## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

## DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

In submitting the Fourteenth Annual Report of the Proceedings of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, the Council feel that they present to the members a satisfactory record of progress and success.

1. In past years the Council have mainly had to rely on the grants in aid voted by Parliament, and contributions from a few well known generous hearted and patriotic individuals. This year, by the personal exertions of His Excellency the Governor General, the public, represented by its three most important interests, viz., the Banks, the Manufacturers and the Press, have been brought to recognise tho national importance of the work in which the Association is engaged, and in many cases to promise annual contributions to its support.

Such a union of interests the Council have ever regarded as the one thing wanting to ensure the permanency of the Association ; and now that it has been accomplished, they tender to His Excellency their deep appreciation of the great services he has rendered.

It is with pleasure the Council announce that the example set by those who responded to the appeal of His Excellency has already been taken up by others, and that they have received for next year's prize list, from the Directors of the Hamilton Powder Company, the handsome contribution of two hundred and fifty dollars, with the assurance that the Company will annually contribute a like amount ; also, from Mr. W. S. Russell, S. S. 45 th Batt., of Bowmanville, of an organ, to be competed for under conditions sirnilar to those of the Remington Match of this year.
2. The Council tender their acknowledgments :-

To His Excellency the Governor General and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, for the handsome donation of $\$ 500$ they were again pleased to place at the disposal of the Council for competition under conditions similar to those of last year.

To His Excellency, also, for the silver and bronze medals which he again offered for competition by members of the several Provincial Rifle Associations in the Dominion.

To the Minister of Militia, the Hon. A. P. Caron, for his personal donation of $\$ 200$, and for the interest he has evinced in the welfare cf all the Rifle Associations of the Dominion.

To the President of the Association, Colonel Gzowski, A.D.C. to the Queen, who, with that liberality which has on so many occasions been exhibited to the Association, presented a massive silver challenge $c \mathrm{p}$, to be competed for annually by members of the active militia of Canada, and which will hereafter form a permanent feature in the Association competitions.

To Major General Luard, commanding the militia of Canada; to the Presidents and Directors of the Bank of Montreal, Bank of British North America, Bank of Commerce, Merchants' Bank of Canada, Banque du Peuple (Montreal), Banque de St. Jean, Ontario Bank, Imperial Bank of Toronto, Bank of Toronto, Commercial Bank, Windsor, N.S., who enrolled themselves in the list of contributors; to the Toronto Mail Printing Company, and to Messrs. Remington \& Co., of New York, for their several contributions to the prize fund.

To Surgeon Malloch, of the Governor General's Foot Guards, for his attendance during the meeting, and to the several Railway and

Steamboat Companies, for the facilities afforded to competitors, and for the grant of transport at reduced rates.
3. In accordance with the resolution passed at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, held on the 16th Feb., 1881, the Executive Committee of the Council undertook the revision of the rules and regulations for the guidance of Wimbledon teams, and made the following changes :-

1. That there should be but one Officer in command.
2. That the second officer should be appointed as Adjutant.
3. That the Commanding Officer and Adjutant should devote their whole time to their respective duties, and not take part in any of the corapetitions at Wimbledon.
4. That as the atmospheric peculiarities of the Wimbledon ranges had in past years proved so baffling to Canadian marksmen, it would be better that the team, abandoning the hitherto customary sojourn at Altcar, should proceed direct to camp at Wimbledori, and practise on the ranges in the vicinity.

To Col. the Hon. C. Lindsay the team are indebted for the privilege of practice on the ranges at Wormwood Scrubbs, and to the London Scottish Volunteers for practice on their range at Wimbledon.

Much difficulty was experienced in forming the team for Wimbledon this year.

The whole of tise fifty who competed in the Governor General's Match of 1880 were in turn notified, and only a very few days prior to the sailing of the team in June last, one member was prevented from accompanying it, and the Council, to complete the team to its proper strength, gave their sanction to the admission, at Wimbledon, of a Canadian marksman who had arranged to proceed there at his own expense.

The team thus formed was placed under the command of Lieut. Col. Gibson, M.P.P., 13th Battalion, with Capt. Curren, 66th Battalion, as adjutant.

From the report of Lieut. Col. Gibson, appended hereto, it will be seen that the changes recommended in the rules, eto., proved to be judicious and beneficial.

The successes c ? the team are fully detailed in Colonel Gibson's report, but mention must be made that in the first stage of the "Queen's Prize" the Canadian twenty, competing against 2,500 competitors, secured two places in the "Sixty," and that Staff Sergeant Walker, of the Queen's Own Rifles, in the second stage, took tenth place. But the crowning success was the capture of the "Kolapore Cups," and to the team of 1881 belongs the honour of bringing them to Canada for the third time since the match was founded.
4. In preparing the programme and prize list for 1881 the Executive Committee of the Council felt it their duty to make such a distribution of the funds placed at their disposal as would, in their judgment, offer general encouragement to the many, rather than large rewards to the few. To give effect to this general policy, they decided :-

1. To create in each competition a long string of prizes.
2. To encourage the attendance of young sints, by the establishment of a competition from which formgr winners of $\$ 10$ and upwards should be excluded.
3. To increase the rewards for steady shooting by an extension of the Grand Aggregate prize list.
4. To offer prizes by way of consolation to those who had competed in the matches and had failed to secure a prize.
5. To arrange the time required for the completion of the programme, so that those coming from a distance might be free to leave the range by mid-day Friday.

The innual Prize Meeting commenced on the 5th September, and was cons? aded on the 10th inst.

The principal prizes won during the meeting were presented to the winners on the ground by Sir William Ritchie, Deputy Governor, the Hon. Sir Leonard Tilley, and the Hon. A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia.

The number of competitors present during the matches showed a very material increase over the attendance of last year.

Orders were punctually observed, and the pre-arranged detail for the several matches was carried out without the record of a protest or complaint.

The Annual General Meeting was held on the second day (Tuesday) of the matches, and was continued over Wednesday and Thursday. It was a large, enthusiastic, and instructive gathering. The points raised and questions asked were discussed with much earnestness. The proceedings will be found in the Appendix.
5. On inspecting the range preparatory to placing it in order for the matches, it was found that the platforms of the Brunel targets required to be thoroughly renewed, and the targets themselves, after nine years. use, demanded repairs. Advantage was taken of the opportunity presented to readjust the intervals at which the Brunel targets were placed, and in anticipation of an increased attendance of competitors, to place four more in the long trench, thus making a total of twenty-four targets available tor the regular matches of the Association.

A second target was also provided for the 500 yards extra series range, and a complete new two-target 200 yards range, with screen, mantelet and firing points.

The expenditure on these works was considerable, but not in excess of that at which it was estimated.
6. The Council feel that though, by the liberality of individuals and careful husbanding of the funds, they were enabled $t$ ) offer so large a prize list last year, it will be out of their power to maintain it if the grant from the Government is not restored to its original amount.
7. The Council, with a deep sense of the obligation which the Association owes to its esteemed Treasurer, Lieut. Col. Macpherson, desires to place on record their acknowledgment of his services, and to state that, although the payment of an annual allowance of $\$ 200$ was voted him by the Association, he has for the past two years most generously declined to accept any remuneration.
8. The Council have thought it well to embody in this year's report, a return showing the winners of National and Domivion Rifle Association Medals. The statement now published from the returns

received in reply to a circular addressed to Secretaries of Associations, is not quite complete; but it is hoped that by next year full information will be placed on record.

## FINANCE.

The Treasurer's statement of finance for the period 13th January to 31st December, 1881, duly audited, is herewith submitted.

It shows receipts from all sources, including the balance ( $\$ 12.57$ ) brought forward from last year, amounting to $\$ 14,440.51$, and expenditure $\$ 14,185.74$, leaving a balance of $\$ 254.77$ to the credit of the Association.

