





The field continues to make good in the very best kind of way, but that there may not be clear sailing for all who are in the game is shown in the resuit of the operations of the Roth-Barnard Company, on the Crown farm, six miles northwest of the field. This company have discovered after several weeks of drilling on what was the furthest property from the field, that they are in the sand and that nothing will come of their present efforts there. In brief, the well was found to be a duster, the first of its kind since the field was discovered last November. This has come as quite a shook to those who have during the last few weeks, been laying in heavily in leases, north and south of the developed territory, in the hope that ultimately their faith in the field as one of the most extended in the world would be justified.

CUBA'S INSURRECTION.

Col. Vale Reports Routing the Enemy At Rodas, Many Dead Being Left in Streets.

Havana, Aug. 29.—Gen. Rodriguez has received the following despatch from Col. Vale, who commanded the detachment of rural guards and volunteers engaged with insurgents near Cienfuegos on Monday.

"Insurgents parties under Guzman and Portela, having encamped near Abreus and commenced harassing the rural guards, we proceeded towards Abreus with a force of rural guards and volunteers and encountered the revolutionists, who were entrenched in the Town of Abreus.

"We routed the enemy, killed many revolutionists and captured a quantity of arms and ammunition, and a number of horses yesterday.

or arms and administration, ber of horses yesterday.

"We continued our operations to Rodas, where our advance guard was charged by the revolutionists, who were holding the town and a little fort, called De Pledra fort, where fierce fighting continued. Left Dead In the Streets.

"The enemy was persistent, but the insurgents were finally dispersed, and ran away in different directions, leaving a large number of men killed in the streets. The full extent of the volutionists casualities is not yet

known.

"Once in possession of the town we got in touch with the detachment of rural guards commanded by Lieut. Torre. Our forces fought valiantly throughout the engagements. Later the enemy returned and rushed the town, but the revolutionists were again scattered by our machete charges."





HON. MR. BECK MAKES REPLY

He Gives Some Light On The Power Question Procedure

NO DIRECT TAXATION

Toronto, Aug. 30.—The important convention of the Ontario Municipal Association, which opened yesterday in the Toronto City Hall, was featured by an address by Ald. Lyons of Guelph, on the power question, eulogizing the Commission.

Answers to questions from delegates regarding it were made by Hon. Adam Beck, who incidentally remarked that some municipalities were worrying because they might not be included, and that the Town of Ogdensburg, N. Y., had offered the Commission 20,000 horse power.

Minister's Reply to Queries.
In effect, some of the Minister's replies to queries were:
The municipality must give the Hydro-Electric Commission an estimate of the amount of power it requires.
The Commission then gives an estimate as to the cost, but the municipality must submit the contract to the duly qualified ratepayers for endorsation.
The Commission will fix a minimum rate to be charged, and it will cover interest and sinking fund on contract. The municipality may charge as much higher as it likes if the users will pay it. The people who don't use the power

The people who don't use the power don't have to pay for it at all.

In the event of a municipality not being able to keep up, owing, say to a big fire, there will be some other place needing more power. The Commission would regulate this and the

place needing more power. The Commission would regulate this and the smaller municipality would not lose.

The Government will see that a large enough minimum fee will be charged to users to pay in full for the power.

No Direct Taxation.

The bill gives the Commission the power to fix the rate, and it will not mean one cent of direct taxation.

Cheers greeted one delegate, who remarked "The whole text is cheap power, and go as far as our present legislation will let us go to get it."

Ottawa's Salvation.

Mayor Ellis of Ottawa said the Power Commission had, to a large extent, been the salvation of his city, and it meant a saving of from \$100,000 to \$150,000 to the capital. He eulogized Mr. Beck, who deserved the thanks of the Ontario people. He understood no town would be required to pay for what it did not want.

Mayor Sleeman of Guelph told how the Royal City was making a success of municipal ownership of the waterworks, street railway, gas, etc.

Then came an explanatory paper from W. C. Mikel on the work and power of the Ontario Railway Commission, and Assessment Commissioner Forman dealt with the present Assessment Act at some length.

Hamilton, Aug. 30.-About 43 mould-Hamilton, Aug. 30.—About 43 moulders and coremakers employed by the Canadian Iron & Foundry Co, went out on strike last night, owing to the refusal of the company to grant an increase of ten cents a day in the moulders' wages and a minimum rate of \$2.25 a day to the coremakers.

Manager Hurriedly Departs.

Goderich, Aug. 30.—A. Barton, assistant manager of the Hotel Goderich, has left town, and an investigation is being made into the state of the hotel's finances. Barton left a note, saying he had taken only what was due him.
