, happily brought to an end; and in 1853, the University of Toronto and University College were established upon their present unsectarian basis.

The University comprises Faculties of Arts, Law and, Medicine. It is a non-denominational, although Christian, institution, leaving all Theological study to be pursued in the Divinity Schools, which carry out their respective systems of Theological training in connection with the University, and with University College, to which their students resort for their studies in Arts.

The connection of the College with the University of Toronto, was at first merely the local one of convenient proximity and access to its lecture-rooms and appliances. In 1885, Wycliffe College was by statute of the University Senate, confirmed by the Governor in Council, affiliated to the University. In 1889 the College was by Act of the Ontario Legislature confederated and made a constituent part of the University of Toronto. From this close and intimate relationship with our national University the College derives great advantages. First, it has representation upon the University Senate and a due share in the government of the University. Secondly, the teaching of the entire curriculum in Arts, including the classics, Hebrew and the other Oriental languages, philosophy and ethics, etc., being provided by the University, all the resources of Wycliffe College can be devoted to the advancement of

Theological learning, while for the general literary training the unrivalled resources of the University can be utilized.

Thirdly, under the Statute of Options (See page 27), certain subjects taught in Wycliffe College are made a portion of the ordinary course required to be taken for the B.A. degree. By this provision, great advantage is given to theological students proceeding to their degree in Arts. Every inducement is offered to the students of Wycliffe College to take a complete University course; and in cases where this is impossible, they can still avail themselves of the opportunities which the University furnishes, for instruction in Philosophy and Mental Science, History, Languages, and the other departments.

Fourthly, the Students of Wycliffe College enjoy the advantages of association with the large body of Students in attendance at University College and the other Theological Colleges. This is of no small consequence. It is of great value to Theological Students to receive their education where they can commingle with those amongst whom their life work is to be carried on, and can be stimulated by contact with men of various communions and callings. Great stress should be laid upon the influence of a common university life and the relations of students with their fellow-students with whom they are associated in the pursuit of learning, and in the religious work which is carried on by the University Young Men's Christian Association and in other ways.

THE PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR HOLY ORDERS AND DEGREES OF DIVINITY.

Until quite recently, the Church in Canada had no corporate connection with the work of theological education and the theological colleges. But in 1889, the Provincial Synod adopted a canon relating to examinations and degrees in theology. The scheme was adopted in consultation with the theological colleges, and is chiefly based, with some modifications, upon the lines developed by Lightfoot and Westcott in connection with the University of Cambridge, and with what is known in England as the Preliminary Examination for Holy Orders. By this canon Wycliffe College is recognized as one of the six institutions devoted to theological teaching in this Ecclesiastical Province, and a Board of Examiners is constituted, upon which Wycliffe is represented equally with the other institutions.

Under this canon, an examination preliminary to ordination, and accepted *pro tanto* by the Bishops in lieu of their

own examinations will be held twice a year in Wycliffe College. Those who pass this examination receive the certificate of the Board of Examiners.

Also, under this canon, the Metropolitan of Canada is constituted a corporation sole for the conferring of Degrees of Divinity. The necessary examinations for these Degrees are held annually at Wycliffe College, and candidates after the passing of these examinations will have such degrees conferred upon them at Wycliffe College, by the Principal or other representative of the College acting for the Metropolitan.

While, then, the College preserves completely its autonomy and carries on its work upon its own lines, it is intimately and organically connected, on the one hand, with the national system of education, which has its crown and completion in the University of Toronto, and, on the other hand, with the special theological education of the Canadian Church. The student of Wycliffe can, at the close of his course, go forth with his degree in Arts, the certificate and guarantee of his literary attainments, bearing the imprimatur of the University of Toronto, and with the certificate of the Board of Examiners of the Provincial Synod, bearing the imprimatur of the highest ecclesiastical authority in the Canadian Church.

THE EQUIPMENT OF THE COLLEGE.

