Its Beauties Graphically Described

Glowing Description by a Gifted Canadian.

A Tribute to its Attractions from a Michigan Pen.

June last was so well received that we feel warranted in again calling attention to the attractions of the place. We then wrote extensively about the advantages offered by Goderich to those seeking health and rest with comfort, but we will not need again to dwell on the beauties of the place, as the two admirable quotations from Picturesque Canada, and Outing, given below, from outside writers, will have more weight than anything we can say, as showing how the place strikes the stranger. "Let another praise thee and not thyself; a stranger's lips and not thine own."

From Picturesque Canada. The following graphic description of Goderich in Picturesque Canada, is supposed to have been written by Principal Grant, of Queen's College, Kingston, and the description of the lake, and the sunset, as seen from the park is a veritable

As seen from the Lake Goderich lies in the centre of a large curve of the coast; and with its church spires, public edifices, and pretty private residences. enriched with the bright, green foliage of abundant trees, it has an air of quiet and almost alcepy beauty. On closer inspection, it is obvious that its growth has not been left to accident, nor to the caprices of individual taste, but has been provided for by foretheught and plan.

THE FOUR QUARTERS OF THE COMPASS. From this central point spacious streets radiate north, south, east, and west, intersected by other streets at measured distances, along which shade trees have been planted abundantly. Beyond the town, to the landward side, the eye wanders over a vast and fertile plain, bearing in summer all the products of the temperate zone, peaches, almost equal to those of the Niagara district, included. To this rich plain, dark-green patches of reserved forest trees give the aspect of the glorious park-lands of Eng-land. Lakewards the boundless expanse of an inland sea meets the eye, extend-ing its glistening waters to a far horizon.

of an inland sea meets the eye, extending its glistening waters to a far horizon. Here and there, at wide intervals, the level floor of water is broken by the white sails of a ship or fishing boat, or by the dark smoke of a distant steamer. The corporation of Goderich has wisely secured an extensive portion of the bluff fronting the lake for a public park. Here, a grand prospect is obtained of the Lake, its far-extending rugged shores, and the river, in the hollow, winding its tortuous way among grassy lalets. Seated on one of the benches, or reclining under the lofty acacia trees, the stranger gazea with never-flagging interest on the extraordinary combination of colors that the waters of the Lake present. Near the shore, probably because of the wash that atirs up the sand, is a broad band of mingled yellow and earth color; then, green gradually predominates till it becomes pure green; and beyond that the deep blue that reflects the sky. Perched on another projecting bluff, that by some special favor is yet preserved from the destruction of the elements, the Light-house looks almost sheer down on the harbor. It contains a fixed light consisting of numerous lamps with silvered reflectors, and sheds its welcome rays far over the dark waters. To the right, lies the harbor in the deep hollow or recess which the united waters of the river and lake have eaten out of the land. A broad breakwater shields it from the wash of the lake, and the entrance is protected by two long piers of crib-work. Goderich is the principal watering-place of Western Ontario, and it well deserves its high reputation for beauty of location and surroundings. Turning from the lake view the town is a pretty sight, being neatly built, with many fine houses and summer residences, with gardens and ornamental grounds the business portion clustering about the pretty little circular park heretoforemen-tioned. THE FALL WHEAT. The last bulletin issued by the On-

tario Bureau of Statistics contains the following of particular interest to the people of this section of the prevince :-Reports received from over six hundred correspondents of the Bureau show that the condition of fall wheat in the province is much more satisfactory than it was in May of last year. Yet it is not uniformly good, and there are some dis-tricts in which the outlook is somewhat gloomy. This is noticeably the case in the extreme ends of the Province—westward of the meridian of London, and eastward of the meridian of Kingston. For the large middle district the ac counts are on the whole favorable, and the weather of this month has caused a marked improvement to take place everywhere. Complete returns of the acreage under crop have not yet been re-ceived, but as far as they have been ob-

tained they indicate an area twenty per cent. less than last year.

Though reports from the Lake Huron counties vary considerably in estimating the extent to which the fall wheat crop been injured, they are practically un animous as to the causes of the injury and its distribution as regards soil and cultivation. The dry weather of seed time, followed as it was by frost and cold winds in September and October, left the young plants rather feebly equipped counter successfully the viscissi tudes of winter and spring; and though they were in fair condition when the anow disappeared the dry frests of the latter part of March and the early part of April did serious and, in many places, irrecoverable damage to the crop.
Wheat sown on light, dry soils generally sustained the least injury, though in few cases low, rich, "mucky" soils, and, in a few others, well-drained clay lands, are mentioned as having enjoyed almost complete immunity from damage. Upon this point, however, the reports may be ed up by saying that the best safeguards against the effects of the spring rosts proved as usual to be-putting

A Bloody Battle Between Blyth Farmers.

BLYTH, Ont., May 27.-A brutal fight occurred yesterday morning just outside the village limits, between two farmers and their sons, named respectively Beamish and Maines, resulting in the death of one of the combatants, Maines, who died from his injuries at 10 o'clock last night. The village was thrown into a scene of the greatest excitement on receipt of this sad gence. Expressions of surprise and hor-ror were heard on every hand that such a crime should have been committed in this usually quiet and peaceable neigh-

Beamish and Maines, who resided about a mile from the village, were well-to-do farmers, the latter being over 50 years eld, and the former about 70. were near neighbors, but between Saturday morning, it is said, they quar-reled, and then again on Sunday,