The annual subscriptions for the past year amounted to $\$ 190$, as against $\$ 166$ for 1880 ; affiliation fees, $\$ 770$, against $\$ 760$, the difference being accounted for by one association remitting on'y half the fee.

The number of Associations in affiliation is the same as last year, viz :-

The receipts from special donations, inclusive of the President, Col. Gzowski's, donation of $\$ 250$ to the Wimbledon Team of the year, and $\$ 80$ for two life memberships, amounted to $\$ 1,155$, as against $\$ 850$ for 1880 , an increase of $\$ 305$.

The sum of $\$ 935$ received from certain Banks named in page 38 of last year's report, entered in this year's statement under the head of "special prizes," raises the amount of special donations to $\$ 2,090$.

The entry fees to matches in 1881, including sighting shots, blowoff tickets, pool gains, post entry fees and fines, amounted to a net sum of $\$ 2,595.57$, as against $\$ 2,209.22$ received in 1880 ; increase of $\$ 386.35$.

A detailed account of expenditure made by Lieut. Col. Gibson, coramanding Wimbledon Team of 1881 , will be found in the appendix.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

OF THE

## DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

The Annual Prize Meeting of 1881 commenced at the Ridean Rifle Ranges on Monday the 5th and were brought to a close by 11 a.m. on Saturday the 10th September.

The experience gained in past years enabled the Executive Committee to perfect their arrangements, to the manifest approval of the Competitors, who expressed their satisfaction at the additional number of Targets provided for their use.

The advantage secured by the system, introduced in 1880 and again carried out this year, of Competitors making their entries for the several matches at an early given date, enabled the Executive Officer to carry out the programme of the matches with punctuality.

The Macdougall Cup, on its 12th Anniversary, was secured by Staff Sergeant Walker, Queens' Own Rifles, with a score of 46 points, out of a pos sible 50 .

The Gzowski Challenge Cup was also won by S. S. Walker, Q.O.R.
The Team representing the Provincial Association of Ontario carried off the London Merchants' Cup with the score of 412 points, the Provincial Team of Nova Scotia being second with 385 points.

## REPORT OF LIEUT. COL. J. M. GIBSON, M. P.P.

WIMBIHIDON THAM, 1881

Hamilton, 1st October, 1881.
Sir,-I have the honour to present to you my official report of the Canadian Wimbledon Team of 1881, and am glad to be able to state at the outset that it is in every respect of a most satisfactory nature.

Saturday, the 25th June, was fixed by the Executive of the Association as the day for the team to sail from Quebec, being a week later, and affording that much less time than usual for team practice in England prior to the commencement of the National Rifle Association Matches at Wimbledon. My views having been invited regarding the matter, I expressed the opinion that so long as the members of the team had time to recover from the effects of a possibly rough sea voyage they would not suffer at Wimbledon by reason of not having had time enough to shoot themselves out in preliminary practice. I am of that opinion still. Experience has shown that a fortnight's most brilliant work at Altcar has often been succeeded by mediocre results at Wimbledon.

In accordance with instructions, the members of the team reported themselves to me at the Brigade Office, Quebec, on the morning of Friday, 24th June, and signed the regulations for their conduct and guidance prescribed by the D. R. Association, immediately after which they wers marched as a team to the citadel and inspected by His

Excellency the Governor General, who addressed a few remarks to them regarding the objects of the expedition to England, expressed himself as hopeful of successful results. The members of the team had the honour of being accompanied around the fortifications by His Excellency, who pointed out the many objects of interest there to be seen, and afterwards entertained several of them at luncheon.

On Saturday morning, 25th June, we embarked on the steamship "Polynesian" under command of the genial and courteous Captain Brown, and I feel bound to express entire satisfaction with the accommodation provided. In this connection, I may also remark that my correspondence with J. D. Ennis, Esq., the Allan representative at Liverpool, regarding return passages at different dates to suit the convenience of members of the team was in every way most satisfactory, and tke arrangements made were in all cases all that could be desired.

We arrived at Liverpool on Monday evening, 4th July, about 8 ©'clock, disembarked, and after about three hours' delay proceeded by the London and North-Western Railway to London where we arrived on the following morning too early to connect with suburban trains for Putney. We accordingly took omnibus conveyances from Euston Station to Wimbledon, where we found the tents for the Canadian camp pitched and ready for occupation. Having breakfasted with the London Scottish Volunteers, who were already in camp undergoing their annual drill, and to whom we were afterwards indebted for many acts of kindness and hospitality, we drew the necessary articles of camp equipage and outfit, and in an hour or two were quite settled and prepared for the first trial at the targets.

Uncertainty as to whether facilities for practice at Wormwood Scrubs had been definitely arranged for caused me much anxiety until, having had time to communicate with Col. Lindsay, commanding St. George's Rifles, I found that Colonel Gzewski's previous efforts in that behalf had resulted in securing the privilege of practice in those ranges at certain hours during the few remaining days before the opening of the Wimbledon meeting. The Dominion Rifle Association are under obligations to Col. Lindsay for much trouble taken by him in procuring the necessary consent to our use of the ranges from the various other volunteer corps entitled to their daily occupation.

The practice return accompanying this report shows very little heavy scoring, mainly owing to the impossibility of judging the wind with accuracy. In many respects the Wormwood Scrubs ranges are like those at Wimbledon, and they afford much more valuable practice than the Altcar ranges, however enjoyable a week or two may be put in at the latter.

Three "Pewters" were presented by Captain Curren and myself in connection with the practice shooting-Sergt. Thomas Mitchell taking one for the highest grand aggregate-Sergeant Ross one for the second grand aggregate, and Captain Weston one for the highest MartiniHenry aggregate.

I have pleasure in reporting that the whole team continued in camp during the three weeks, from 5th to 25 th July, and that although all kinds of weather were experienced, no desire was expressed by any of the members to be allowed to take quarters out of camp.

Strict compliance with the regulations as to completeness of uniform was insisted upon by me, and I have to acknowledge on the part of some who were deficient a most cheerful acquiescence, though attended with, to them, considerable personal inconvenience.

Before sailing, somewhat definite instructions were given to me by the Executive Committee to curtail the expenditure in connection with various items under the head of camp expenses, and my best endeavours were directed to that end, but without success. So long as the Canadian camp is laid out on the ground which has been annually allotted for the purpose for the last ten years, and so long as the same number of tents are pitched and handed over for the use of the Canadians, so long should the expenditure referred to be continued. In other words, the details must be governed by and be in keeping with the general design. Whenever it becomes imperative to cut down materially the items in question, the Canadian Team should no longer occupy, as hitherto, a prominently distinctive Canadian camp. Indeed it would then be worth while to consider whether 10 or 12 men and one officer would not answer all necessary purposes of being represented in the Kolapore Match. But I apprehend a much broader significance is intended by our annual presence at Wimbledon than what is

implied in the mere participation in that competition. We take our stand on Wimbledon Common not only as competitors in rifle matches, but also as representatives of an important branch of the defensive forces of the realm-the active militia of Canada. We annually receive recognition as such from members of the royal family, including H. R. H. the Duke of Cambridge, Commander-in-Chief, and also from the Colonial Secretary, and other distinguished representatives ; and so long as the presence of the team at Wimbledon is regarded in the light of a representation of the Canadian militia, so long, in my humble opinion, will it be both necessary and expedient to incur in connection with the Canadian camp the expenses hitherto incurred in order that our appearance there may be both respectable and creditable.

Appended to this report will be found:
1st. A general statement of receipts and expenditure.
2nd. Details of the expenditure, fcr which I forward vouchers of all items capable of being vouched.

3rd. An acquittance roll signed by the members of the team, showing the amount paid each man for subsistence, for share of prize moneys, and for travelling expenses on return from Quebec.

