Ever since you can remember you have heard the state of Virginia called the "Old Dominion;" do you know why it is so called? During the protectorate of Cromwell the colony of Virginia refused to acknowledge his authority and declared itself independent. Shortly after, when Cromwell threatened to send a fleet and army to reduce them to subjection, the Virginians sent a messenger to Charles II, who was then an exile in Flan-Charles 11, who was then an exile in Fianders, inviting him to return in the ship with the messenger and be king of Virginia. Charles accepted the invitation and was on the eve of embarking for the New World when he was called to the throne of England. As soon as he was safely seated on the throne, out of gratitude for the loyalty of Virginia he caused her coat-of-arms to be quartered with those of England, Ireland and Scotland, as an independent member of the empire—a distinct portion of the "Old Dominion." Coins of Virginia were issued as late as the reign of George III, which bore on one side the coat-of-arms of England, Ireland, Scotland and Virginia.—St. Louis Republic.



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
