BERLIN, May 7 .- Ahlwardt, the Jewember of the last Reichstag, was arrested to-night, and will be returned to prison to serve his sontence for having libelled the Loewes, small arms manufac-turers. The period of immunity, expired with the Reichstag.

The Great Eastern's Captain Dead. London, May 7 .- Sir James Anderson died at 2 this morning. He was born at Dumfries in 1820. He was for some time commodore of the Cunard steamship line, and commanded the steamship Great Eastern during the Atlantic cable laying in 1865 and 1866. His second wife died about a year and a half ago.

Belligerents Bought Off.

LONDON, May 7 .- A dispatch from Madrid to the Central News says it is reported that the collapse of the revolt in Cuba is due to the Government's buying off all the leaders. This method was adopted because it was cheaper than fighting. The Government found it impossible to bring about a decisive battle with the guerilla bands.

Sombody Threw a Bomb.

Dublin, May 7.—A dynamite bomb exploded at 10:40 o'clock last night in the uadrangle of the Four Courts. Many windows were broken, but otherwise no damage was done. It is supposed that somebody threw the bomb over the railings in a spirit of bravado. The day was the eleventh anniversary of the assassination of Lord Frederick Cavendish and Under Secretary Burke in Phoenix Park.

Money Market Improved.

Bank of England rate steadied both money and stock markets. The exports of gold and stock markets. The exports of gold were moderate, and a serious drain is not now expected in spite of the cricis in Australia, where £1,250,000 has gone in a fornight. American railway securities suffered a general relapse, though there were signs of improvement at the close. Business on the Paris bourse has improved during the week.

Emin Pasha's Daughter.

Berlin, May 7 .- The 12-year-old daugh ter of Emin Pasha, who, during her father's exploration in Africa, was cared for by exploration in Africa, was cared for by friends on the coast, is expected to arrive from East Africa shortly and to proceed to Neisse, where she will be received by relatives. The Governor of German East Africa has ordered that Emin Pasha's manuscripts, geological and botanical collections and weapons, now in Dur-es-Salam and Eagomoyo, be packed and shipped to his funity in Neisse. News of this order is regarded as final confirmation of the announcement of Emin's death.

BEBLIN, May 6.—On the result of the vote on the Army Bill being known the Social Democratic members of the Reichstag displayed the wildest enthusiasm. They, hurrahed Pepatedly, following cheer with but raised repeatedly, following cheer with cheer. Great confusion and uproar prevailed in the House, and public excitement is at the highest pitch in Berlin. The Reichsanzeiger publishes the decree of the Kaiser dissolving the Reichstag. The new elections, which under the constitution must take place within 60 days after dissolution, are to be held on the 15th of June. The new session must open within 90 days after dissolution.

The last attempts at compromise having Ialled, Chancellor Caprivi refusing to sanction a proposition to make the two years' active service permanent, the Kaiser became impatient of further delay and pressed for a decision by the Reichstag today. Hence the over the changes, which will involve the

Kaiser, Caprivi himself and others whom the Chancellor has no desire to antagonize. Chancellor Caprivi has gone to Potsdam to offer his resignation to the Kaiser. The Kaiser has summoned Count Botho von Fulenburg, the Prussian Premier, to Potsdam. Count Botho von Fulenberg took the place of Chancellor von Caprivi, as Prussian Premier about a year ago, when Chancellor Caprivi resigned that office, owing to the decision of the Kaiser to withdraw the Educational Bill from the Prussian Landiag.

The most striking feature of the closing debate was the resurgence of anti-Prussian sentiments, especially from the speakers of the Center party. Dr. Lieber, who is a leader in the councils of his party, after attacking Chancellor von Caprivi for having, as he put it, reserted to the worst form of Eismarckian methods to secure the pasage of the bill, said:

"The Center parry fights to-day against the ambitions of a centralizing Covarism. We protest against the militarism which translates itself: In persistent endeavors to extend the principles of the Prussian state

translates itself, in persistent endeavors to extend the principles of the Prussian state into the domain of imperial legislation. In the interests of the empire we demand that the Prussian policy be confined to the Prussian Diet, while the German prevail in the Reichastag."