The new College building, opened October, 1891, is very conveniently and healthily situated in open ground on the edge of the Queen's Park, upon Hoskin avenue, about 500 feet to the north-east of the main building of the University of Toronto. It is built of stone and pressed brick, in a chaste collegiate style, and in the form of an L, the main building running 178 feet from east to west, and the east wing extending 142 feet from north to south.

It contains rooms for forty-four students, lecture-rooms, library, chapel, dining-hall, housekeeper's quarters, and residences for the Principal and the Dean, and is in every way well equipped for its work.

The rooms of the students are suitably furnished, and every provision has been made for their health and comfort. The University Gymnasium, erected within fifty yards of the College, will be open to the students upon the payment of a small fee.

The Library contains at present 8,000 volumes, and additions are made to it from time to time as the funds permit. The students have also access upon the payment of a small

fee to the Library and Reading-rooms of the University in the new building just completed to the south of the College. The University Library contains over 40,000 volumes; and the Reading-room, lighted by electricity, open both in the day and in the evening, affords every facility for study and research.

The generosity of benefactors has provided a number of Bursaries available for those needing this assistance. The College would be greatly strengthened by further benefactions for this purpose. The teaching work of the College is carried on by a staff of four theological professors. Great stress is laid upon the practical work in the city and in country missions as a means of training, which is carried on under the supervision of the Professor of Practical Theology.

THE POSITION OF THE COLLEGE.

In such a city as Toronto, with many earnest laymen, and especially with many clergymen of theological attainments and experience, means of enriching and strengthening the work of the College are provided in lectures by the clergymen, and in the counsel and co-operation of the laity. There are also in Toronto so many Christian workers, and so many departments of Christian work that the students have unequalled opportunities for gaining a practical acquaintance with the various methods pursued, and must receive both stimulus and enrichment from this contract.

ITS FIELD OF WORK.

The College is not local in character, but it is intended to provide for the education of men from and for all parts of the Dominion. The territory is vast and the opportunity is ripe. The Great North-West is rapidly filling up with a population of which a great part are members of the Church of England. So far we have failed to provide adequately for the spiritual wants of these people; and not only there, but in the older parts of the Dominion, men of earnest piety and Evangelical principles are greatly needed. The demand for graduates of Wycliffe is far in excess of the present capacity of the College to supply.

Nor does Wycliffe College neglect to foster a true missionary spirit in its men, and to keep constantly before them the missionary work and needs of the church and the world. Her graduates have shewn themselves willing to

work for God wherever His hand leads them, and those whose work lies near home have been zealous and faithful in procuring funds for the maintenance of their missionary brethren. Five Wycliffe graduates are at present working in the missionary diocese of Algoma, two in Rupert's Land, two in Mackenzie River, and three in Japan, while the graduates at home raise in their various parishes nearly \$3,000 annually towards the carrying on of this work.

THE DISTINCTIVE PRINCIPLES of this College, which are the basis of the instruction given, are:—

THE BIBLE, THE SOLE RULE OF FAITH; in opposition to the error that would make the Bible and tradition the *joint* rule of faith.

“Holy Scriptures containeth all things necessary to salvation, so that *whatsoever* is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby, is not to be required of any man, that it should be believed as an article of the faith, or be thought requisite or necessary to salvation.”—*Article VI.*

2. JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH IN CHRIST ALONE; in opposition to the sacramentarian system.

"We are accounted righteous before God, only for the merit of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ by faith and not for our own works or deservings. Wherefore, that we are justified by faith only, is a most wholesome doctrine and full of comfort, as it is more largely expressed in the Homily of Justification."—*Article XI.*

"The Sacraments were not ordained of Christ to be gazed upon or to be carried about; but that we should duly use them. And in such only as worthily receive the same [that is, with a 'lively and steadfast faith in Christ our Saviour.'—*Communion Service*] they have a wholesome effect or operation; but they that receive them unworthily purchase to themselves damnation, as St. Paul saith.—*Article XXV.*

3. THE SOLE AND EXCLUSIVE PRIESTHOOD OF JESUS CHRIST, in opposition to the assumption which would convert Christ's ministers into an order of sacrificing and mediating priests (*tepeis*).

