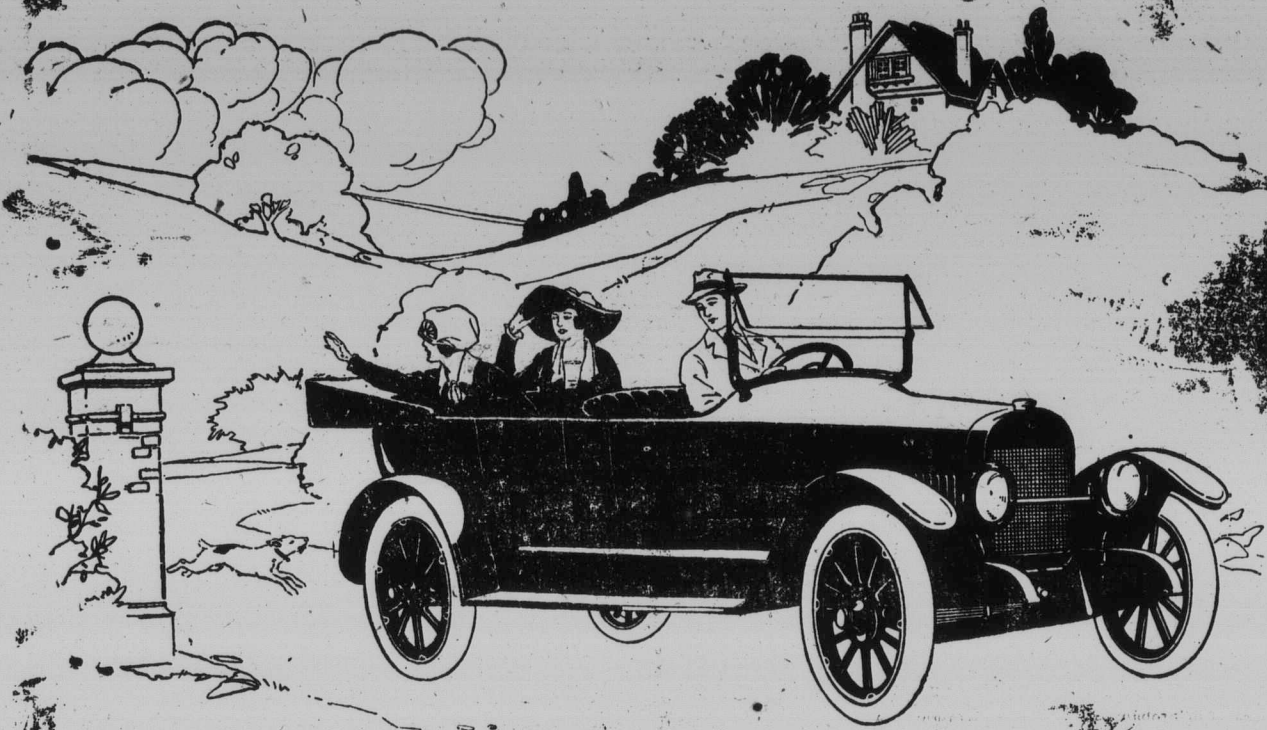

LASHES AND PRISON TERM. were sentenced by Judge Sutherland at Owen Sound last Thursday to five years in Kingston penitentiary with John McBeth, aged 56, and Walter Cox, 19, who were charged with an offense against a 13-year-old girl, months with 10 lashes, respectively.

In giving sentence Judge Sutherland pointed out the heinousness of the crime. He said the older man should have been a protector of the girl and the young man was warned to make amends in the future. Crown Attorney Dyre prosecuted. The unfortunate victim of the crime is a daughter of the men's employer. Her mother has been in the hospital since 1913. The parties live near Priceville, in Glenelg Township, near Flesherton. The girl who is expected to become a mother in a few months, was made a ward of the Children's Aid Society.

The sum of \$1620000 has been set aside to pay the expenses of the census of Canada to be taken in June, which figures out at 18 cents a head of the population, on an estimate of nine million people. Twenty-four thousand enumerators will be employed; and this will mean that the returns will be made much more quickly than in other census periods. The work will start June 1 and it is expected to be completed early in August. Each enumerator will have to fill out, from answers given by the citizens, four schedules concerning population and agriculture, with particulars as to animals kept in towns and cities and special information concerning the blind.

