





Cable News.

LONDON, To-day.—The Daily Mail learns that from motives of economy the Government has decided to hold no naval manoeuvres this year.

VIENNA, To-day.—The marriage of Prince George of Greece and Princess Elizabeth of Roumania, will be celebrated next May 21, in the presence of the German Emperor, who arranged the match.

BEUTHEN, Russia, To-day.—A Russian, Lubelski, was sentenced to nine years imprisonment for engaging in the White Slave Traffic. Lubelski had hundreds of agents in Russian Poland, ostensibly engaged in general emigration business. Lubelski detached girls from emigrant parties after they crossed the frontier.

WASHINGTON, To-day.—The Alaska Railway Bill, authorized the President to construct a 35,000,000 railroad from Alaska's coast to its great coal fields was past by the House by a vote of 230 to 87. The Bill has already passed the Senate, and now goes to the President who is expected to sign it.

LONDON, To-day.—An investigation into the Marconi scandal will be asked for in the Lords to-day on motion of the Marquis of Lansdowne in terms identical to that of Lord Amthill which gave rise to Lord Murray's explanation on Tuesday. Amthill with his friends are delighted at receiving front bench action. He desires the appointment of a committee of seven or nine members. Milner, Revoltke and Parmer are mentioned. It is also hoped that one or two independent Liberals would serve.

PARIS, To-day.—A commission for the study of the economic consequences for France of the opening of the Panama Canal was formed, composed of ten officials from various State Ministries. The Commissioners after discussion will draft a report to the French Government on the steps necessary to gain the fullest utilization of the Canal by French Commerce.



How New Zealand
Abandoned the Policy
of the Market-Place.

(Concluded.)

Industrial Protection

"Women were granted the franchise in 1893, and their influence can no doubt be traced in numerous provisions which have for their object the protection of working women, girls and boys. One result is that not a girl nor a boy under 16 is anywhere at work, and there is a sentiment in favour of raising these limits. No boys are allowed on the streets selling papers or acting as messengers after 6 p.m. An eight and a quarter hour day and forty-five hour week, with restricted overtime, is laid down for women and boys—this being less than that fixed in the case of men.

"It is claimed by Mr. Lusk, not only that his policy has been humane, but also that it has been commercially successful—that the people of New Zealand are 'the most contented, the most law-abiding, and the most prosperous community in the world.'

"The following passage sums up the lesson—

"Perhaps the most remarkable feature of New Zealand's object-lesson, at least from an economic point of view, is the evidence it affords on one point, and that the most unexpected of all—the policy is the most profitable of all national policies yet adopted. This, indeed, is not its highest recommendation; it is, one, however, so unexpected, and so contradictory of all past experience, that it cannot be lost sight of without injustice in dealing with the question.

"New Zealand adopted a policy that was in absolute contradiction of the received and accepted principles of national political economy—a policy that might be defended on grounds of benevolence, or even of an over-streined and somewhat sentimental desire to give opportunity to the class that had hitherto had the least opportunity of advancement twenty years ago. The result that was not anticipated, either by the supporters or opponents of the policy in New Zealand or elsewhere, was the one that is the most apparent of all—the policy has paid, to an extent that can be claimed for no other national policy ever adopted by any country.

"The last twenty years has been a period of great events in the commercial world. Business has increased as it never did before in many of the countries of the civilized world; nowhere has it increased in anything like the proportion that it has increased in New Zealand. Wealth has poured into several countries as it never did before, so that America, England, and Germany, as the great commercial countries of the time, congratulate themselves on an unprecedented increase in the amount of their wealth; none of them have increased in riches—in the amount of goods exported, or the amount of riches gained—in proportion to the numbers of their people, one-half as rapidly as New Zealand and its people during the period.

"These are the facts; it can hardly be questioned that they demand consideration from the nations whose policy has been that of the market place, and whose success has been so greatly exceeded by a country that has abandoned the policy of the market for that of human brotherhood."