"The only priests under the Gospel, designated as such in the New Testament, are the saints, the members of the Christian Brotherhood. As individuals, all Christians are priests alike." "The most exalted office in the Church, the highest gift in the Spirit, conveyed no sacerdotal right which was not enjoyed by the humblest member of the Christian community."—*Lightfoot, Bishop of Durham.*

"The word *priest*, as used in the Prayer-Book, is synonymous with, and is but a contraction of, *Presbyter*."—*Bishop Melvaine.*

4. THE REAL PRESENCE OF CHRIST BY FAITH IN THE HEARTS OF WORTHY RECIPIENTS OF THE HOLY COMMUNION; in opposition to the figment of His presence corporeally or spiritually on the communion table, under the form of bread and wine, after the consecration of the elements.

"No adoration is intended, or ought to be done, either unto the sacramental bread or wine, there bodily received, or unto any Corporal presence of Christ's natural Flesh and Blood;... the natural Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ are in heaven and not here."—(*Note at end of Communion Service.*)

"If a man... by any other just impediment do not receive the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood, the Curate shall instruct him if he do truly repent him of his sins, and steadfastly believe that Jesus Christ hath suffered death upon the Cross for him, and shed His Blood for his redemption, earnestly remembering the benefits he hath thereby, and giving Him hearty thanks therefor, he doth eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ profitably to his soul's health, although he do not receive the Sacrament with his mouth."—(*Rubric in Communion of the Sick.*)

"The Body of Christ is given, taken, and eaten, in the Supper only after an heavenly and spiritual manner. And the means whereby the Body of Christ is received and eaten in the Supper is faith."—*Article XXVIII.*

5. THE CHURCH OF CHRIST is "the Holy Catholic Church."—(*Creed.*) "The Holy Church Universal."—(*Prayer for Church Militant and Litany.*) "The mystical body of Christ, which is the blessed company of all faithful people."—*Communion Service.*

"The true Church is an universal congregation or fellowship of God's faithful and elect people, built upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the head corner stone."—*Homily for Whitsunday.*

"Before all sermons, lectures, and homilies, the preachers and ministers shall move the people to join with them in prayer in this

form or this effect, as briefly and conveniently as they may. 'Ye shall pray for Christ's Holy Catholic Church, that is, for the whole congregation of Christian people dispersed throughout the whole world, and especially for the Churches of England, Scotland, and Ireland.'—*Canon XV.*

6. "THE VISIBLE CHURCH (VISIBILIS ECCLESIA) OF CHRIST IS A CONGREGATION OF FAITHFUL MEN, in which the *pure word of God is preached, and the sacraments be duly administered* according to Christ's ordinance, in all those things that of *necessity are requisite* to the same."—*Article XIX.*

7. AN HISTORICAL EPISCOPATE, traceable to Apostolic direction, as conducive to the *well-being* but *not necessary to the being* of the Church; in opposition to the dogma of a tactual possession, "a fiction," asserts Dean Alford, "of which I find in the New Testament no trace."

STUDENTS.

SECTION I.

Conditions of Admission.

1. At the discretion of the Council Candidates may be admitted to this College, who shall produce a certificate, signed by three members of the Church of England, in good standing, one of whom at least must be a clergyman, testifying to the good moral and religious character of the applicant, and to such disposition and habits on his part as may render him apt and meet to exercise the ministry of the Church of England.

2. All applications for information as to the College, or for admission to the course of study, must be made in writing to the College Registrar.

3. Candidates for admission must undergo such examination as the Council may prescribe as to their spiritual and literary fitness for the work of the Ministry and when admitted shall be on probation throughout their first year.

4. Regular Students of the College are (*a*) Graduates in Arts of some recognized University; or (*b*) Matriculated Students of the University of Toronto.

