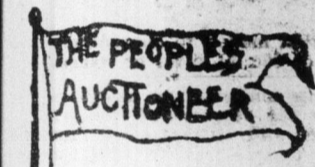

Household Notes.

After a whisk broom has become ragged, trim off evenly and use as a sink brush. The very best way to clean rusty needles is to run them up and down in the earth. Excellent pantry cloths for glass-ware and china are made from cheese-cloth hemmed. Mud stains can be removed from black garments by rubbing the stains with a raw cut potato. When a worn place or hole appears in the matting it can be darned with strands of raffia. A lump of camphor placed near silver-ware that is not in use will prevent it from tarnishing. Grapes are much more delicious if they are allowed to lie in ice water at least five minutes before serving. A dash of scalloped potatoes is much more savory if a sweet green pepper is boiled and chopped fine and put in. Nutmegs can be tested by pricking them with a pin. If they are good, oil will instantly spread around the puncture. When shoes have become hard and stiff after being wet, they should be washed with warm water and then rubbed well with oil. The cooking process of anything cooked in a double boiler can be hurried if salt is added to the water in the outer boiler. Fine linens and pieces of lingerie will last much longer if they are wrung out by hand and not put through the wringer. An easy and quick way to clean tarnished silver is to boil it in water to which has been added a small lump of washing soda. When you open a box of sardines taken out on a plate and sprinkled with lemon juice. Potatoes will remain firm and mealy all winter if air-stacked lime is sprinkled over the barrels or bins; the lime absorbs the moisture. Dry bran is said to be an excellent thing to clean dainty velvet flowers and woollen fabrics. Rub the soiled part, then brush it all off. Radiators should be examined often to see if they are filled with cold water or condensed steam, which keeps them from radiating the heat. A lemon that is heated will remove more juice than one that is cold. When cold, place the lemon in a heated oven until it is warm through. If flour is placed in the oven until it is thoroughly heated, it will not be so apt to lump easily in making thickening for gravies, soups and sauces. Save orange and lemon parings; dry them, and when you have a fire on the hearth throw them on; the flames will become very vivid and full of bright colours. Before belting is sewed on a wash skirt it should be shrunken by pouring boiling water over it and letting it soak therein for five minutes. Then dry and iron. Iron bedsteads can be very successfully cleaned by using a damp cloth and a little cooking soda. Soda is also very good to remove stains from the sink. When you are running curtain rods through the curtains they sometimes catch and tear the material. To prevent this, put a thimble on the end of the rod.

Secured Scoop With Airship

Portland, Ore., Nov. 6.—How a newspaper reporter raced in an aeroplane to the scene of a wrecked gasoline schooner, from which six men ad perished, was told by F. D. Guyton, the Marshfield correspondent of the Portland Journal. Guyton received word that the chopper had been smashed to bits when it crashed into a submerged stry early to-day. He ran to the shore from his office after having sent a bulletin to Portland. The wreck was about twelve miles from Marshfield. Guyton went to several captains, but they were unwilling to go to the spot where the Osprey had been wrecked. He was told that he would have to wait several hours before he could get the details of the wreck. The newspaper man was in a dilemma. He had no craft, and despite the queries that kept pouring in, his office each time he returned out of breath he had no detailed account to send. Suddenly it occurred to Guyton that his friend, St. Christopher, had an airplane. The wind was pretty strong, but Guyton knew that Christopher would have any reasonable weather. "I want to go to where that schooner was wrecked," Guyton told his friend. Christopher smiled at his friend and tantalizingly told him that he had either get a boat. Guyton paid no heed to this remark. "You've got to take me out there," he told the owner of the aeroplane. "Right you are," said Christopher, and in a few minutes the air raft was ready. The reporter, acting as if it were in everyday occurrence, stepped in the aeroplane—something he never before had done in his life—and was sailing through the air at a speed of forty miles an hour. The biplane soared safely over the air despite the high wind. It went round the spot where the Osprey was wrecked. The biplane swooped down as near as it was safe to the wrecked schooner. From there the reporter saw the fragments of the vessel swept away by the rough water. In the first trip the two men in the biplane saw some of the wreck, and it was decided that another visit would be paid to the scene. By that time the life saving crew were at work. The tug Rescue got near enough to the wrecked schooner to throw a line to Captain Gus Johnson. He broke away from the line and was washed into the sea. Captain Johnson, of San Francisco, a passenger, also lost his life, as did four of the crew. The aeroplane than swept back to Marshfield where Guyton sent in a thrilling account of the attempted rescue and the sight of the wreck from a height of a couple of hundred feet. 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To Vote on Local Option

Seventy-Eight Municipalities to Vote In January. Toronto, Nov. 5.—The latest reports to the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance indicate that 78 municipalities will vote on local option next January, while 15 will vote on the question of repealing existing by-laws.
