Temporary Insanity. Many people think that the expression 'temporary insanity' is merely used by a jury wishing to save relatives pain, but numbers of doctors who have made a study of mental disorders emphatically declare it is no idle term.

One doctor has stated that temporary insanity is a condition of double consciousness, not familiar to epileptics. A person normally quite sane may have attacks of temporary aberrations lasting little more than a few minutes, especially after long bouts of hard, continuous mental work, being practically liable if insomnia supervenes.

Crimes have been committed in the early morning when the perpetrator has not really been properly awake, and has been too tired to find what he has done.

This is a true case of temporary insanity, but it is comparatively rare, and a man in normal health would not suffer in this way.

An specialist in mental disease has stated that he knew a case in which a person was insane during a certain time each day, and that others have been known when the patient was quite normal at ordinary times, but still fell from a temporary fit of mania regularly once a month - Tit-Bits.

Editorial Brevities.

In the recent Salvation Army drive the sum of one and a half millions was contributed throughout Canada.

Hereafter no resident of this province can do business as an insurance agent in Nova Scotia unless he holds a certificate from the Provincial Secretary empowering him so to act.

Lovers of the luscious banana will be pleased to learn that there will be an extraordinary banana crop this year. It is estimated that it will be four times as large as that in 1918.

With the return of Sir Robert Borden the date of prorogation has become a matter of speculation. The majority of members believe that, barring unforeseen developments, the house should rise not later than the end of the first week in July.

As soon as the Bell Telephone Company obtained permission to increase its rates to customers it issued \$4,500,000, at par to its own shareholders. As the stock is now selling at 130 this is a present of \$30 a share or \$1,350,000, to its shareholders at the expense of telephone users.

It is stated that of the ten motor trucks recently purchased by the Provincial Highway Commission, two are to be delivered at Kentville and the road between Kentville and Wolfville is to be among the first to receive attention. This road, like all our other county roads, might well be improved. We believe, however, that better methods must be resorted to than at present in vogue if ideal roads are to be secured.

A writer in the Montreal Gazette points out that the greater part of the trade of Jamaica is done with the United States. Of the imports the republic supplied 47 per cent, compared with 38.5 per cent by Great Britain and 8.7 per cent by Canada, 13.5 per cent received by Great Britain and 5.5 per cent by Canada. The writer calls for a preference tariff by Canada, by which, as well as by establishment of a rapid steamship service, he has no doubt that a considerable and profitable development of trade between the Dominion and the British West Indian colonies could be effected.

An Evening Service Incident.

The following paragraph is taken from an interesting letter published in the Monoton Times, on 'Reminiscences of "Mouseton," by Brenton A. McNab, of Val Morin, Quebec. We are sure it will be read with pleasure by many of the friends and admirers of Dr. Gates in this vicinity. Rev. George O. Gates was the pastor of the First Baptist church; and a preacher of rare spiritual power was he. I recall a notable incident, which took place on a Sunday night, while that Reverend gentleman was conducting the service.