The examiner will allow a choice of subjects, some of which must be based on the following selections, with which the candidate is expected to familiarize himself by careful reading :—

The standing of Candidates who have passed, or may hereafter pass, the Examinations of the department of Education for First or Second Class Teachers' Certificates is accepted *pro tanto* at any Junior Matriculation Examination, *i. e.*, Candidates will not be re-examined in the subjects already taken in the Departmental examinations.

The system of counting the work and attendance of the term in the annual results is adopted at Wycliffe College.

THIRD YEAR.....	The Psychology, or Ethics, or History, of the Third Year in the University of Toronto. All the work prescribed for the Second Examination in the Theological Course, page 18.
FOURTH YEAR.....	All the work prescribed for the Third Examination in the Theological Course.

B. A Matriculated Student may take the Pass Course in Arts with the permitted options (see page 27), and proceed to the Degree of B.A. concurrently with the Theological Course, in five years in accordance with the annexed schedule :—

FIRST YEAR.....	Latin; English; History; Mathematics; Greek; and either Biology or Physics in the University of Toronto. General Outlines of Christian Doctrine.
SECOND YEAR.....	Latin; English; History; Philosophy; Geology, or Chemistry; Greek; in the University of Toronto. Literature and Exegesis of O. T. and N. T. of First Examination; Liturgies of the First Examination.

THIRD YEAR.....	Latin; English; Psychology; in the University of Toronto. The three options—Biblical Greek of the Second Examination, Apologetics and Church History of the First Examination; Dogmatics of the First Examination; Homiletics of the Second Examination; Elocution of the First Examination.
FOURTH YEAR.....	Latin; English; in the University of Toronto. The three options—Biblical Greek of the Third Examination, Church History and Apologetics of the Second Examination. Literature and Exegesis of the Old and New Testaments, Dogmatics, Pastoral Theology, and Elocution of the Second Examination.
FIFTH YEAR.....	All the work prescribed for the Third Examination in the Theological Course, and Liturgics of the Second Examination.

C. A Graduate in Arts must attend the Theological Lectures during two years at least, taking the prescribed examinations during that period in accordance with the annexed schedule:—

FIRST YEAR.....	All the work prescribed for the First Examination, page 13; together with the following subjects of the Second Examination:—Biblical Greek; Dogmatics; Literature and Exegesis of the Old Testament; Apologetics; Homiletics; Pastoral Theology; Elocution.
SECOND YEAR.....	All the work prescribed for the Third Examination, page 13; together with the following subjects of the Second Examination; Literature and Exegesis of the New Testament; Church History; Liturgics.

D. Non-Matriculated Students may be admitted under exceptional circumstances as the Council may determine, being persons of mature age, practical experience, and special aptitude. They must pass such an examination as shall shew that they are fully able to enter upon the course prescribed. Such students must take the course of four years as set forth in the annexed synopsis:

FIRST YEAR.....	Latin; Elements of Greek Testament Grammar and Vocabulary, with Harper and Weidner's Manual. English; History; one of the Sciences—Biology or Physics of the First Year, in the University of Toronto. Rhetoric; General Outlines of Christian Doctrine.
SECOND, THIRD, AND FOURTH YEARS..	The same work prescribed in A for Matriculated Students, with the addition of Rhetoric in the second year.

N. B.—In the event of a candidate not satisfying the examiners at the end of this first preliminary year of his competency to take up the work of the second year as herein prescribed, he must spend a second year in the preliminary work.

2. A Candidate for examination in any year in the course who has failed in not more than three subjects of the examination, may be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing October Supplemental Examination on the subject or subjects only in which he has so failed. No candidate shall be allowed to enter upon the next succeeding year of his course until he has passed at the Supplemental Examination in the subject or subjects in which he has failed.

3. No deviation from these regulations will be allowed except by petition from the Council.

SECTION V.

Theological Options.

