

The President. Hon. W. R. Warren, was in the chair, with Mr. G. J. Adams as Secretary. Judge Johnson addressed the meeting and gave a splendid and most interesting account of the Association from the time of its inception down to the present, particularly emphasizing the pioneer efforts of the late Hon. D. J. Greene and Mr. G. J. Carty in the initial steps of the movement The following resolutions were adopt

"The Association should be incorpor ated, and given thereby a standing and authority not hitherto enjoyed. The membership should be increased from the ranks of citizens willing to assist in the Association's efforts. The funds should be augmented by public subscription and otherwise and applied to the requirements of the Association as they arise. At present there is a substantial sum in the Bank to the credit of the S. P. C. A.,

(about \$1,400.00.) The Association will require a competent agent, whose time must be given wholly to his office, and, for which a fair salary will be paid.

It will be an endeavour of the S. P C. A. to move in the matter of educating the youth against practices of cruelty to animals, now unfortunately



Indianapolis, Ind., Feb., 16. -New disclosures made in the dynamite conspiracy cases, through 40,000 letters and telegrams quoted in all the Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, will be the basis, it was declared to-day, upon which the government will seek to convict the fifty-four defendants charged with

ng that a vast plot, known by Frank Ryan president of the iron workers. and to members of his executive board and many business agents, was carried on for six years to destroy the property of steel contractors who em ployed non-union labor

It charges all the defendants with eing equally guilty as abettors. It also purports to reveal evidence that "jobs" became the accepted term and that gradually the officials of local unions began to call on the international headquarters in Indianapolis to assist by dynamite and nitro-glycerine in increasing the expenses of "open

Ortie E. McManigal, Herbert S Hockin, second vice president and James B. McNamara, became, it is charged, an organized "dynamiting committee." Letters are included to show regular fees were paid to Mc-Manigal and that the cost of doing ocal "jobs" frequently was discussed

A letter from Olaf A. Treitmoe of the local union in San Francisco to J. J. McNamara in Indianapolis, after the Los Angeles Times disaster, stating that he hoped "Santa Claus would be as kind and generous to you with surprises," is quoted to show that the conspiracy spread from Boston to the

Four more indictments not venade public, supplemented the principal indictment containing the correspondence. The indictments name all the fifty-four defendants as implicated in the general conspiracy and

make these charges "That on thirty-four counts all the defendants were principals in illegal

ransportation of dynamite. "That on thirty-four counts Manigal, John J. McNamara, James B. McNamara and Hockin are guilty of illegally transporting dynamite and all the other defendants are guilty of iding and abetting them.

"That on sixteen counts all the deendants are guilty as principals in illegal transortation of nitro-glycer-

"That on sixteen counts. McManigal, John J. McNamara, James B. Mc-Namara and Hockin are guilty of illegal transportation of nitro-glycerine and all the defendants are guilty of aiding and abetting them."

The wide scope of the thirty-two indictments which contain twenty-eight counts, is due, it is announced, to the theory of the government that the defendants' alleged guilt is equal no son's activity in the conspiracy may have been. Mr. Miller said it has been determined to press all the counts of the indictments against each of the defendants.
