**PERTH TEACHERS' CONVENTION.**  
The annual meeting of the North and South Ontario Teachers' Convention was held at Stratford on Thursday last at 10 a. m. Mr. M. Munro, Milverton, president of the N. P. Association, in the chair. After the usual business of the convention was completed, Mr. S. McGregor, Stratford, introduced the subject of "Superannuation." Mr. McGregor reported that the fund had been set up in 1871, and that it was now in operation for 10 years. He stated that the contributions were only equal to 12 per cent of the draft on the fund. Such a state of things was not satisfactory to the members of the convention, and they agreed to petition the Government to have the law amended to require the contributions to be increased to 25 per cent of the draft on the fund. Mr. McGregor also reported that the fund had a balance of \$15,000 on hand, and that it was now in a position to pay 10 per cent of the draft on the fund.