Neither Chancellor von Caprivi nor Baron von Manteuffel, the Prussian Conservative leader, attempted to respond to Dr. Lieber's attack. All the speakers on the Government side simply ignored the expressions of anti-Prussian sentiment. expressions of anti-Prussian sentiment The Chancellor commented vaguely upon the democratic tendencies that have recent ly been developing among the Centerists and suggested that the policy now pursued by that party had its inspiration in the Vatican.

Hurriedly convened meetings are being held in Berlin and other populous centers. The promptness with which the Reichstag was dissolved immediately after the defeat of the Government was amounced has taken everybody by aurprise. The Social Democratic leaders alone are really ready for the electoral campaign. The Socialist for the electoral campaign. The Socialist party expects, with reason, to have an increased representation in the next Reich-

increased representation in the next Keienstag.

The Emperor will not allow the dissolution of the Reichstag to interfere with the programme of his coming tour. Before starting for North Cape his Majesty will go on a deer stalking expedition at Prockelwitz. Subsequently he will hunt over the estates of Count Rochberg in Silesia.

German constitutionalism is too weak to stand a conflict with the Government in military matters. In the coming elections, however, the Army Bill will play only a secondary part. The war cries of the enemies of liberalism will be autl-Semisium and protection."

BERLIN, May 8.—Prince Bismarck's Nachrichten regrets the dissolution, but hopes it may be followed by some beneficial results. The coming struggle, it says, "threatens to be one of the most violent of the empire. Everybody expects that it will be characterized by some startling events."

The Member for North Simcoe Speaks to a Kingston Audience,

Kingston, May 6.—The City Hall was packed to the doors to-night to hear D'Alton McCarthy. He was accompanied to the platform by Rev. Dr. Grant and other clerical and professional gentiemen. Principal Grant opened by declaring Mr. Mc Carthy a thoroughbred and having sand requisite for a man having sand plauded his stand on Provincial rights. Chicago, May 7.—The council of administration has decided that smoking is permissable within the grounds of the exposition but not inside of the buildings.

Until all the tickets are actually counted it can only be surmised how many people attended the opening, but allowing that 95,000 people who had tickets did not use them, there remains the stupendous figure of 400,000 as the number of people who visited the park on May 1. This showing is in strong contrast with the best record made at the Centennial Exhibition, at which the greatest attendance was on Pennsylvanis Day, when the number was 274,919. At the Paris Exposition of 1878, which is considered the most successful in practical results ever held in that country, the greatest attendance for one day was 200,613. The history of expositions shows that there is always a great reaction in the attendance the next few days after the opening. At the Centennial the attendance on May 11, the day after the opening, was 12,720; Tuesday's attendance at Jackson Park was 14,300.

Plans have been perfected by the Illinois Central Railroad Company which provide for the transportation of more than 1,000,000 passengers daily to and from the World's Fair. The road, has unquestionably mapped out a system under which 1,000,000 passengers going to and returning from Jackson Park can be accommedated with seats.



The chief topic for gossip in Great B itain during the last few days has been the betrothal of Princess May to the Duke of York, eldest surviving son of the Prince of Wales. It comes with little delay, considering the time that has elapsed since the first lover of the princess, the duke's brother, died. Discussing this topic, a special cablegram comments in this way:

"It is a pity that the announcement of the betrothal of the Duke of York and Princess May could not have been made under happier circumstances. It appeared to be forced by the false report which got into print on the previous day to the effect that the young prince had been secretly married to the daughter of an English officer at Malta. There have been indications, if the court gossip counts for anything, that the prince has long had a most sincere admiration for this charming daughter of one of the Queen's defenders. It is affirmed that the Prince of Wales felt it necessary to interfere in order to prevent this attachment becoming so strong as to disappoint the matchmaking desires of the royal family and the whole nation. This episode threatens to spoil the royal romance, for there has been universal popular delight over the rare coincidence that a marriage most desirable for reasons of State appeared to be also a genuine love match.

