At the head of the casket on a satin-covered table were placed the late Premier's decorations, the insignia of his various orders. The Premier himself lay in his Privy Councilor's uniform of blue and gold lace, a uniform, by the way, which scarce two dozen persons in the empire are privileged to wear. The garments hung loosely round his worn and attenuated form. His face had a peculiar yellowish color and the surface of the skin was of a waxen consistency, probably the result of embalming. There was no wrinkle or furrow about the mouth or eyes. The features were in perfect repose. As soon as the remains, were placed in state a military watch was appointed to guard them. It consisted of the sergeant's guard of each of the local corps, and during the day and night the guards relieved each other at intervals.

The Governor-General was the first to view the remains after they were placed on the catafalque. He laid on the caket a magnificent wreath of white west and maiden-hair terns, with a card containing the following:

METHODISTS DELIBERATING.

London Conference Love Feast and Ordination Services.

London.

Windsor, June 8.—The usual Conference love feast was held in Windsor Avenue Methodist Church yesterday, Rev. E. C. Parsons in charge. Rev. Dr. Douglas, of Montreal, preached the ordination sermon from the words, "For we glory in tribulation also." At the close of the sermon the secretary presented Wm. McMullen, B.A., C. W. Brown, B.A., B.D., W. J. Smith, B.A., to the president for ordination. The Sunday school was addressed in the afternoon by Revs. E. E. Scott and C. Smith. In the evening the ex-president, Rev. J. R. Gundy, occupied the pulpit and spoke to a large audience. The sacramental service was conducted by Rev. Wm. Hayhurst.

At 9 o'clock this morning Conference assembled for business. A communication was read in acknowledgment to a letter of sympathy with Rev. Dr. Evans. Rev. J. G. Scott presented the report of the Educational Committee on the question of college degrees. It was resolved that all degrees granted by Canadian institutions be recognized and all foreign degrees prior to 1885. The report of Alma College was ably presented by Rev. J. R. Warner, M.A., and Mr. J. McCausland. The college building cost \$116,000 and has a debt of \$50,000, with 181 students enrolled and 141 resident pupils. It has been, lately affiliated with Victoria University. Rev. J. R. Gundy presented the report of the Wesleyan Female College, Hamilton, which was adopted. The Sabbath school publications of the church were represented by the editor, Rev. W. H. Withrow, D.D. Those publications reach 250,000. He spoke in hopeful terms of the Epworth League. It is only one and a half years old and has 300 organizations in Canada. Rev. Dr. Douglas addressed the Conference, setting forth the work the Montreal Theological College, of which he is president, is doing. The doctor's able ordination sermon yesterday was the subject of a complimentary resolution. The superannuation fund reports, as presented by the treasurer, Rev. J. DISGRACED THROUGH GAMBLING. The famous libel suit brought by Sir William Gordon Cumming against his associates in the gambling games of baccarat, at which the Prince of Wales presided, ended this forenoon. The jury apparently reached the conclusion that Sir William cheated in the manner described by the men and women who swore to that effect, for the verdict was for the defendants. Sir William, it has been reported, had threatened to commit suicide if he did not obtain a vindication, but so far it is not chronicled that he has resorted to that inglorious method of ending his existence. There are many, indeed, that believe he will rather turn his attention to his detractors, and those who refused to stand by him in his distresses, and indulge in exposures that will make them wish they had withdrawn their charges.

There can be no doubt, however, that the discomfised plaintiff is disgraced by the result. Having practically been found guilty of cheating, Sir William will be forced to retire from his position in the Guards. 

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

Foreign wheats are depressed and generally 6d lower. Heavy shipments are on passage, estimated at 3,000,000 quarters, and this fact keeps the market weak. California, prompt shipment, is quoted at 44s 6d. New American winter is speculated in at 40s for August shipment. Beans and barley have declined 6d, maize 9d and oats 9d. At to-day's market English wheats were dull at 5d decline. Foreign reds were also 6d lower, while prices of whites were maintained. Flour declined 6d. Barley was rather firmer.