Cows Did Not Strike.

"The strike of the waterside workers, then, was viewed by butter and cheese makers (mostly small farmers working on co-operative principles) with the gravest alarm. Following an exceptionally mild winter was a phenomenal milk production. Tons of butter and cheese were made daily, only to accumulate in the stores until the gentlemen whose work it was to load it into the ships were disposed to resume work. The cow did not strike, and more and more milk went to the factories to be turned into butter and cheese for export until the stores could hold no more, while four ocean liners lay idly at anchor awaiting discharge in order to take the butter and cheese into their freezing chambers. The wool farmers, too, realized that, while the shorn wool might keep that commodity, like butter and cheese, was useless to them until safely under hatches, when they could draw on London against their bills of lading. To the farmer the stoppage of work meant ruin—and he has felt as keenly as anyone the extremely cautious policy generally adopted by the banks of New Zealand. There was rather less time for thought and talk than action. Word went throughout the country to its remotest settlement that volunteers were wanted as dockers and also as police to protect them.

"Immediately the strike was declared, Wellington, the capital city of the Dominion, was in the hands of a lawless mob. Moral sanction used by the strikers took the form of the fat and the homestead boot. The first company of mounted farmers that rode into the city was stoned and many men were injured. Revolvers were used by the mob and several persons were wounded.

"There were most disorderly scenes in the streets, and a wholesale smashing of windows. All this would be characteristic of industrial disturbance in the older countries," adds the "Morning Post," "but in this land, where Labour has had all it has demanded, where politicians in order to keep their seats, have pampered and coddled it, where a properly constituted and special Court has been instituted for inquiring into its grievances, and where the working classes have always been well fed, and where their labour commands probably the highest price in the world with the minimum of exertion, all this in the not inaptly described 'Paradise of the working man,' was extremely hard for reasonable persons to understand.

"All the time the butter was accumulating in the cool chamber inside of the ships, and the cheese was becoming warm in the stores. The sheep men, too, saw not only their wool detained, but the shipment of fat lambs endangered.

A BLACK POSTSCRIPT.

Against this glowing picture of New Zealand may be set an account of the general strike in that country which has been sent to the Morning Post by its Wellington correspondent. It was dated November 30, and was published a few days ago.

It shows vividly how the general strike, and especially the strike of the waterside workers, has turned the farmers, and how they like the burghers in South Africa, were called in to deal with the strikers in the towns.

"The countrymen now rose in their strength. Men of means and education were to be seen handling cargo in the ships' holds and on the wharves in Wellington, side by side with the small settler from the back blocks. They would rather be on their stations or their holdings than at the ships' side, but they were determined to keep at it until the strike is over. Other countrymen form their guard, in all 1,000 men, on the best horses (many of them thoroughbreds) that the country can produce, and there are 1,000 more men ready to take their places. These are at present doing vigilance work in the country and looking after the interests of those who are working in the port."

At the House

Petitions were presented by Mr. Downey, for a road at Stepienville; by Mr. Jennings, on various public matters from Leading Tickle; by Mr. Grimes, on various public matters from Clarke's Beach; by Mr. Halfyard, on various public matters from Change Islands; by Mr. Devereaux, for a slip at Great Paradise; and by Mr. Winsor, from Keels, for a road.

The Speaker read a message from the Legislative Council stating that the Patent Bill had passed with amendment.

Mr. Coaker asked the Prime Minister the attitude of the Government in regard to Elective Road Boards, and got a reply that Road Boards will be elected wherever desired.

The House then resolved itself into Committee of the Whole on Supplemental Supply.