4th. Details of the preliminary practice scores.
5th. Details of the scoring at Wimbledon in the various matches fired prior to the competition for the Kolapore Cup.

6 th. A list of the various prizes won by the members of the team individually.

7th. The scores made by the Canadian Team and the Mother Country Team in the match for the Kolapore Cup.

8th. The acquittance roll, showing the payment to the team of the "Sir John Rose" prize of $£ 100$; that, for the "Gzowski" prize, of $£ 50$, having been forwarded from Quebec prior to sailing for England.

On the whole, the success of the team was very marked. Nineteen out of the twenty members appear somewhere, more or less frequently, in the lists as prize winners. Bette: results might have been expected in the matches known as the "Glen Albyn" and "Daily Telegraph" ; but in the two important events, the "Queen's" and "Alexandra" the Canadians came in well-eight taking prizes in the former and seven in the latter. Sergt. Thomas Mitchell and Staff

Sergt. Walker shot into the "Queen's Sixty" winning £12 each and the much coveted Queen's Badge, while Wheeler Ogg, who has so frequently all but gained a place in the Sixty, failed this year solely by reason of an accident happening to his rifle at the 200 yards range, which 62 points out of a possible 70 at 500 and 600 yards was hardly sufficient to make up for. I deemed it my duty to give Sergts. Mitchell and Walker as much special practice as possible for the final competition for the Queen's prize in the second stage, and when that most important event came on it was gratifying in the extreme to witness the splendid stand taken by these two Canadians. Staff Sergt. Walker, with three others, stood at the top of the field at the conclusion of the firing at 900 yards ; and Sergt. Mitchell, who had commenced indifferently at 800 yards, so pulled himself to the front by brilliant shooting at the 900 yards range, that both were subjects of the keenest attention in the final struggle at 1000 yards, and eventually found places among the highest 10 in a contest in which well nigh 2,500 picked marksmen originally entered. While the task of winning the Queen's prize for Canada still remains to be accomplished by some future team, nothing could be more pleasurably exciting than witnessing the gallant struggle made this year by our two marksmen, and nothing could be more pleasing and satisfactory than the commendatory remarks of a large and interested field of spectators, many of whom showed an anxiety for our success scarcely less than our own.

The return of prizes won shows that Sergt. Thomas Mitchell stands 5 th in the Snider aggregates and 11 th in the grand aggregates, and that Wheeler Ogg stands well up in the Martini-Henry and grand aggregates. Corpl. C. N. Mitchell also took a place in the grand aggregates, and would have been ranked high up among the Martini-Henry aggregate prize winners but for the unfortunate circumstance of being too late in handing in his score ticket. I refer to these successes specially because by practical riflemen aggregate scoring is regarded as a much more reliable test of marksmanship than brilliant resuits at isolated ranges ; and in my estimation to find a place among the 50 grand aggregate prize winners at Wimbledon is much more creditable than, as frequently happens, to fluke into the "Queen's Sixty."

Some excellent shooting was shown by a number of members of the team in the Any Rifle Matches. Sergt. David Mitchell made a highest possible score of 50 for the Any Rifle Association Cup, but was beaten on the tie. Four prizes were taken in the "Albert" and two in the "Arthur," our men using Remington rifles.

It is far from uncommon for excellent marksmen to shoot well through all the Wimbledon competitions, and yet not win a prize. What may be called good average shooting seldom results in prize winning, and brilliant scoring can only be looked for when the competitor is in his best form. In justice to Captain Weston, whose shooting record is well known, I may state that throughout the first week he suffered from a severe cold. Private Bent also laboured under the disadvantages of an illness which threatened to become serious, but which after the close of the meeting was checked by careful treatment.

My selection of eight members of the team for the honour of representing Canada in the match for the Rajah of Kolapore's Challenge Cup was to some extent an arbitrary one. I think the practice frequently hitherto adopted of basing the selection on the aggregate results of the shooting in the practices and the completed matches at the meeting is not calculated al ways to bring ont the strongest and most reliable eight. More especially, in my judgment, shouid it be understood that little or no regard will be paid to the scores made in the practices. I am doubtful of the propriety of publishing in the annual reports the results of the practice shooting. Useful practice should not be spoiled by anxiety as to the importance of a large score. Then, again, even at the Wimbledon matches Martini-Henry scoring is by no means a reliable criterion by which to judge as to what a man can do in a match with Sniders. Sergt. Ross, who shot remarkably well with his Martini-Henry both in the practices and matches, and who stood seventh in the Wimbledon grand aggregate, was left out of the eight because I thought better results with the Snider could be got from another man.

On the application of the captain of the mother country team, I consented to the nomination by him of about half a dozen alternative men in addition to the twenty to be named at the opening of the meeting
from whom his eight should be selected. I did so on the representation by him that there was uncertainty about some of his twenty being present at the meeting at all or being able to remain during the second week, and on the understanding that no alternative man should be selected for his team except in case of the bona fide absence of the man for whom he was specially designated as a substitute in the published list. Instructions ought to be given to the next team commander as to whether such a concession should be agreed to or not.

As will be seen by reference to the detailed report of the match, the contest was close and exciting. The slight advantages gained by the mother country team at the 200 and 500 yards ranges by no means discouraged our men, who went back to the 600 yards firing point in the best of spirits, well knowing that the crucial test had yet to come. After the first four men on each side had completed firing, it was evident that in the absence of a break down on our side we must win. Much interest was being taken in the result when it became known that the Canadians were leading, and the occasion was naturally one of thrilling interest for the members of the team. The remaining four of our eight were quite equal to the task before them, and instead of losing any ground increased our lead to 20 points. Private Henry Marris, of the 13th Battalion, Hamilton, had the honour of making the highest score of both teams. Major Waller, Captain of the British team, in a few remarks, most gracefully acknowledged the defeat they had suffered, complimented our men very highly and bore testimony to the genuineness of the victory we had won against some of the best marksmen of Britain. He then called for cheers for the Canadians, which were given in a manner that could not fail to convince us our victory was not grudged, and which, at the conclusion of my own remarks in reply, were returned with all the vigour that usually characterizes Canadian cheering.

I venture to predict that the Kolapore Cup will come to Canada more frequently in the future than it has in the past. Rifle practice in Canada is performed for the most part.with the Snider rifle, while in Great Britain the Martini-Henry rifle, and other military breechloaders of similar make, are rapidly becoming of very common use and of necessity superseding the Snider. But, while the result of this is toimprove our chances in a competition with the latter rifle, it must be

borne in mind that the best matches at Wimbledon are now being contested by the Martini-Henry rifle, and I cannot urge too strongly the advisability of introducing into our rifle associations-the D. R. A. leading in the matter-a supply of Martini-Henry rifles of the latest and best make, so that our riflemen may become familiar with their use. A few practices by members of a team during two or three weeks prior to sailing are of very little advantage, more particularly if those practices are put in with rifles in which there is a want of confidence. At Quebec, before sailing, six of this year's team exchanged for others the rifles with which they had been practising.

As usual the Canadian camp was this year one of the principal points of attraction at Wimbledon, and we were honoured by the presence of many distinguished visitors, among the number H.S.F. the Duke of Teck, H.R.H. the Duchess of Teck, Earl and Countess of Brownlow, Earl and Countess of Granville, and Lord and Lady Lytton. On the occasion of the Canadian Team's "At Home "we had the honour of receiving H. R. H. the Duke of Cambridge, who carefully inspected the team, and, in the presence of a large gathering, highly complimented the Canadians on the successful results of their shooting. The Earl of Kimberly, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, Lt. Gen. Sir Garnet Wolseley, Sir John Rose, Bart., and the Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, the Premier of Canada, also delivered congratulatory and felicitous speeches on the occasion.