"Another shadow is thrown over the felicitous occasion by busy rumors regard-ing he recent relations existing between the Prince and Princess of Wales. When the Mediterranean trip of the Prince of Wales' family was first projected it was announced that the prince would be of the party. The princess and the children finally went without him. The Duke of York has returned, but the princess continues to linger in Greece and other southern resorts, and nothing is yet made southern resorts, and nothing is yet made known about her plans for the season. It is to be regretted that gossip has dragged in the name of a lady well known in society as the cause of the alleged estrangement between the prince and princess. The rumors will probably soon be set at rest by the announcement of the immediate return of the princess and her daughters to join in the festivities attending the Duke of York's botrothal. That those festivities, culminating in a magnificent midsummer wedding, will be the gayest London has seen for many years is already assured."

No More Red Tape. The London Times, which prides itself on exactitude in diplomatic matters, and on exactitude in diplomatic matters, and other newspapers, said that the Queen sent the state carriage to convey Mr. Lincoln to the station and again to Windsor castle, when he went to present his letters of reall on Thursday. This is not true. M. Waddington, the French ambassador, went to Windsor on the same train with Mr. Lincoln for the same purpose. A Princess Sculptor. Danger from Petroleum. English insurance corporations lave under consideration the desirableness of increasing the rates on vessels carrying increasing the rates on vessels carrying crude petrolum in barrels or of insisting upon special regulations for cleansing ships laden with what is now declared to be one of the most dangerous of all cargoes. A steamer which recently discharged at Newport crude petroleum in barrels, was afterward found to have a considerable quantity of all in the engine room well, in the ward found to have a considerable quantity of oil in the engine room well, in the limbers, and in the gutterways. The vessel was thereupon placed in a dry dock, and the plugs in the bottom having been removed, a considerable quantity of crude oil flowed out. This steamer loaded at Philadelphia with nearly a dozen others, and it is probable that special inquiries will be made at that port. The matter will not be allowed to drop as it is believed a new and very serious source of danger to ships has been discovered. An explosion recently occurred aboard a steamer which several weeks previously had discharged a cargo of crude oil in barrels, although the vessel had been thoroughly washed out with sea water two or three times.

The Great Question.

The Great Question. The principle news regarding the bill for conceding self-government to Ireland this week shows that great progress has been made in the support of Mr. Gladstone's scheme. Belfast has quieted down, the city of Derry has subscribed \$1,000 to the home rule fund, and other Ulster towns are falling into line. It is significant of the real underlying feeling in Ireland that there has been a steady rise in almost every kind of Irish security since the second reading of the Home Rule Bill. This is the very opposite of what the Unionists predicted. The temporary fall in banking and railway stocks a month back gave Mr. Gladstone's opponents a very strong argument for platform and parliamentary use. The rostrums of Tovyism rang with denunciations of the policy which was bringing ruln upon the vested interests of the Irish commercial classes. The whole thing was a movement of bears. 

For a long time the workmen employed in the Salford, England, fron works have expressed dissatisfaction because of the length of their hours of labor. We repre-"On Saturday, Dec. 3, last year, our Mr. Mather asked you to attend a mass meeting in one of the erecting shops for the purpose of hearing some observations he had to make on the subject of the shortening of the hours of labor, with a view to adopting a week of 48 hours instead of 53 hours, the wages remaining the same. duce below two addresses of an unusual haraoter in reference thereto. Mr. Mather, M.P., one of the employers, last December

"In accordance with the request made that you should form a committee to discuss the question, you appointed a number of your fellow-workmen to take the subject

into consideration.

"Up to the present time we have not received any proposals from that committee, although we understand it has often

addressed his employes as below:

"I have invited you to meet me to-day for the purpose of asking you whether we could not, in this firm, devise some plan by which the hours of labor may be shortened, so as to be a benefit to you, and not disadvantageous to the business in which we are all engaged. You form a partnership with the members of this firm in carrying on a large industry, and the success of that industry is as much your concern as ours. We should, therefore, endeavor not to allow it to fall away by any mistaken policy or action, either on your part or ours. Of course our competitors aloue would benefit in that ease; you would suffer and we should suffer.

