Mr. Hayes was out for the first time in many weeks yesterday, having been laid up all winter with a broken leg. He was out in his yard sifting ashes when suddenly a large dog rushed in and made a spring at him and fastened its teeth

TERRIBLY WOUNDED.

Mr. Hayes was knocked down, but did the best he could to defend himself with his ash sifter. In his weakened condition, however, he could do but little, and the dog bit him repeatedly.

His clothing was torn to shreds about the shoulders, and the skin all the way down from the shoulder to the hands was fearfully chewed.

The fingers were bitten in a number of places by the animal and bled pro

The dog finally fled, leaving Mr. Hayes on the ground helpless from the shock and from the injuries he had sustained. He lay in the yard for some minutes, and then finally made his way to the house covered with blood, DOCTOR CALLED.

Dr. Percy . Banghart was summoned, and at once cauterized the wounds and dressed them. Mr. Hayes was very weak from loss of blood and from the results of his being in the house so long with a broken leg, but it was decided to send him at once to the Pasteur Institute.

It is feared that in his weakened condition the results of the long journey and of the shock from which he is suffering, may prove very serious.



### HAMILTON IS CHARGED WITH ELECTRICITY

Experts Fear That There Will Be a Serious and Fatal Explosion Shortly.

Hamilton, Ont., March 2.-That there is grave danger from explosions due to electrolysis pitting gas mains is emphasized by former City Engineer Barrow in a letter to the press, and that it is not exaggerated is evident from a surprising discovery made at the city hospital this week. The gas and water pipes in the in-

stitution are so heavily charged with electricity that frequently the nurses in making up the iron beds have received shocks that have thrown them half-way across the room. It is feared contact with the stream of water, that unless something is done before the gas pipes are eaten away there will be a big explosion, with great loss of life, at the hospital.

Tests have been made which show

that every pipe in the institution is affected. At time the electrolysis is so noticeable in some of the iron beds that patients toss restlessly about at night. The hospital governors have taken the matter up with the city



"We are informed," the letter reads. that there are large quantities of these fish around London, and if a license could be obtained whereby they could be taken our with a seine of Fike net, we would like to obtain the privilege, and would be willing to pay a salary to any reliable man appointed by the association to see that nothing taken except carp. If the association and fisheries department do not object we could use suckers and dog.

The members of the association are inclined to look with favor upon the request. The water of the Thames are simply swarming with carp, and they are very destructive on other fish spawn, and it is considered highly advisable to dispose of them if possible There is every likelihood, therefore, that the request will be granted for everything but dogfish, which will still be protected by the association's rules