A mong many other prominent and distinguished Canadians present were the Premiers of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, Hon. Oliver Mowat and Hon. J. A. Chapleau. Sir John Rose formally presented to the team the prize of $£ i 00$ generously donated by him last year to the Dominion Rifle Association for competition.

The prizes were presented on Saturday afternoon, 23rd July, by their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, in the presence of a vast concourse of spectators, who greeted announcements of Canadian successes with very marked demonstrations of applause.

Every courtesy and attention were as usual shown to the Canadians by the Chairman of the National Rifle Association, and by Captain Mildmay, the Secretary ; as also by Colonel Buller the Camp Commandant, and other officers of the staff.

Captain Boyd, late of the 54th Battalion, Canada, and now residing in London, was frequently with the team, and we were under obligations to him for assistance kindly rendered when it was most needed.

The Dominion Rifle Association bave also a most valuable friend in Jas. G. Colmer, Esq., of the Department of the High Commissioner for Canada, who in many ways afforded me important aid and was most obliging to the members of the team generally.

Nothing could be more satisfactory than the conduct of those under my command from first to last. On July 23rd, when about to disband, an order was read of which the following is a copy:-
" The Captain of the team cannot part with those who have been under his command in the representation of Canada, at Winbledon for the year 1881, without expressing his great satisfaction and gratification that, from the day of embarkation at Quer ac to the present time, the conduct and general demeanour of the team individually and collectively have been exemplary throughout. The record made this year on behalf of Canada is much superiur to that of any previous year, and the cablegrams already received from the Honourable the Minister of Nilitia, the Chairman of the Council and the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the D. R. Association, as well as from other sources, show how greatly our successes are being appreciated at home."

Before closing this report, I must bear testimony to the zeal and energy shown by Captain Curren, in directing and seeing carried out the roatine work of the team, as well as his readiness at all times to render me every assistance. The enclosed copy of an address from the members of the team is the best evidence that can be given of the very cordial and pleasant relations which existed between them on the one hand and Captain Curren and myself on the other.

In conclusion, I have to give expression to the only regret which I felt in connection with the visit of this year's team to Wimbledon. I refer to the absence from camp of our President, Colonel Gzowski, A. D. C. to the Queen, who has for many years been so prominently identified with the representation of the Dominion at Wimbledon, and who was this year on all hands the subject of much kind inquiry. Amid the general rejoicings over our successes as a team, it would have been especially gratifying if the numerous congratulations offered to us

could have been personally received and acknowledged by one to whom Canada is so much indebted for the efforts he has put forth, and the sacrifices he has made in encouraging and promoting practical skill in the use of the rifle by the members of our active militia.

## annual meeting.

Pursuant to adjournment the General Annual Meeting of the Association was held at noon, Col. Gzowski, President, in the Chair. In calling the gathering to order Col. Gzowski referred to the pleasure he felt in seeing such a large attendance, indicating unmistakably the interest felt in the cause, which he, in common with the Council, had always laboured to develop. He announced with pleasure that the Hamilton Powder Company would contribute from year to year the sum of $\$ 250$ as a prize. (Cheers.) The business now before the meeting was the resolution of Lieut. Flynn, relating to the selection of the Wimbledon Team, and he would state that it was desirable to have a full discussion of the subject, and that in the event of the action of the Council not being upheld the voice and wishes of the majority would be complied with.

Captain Ellis, 25th, said he represented the views of the eight men of his corps who are now here when he stated that he felt pleased at the Council's action, which had the effect of attracting to this Meeting a large number of new shots, who had been led to believe that the Wimbledon Team's selection would be made in accordance with the announced plan, and to depart from which now would be unfair to the 300 marksmen in attendance.

Captain Blaiklock, 6th Fusiliers, suggested the desirability of the reasons being made public which had induced the Council to take the step.

Col. Gzowski replied that, although he was in England when this rule was adopted, nothing had given him greater pleasure. He felt then that he was not the representative of eight or ten shots, but of the whole Dominion, and that the young men should have the same opportunity as the older shots. The Government aid was not given merely for the purpose of winning the Kolapore Cup, but as an assistance in giving the Canadian Team an opportunity to see Wimbledon Common, where much was to be learned, and no rifleman who had been there failed to pick up something. These were his reasons for acquiescing in this measure, believing as he did that the young men could, should unfortunalely the necessity arise, shoot to the best possible advantage.

Captain Tilton, Chairman of the Executive Committee of Council, expressed his satisfaction at the large attendance at the meeting, as proot that the efforts of the Council made in good faith with a desire to advance the interests of riflemen in Canada had not been in vain. This year's programme made some new departures, among others the enlarging art extending of the Prize List to an extent inexcess of that of any previous year. Through the efforts of His Excellency the Governor Gejeral, over a thousand dollars had been received from the Banks, and the Executive Committee had decided that the best thing they could do with a portion of it was to establish a Nursery Prize, in the hope of bringing young shots to the front, and this match appeared in the present year's programme for the first time. (Applause.) Year after year the saine faces were seen at the meetings, and, while they were always welcome, it was apparent some new interest must be awakened in the Association's work, hence the changes in the programme to which he had referred. With reference to the rule that had been adopted limiting the number of times which a competitor might go to Wimbledon, he desired to say that the Council must adhere to its decision at least for this year. They had not had the opportunity of consulting Col. Gzowski with reference to it, as that gentleman was in England when the rule was adopted; they were glad, however, to know that it met with his approval, and had already borne fruit in the increased attendance of riflemen at the meeting now in progress. Another consideration which weighed with the Council was the fear that if the benefits to the Militia force through these competitions were limited to the selection annually of a Team for Wimbledon the Government might not feel inclined to continue its aid. He referred to the great difficulty in securing the requisite number of men to complete last year's team, as the members chosen did not appear to realize their position or responsibility, and out
of twenty representatives selected from the first fifty in the usual competition, nine declined to go, of whom five had previously secured places on teams-having won this honour once were indifferent about going a second time. It was found impossible to complete the team from the list of successful competitors, and necessary at the last moment to take a rifleman at Quehee who had not only not won a place on the team, but had not shot at the Dominion Rifle Association meeting that year, and who under certain conditions was allowed to compete as a member of the team. It was intended to ask the National Rifle Association to consent to the same restrictions being enforced with regard to the selection of their teams as had been alopted by the Souncil, and he had no doubt that the representations of the Dominion Rifle Association would be formally entertained and agreed to. He showed that the effect of the working of the rule would only debar eight men fiom Ontario, and two each from Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Bruuswick, in all fourteen men. When such a happy result has already been attained in bringing out so many new shots, it would be extremely unwise to repeal it before carefully considering the matter. He would suggest that the mover of the rasolution allow the motion to stand over until the next meeting.

Captain Todd, G.G.F.G., argued that the exclusion of the older shots would only increase the difficulty in selecting a team to go to Wimbledon.

Captain Tilton said in reply that five members of the team who declined to go were on the team previously.

Paymaster O'Grady, 43rd Batt., favoured the selection of the best shots, irrespective of the number of times they had been to Wimbledon.

Lient. Hartt, N.B., Eng., was of the opinion that no rifleman had any right to represent Canada at Wimbledon unless he had won a place in the team. He trusted the rosolution would be reconsidered, although he had no objections to allowing it to stand for this meeting.

Captain Todd, G.G.F.G., held that the team would acomplish very little without the services of the older shots. Under the proposed new arrangement it would appear to be a pic-nic party.

Corpl. Belcher, 3rd V.R.C., claimed that the intended applisation to the National Rifle Association would be unproductive of any results, and that no attention would be paid to it, as it contained an element of unfairness.

