"I have already informed your Eminence about the sacrilegious acts that took place on the morning of the 8th Dec., at the Basilica of the Vatican and the outrageous insults then offered to the numerous faithful who had repaired thither on a pilgrimage to the tomb of the Prince of Apostles.

"For myself, I leave to your Excellency the work of de-laying the consequences that must flow from the adoption of such a resolution: my business was to supply you with the knowledge of all the odious acts above mentioned.

THE NEW GERMAN EMPIRE. As our readers are aware, one of the effects of the war at present raging in Europe, has been the formal consolidation of Germany under one head and one regular form of rule.

The career of the Emperor of Germany is thus sketched by the Dublin Freeman:— In a few years he has grown to be the most powerful ruler in Europe.

It would have been altogether absurd to have received the title of Emperor upon the throne. His mother was the Princess Louise of Mecklenburg-Strelitz.

"I dare not repeat the vile songs and cries of death shouted against the Sovereign Pontiff, and against the chief dignitaries of the Church, which resound incessantly in the public streets of the City, and even close to the residence of His Holiness.

"I dare not describe the insults that are offered to the Clergy. One Priest was knocked down and seriously injured by a stone which was hurled at him on the head; everybody was subjected to the same who was known as professing sentiments of piety.

She lingered until nine o'clock the following morning, when death put an end to her sufferings.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Yesterday, a man by the name of William Owen, who had been engaged on Monday by Angus McLean, Esq., to carry a tub on board the brig "Chester," was found dead, at noon, in the cabin of that vessel. The deceased was a good one, but on Tuesday night by another man in the employ of Mr. McLean, who left him (Owen) sitting on the deck, and he was found dead on the morning, the cabin was locked on the inside, and was entered through the skylight, and was discovered lying in the tank, with his outer clothes off, quite dead; but we believe the body was warm, when it was found. There were no marks of violence discoverable on his person. It is said the deceased was subject to fits, but whether he came to his death in that way or not, is not known. A first stage was used in the cabin, and it was evident he had been in it. It was the first stage he had slept in the vessel. An inquest was held before Thomas Hunt, Esq., Coroner, and a verdict returned that "deceased came to his death from some cause unknown to the jury." THE LEGISLATURE OF ONTARIO.

The Legislature of Ontario was prorogued on the 16th inst., and that of the Dominion opened on the same day. The Governor General's Speech referred to the Fenian raid of May last, to Red River, the proximate incorporation of British Columbia, railroad extension to the Pacific coast, and other important public work, and also to emigration, international currency, and other serious subjects. Here are, surely, enough of important matters to occupy the attention of the Dominion Parliament for one session at least. We are particularly pleased with the length of the paragraph relating to the Fenian question, and earnestly hope that no diplomatic jugglery will sacrifice colonial interests. Owing to the financial prosperity of the country, a reduction of taxation is promised.

The Newfoundland Legislature was opened on the 28th ult. The revenue of the Colony last year was £297,790. After providing for all contingencies a balance of £23,887 10s. 9d. remained to the credit of the Colony. Political matters are lively both in and out of Parliament.
