WASHINGTON, June 10.—Advices from the fourth Quinquennial Universal Postal Union Congress, now in session at Vienna, say the long-desired accession of the Australian colonies has been effected. This means a reduction of more than 50 per cent. in the rates of postage to those countries, the postal union rate being only 5 cents per half ounce for letters and 2 cents for postal cards.