Col. Gzowski said whatever influence he had on the other side of the Atlantic had always been exerted for the benefit of the Association,
and that he did not apprehend any serious difficulty in securing the conditions asked from the N.R A. regarding the selection of the team to compete against the Canadian Wimbledon team. The former team were now selected irrespective of their aggregate scores, and he also intended to ask that in snooting for the Kolapore Cup competitors be compelled to shoot with their heads to the target, and he had not the least doubt that Lis request would be granted.

Captain Mason, of Hamilton, wanted the best team to go to England to bring back the Kolapore Cup and other prizes, and argued if there was a deterioration in the team sent to England there would necessarily follow a decreasing interest in the achievements and performances of the team. He held that the arguments of Captain Tilton did not apply to the question under discussion, and that the Council had through the "Nursery" taken the step to bring out the young shots. He thought the Martime Provinces would, under the working of the rule, not have a fair proportion of members in the team-not that he thought that the team should be represented by Provinces-although there was generally a fair proportion on account of the distance their representatives had to travel to reach Ottawa.

Lieut. Hartt asked if the resolution would apply to this year's selection if rescinded.

Col. Czowski suggested that the resolution should be withdrawn.
The yeas and nays were then called, when the resolution was lost by a vote of 100 to 79 .

It was moved by Captain Adams, seconded by Paymaster O'Grady, that in future non-commissioned officers and men who have served for ten consecutive years as active volunteers, and who have been honourably discharged from their corps, shall be eligible to shoot in the matches of the Dominion Rifle Association.

Captain Ellis brought up the question of a resumption of the back position in firing.

Col. Gzowski said this was a point hehad fully considered, and he had no hesitation in saying that this position was of no practical use, as had been shown by late developments, especially in the recent Zulu and Boer wars, and that it would eventually be abandoned at Wimbledon. He had decided that his Cup competition should be shot for standing at the 200 yards range. The old back system was only good for money shooting, and was going rapidly out of use, except among pot-hunters, to which class he hoped none of them belonged. Canadian riflemen bad
the reputation in England of being good sound rifle shooting men, and they should maintain this title. They would find that in future the N.R.A. would give many prizes in standing positions.

Lieut. Col. Worsley referred to the necessity of practising rifle shooting in standing positions in order to be effective against such foes as the Zulus and Boers.

The meeting then adjourned until 12.30 o'clock to-morrow.

THE BACK POSITION IN EIRING.
It was moved by Capt. Ellis, seconded by Paymaster O'Grady-
That, in the opinion of this meeting, so long as the back position is allowed at Wimbledon, it should not be disallowed in the matches of the Dominion Rifle Association.

Captain Mason, of Hamilton, contended that no reason could be given for a return to this style of shooting, and claimed that much valuable time was wasted by advocates thereof, and called attention to the noticeably pleasant and rapid manner in which the present meeting was being conducted. It was not in keeping with the military position and should not be allowed.

Captain Costin pointed out that the advocates of the back position were not sanguine of its ever being generally used, but on the contrary
it was fast coming into disuse. He argued that the best results could not be obtained in this style of shooting, but that the advocates of it could not be blamed, as it afforded them a most comfortable position, and would allow them to go to sleep.

## A Member-Use a sand glass.

Sergt. McLaughlin, 34th Batt., said that the Association could guard against any unnecessary time being lost through the delay in the firing of competitors who chose to shoot in the back position. It was an unquestionable fact that in England three-fifths of the riflemen who carry off the principal prizes at Wimbledon occupied the back position, and he thought it unfair to compel the Canadian volunteers to adopt a different system. He, as well as other riflemen, had been pained by the observation of the President at the previous day's meeting with reference to the pot hunting motives which actuated those who favoured the allowance of this position in shooting. He showed that the riflemen attending this meeting paid into the Association $\$ 3,015$, and drew out $\$ 3,490$, when their expenses averaged $\$ 26$ each, or $\$ 7,800$ in round figures. The most successful riflemen at these meetings failed to make any money at these competitions, but on the contrary always sustained a loss. He claimed that common sense would dictate the necessity in warfare of allowing the smallest portion of a soldier's body to be exposed to the fire of the enemy, and pointed out that the prone position, which was allowed, had been equally inoperative as the back position in the Zulu and Boer wars.

Col. Gzowski said the change of opinion in England in regard to the back position was due to the experiences of the late wars, and it was useless to question the correctness of the most prominent officers there. He did not intend to apply the term to which objection had been taken by the previous speaker to all those who came here, but to that class whose principal object was to win money. He would not undertake to disprove the statement made relative to the expenses of the competitors, but he was positive that some of them made ten times their expenses. He assured them that the next programme of the National Rifle Association would contain many competitions to be fired for at standing and kneeling positions as well as prone.

Lieut. Hartt, N.B. Eng., argued that it was desirable to allow the use of the back position, firstly, because it would have a tendency to encourage a larger attendance of competitors, and, secondly, because it was allowed at Wimbledon. He claimed that although the N.R.A. might not be better qualified to judge what was the proper position in firing, yet it certainly was in regard to what was best to be done to advance the cause cf rifle shooting.

Capt. Mason asked, in case the resolution was carried, that an arrangement should be adopted whereby competitors firing in this position should be squadded, as he would object to firing with any of that class, as he had many times suffered from a severe headache occasioned by the report of a back position man's rifle going off at his ear.

The resolution was then put to the meeting and carried by a large majority.

## the cost of ammunition.

Capt. Delamere, Q.O.R., Toronto, desired to bring before the notice of the Council, with a view of securing a reduction, the very high rate paid to the Government for the ammunition used by the militia in practice.

Capt. Perley, N.B., stated that the Government had some years ago reduced the price from $\$ 22$ to $\$ 16$ per thousand, which was a loss to the Government. A factory was now in course of construction at Quebec, and Canada will manufacture her own ammunition for the Snider.

Capt. Mason sxid he had written to the Department, and had been notified that no further reduction could be made in the price, as the charges for freight would not allow the request being complied with.

Col. Murray, Halifax, said the cost of ammunition at Halifax was sixteen cents.

Col. Gzowski promised, on behalf of the Council, to lay the matter before the Government.

## In reply to Corpl. Belcher,

Capt. Tilton explained the manner in which the Council would be guided in selecting the Wimbledon team. In the event of the exhausting of the whole of the fifty who fired in the Governor General's match, the Council would then select the competitors who had the next best aggregate score.

On motion of Lieut. Flynn and Capt. Adams, a vote of thanks was tendered Capt. Costin, the Executive Officer, for the faithful performance of his onerous duties.

Capt. Costin replied in suitable terms, pointing out the necessity on the part of the members of a strict compliance with orders, whether good er bad.

Col. Gzowski stated that he had always found Capt. Costin a most energetic officer of the Association, and possessed of the patience of an angel.

Corpl. Belcher, 3rd Vic. Rifles, in moving a resolution of thanks to the President, Col. Gzowski, said that his condnct towards the members was characterized by kindness, geniality and honesty. In fact, in his opinion, he was the finest man in Canada. (Applause.)

The resolution, being seconded, was put to the meeting by Capt. Tilton, and being unanimously carried was received with cheers.

Col. Gzowski returned his thanks for the compliment paid him, which he fully appreciated, as his whole heart was in the work, and as it was particularly gratifying to know his efforts on behalf of the Association met with approval. It was a satisfaction to him to see present the largest attendance at any meeting since his election to the Presidency of the Association. It was also gratifying to notice the presence of the Hon. Minister of Militia, and to point vut to that gentleman that the meeting was the largest and most effective that had ever been held, showing that the efforts to improve the militia of the country had been aided as much by the Dominion Rifle Association as any other branch of the service.