Mr. Cliff rose to deal with the supplemental supply. He regretted the unavoidable absence, through illness, of Mr. Kent, the leader of the Opposition, because he knew Mr. Kent had some remarks to make in connection with the proposal. He was strongly opposed to supplemental supply, as the principle was bad, and should not be encouraged. He contended that the Government should make such provisions when the votes for the estimates are taken, as would render it unnecessary for the Finance Minister to be coming down in the House and looking for additional supply. The regular votes should not be exceeded, except in extraordinary cases. For the past five years the supplemental supplies amounted to over one million and a half of dollars. He then gave a spicy criticism of the over-expenditure for the different departments, as contained in the supplemental supply bill. The expenditures were not only foreseen but wanted and foreseen, and a particular striking feature was that every item of the expenditures was covered and answered by that very useful word "Contingencies," which have not been explained properly in detail form. The first amount asked for in the Finance Minister's list is \$1,500 as contingencies or to cover incidents in the Prime Minister's office. He did not object to the amount asked for as there was a good deal of work to be done in connection with the department, but he did object to the increased vote in view of the fact that the last session of the Legislature it was common knowledge that this expenditure would naturally come up during the year and should have been provided for. Similarly the extra amounts asked for the other departments on the list should have been also made in the regular way. He emphasized that the expenditures were foreseen and reiterated that such a practice of assuming executive responsibility should not be encouraged.

Mr. Coaker said he was glad to know the Premier was endeavoring to agree to the requests of the fishermen by appointing Elective Road Boards, and it might delight him (the Premier) to know that the Opposition members would help him out of his troubles. He thought that over \$244,000 was too large an amount for supplemental supply, and believed that \$25,000 would sufficiently cover all unforeseen expenditures. In going through the list he noticed \$2,400 for House of Assembly stationery. He believed \$500 would foot the bill and some one was writing a tremendous amount of letters or that a certain subsidized newspaper office was making a bonanza. He dealt with the extra expenditures for the upkeep of the Fiona and Dredge, and with the Finance Department. The latter asked for \$10,000 for contingencies.

Mr. Coaker contended that gasolene used in motor boats for fishing purposes should be put on the free list. The Finance Minister believed it impossible to carry out such a law as it would be difficult to make a proper system. Mr. Halfyard then asked the Prime Minister what had been done in regard to the Hospital enquiry. The Prime Minister replied that the subject matter was being discussed yet with Dr. Keegan, but would soon be finished. He jocosely remarked that none of the expenditures in supplemental supply was made for election purposes, and in reply to Mr. Coaker, said it was necessary to appoint Commissioners, as there were occasions for expenditures in but-ports not under the jurisdiction of Road Boards.

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Mr. Stone then referred to an expenditure of \$1,000 in the District of Burin, not one cent of which did the Road Board see. Mr. Currie replied that the money was \$400 and not \$1,000, and was used to make a road which was done under the supervision of Road Inspector Bonia. The supplementary votes then passed the Committee and then the Sealing Bill was taken up. Mr. Crosbie got off a long address.

He said many a bill was paid out of contingencies that would not be paid out of the regular estimates. He hoped that the Premier would see the error of his ways and mend them. He (Mr. C.) was not going to be hard on the Premier, but was going to act like Governor Williams did in connection with the late Minister of Justice episode when His Excellency said to that official "there is no doubt about it but that you did wrong, but go and sin no more."

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on the Bill. He was in entire accord with the Bill; except the section that prevented cooks going on the ice and the mixed crews, and he believed that the enforcement of such would interfere with the discipline on the ships and might create serious trouble among the crews. The House then adjourned until this afternoon.

BOSTON, Feb. 18.

The eight survivors of the wrecked Italian barque Castagna were brought here yesterday all severely frostbitten, some probably maimed for life, as the result of five hours' exposure in the rigging.

EL PASO, Feb. 18.

Maximo Costillo, the Mexican bandit, charged with responsibility for the Cumbre Tunnel disaster in which fifty lives were lost, has been captured 38 miles south of Hachila, New Mexico by American troops.

MASSILON, Feb. 18.