"Now, you are no doubt well aware of the discussion which has taken place during the last few months in regard to labor, and especially on the question of shortening the hours of labor. As an employer, and in view of the fact of so much being said upon this question, I wish to be perfectly at one with you in this respect, that if there is any benefit you could derive from shortening the hours of labor for yourselves without damaging the success of the industry in which we are all engaged, we are quite willing to adopt a new plan.

"I have long felt that some rearrangement of hours is necessary, at least as far as the first quarter of the day is concerned. I know there are many reasons why, if it can be done, the start before breakfast should be abolished.

"Various considerations make the first quarter of the day upprofitable to employers, and not very enjoyable to workpeeple.

"The to the present time we have now mereeived any proposals from that committee, although we understand it has often met.

"We have been given to understand that the difficulties of the committee in arriving at any scheme which shall be unanimous, and one that can be recommended to the whole trade, are in connection with the working and payment of overtime and the payment of double shifts of men.

"It may be that these difficulties can only be removed after extended experience of the working of a 48 hours' system. We have resolved, therefore, to take upon ourselves the risk of the experiment, and from the week commencing Feb. 20 these works will commence running 48 instead of 53 hours per week, and at the same wages.

"The principles upon which alone such a change in the shortening of the hours of labor, without reducing wages, can be justified, were fully set forth in Mr. Mather's observations addressed to you on Dec. 3 last, an abridged report of which is appended to this circular.

"Without some compensation being made on the part of the workmen, by greater punctuality and increased energy and interest during the shorter hours, it is obviously impossible that the whole trade can unite in carrying out the new system. We have been assured by many serious workmen that this is possible. If not, other forms of compensation may be suggested after the experiment has been tried over a sufficiently long period.

"Our own opinions as to the increased energy, spirit and cheerfulness with which you will all work when the day is shortened by cutting off the two hours before breakfast, were expressed by Mr. Mather.

"We rely for the success of this shortening of the hours upon the moral, as much as the physical, effect that will result therefrom.

"We cannot enter now upon the question of overtime or double shitts. These two "Various considerations make the first quarter of the day unprofitable to employers, and not very enjoyable to workpeople. Again, we have seen how circumstances have gradually grown different during the last 20 or 30 years. We have now many recreations and amusements, and very properly so, for the people after the hours of work. It is not quite as easy to go to bed at 9 or 10 o'clock as it was 20 or 30 years ago. There was nothing much in those days but work and sleep. There were few night schools, or enjoyment in the way of lectures and rational recreation, etc.

"Well, these recreations naturally occupy
some time, and probably you would not go
to bed until 10 or 11 o'clock, instead of at
9 as your forefathers did. These changed
circumstances render it especially difficult
for boys who have to attend night schools.

"I wish to make it possible that there
need only be one meal hour in the working
time of the day. I think it would be better for workmen if they could start their
work atter enjoying a good solid meal with
their families before leaving home. The
condition of men all through the day would
then be different from what it is now.
There need only be one stop instead of two,
one meal hour instead of two, and on the
whole a shorter week.

"Now, what you have to do is to devise
a scheme of working time which will be advantageous both to you and us; and we
wish to show you that we are ready as a
firm to adopt such a system. Of course it
is not my duty, nor does my interest in
this firm permit me, to introduce any system of hours of labor or wages on the mere
ground of philanthropy. I should only be
a mischief-maker if I disregarded the interests of other employers, and proposed "We cannot enter now upon the question of overtime or double shifts. These two points we propose to leave over to settle themselves after the experiment has been tried. We shall endeavor during that period to work as little overtime as possible, but the rates will remain the same as now in operation. Should we require to employ a number of men on a double shift, they will be paid the same wages and work the same number of hours as heretofore.

"At the end of the probational period,
which we shall fix at twelve months, we
must have full liberty to revert to the old
plan of working in any particular branch or
throughout our industry, or to make such
modifications as experience may show to be
necessary, should the experiment have
proved the system to be prejudicial or such
that we cannot recommend it to the trade
as a whole.

"We accept in good faith the assurance "We accept in good faith the assurances made to us that your object is to aflord more employment to your fellow-workmen, and consequently are willing to limit yourselves to 48 hours per week, in order that the demand for more labor may be supplied by other workmen if longer hours are needed, and thus increase the possibility of employment for a larger number of men in the aggregate. Our object is to facilitate your endeavors, while maintaining the industry in which we are all engaged in a healthy condition.