Hon. Mr. Caron said it afforded hin the greatest pleasure to come here from Quebec, where business which could not be overlooked detainod and prevented him from being present at the commencement of the Annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association. He desired to tender his sincere congratulation upon the success achieved during this meeting, knowing, as all must know-in fact it can no longer be denied -that the D.R.A. had been mainly instrumental in bringing about the present efficient state of the militia, which is increasing every day, and would, be trusted, continue to do so in the future. He referred to the valuable lessons which had been learned from the events of the late wars, and said that the victories won were due to the skill of riflemen, who had to adopt certain rules of life in order to become proficient, and who made good citizens as well. (Applanse.) He could bear testimony to the services rendered by Col. Gzowski, as in all probability were it not for his zeal a team might not be sent annually to Wimbledon, and it gave him pleasure as Minister of Militia to recognize his energy and labour in the furtherance of the objects of the Association, entailing as it must a sacrifice of time, and he might also say of money. (Applause.)

A vote of thanks was tendered to Lient. Col. Worsley, Commandant of the Camp, who made a brief reply.

Col. Gzowski announcell that the Hon. Minister of Militia would, Friday afternoon, between the hours of 5 and 6, present the prizes to the winners of the following competitions : All Comers', Rideau, Dominion of Canada, Affiliated, The Mail, Bankers', Nursery, Consolation and Grand Aggregate.

A suggestion was made that the General Meetings in future should be held in the evenings.

"Resolved,-II. Tbat in Competitions restricted to Volunteers the sights may not be coloured with any colour except black or white."

## REGULATIONS

OF THE

## DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION,

HOR TETR Y YAAR 1881

The prize meeting of the Association will be conducted under the direction of five members of the Executive Committee specially appointed for the purpose, three of whom shall be a quorum, and their decision will be final, conclusive, and binding, in all matters submitted to them for consideration; but they may, at their discretion, refer any questions to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Committee shall be final.

## NOTICE TO COMPETITORS.

1. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as also with the conditions of any Match for which they have entered, as in neither case will the plea of ignorance be entertained.
2. When at the firing point they must comply with all orders given by the Executive Officer or the Range Officers in charge.

## 1.-GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I.-No Active Militiaman shall shoot as a member of more than one corps.
II.-No officer, non commissioned officer or private employed by the D.R.A. for duty at the firing points or in the butts shall shoot either for a prize or for practice.
III. - In all competitions restricted to Active Militiamen, or in which they shoot as such, the uniform of their corps shall be worn, viz :-

1. Tunic, patrol or regulation fatigne jacket.

## 2. Trousers.

3. Regimental head dress, or a cap cover, with or without a cap under it.

All officers of the same corps must appear in the same order, as must also all non-commissioned officers and privates; but where a duly authorized undress for officers exists they may appear in it, although the non-commissioned officers and privates may be in full dress. Waist or cross belts need not be worn.
4. In competitions not restricted to the Active Militia, competitors must appear either in complete uniform or wholly in plain clothes.

Any objection on the score of a competitor's dress must be raised before he takes up his position to shoot.
N.B.-Cap covers or puggarees may be worn over the regimental full or undress cap, and great coats or waterproofs over uniforms.
IV.-Competitors must submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection whenever required.
V.-Hair triggers will not be allowed.
VI.-Fixed artificial rests will not be allowed, except in the skirmishing match.
VII.-Competitors may use a waterproof sheet, mat or great coat, not folded up, but laid flat on the ground ; but no cork beds or elbow rests will be allowed.
VIII.-In competitions open to "Any Rifles," the competitors may wipe out or clean their rifles during a competition, provided they do not delay the squad by so doing. In ordinary competitions, restricted to " Military Breech-loaders," this will not be allowed except between the distances in the competition.
IX.-When a muzzle-loader is used, the competitor must load in view of other members of the squad, but he must not cap until about to fire.
X. - When a breech-loader is used, the competitor must not load until he has taken his position at the firing point, and the register keeper has gived the word "All clear."
XI.-Competitors may "blow-off" in the pits at the firing points only before firing, and after the presentation of a "blow-off" ticket to the register keeper.
XII.-Slings may be used as an assistance in shooting for all prizes, but when the competition is restricted to military breach-loaders the slings must be of the Government length and pattern, white, brown or black, and attached to the rifle as in Government arms.

## IN INDIVIDUAL COMPETITIONS.

XIII.-(a) A competitor may use a binocular or telescope, not mounted on any kind of stand, provided his doing so causes no delay in the shooting.
(b) After a competitor has taken his place at the firing point no person, except the Register Keeper or an officer on duty, will be permitted to speak to him.
(c) No coaching of any kind will be permitted in any match where both team and individual prizes are being competed for.

IN TEAM MATCHES.
(d) The members of a team shooting together will be permitted to " coach " or " spot" for each other, and to use binoculars or telescopes for that purpose, provided their doing so does not delay or impede the shooting.
(e) The duly recognized Captain or Adjutant of a team, although not himself shooting, will be permitted to assist his team in like manner, and to appoint a spotter to assist him. With the above exceptions no other persons will be allowed within the ropes.

Any violation of this rule, or any part of it, must be at once reported by the Register Keeper to the officer in charge, who will caution the offender, and on any repetition of the offence shall report the same to the Executive Officer, to be dealt with by the Executive Committee as laid down under the head of "penalties," and the person or persons offending may be removed from the firing points.

## 2.-PENALTIES.-DISQUALIFICATIONS.

## XIV-Any Competitor-

(a) Who shall fire in a name other than his own; or
(b) Who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so ; or
(c) Who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target ; or
(d) Who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind to any employee of the Association under any pretence whatever; or
(e) Who shall be guilty of any conduct which the Executive Committee may consider discreditable; or
$(f)$ Who shall be reported to the Council or Executive Committee as having been elsewhere guilty of such conduct or the aforesaid offences ; or
(g) Who shall directly or indirectly make any anrangements with any other competitor for pooling or dividing any prize, shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Council or Executive Committee, or on the receipt of such report from any affiliated or duly recognized Association, forfeit all his entrance fees and prizes, and be forever disqualified from competing at any Prize Mteting of the Association.

## EXCLUSION FROM FURTHER COMPETITION DURING THE MEETING.

XV.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fire when the danger signal is up ; or
(b) Who shall discharge his rifle on the range except in accordance with the regulations for shooting ; or
(c) Who shall be found with a loaded rifle, except when at his proper firing point and engaged in competing ; or
(d) Who from a proper want of care discharges his rifle accidentally. [If such discharge is due to a defect in his rifle, an ample and satisfactory explanation must be given] ; or
(e) Who shall fire a pool shot before delivering his ticket to the Register Keeper ; or
$(f)$ Who shall alter or make any erasures on his firing ticket ; or
$(g)$ Who shall act in any way that might prove dangerous ; shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, be excluded from all further competition at the meeting, and shall forfeit all his entrance fers.

## DISALLOWANCE OF SCORE.

XVI.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular prize ; or
(b) Who shall infringe on any of the instructions and regulations for the conduct of the meeting while shooting for any particular prize ; or
(c) Who, when competing for an aggregate prize, shall omit to enter, or shall enter incorrectly, his previous score or scores on the register or ticket provided for that purpose, shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, have his score for that particular prize disallowed.

FINES.

## XVII.-Any competitor-

Who in "blowing off" shall fail to go close up to and point his rifle into the pit provided for that purpose, or who shall accidentally fire at the wrong target, shall be fined one dollar, to be paid forthwith to the range officer.

In cases where a competitor is " excluded from further competition," or where his "his score is disallowed," for any particular prize, the circumstances only under which the penalty was incurred shall be posted on the notice board, as a warning to others, without the name of the individual implicated.

In case of "disqualfication" the name of the offender, as well as the particulars of the case, shall be posted on the notice board.

