ANTI-UNIONISTS' PLANS FOR FUTURE

"Vie will continue the Presbyter an Church from the 10th of June 1925-the date union comes into tect-regardless of what the legisla tures do" declared Rev. Dr. D.J Fraser, president of the Presbyter ian Church Association, who return ed to the city yesterday following an executive meeting of the organi zation in Toronto Monday. He added that an official statement of the plans of the association would be issued immediately parliament final rat ded the Church Union Bill.

amendment to the bill, gran ing prmission for non-concurring cong ogations to vote against enterthe united church instead their being obliged to enter and then later being permitted to vote themselves out if they so desired as was originally provided for in the bill, represents a great gain for the anti-unionists, particularly so tar as moral effect is concerned, Dr. Fraser said. The votes may be taken any time within the six mon as following December 10th next. COLLEGE PROBLEM

It is impossible at this time to tell what will be the future of the Presbyterian College here, Dr. Fras The college, he explained is not affected at all by Ottawa's action since its charter is a provincial one and the Quebec Legisla ture has not yet passed on the Church Union Bill.

"If" he went on "Quebec passes the act, the college will go into will United Church, as the other seven Presbyterian theolo gical colleges in Canada. ALARMING FOREST

There is a day of reckoning com ing for the politicians who have been Canada's only safe remaining wood supply—the fee land holdings. A forest fire catastrophe of appalling dimensions is bound to occur in the near future. With the annual des truction of fifteen million acres of forested area through the ravages of fire, fungi, insects and wind and the consequent drying up of the earth's surface-which is now appar increasing to such an alarming ex tent that there is bound to be a forest fire or series of fires that will sweep the whole northern portions of Quebec. Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia the first day when weather conditions are right for such a catastrophe. It may happen this summer; it may happen this fall, it may happen next spring but happen it will just as surely as daylight follows darkness This is the reason why I stress the imortance of conserving the wood on the fee-land holdings, which is now being exported to enrich the

people of another nation. A dry day, a high wind in the right direction, a spark, and this whole country will be laid waste, to gether with a loss of life hereto fore unrecorded in forest fire history. With the present indifference of our political exploiters this is just as sure to occur as that a spark dropped into a powder magazine will cause an explosion, for the woods of northern Canada in a dry time are just as inflammable as gunpowder. This condition has been brought about by the blowing down of two hundred million cords of bud-worm killed trees, millions of acres of dry, tinder like,; disease infested slash, and the lowering of the water table in the earth's surface, through the denuding of the fifteen million acres of forested area annually. The earth's surface is now so dry that in hot weather forest fires frequently break out and roads become dusty within two days after quite heavy rains, bearing mute testimony to the desertlike conditions that are approaching in this now over-denuded country.

An article which has just appear ed in the International Monthly by Julian E. Kothery, Forest Engineer for the International Paper Company calls ttention to the well-known fact that forest fires season destroyed one-eighth the wood d area of one of the largest watersheds in the Province of Quebec-which simply means that seven years more of equal loss will reduce that great area to a desert wilderness, entirely aside from the depletion that is taking place through cutting, fungi, insects and wind. A grim awakening is in store for the Capadian people.



SCHWAB TO MAKE SIX- WHEEL MOTORS

New York, July 27—Charles M. Schwab, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Betlehem Steel Corporation, announced yesterday he nad accepted the chairmanship of the Six Wheel Company of Philadelphia which will manufacture a new type of six-wheel motor bus and truck.

This is the steel man's second im portant venture in the automobile field. Some time ago he became largely interested in the expanded Stutz company, the stock of which had been given a sensational and later disastrous boost by his friend Allan Kyan in 1920.

The six-wheel idea has been supplied before to trucks designed to carry expectionally heavy loads. Heretofore such trucks usually have been used with a two-wheel trailer, the front end of which rested on the truck's rear. In the new truck the rear four wheels will be assembled in one unit, and power and brakes will be applied to all four wheels.