ACT WILL BE ENFORCED.

There is to be no weakening of the Adolescent Act, which requires that after September 1 next, children shall be kept at school until they are 16 years old, according to announcements by Hon. Mr. Grant, minister of education. "But we will be reasonable and enforce it gradually," intimated Mr. Grant. "Children who are 15 years of age and who have been working for a year will not be forced back to school. We expect the people of the province will cooperate."

REDUCE ALLOWANCES.

A reduction in wages to be paid to the returning officers, deputy returning officers and poll clerks, who will work in the coming referendum on the temperance question on April 18, has been made by the Dominion Government, through an order-in-council issued by the Cabinet. Notice of this effect was received by Sheric Richardson, returning officer for Ottawa. The notice came from the auditor general's department and notified him that the tariff of fees had been reduced from the former tariff, which provided the payment of \$4 per poll to the returning officer, \$8 per day to the D.R.C. and \$5 per diem for the poll clerk. Averill Mitchell of Maryboro and Edmund Hayes of Palmerston, two young men arrested some time ago by County Constable Green and Provincial Detective Elliott in connection with a burglary at Palmerston were brought up for trial before Judge Hayes on Monday, charged with shop-breaking. LIVE STOCK MARKETS

TORONTO
With 2200 cattle on sale yesterday the market was no better than the close of last week. The best demand was shown for handy-weight butcher cattle showing fat and quality, and the medium low priced butchers. Very good demand was shown for butcher cows.

The market was lower and inclined to drag on steers with weight variously estimated at from 50c to 75c lower on this class of cattle.

The bull market held about steady.

For milk cows and springers the market was unchanged.

There were a number of parties inquiring for breeder stockers and feeders but there were not many of this class. Generally the market had a slight lower tendency. Reports from Buffalo and other outside points quoted cattle generally lower, and this naturally had its reflection here. We think the immediate prospects are for about steady prices but it is pretty hard to forecast the future at a time like this.

With around 250 sheep and lambs the market held about steady on the choice stuff, but the medium and common class were slow of sale. Choice grain-fed lambs, handy weight, sold from \$14 to \$15; choice sheep \$9 to \$10; heavy sheep and bucks, \$7 to \$8. The market was well cleaned up with the bulk of the lambs of the medium to common quality. There is a fair demand for a few choice spring lamb weighing around 50 pounds; and fat These kind are selling around \$14 to \$16 apiece.

The hog market held about steady at \$14 f.o.b. and \$15 fed and watered with a weaker tendency, and packers aiming at 13.75 f.o.b. for the balance of the week.

NEW HAMBURG.

We have increasing evidence from time to time that farmers of Waterloo County are progressive.

Mr. A. S. Cressman near here, has just returned from Sarnia where he attended a free school of instruction in tractor operating.

An interesting debate took place at Kitchener a couple of weeks ago between a member of the junior farmer's club. The contesting associations were Ayr and Linwood. The subject of the debate was "Resolved that free trade between Canada and the United States would be in the best interests of Canada." The debate was keenly contested. It took the judges three quarters of an hour to decide which was the winner, the decision was given in favor of Linwood, who took the negative side.

New Hamburg and Kitchener took part in previous debates with Ayr and Linwood. A "buy at home" campaign is on in this village. There is to be a series of twenty-six articles in the local press pointing out why it is in the best interest of our citizens to spend their money at home. A good deal of interest will be taken in the discussion with possibly some attempts to explain why some do not spend their money at home. Some of our farmers are coming to the front with live stock. Seegmiller Bros. of Petersburg have a herd of Jersey to the number of 90 head, including "Lincoln Fern" the champion mature cow of Canada for 1920. We have also some wealthy men in Waterloo County. The will of the late J. P. Livingston of Baden, four miles from here, shows an estate valued at \$553,000, consisting of bank stocks, victory bonds, life insurance, real estate and cash in bank.

The referendum matter is causing some stir in town. Meetings are being held, committees appointed in order that the vote may be brought to the poll in the interest of home and country.