## MITIGATION OF PENALTIES.

XVIII.-The Executive Committee shall have power to mitigate or remit any of the above penalties.

- 3.-PRIZE WINNERS.
XIX.-Unless otherwise specified, no one wil be allowed to take more than one prize in any competition.
XX.-Winners of prizes must apply for their certificates at the statistical office, and on signing the receipt attached thereto will receive the amount or amounts due to them from the Treasurer of the D.R.A.

If a formal presentation takes place, winners, being Active Militiamen, must parade in the full-dress uniform of their corps.

> 4.-DISTANCES AND TARGETS.

The Ordinary Targets, divided into three classes, shall be of the following dimensions :-

## 5.-MARKING.

1. The marking will be as follows :-
a. Bull's Eye. ..................... White disc.
b. Inner.. ......................... Red dise.
c. Magpie ........................ Black and White disc.
d. Outer . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . Black disc.
e. Misses will not be signalled ; but if a target is lowered under the impression that it has been hit, and if no hit is found on it, after raising it the marker will wave a black dise, which will signify a miss.
2. When two shots strike a target simultaneously, that which has the highest value will alone be marked with the marking disc, and the competitor whose proper turn it was to fire at the target will be credited with that shot, provided he has fired. Both hits will, however, be shown by spotting dises.
3. On a target being lowered, the position of a hit, if any, and its value, will be shown by the spotting dise when the target is again raised.
4. The marking when signalled shall not be questioned, but if a shot is not signalled, and the officer in charge of the firing points be satisfied that a reasonable doubt exists as to whether the shot may not have struck the target, he may ask the officer in charge at the butt to examine the target, and the result of such examination as signalled shall be final. Any competitor challenging a shot shall deposit the sum of fifty cents with the officer in charge at the firing point, which shall be forteited in case no hit is found on the target.
5. All alterations of the registers must be initialed by the officer making them, but no alterations, except in the case of a clerical error, shall be made without his having first signalled to the butt.
6. No person will be permitted to go to and examine a turget during the meeting, except the Executive Officer or such person or persons as he may duly authorize to do so in his behalf.

## IN SKIRMISHING.

When the number of hits counted on the targets exceeds the number of shots allowed in the competition, three marks shall be deducted for every such hit in excess of the number of such shots,
unless it be proved that such hits on the targets in excess of the number of shots allowed could only have been made by competitors in the squad firing more than the anthorized number of rounds, in which case the squad shall be disqualified.

## 6.-RIFLES.

The rifles shall be classed as follows :-

## CLASS I.-MILITARY BREECH-LOADERS.

Snider and Martini-Henry rifles, either of Government issue or of bona fude Government pattern, and bearing the Government viewer's mark.

1. Weight of Snider not to exceed, without bayonet, 9 lbs. 12 oz . Weight of Martini-Henry, without bayonet, not to exceed 8lbs. 12 oz .
2. No pad or shoe for the heel plate of the butt will be allowed.
3. Minimum pull of trigger, 6 lbs .
4. Sights to be strictly in accordance with those of the Government issue. Filed sights will not be allowed.
(a) All sights may be temporarily blackened, whitened, or coloured in any way, but no application of a permanent nature will be allowed. No shading of sights will be permitted.
(b) The back sight may be tilted forward or backward, or supported at any angle by any extemporizel means.
(c) The sliding bar may be reversed, and used on either side of the uprights. One permanent centre line for the Snider and three for the Martini-Henry will be allowed, and temporary marks or lines of any kind removeable at pleasure may be used.

CLASS II.-ANY RIFLES.

1. Weight-Maximum, 10 lbs.
2. Pull of Trigger-Minimum, 3 lbs.
3. A pad or shoe for the heel plate may be used.
4. Any description of sights, except telescopic and magnifying, may be used.

## 7.-AMMUNITION.

1.- In Competitions restricted to "Military Breech-loaders" :--
(a) None but the ammunition issued by the D. R. A. on the ground shall be used or allowed. Price for Snider, 20 cents per package of 10 rounds. Price for Martini, 25 cents per package of 10 rounds.
2.-In Compeititions open to "Any Rifles" :-

Any ammunition may be used, to be provided by the competitor.
No restrictions will be made as to the arrangement or composition of the charges or cartridges, provided that,-
3.-In the case of Breech-loading Rifles being used :-
(a) No part of the charge is inserted at the muzzle.
(b) That the rifle is not loaded until the word "all clear" is given.
(c) That no time is lost, and
(d) That no dangerous practice is resorted to.
8.-POSITION.

Unless otherwise specified, the shooting at all ranges shall be from the firing points, and may be in any position, with the head to the target.

## 9.-ORDER OF SHOOTING.

1. Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time detailed on their tickets, otherwise they will not be allowed to shoot ; the time to be regulated by the clock in the Secretary's office.
2. In all competitions, except those open to "Any Rifles," competitors shall, when possible, be formed up by files, and fire shot and shot alternately.
3. Where but one competitor is present, he shall fire his shots without undue delay; but the officer in charge of the firing point, or some person named by him, must witness the shooting, and countersign the register. Failing such verification the score will be invalidated.
4. In competitions open to "Any Rifles," the competiters shall be formed in a squad and fire shot for shot in the order in which their names are called.
5. No one shall be allowed to join the squad after the commencement of the second competitive round.
6. When once a competitor has joined a squad, he shall not leave it before he has either retired from the competition or has completed his firing, but leave may be given by the offlcer in charge to any competitor who, when firing with a muzzle loader, may find it necessary through a mistake in loading to fall out for the purpose of "blowing off."
7. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle ; nor shall a competitor change bis rifle at any range during a competition, unless his first rifle should become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by the officer in charge.

In competitions opjen to "Any Rifles"-
The competitor must, after delivering each shot, pay attention to the score called out by the register keeper, and himself see that such score is correctly entered on the register, so that any objection to the score recorded may be investigated before the next shot is fired.

## In ordinary competitions-

Any person present whom the competitor may name will watch the score recorded, and if need be raise objection before the next shot is fired.
N.B.-The right of objection in either of the above cases only extends to the registration of score by the register keeper, and not to the marker's signals.
10.-TIES.

Ties shall be decided as follows :A. In Individual Competitions for a Series of Prizes.

1. If at more than one distance, by the range totals in inverse order.
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the value of each shot in inverse order.
6. For Money Prizes, by division.
7. For Prizes in Kind, by shooting off, as in Clause B.
8. In the case of a Prize Part in Kind and Part in Money, by shooting off for the Prize in Kind and dividing the, Money.
N.B.-In all competitions the order of the winners shall be decided by the foregoing rules if possible, but in the case of absolute ties the names shall be arranged alphabetically and bracketted.

## B. In Individual Competitions for a Single Prize.

1. By the aggregate score in three rounds at the longest distance.
2. By firing single shots until decided.

Absentees shall forfeit their claim to shoot.

## C. In Team Competitions.

1. If at more than one distance, by the aggregate range totais in inverse order.
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the highest scorers in each team shooting off, as in Clause B
D. Grand Aggregate.

Ties for first place to be shot off, as in Clause B.
For other places :-

1. By the total score in each match in inverse order.
2. By the total scores at 600 yards.
3. By the total scores at 500 yards.
4. By the total scores at 400 yards.
5. By the total scores at 200 yards.
6. By shooting off, as in Clause B.
E. In cases not met by the foregoing.
7. By any special rules attached to the conditions.
8. By the fiat of the Excoutive.