In a statement explaining the purpose of the company, Mr.

I have entered the automotive industry in the field of large capacity coaches and freight trucks, with the idea of providing a solution of the two outstanding problems of efficient and economical use of the nghways by heavy motor vehicles. "The highway is the roadbed of tne motor truck and bus. Conservation of that roadbed is the basic principle of truck and bus operation if such operation is to be of great est public service. Herein is the greatest d'fficulty of highway trans portation. Loads sufficiently large to permit of economical operation have presented a serious problem of highway maintenance.

"Having this condition in mind a six-wheel motor vehicle has been developed which requires road impact to about one-fourth that experienced by four-wheel vehicles of like capacity in general use. With 2,941,274 miles of highways in the United States as compartd with only 251,175 miles of earn railways and 47,159 miles of electric and street railways, the vast opportunity that has awaited the right type of highway vehicle is obvious.

"When railroads first used four wheel trucks under their cars, two wheel trucks became forever obsolte. The new type of six-wheel construction will, in my opinion ac complish the same thing for heavy duty highway motor vehicles."

Justice Department Prepares Reference

The reference to the Supreme Court of Canada of the question of the powers of the Dominion Parliament and the Provincial Legislatures to pass and administer legislation respecting the eight hour day in the industrial undertakings, is in the course of preparation by the Department of Justice. The reference will come before the Supreme court for advisory judgment, and can if appealed to, be carried to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council


At the conference held in Ottawa last September between representatives of the federal and Provincial Governments, doubt was expressed as to the jurisdiction of the Domin ion under the British North America is to ascertain definitely the powers of the Dominion and provinces, and is the result of a recommendation made to the House of Commons in the last days of the session by the Committee on Industrial and Inter national Relations. The Committee made its recommendations after examination of the draft convention adopted by the International Labor Congress of the League of Nations in 1919, limiting the hours of work in industrial undertakings to eight in the day and forty eight in the

40.000 HARVESTERS WANTED FOR WEST

At least 40,000 harvesters will be required this year to gather in the wheat croy of Canada, according to information given out by the Cana dian National Railway offices here today. A world's record for his senior two-year old Holstein Friesian Heifer, Williamsburg Pontiac, is claimed by Dr. M. V. Locke, Williamsburg, Catt., as a result of a 38 day test saowing production of 2,788.5 pounds of milk and 113.82 lbs. butter fat, equivalent to 148.8 lbs. of butter.

The official Railway Guide, in commenting on the Air service which connects with the Canadian Pacific Railway at Argliers says:
—"so far as we are aware this is the first instance on this continent where interchange of passenger taffic between railways and airplanes has been established.

In his address to the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, at Wemoley, July 17th, E. W. Beatty, pesident of the Canadian Pacific Railway rated that the amounts spent on colonization by the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian Government from the year 1881 totalled, respectively \$67,000,000 and \$35,000,000.

During the last four years the Canadian Pacific Railway has handled some 85.000 west-bound harvesters. Last year this company inargurated the lunch-counter car, which afforded facilities hitherto unknown, and, although perhaps not as a direct result of this innovation, over 26,000 men travelled in special trains over Canadian Pacific lines.

MacTier, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific eastern lines, who awarded to the McAdam team the First Aid Challenge Cup, which they won in competition with teams from North Pay, Toronto, Windsor Station and Angus, stated that since the Canadian Pacific Council of the St. John Ambulance Association was inaugurated in 1909, over twenty thousand employees of the Company have received instruction in First Aid. The last amural report of the St. John Ambulance Association referred to the Canadian Pacific as the "premier rail-way centre."

Forest Fires in N. B. This Season

passed through another month with comparatively little damage occuring in the province from forest fires. While there were more large fires in July than occurred during the month of June, it is felt anat the province has been most fortunate inasmuch as there almost continuous drought for the first three weeks of the month.

