Saturday's attendance was 55,000, several thousand more than on the closing day last year. It is stated on the best of authority that the surplus to be handed over to the city will be at least \$70,000, as against \$40,000 last year.

The Prince County Ex hibition opened with the usual formalities on Friday last and was continued on Saturday. There was large attendance during both days, and the exhibits in the different classes were extensive, varied and for the most part excellent. Inside and outside the number of entries general excellence of the ex hibits rendered the competition for prizes quite keen. Fine horse trotting on both days was largely patronized and much enjoyed. On the whole, the Prince County Exhibition of 1909 may be set down as the best in the history of the county.