April has been selected as the date upon which General Coxe proposes to lead a second army of unemployed out of Massilon for Washington. General Coxe has announced that a demand will be made upon Congress that work be furnished for those in idleness.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

A suffragette, armed with a whip attacked Baron Weardale, while he was waiting with other guests for a train to Althorp Park, Northampton to attend the wedding of the Hon Sidney Peel. Lord Weardale was walking with his wife along the platform, when he was approached from behind by the woman who struck him a severe blow with a powerful whip as a result of which he fell in a heap on the ground.

CORK, Feb. 18.

William O'Brien, leader of the Independent Irish Nationalists, has been re-elected, unopposed, as M.P. for Cork City. He recently resigned in consequence of a speech by Augustus Roche, Nationalist M.P. for North Louth, who declared that O'Brien had lost his hold in Cork. O'Brien accepted the implied challenge and immediately vacated his seat but the regular Nationalist party decided not to oppose him.

OVIDO, Spain, Feb. 18.

A cloud burst wrought havoc in the city of Ovido and surrounding country. The lower part of the town was flooded and the residents on the roofs of houses. In the country district hundreds of cattle were swept away houses collapsed, roads were inundated, and the tracks of both the Northern and East Uria railroads were washed away for a considerable distance. The authorities have sent out urgent appeals for food. Many persons are destitute.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

Frederic Harrison, the historian and philosopher, now 83 years of age who is a staunch Home Ruler, has written a long letter to Premier Asquith urging the dangers of ignoring Ulster. He proposes a scheme to treat Ulster as a separate Province with its own legislative and administrative powers independent of Irish Parliament for a stated term or until after a general election, when the problem could be reconsidered, or to Ulster for decision by a referendum.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

A Sydney (N.S.W.) correspondent of the Telegraph reports the warning utterances of Sir Ian Hamilton, who is visiting that part of the Empire on a tour to inspect the local defence systems. Speaking at a banquet Sir Ian referred to the ever present and formidable danger confronting the country by reason of its exposed position in the open Pacific. It was, he said, important for the people of Britain, South Africa and Canada to know that Australia and New Zealand are not waiting until danger actually arrives but by their system of defence, were taking time by the forelock.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

The latter is Gustave Bouch, whose sister, Mrs. Patterson, of this city, says he was born of German parents in Louisiana. Bouch was arrested on Sunday morning, tried by court martial yesterday and found guilty. The sentence will be left with General Villa, but he may be shot as a spy. Mrs. Patterson last night entreated the General to release her brother, or at least spare his life, but the rebel leader declined to commit himself. Mrs. Patterson announced that she intended to appeal to the Consul-General to-day to intercede for the prisoner. Bouch has been a railway engineer in Mexico for many years. The British subject arrested is W. B. Siventon, owner of a 100,000 acre ranch west of the city of Chihuahua, and has lived in Mexico for thirty years. His wife is Mexican woman. He was arrested on suspicion of having been concerned with a federal filibustering movement, having its base on the American side, which became known last Wednesday, when a detachment of filibusters escaped across the Rio Grande at Yoleta, thirteen miles east of El Paso.

The Late Mr. Macdonald.

Editor The Evening Telegram.
Mr. Editor,—My acquaintance with the late Mr. Macdonald in his capacity as architect left me with the wish to know him more intimately, a desire which his death leaves unfulfilled. A native of Cape Breton, he had been among us but a few years, but his premature departure will be lamented by all who knew him. His disposition was so genuine, kindly, and retiring that he could not have made an enemy. Permit me to record my high appreciation of him both from the personal point of view and because of his wide range of knowledge, particularly on the artistic side of his profession. He was too much an artist to be a mere artisan; he might well have been a favourite pupil of some architect of celebrity. His draughtsmanship and powers of independent design were hall-marks of his ability. A casual reference to any of the great masterpieces of architecture found him capable of discussing them intimately. St. John's was hardly a wide enough field for him.

This brief appreciation by a comparative stranger will not have failed if it affords a modicum of comfort to those to whom he was near and dear.