A summary of the returns to of fires in the province was 130, that they burned over approximately 12. 000 acres evenly divided between Crown and Granted lands and that the estimated damage to both timber and property is approximately \$40,000. Of the 130 fires this season 11 spread and caused damage to Crown Lands, all the others be ing on either granted land or railn the right of way. Twenty fires on the right of way of railways were discovered and extinguished by the railway patrols and section men: 2 fires along railways got out of con trol and did considerable damagebeing on the Frederictor and Grand Lake Kailway's Line and the other on the Transcon tinental Division of the Canadian National Railways at Sunbury.

A number of cases of violation o the fire law are being investigated In one case where a settler started to burn during a dry and windy period and a large crew had to be employed to subdue the flames, the convicting magistrate imposed the cost of the fire fighting as well as a substantial fine upon the party responsible for creating the danger ous situation. Five campers who were found in the woods without re gistration certificates which are re quired from everybody entering the forests, have been prosecuted by the Department of Lands & Mines officials and convicted in

Just how rapidly a prosecution can be carried out was illustrated recently. During the period when all burning was prohibited a settle started a fire on his plot. lot. A lookout observed the fire, spotted it and notified the ranger. En route, to the scene the ranger picked up the local magistrate and the settler was caught in the act of starting the fire. The ranger ordered the fire put out and the settler worked feverish'y until this was accomplish ed. Then he was taken before the Magistrate who held court on the ye, which became affected as the spot; the settler pleaded guilty and fine being allowed to stand because of his successful efforts in extinguish ing the fire and his promise of care in the future. The whole procedure; from the time the fire was observed by the lookout who telephoned to the within fifteen minutes-which shows that the mills of justice can grind rapidly at times.

WHITE BREAD IS ALLY OF CANCER

Eminent Surgeon in Britain Advocates Wholemeal Loaf

London, July 28-The case for wholesome bread is unanswerable and undeniable" says the Weekly Lespatch. "Long ago the Daily Mail marshalled facts and arguments to prove that white bread is made of flour from which some of the nutritions elements have been withdrawn White bread, like very white and pol ished rice has been deprived of val uable constituents which are able to nourish and stimulate the human system. Wheat and other cereals are ideal foods when left in their natural condition; they become debilitat ing and dangerous when all the nusks have been extracted.

"The Bulgarian peasant enjoying his rye bread, the Highland crofter with his oaten cake, is, or was be ter nourished than the modern well to do Englishman with his elaborate ly whitened loaf which the miller and the baker have converted from the staff of life into an agent of

"Attention has again been emphatically directed to this important subject. Mr. Ellis Barker has brought together a mass of evidence which tends to show that cancer is the result of autotoxins generated within the system. For this selfpoisoning improper diet is mainly responsible. A person may eat a great deal of food and yet be inadequately nourished if the food is of the wrong kind. There must be a sufficient supply of vitaminer to maintain the functional balance and promote resistance to disease various grave maladies, of which cancer is the worst.

"This is a view which has recei ed the endorsement of Sir Archibuthnot Lane, the eminent surgeon white bread favors the onset of cancer by lowering the bodily health and general vitality. White bread contains few vitamines. An official report on the apple crop of New Brunswick states that the drop was very heavy on occount of the drought the rains coming too late to stop it. The drop is continuing and the final yie'ds may be seriously reduced even vet.

Early varieties promise much be ter than last season but 1923 was a remarkably poor year. Yellow Trans parent, Crimson Beauty, Duchess Dudley and Wealthy promise a full crop which would be fifty per cent better than 1923.

Later varieties also promise better than last year but not so well as the early varieties. McIntosh, Fameuse, Alexander, Wdif River; Canada Baldwin and Milwauke promise a fair crop, or twenty-five per cent better than 1923.

Other winter varieties will be light to nledium in yield. Pichop Pippin, feewaukee, Ben Davis; Gold n Russet, Northern Spy and Bethel are in this class.