Wycliffe College being in affiliation with the University of Toronto, every inducement is held out to students to proceed to a degree in that institution. By a recently enacted statute, subjects taught in Wycliffe and other Theological Colleges, viz., Biblical Greek, Biblical Literature, Church History, and Apologetics are allowed as Options in the University of Toronto, in the Second, Third and Fourth Years. The following excerpts from the curriculum of the University of Toronto explain in detail the options allowed :

Undergraduates in the Pass course in the Third and Fourth Years may, in lieu of one or more of the subjects prescribed for each of three years, take certain of the following subjects, namely, Biblical Greek, Biblical Literature, Apologetics, and Church History, according to the following scheme :

THIRD YEAR.

- BIBLICAL GREEK.....May be substituted for the prescribed Classical Greek.
- BIBLICAL LITERATURE OR CHURCH HISTORY... (May be substituted for the Modern History of the Political Science subject.
- APOLOGETICSAn undergraduate who takes Philosophy may substitute Apologetics for Ethics.

FOURTH YEAR.

- BIBLICAL GREEK.....May be substituted for the prescribed Classical Greek.
- BIBLICAL LITERATURE OR CHURCH HISTORY OR APOLOGETICS..... (May be substituted for Political Science or Philosophy.

OPTIONS FOR HONOUR STUDENTS.

"Undergraduates in the Honour Department of Political Science may substitute Church History for the Pass English of the Second Year, and Biblical Greek for the Pass French or German of the Third Year.

"Undergraduates in the Honour Departments of Philosophy and Oriental Languages may, in the Third Year, substitute Biblical Literature or Church History for History."

"Undergraduates in the Honour Department of Philosophy may also substitute Biblical Greek for the Pass Classical Greek (Plato) to be taken in the Third Year; and Biblical Literature or Apologetics for the Pass Economics of the Fourth Year.

"Undergraduates in the Honour Department of Oriental Languages may also substitute Biblical Greek for the Pass Classical Greek of the Third and Fourth Years.

SECTION VI.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION AND EXAMINATIONS FOR DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

The PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR HOLY ORDERS, which will be accepted *pro tanto* by all the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province at their Ordination Examinations is conducted twice a year by the Provincial Board of Examiners.

The first examination during the Academic year 1893-4 will begin on Tuesday, October 3rd, 1893, and the second on Friday, April 27th, 1894.

The examination for students of Wycliffe College will be held in the College Library on the dates fixed.

Students of Wycliffe intending to write must send their applications, blank forms for which can be obtained through the Registrar of the College, not later than August 1st and March 1st in each year.

7. Epistle of St. Clement of Rome ; St. Augustine, De Fide et Symbolo ; Sermo ad Catechumenos ; Leo, Epistola ad Flavianum (from Heurtley, De Fide et Symbolo).

Candidates who obtain at least 33 per cent. of the aggregate marks in this examination, and 25 per cent. on each paper, shall be held to have passed the examination, and such candidates shall be entitled to receive from the Board of Examiners a certificate of having passed the subjects of examination. Such certificate shall authorize the holder after ordination to wear a black stuffhood with a border of crimson stuff two inches wide, on payment of \$10.

Candidates for the degree of B.D., who produce a certificate from the Board of Examiners of having obtained at least 50 per cent of the marks in the Preliminary Examination for candidates for Holy Orders conducted by the Board (paper No. 3 not being compulsory), shall be exempted from the first examination for the degree of B.D.

DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

Candidates for the degree of B.D., must be graduates in Arts of at least three years' standing of some duly empowered University in the British Dominions ; provided that in the case of clergymen in Priest's orders of more than six years' standing, who produce a written nomination for that purpose, passed at a duly called general meeting of the Governing Body of any one of the six institutions, and who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts in some duly

empowered University in the British Dominions, this requirement may be dispensed with. This provision with regard to non-graduates ceases after December 31st, 1899.

Candidates for any of the examinations must send in notice of their intention to present themselves for examination to the Secretary, the Rev. C. H. Mockridge, D.D., Toronto, on a form of application to be obtained from him not later than April 1st, in each year.

The examination will be conducted at Wycliffe College, beginning on the first Tuesday in October, in each year.

There are two examinations for the degree, the interval between which must be at least one year.