"The problem is one that cannot be solved in a large machine-making and engineering district like Lancashire without some experiment being made, because this a mischief-maker if I disregarded the interests of other employers, and proposed
to you what could not be accepted by the
employers in the trade as a whole in the
course of time.

"I want us to approach this question
with great deliberation, prudence and
reason, so that whatever we arrange
to do here in regard to shortening the hours
of labor may be held up by all our fellowlaborers and fellow-employers as a plan
practical, prudent, and in the end profitable, and certainly helpful towards the
maintenance of the industries of the
country.

do consider that with these shorter hours and wages unreduced you will have it in your power to manifest throughout the day a spirit of earnestness and intelligence in your work which the longer hours may have somewhat impaired.

"The conditions of your home life should be materially improved, when you can breakfast with your families and come to work refreshed from your previous day's labor more thoroughly than may now be possible.

"You are aware we enjoy no monopoly."

"You are aware we enjoy no monopoly in our business. We are subject to keen competition at home and abroad in all we produce. This experiment, therefore, is sure to entail some considerable-sacrifice upon us; but if it will enable us to make a permanent custom of the trade that which is now only a matter of hope and desire, we shall count it a privilege to have aided you in proving that your aspirations are perfectly consistent with the maintenance of the welfare and prosperity of the engineering industry.

"We have entered into an arrangement "We have entered into an arrangement with the Amalgamated Society of Engineers, to the effect that no demands shall be authorized or encouraged by them on other employers in this district during a year's trial; and, further, that should the experiment show that we cannot recommend the change for general adoption, we may revert to our present system, or make such modifications as shall seem satisfactory to all concerned, without any reflection being cast upon our bona fides or motives.

A POPULAR CAME.

Basket Ball as Universally Played in Gymnasiums.

A Pastime for Men and Women-Some thing Like Football, But Not Rough-Some Crack Lon-

For a long time gymnasium instructors were confronted by the necessity for a game which could be played indoors by old and young, male and female. They wented a game devoid of rough features, yet one which would be thoroughly scientific, and which should afford plenty of opportunity for good healthy exercise for the scholar or business man and training for the athlete. Such possibilities have been discovered in the game of basket ball, which has become so pepular in school and club gymnasiums throughout the country.



The game was first introduced by the directors and pupils of the Y. M. C. A. Training School at Springfield, Mass. Its advantages were soon perceived, and the sport spread to the gymnasiums controlled by the Young Men's Christian Association, and was further introduced into scholastic institutions and club gymnasiums. At the training school the game was developed, and a strong team was drilled in the simple workings of it by James Naismith, one of the Springfield instructors, and an earness worker in the field of all-around sport and recreation. In New York and Brooklyn are several good teams, and these play the game from time to time.

The game can readily be played in almost the smallest gymnasium. As the sizes of the exercising rooms vary, the game played by each team is slightly different. All the match games are played under regular rules, however, and the peculiar disadvantage which a "gym" may have for the visiting team is remedied so far as possible. The game can be played out of doors, on a large field quite as well as in a small gymnasium. The goals pictured in this gool unn are used, the upright one for the field, on which it can be placed at any point, and the other for indoor play. The latter is attached to the gallery or the wall of the room. The string is used to turn the goal so that the ball may readily be regained. These goals are the improved article. The first goals, from which the game got its name, were only peach baskets nailed to the wall or running track.

You are not resting your body, but rather straining it, and thereby doing yourself a great wrong. We do not rest the back by placing the shoulders against the chair, but rather by holding the shoulders in the same position as when standing. The head should be held erect, poising equally upon the shoulders. Upon the art of standing correctly depends, after all, the posture of the body. The chest must be lifted into proper position, the arms must be brought into proper position, and in doing this the muscles are developed, the chest expanded, and physical strength is gained. Then learn how to walk correctly. When walking the ball and heel of the foot should touch the floor at the same time. This gives an elasticity to the step, which cannot otherwise be obtained. 
