DR. BRIGGS' UNION THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY, New York, was the principal speaker at a meeting of the Connecticut Valley Congregational Club held in South Deerfield, Mass., last week. The subject was "Church Unity." Dr. Briggs, it will be remembered, was condemned some two years ago by the Presbyterian General Assembly on the charge of heresy, and suspended from the ministry. At the outset of his discourse he startled his hearers by declaring that Protestants had been more intolerant than Catholics. Nothing, he said, was nearer his heart than Christian Unity. The present Pope was earnestly looking forward to the time when Christian unity might be restored, and the utterances of Cardinals, Archbishops, and Bishops showed that the unity of Christendom was weighing on their hearts. "There is nothing in the New Testament," continued the speaker, "that prevents all of us from coming together. For some years I have agreed with the authorities of the Roman Catholic Church to a certain extent in the interpretation that they place upon the words, 'Thou art Peter, and upon this rock will I build my Church.' It is sincerely to be hoped that Dr. Briggs will be in time to see that the only possible basis of the Christian unity he yearns for is the same Rock on which Christ has built His Church. - C. K. C.

FROM time to time articles appear in London journals attacking Canada's commercial standing and with the intent of injuring her credit in the money markets of the world.

The grand result of the work of the two Liberal-Conservative Associations of Ottawa, on the revision of the voters lists, is that the Conservatives are nine hundred ahead.

"When I was in London Canadian three per cents touched par, a thing unprecedented in the history of the Dominion, and I was proud to be a Canadian," was the remark made in Montreal the other day, by Geo. Hague, general manager of the Merchants Bank of Canada, who has just returned from a two months' trip to Europe.

A cable to the Montreal Star from London says: "In the Canadian finance minister's interview with the Chronicle, Mr. Foster touches upon pretty nearly the whole range of topics common to British and Canadian discussion, except the 'loan' and the East Atlantic service."

Following up the judgment in the exchequer court in which Emanuel St. Louis claim for \$64,000 more in connection with his contract for labor on the Curran bridge was knocked out, with costs, against St. Louis on Thursday last in the exchequer court at Ottawa, Mr. Hogg, Q. C. acting on behalf of the department of justice, filed an information at the suit of the attorney-general of Canada against St. Louis, claiming the sum of \$143,881, as having been overpaid to him on his pay lists through fraud and misrepresentation on his part.

A despatch was lately received at the department of trade and commerce, Ottawa, from the colonial office, enclosing the latest communication from the British minister at Madrid on the subject of the duties levied on Canadian fish entering Cuba and Porto Rico. Canada is on precisely the same terms as Norway in the Spanish Antilles, that is, our codfish are free; but with reference to the enquiry whether haddock and halibut are included in the word 'codfish,' the decision of the Spanish colonial customs department is that they are not.

An English schoolmaster suggests that school slates very frequently convey diphtheria germs. It is a common practice for children to clean their slates by spitting on them, or to wet their fingers to rub out a figure found to be wrong.

Canada's Detractors.

As announced in the Cathedral on Sunday last, the ladies of the CharloTTetown Hospital have, this week, commenced their annual collection for the support of that institution.

In view of these facts, it is not wonderful that the recent attack on Canada's financial condition, published in the Investors Review, London, should be regarded by many as Grit inspiration.

Let those who wish to deny Canada's credit in this most unjust manner point to any other country that can make a better showing, so far as the question of public debt is concerned.

As to the Australasian colonies, the alleged debt of Canada is small in comparison with theirs. According to the Montreal Gazette, the following are the debts per head of these colonies:

What the debt per head of the United States, estimated after the Wilson fashion, is, it is difficult to tell; but there can be no doubt that it would be far higher than that made up against Canada.

The net debt per head of the Dominion is \$48.70. With all their misrepresentations and evil propensities, those London publicists will not make out a serious case against the Dominion, even supposing their figures to be correct.

Canadian Gazette: "We see that The World this week announces that, in reference to the wishes of the Canadian Government an arrangement has been made by which Major-General Ivor Herbert will retain his appointment as commandant of the Dominion militia, instead of joining the Grenadier Guards for duty, as he ought to have done on the promotion of Col. Ricardo."

The CharloTTetown Hospital.

The London Morning Post says of Sir John Thompson's proposed visit: "The Canadian fast Atlantic service is a business connection with the resolution of the Ottawa Intercolonial conference. Owing to the apathy of the Australasian colonies it is unlikely that the Government will enter into any contract with Canada as yet."

Admiral Hopkins has written an open letter to Promoter Haddart, who came to England in the interest of the Canadian fast Atlantic service, in it he says: "It seems a pity that the enterprise and genius which completed the magnificent service over the major part of the route between the United Kingdom and the West, via the Canadian Pacific railway, should not now be backed by some further enterprise able and willing to furnish means for bridging the remaining portion and making the whole possible in far shorter time than at present."