The subjects of this Examination for the years 1890-1896 are as follows:

(Questions in Hebrew will be set, but are not obligatory for the degree.)
3. A selected Gospel and Epistle from the New Testament in Greek :
The Gospel of St. Matthew.
The Epistle to the Romans.
4. Epistle of St. Clement of Rome ; St. Augustine, De Fide et Symbolo ; De Symbolo ad Catechumenos ; Leo, Epistola ad Flavianum. (From Heurtley, De Fide et Symbolo.)
5. The Outlines of the History :—
(a) Of the Christian Church to A.D. 451.
(Books recommended : Wordsworth's, or Robertson's, or Kurtz's Church History.)
(b) Of the English Church.
(Books recommended : Perry's English Church History, 3 vols. or Jennings's Ecclesia Anglicana.)
6. Dogmatic Theology :
Martensen's Christian Dogmatics, and Mason's Faith of the Gospel ;
or Van Oosterzee's Christian Dogmatics (omitting chapters VI and VII, Part II.)
Moule's Outlines of Christian Doctrine.
7. Flint's Theism and Flint's Antitheistic Theories.
8. Martensen's Christian Ethics (General.)

Further particulars as to the Degrees in Divinity are given in the syllabus, to be obtained from the Registrar of Wycliffe College, or from the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, Rev. C. H. Mockridge, D.D., 37 Buchanan St., Toronto.

SECTION VII.

Prizes.

In order to obtain any of these prizes the Candidate must rank in Class I. in the examination in the department or subject for which the prize is given, as well as in the prize work prescribed. These conditions being fulfilled the prize will be awarded to the student writing the best essay, or, where no essay is prescribed, taking the highest place in the special examination.

No student can be awarded more than two prizes in his year, and no student can obtain the same prize more than once during his course.

No student can be awarded a prize unless he passes all the examinations of his year.

All essays must be sent to the Registrar not later than March 1st in each year.

 I. MACPHERSON PRIZE.

Twenty-five dollars in books, presented by Sir D. L. Macpherson, in the Department of Biblical Greek. Open to students taking the third examination.

VII. GURD PRIZE.

Twenty-five dollars in books, presented by R. S. Gurd, Esq., of Sarnia, in the Department of Pastoral Theology. Open to students taking the second and third examination.

Oral Examination in Practical Christian Work.

VIII. REFORMATION PRIZE.

Thirty dollars in books, presented by N. W. Hoyles, Esq., Q.C., to promote the essential principles of the Reformation, open to all *graduates* of the College and to students taking the second or third examination.

1. Analysis of selected book.
Bishop O'Brien's "Nature and Effects of Faith."
2. Essay on "Justification and Sanctification in their Nature and Mutual Relations."

IX. NEVILLE PRIZE IN ELOCUTION.

Twenty dollars in books, presented by Mrs. Neville, to promote the effective reading of the Scriptures and the Church Services, open to students taking the third examination.

X. COLLEGE PRIZE IN HISTORY AND LITERATURE OF THE OLD TESTAMENT.

Ten dollars in books, open to students taking third examination.

Work for Special Examination :—

Genesis.

XI. THE DESOYRES PRIZE.

Fifty dollars in books, presented by Rev. J. DeSoyres, M.A., rector of St. John's Church, St. John, New Brunswick. Given for the best essay upon some prescribed subject in relation to the History of Religion and of the Christian Church. The object of the donor is to promote original historical investigation. Therefore, no award can be made unless the essay shews evidence of independent research and knowledge of authorities. The writer of each essay must enumerate all the authorities consulted in his work. The prize is open to all students and to graduates of not more than five years standing.

Subject for essay:—

1894—The Evangelical Revival of the 18th Century.
Or Bernard of Clairvaux.
Or A Study of the Reformation as it affected
the Latin Races.

XII. THE MISSIONARY PRIZE.

Books to the value of \$25, presented by J. E. Bryant, Esq., M.A., to encourage interest in Missionary history and work, open to all members of the STUDENTS' MISSION SOCIETY. The prize will be awarded for the best essay on the Missionary Work of the world during the preceding year. The prize essay must present evidences of careful reading and research and will be published in the *Evangelical Churchman*.

