SYMBOL OF FRENCH PROWESS

Martial Bird Placed in Prominent Position on Pont de Kehl, Over the River Rhine.

A Gallie cock now adorns the Font de Kehl on the Rhine at Strasbourg where but only the other day sat erect the griffin of Baden, symbolising the iron heel upon Alsace. The idea of the setting up of the Gallic cock was that of the French general, Cernesson, the first officer in charge of the engineers in a freed Strasbourg. scheme was put before General Hirschauer and was immediately adopted. The sculptor chosen to carve the emblematic bird was the Alsatian Schultz. Since the peace treaty gave France possession of the entire length of the Rhine bridges, the Gallic cock in bronze has been placed aloft on the right bank of the Rhine. It has an air, that bird, the air of the king of the barnyard justily crowing at dawn.