## 11.-ENTRIES.

1. Entries for the several competitions shall close on days to be named by the Council.
2. Every competitor shall enter and shoot under his own name, and not oftener than once for any prize, unless specially allowed by the terms of the competition.
3. No entry shall be accepted after the hour fixed tor the commencement of the competition to which admission is sought.
4. Entries shall be classified :-
(a) Ordinary (at the published rate of entrance fees). To include those made and received by the Secretary of the D.R.A. on or before 4 p.m., Wednesday, the 31st August.
(b) Post (at an increased charge of 20 per cent. on the published rate of entrance fee). To include those made or received after 4 p.m., Wednesday, the 31st August.
N.B.-The acceptance of Post Entries will be entirely governed by circumstances. As a rule, the privilege will be withdrawn as soon as the target accommodation allotted for each competition is absorbed, and whenever the Special Executive Committee may determine.
5. To meet the case where difficulty may be experienced in selecting the actual competitors in sufficient time to make the required entries by the 31st August, Officers commanding corps and Secretaries of Provincial or Local Associations will be permitted to send in their application for (state No.) competitors, accompanying such application with the amount of the entrance fees ; and to postpone the rendering of the actual names of those for whom they make the entries until the selection of the competitors is definitely made. In such case the Register Tickets shall not be issued before the nominal return is handed to the Secretary. Any payment made for entries in excess of the number of competitors nominated will be returned in full as provided for under paragraph 1, (a), Return of Entrance Fees.
6. Entrance fees must be paid at the time when the entries are made.

The register tickets will be issued on application at the Secretary's office on the Range.

The Executive Committee reserve to themselves the power of refusing any Entry either for Volunteer or All Comers' Prizes, or of cancelling at any moment any entry that mxy have been previously made.

## 12.-RETURNS OF ENTRANCE FEES.

1. Entrance fees in full will be returned to those-
(a) Who are prevented from being present at the meeting; or
(b) Who attend the meeting but are incapacitated from illness or accident ; or
(c) Whose entries the Executive Committee may have cancelled.
2. Claims based on other considerations than the above will, if allowed, be subject to a penalty of half forteit.
13.--SQUADDING.
3. In the case of competitors classified as ordinary entries, arrange. ments will be made and detail published of the day, hour and target at which each competitor will be required to attend to fulfil his engagements.
4. In case of Post Entries, the hour of shooting cannot be predetermined or announced, and competitors so classified must await the orders that the progress of the meeting may render practicable.

## 14.-ALTERATION OF SQUADDING.

1. Any alterations which the Executive Officer may find it necessary to make wil' be duly notified on the notice board, and such notice will be a sufficient authority for the change. In the absence of such notice, tickets will be available only for the target for which they were originally issued, and any erasure or alteration will cancel the ticket, unless verified by the initials of the Executive Officer.
2. The place of publication for all notices affecting the detail of shooting shall be the board fixed withont the tent of the Executive Officer, and the posting of a notice on such board shall be taken as a good service on all affected thereby.

## 15.-REGISTER TICKETS.

1. Should a competitor lose his ticket, or omit to take it to the firing point, or fail to attend at the hour detailed, or give a wrong ticket, and so by his own neglect miss the opportunity of competing for the prize for which his ticket was issued, he shall forfeit his claim on the Association in regard to such competition, and no duplicate ticket shall be issued to him except under special circumstances.
2. Any erasure or substitution of one name for another shall invalidate the ticket.

## 16.--SIGHTING AND FOULING.

Tickets for sighting shots, 10 cents, and for fouling shots, 2 cents, can be obtained at the Secretary's office. They must be delivered up to the Register-keeper-two of the former and one of the latter allowed at each range-before a shot is fired. Such tickets to hold good in any match during the meeting.

The Council reserves the right to alter, amend or rescind any of the foregoing regulations, as circumstances may require.

## CONSTITUTION,

## ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 187T.

1.-That this Association be denominated "The Dominion of Canada Rifle Assoclation."
2.-Any person being a subscriber of $\$ 2.00$, and paying the same before the 1st day of September, or the second day of the Annual Prize meeting, shall become a member of the Association for the current Association year, and any member may continue his membership by the annual payment of $\$ 2.00$.
3. - Donors of $\$ 40.00$ at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a Prize of not less value to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association, they having the full rights and privileges of ordinary members, and their names to be published in the Annual Reports.
4.-Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subseribing not less than $\$ 40.00$ annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion not less than $\$ 20.00$ annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in the proportion of one to every dollar thus subscribed. Each subscribing Association is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships, and return their names and addresses, when selected, to the Secretary of the Dominion Rifle Association, to be registered by him previous to the Annual Prize Meeting. Each Affiliating Association shall be entitled to receive a Silver Medal for competition by its bona
fide members. The winner of such medal, being an efficient member of the Active Militia, or an Officer retired retaining rank, to be entitled to compete free of all entrance fees in the Dominion of Canada and Affiliated Association Matches at the First Prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at which he is present after he wins the Medal. Provided name of the winner and details of the match at which it is won shall be communicated to the Secretary of the D. C. Rifle Association not later than the first day of such Prize Meeting,
5.-There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, to be named by the Council.

The Governor General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron."
6.-There shall be a President, to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.
7.-There shall be a Vice-President for each Province, to be elected in the same manner as the President.
8.-There shall be a Council composed of Fifty members of the Association, who shall be elected in the following proportions :-

one half in each case to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Dominion Association, the other half by the Provincial Associations of the respective Provinces at their annual meetings; the names of those elected by the Provincial Associations to be notified to the Secretary of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association on or before the day of the annual business meeting each year. Six members of the Council shall form the quorum.
9.-The Council shall at its first meeting choose from its own members the Chairman of the Council.
10.-The Council sholl annually elect at its first meeting an Executive Committee, consisting of fifteen (15) of its members. Five (5) to
be a quorum. The President of the Association and Chairman of Council shall be ex officio members of the Executive Committee.
11.-The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Deputy Adjutants General commanding districts, being members of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be ex officio Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.
12.-There shall be a Treasurer and a Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure, who shall receive such compensation for their services as may be voted by the Council.
13.-The Council shall have the management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendency of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts and doeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
14.-The Executive Committee shall give effect to such instructions as the Council may from time to time order, respecting the management of the affairs of the Association.
15.-The Council may from time to time make such rules for their guidance as they deem necessary.
16.-The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at Ottawa, at such time and under such regulations as may be determined on by the Executive Committee, as to all points not previously decided upon by the Council.
17.-An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the Finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary under the direction of the Council, and shall be published and sent to members of the Association at least one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting.
18.-The Annual Business Meeting of the Members of the Association for the Election of Officers and the Council, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after the Assembling of the general session of the Parliament of the Do-
minion. At the close of such Annual Meeting or any adjournment thereof the Association year will terminate.
19.-A General meeting shall be held on the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting for the discussion of all matters that may be brought forward by any member or competitor attending the matches, but no changes in the constitution shall be made except at the Annual Business Meeting.
20.-No alterations in the constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all mombers of the Association of such proposed amendments.
21.-The Council shall have power to fill any vacancy occasioned by death or resignation in their number, from among the members of the Association.

# GENERAL BY-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION, 

## ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.


#### Abstract

Meetings of There shall be two Ordinary Mectings of the Council. The first of which shall be held immediately after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association, and the second, on the first day of the annual Prize Meeting.


Extraordi-
nary Meetings.

Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required by the Chairman or by any four of the members of the Council, at such place as the Chairman may direct-notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such Meeting-and the requisition for the Meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meetings.

The Council to keep minutes of all proceedings.

The Council shall keep Minutes of its proceedings at all Meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary,-and open to the inspection of any member of the Council.

Finance
Committee.
There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at the first meeting.

Treasurer to deposit sums received in Savings Bank.

The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered Bank as a Finance Committee may direct, all

Expenditure of sums for current expenses.

All expenditure of sums for current expenses which may be required by the Secretary must be authorized by the signature of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, or in his absence by some member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Expenditures of a general nature.

Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

Annual
Accounts.
A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall bo rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.

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