SECTION VIII.

The Keeping of Terms.

1. In the course, each year comprises two terms :
 1. Michaelmas Term—From October 2nd to December 22nd (inclusive).
 2. Easter Term—From January 8th to April 27th (inclusive).
2. Every student is required to present himself punctually at the beginning of each term.
3. For necessary absence during term, previous permission from the Principal or Dean must be obtained.
4. Examinations may be given or essays required at the end of each Term or during the Term, at the discretion of the Professor or Lecturer. At the close of the Easter Term

Examinations on the work of the Academic year will be held jointly by Examiners appointed by the Council, and the Professors and Lecturers of the College.

5. Every regular Student who has passed all the required Examinations will receive the Diploma of the College.

6. Every Student shall engage in the work of the Students' Mission Society, and other practical work, under the direction of the Professor of Practical Theology, and the Dean of the College.

SECTION IX.

Regulations for Resident Students.

1. The Resident Students are under the immediate charge of the Dean.

2. All Students not resident in Toronto, are required to live in the College Building. The cost of living in the College Building is \$4 per week. No allowance will be made during term for less than one week's absence.

N.B.—A Student's expenditure for board, lodging and washing through the Academic Year, as well as for books and University fees, need not exceed \$175.

3. Graduates of the College, and Graduates and Undergraduates of the University of Toronto, may be admitted as Residents, at the discretion of the Dean, to any rooms not required by Students.

4. Spirituous liquors are not allowed in the College Building, unless prescribed by a physician for medical purposes.

5. All Resident Students are required regularly to attend morning and evening service. Students are required to attend the Sunday service in the College Chapel, unless exempted from so doing by being engaged in Mission work.

6. No student shall be absent from the College after the doors are closed, except by permission from the Dean.

7. Students are required to wear the College gown during the College services, at lectures and in the refectory.

8. The first morning bell shall be rung at 7 a.m. Breakfast at 8 a.m. Morning Prayer 8.35 to 8.50 a.m. Dinner at 1 p.m. Tea at 6 p.m. Evening Prayer at 6.30 p.m. Doors close at 10.30 p.m.

SECTION X.

Bursaries and Loans.

REGULATIONS.

I. There are ten Bursaries of \$120 each per annum, renewable from year to year during the Academic Course of the Beneficiary, at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

II. Bursaries shall be awarded upon the conditions hereinafter stated. Failure to comply with the conditions required will involve the forfeiture of the Bursary.

III. Provision has been made for extending loans to students under certain prescribed conditions, whenever the applicant himself prefers to receive assistance in this form, or whenever the Executive Committee judge it expedient, and the funds of the College permit it.

IV. Sums of money not exceeding \$120 per annum may be loaned to students who comply with the necessary conditions to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee. No interest shall be charged upon these loans, and they shall be repayable on such terms as the Committee shall arrange.

V. All applications for Bursaries or for Loans shall be referred to the Executive Committee, appointed annually by the Council.

VI. Bursaries and Loans will only be granted to students in divinity who are pursuing one of the courses laid down in the College Calendar, or a full course in Arts, at the University of Toronto, under the supervision of the College Council.

VII. In the case of every application for a Bursary or for a Loan, it shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to make thorough and careful inquiry, in order to ascertain, first, that the applicant is worthy of the assistance he seeks; and, secondly, that his financial circumstances are such that, without this assistance, he is unable to proceed with his studies.

VIII. In all cases the holder of a Bursary or of a Loan shall be upon probation during his first term in residence; and it shall be understood that a grant of a Bursary or of a Loan may be discontinued at the end of the term, if the Beneficiary be found inefficient or unworthy.

IX. A Bursary or a Loan shall be payable in three instalments; the first at the close of the Michaelmas Term; the second before Easter, and the third at the close of the Academic year.

X. In the event of the Beneficiary abandoning his studies before entering the Ministry, he will be required to repay the amount he has received.

XI. The applicant is expected to be in hearty and practical sympathy with Evangelical Truth as opposed to the errors of Sacerdotalism on the one hand, and of Rationalism on the other. The Council feel that for applicants to accept the aid with other views and feelings, would be as dishonest in them as it would be for the Council to use for some different purpose the money entrusted to them for Evangelical Education.

XII. The applicant is required to bring satisfactory testimonials, stating that he is a suitable person to receive aid from the Council in preparing for the sacred Ministry, and also, that without such aid he is unable to pursue his studies.

XIII. The applicant is required to fill up, sign, and transmit to the College Registrar a form of application for Bursaries or Loans, which form may be had upon application in person or by writing to the Registrar.

XIV. No Student shall hold a Bursary or Loan in any academic year unless he has passed the full examinations of the College or of the University immediately preceding such year.

XV. In case a Beneficiary leaves the Canadian Church (except for the Foreign Mission Field), within seven years after his graduation, he will be required to return the amount he has received.

STUDENTS' MISSION SOCIETY.

This Society has been in operation since November, 1891, under the patronage of the different Bishops, in whose Dioceses work has been undertaken. The object of the Society is to open up new Missions, and to keep open old ones which are unable to maintain a resident clergyman. A valuable feature of its work is, that it is a means for the education in parochial organization and work, of men, who are preparing for the ministry, and that it thus enables them to enter upon their ministerial labours, when their College course is completed, with some practical knowledge of the duties of the office.

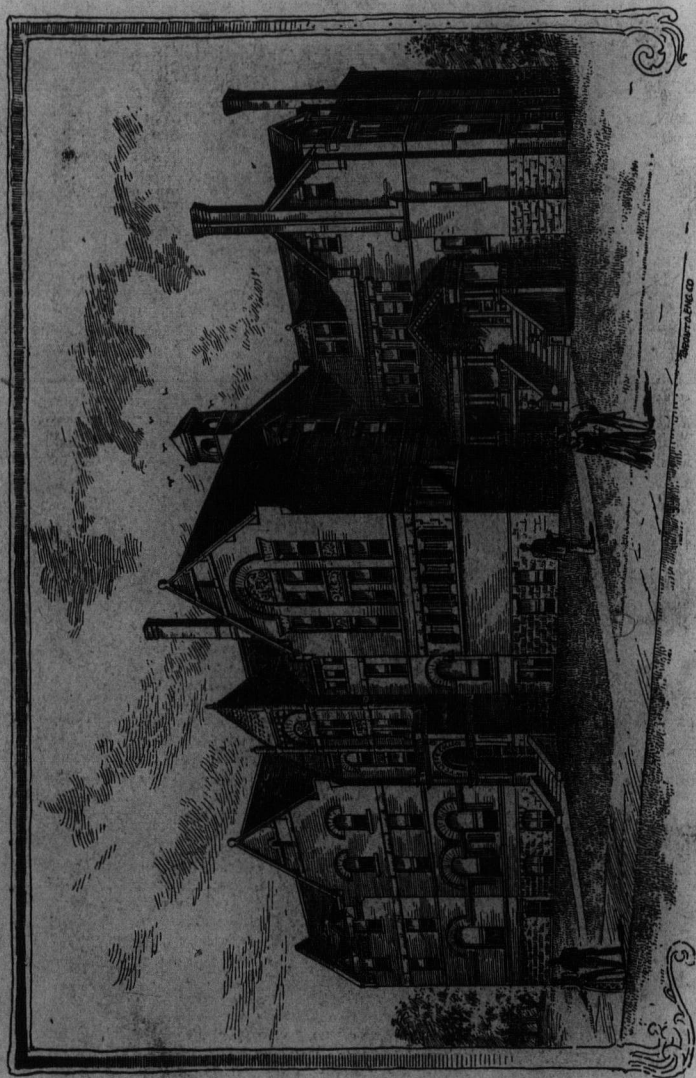
