WAR REVIEW.

Eight weeks to the day for the first time since the great Allied offensive of Marshal Foch began, it is a virtual pause. True, both the British and French on isolated sectors of the front extending from Flanders to the east of Soissons, again have recorded advances, but Wednesday witnessed no such progress of the Allies toward strategic objectives as past days had brought them before the torrential rains had turned the lowlands into an impassable mass and the badly worsted enemy rushed large reinforcements forward to stop the gaps through which the British, French and American armies were threatening to filter and wreck his entire military situation. During the eight weeks that have passed the Allied troops have cleared almost entirely all the enemy held territory from the Marne to the Aisne in the apex and Soissons and Rheims, respectively, its western and eastern anchor points. From Soissons to Arras the old bulge westward to Montdidier towards the door step of Amiens, has all but been obliterated, and the Allies now are standing across a large portion of the old Hindenburg defense line and virtually are upon the remainder of it, while to the north of it in Flanders the deep salients which threatened the English Channel ports have been bent eastward and the enemy is expelled from the vantage points from which he had expected ultimately to make an endeavor to gain the seaboard and thus cause a diversion of the transport service from England to Southern France. Until the rains began falling, there had been no let up in the Allied offensive, notwithstanding the fact that the German high command had stiffened its resistance, everywhere discarding infantry units as such as turning them into machine gun companies and bringing up large numbers of guns of all calibres to hold the aggressors back. Wherefore it ist not improbable that Foch, when the skies have cleared and the marshes disappeared, again will take up with full impetus his tactics of putting the enemy on his mettle and continue for the two months of good fighting weather remaining, if not beyond that period, his efforts with his own now great forces to drive the Germans farther back toward the Rhine. The British and French troops apparently are in a hard race for the prize of St. Quentin, forces of both armies now being at equal distance west of the city, the British in the vicinity of Vermande, and the French at Eterillers and Couspy to the north. The British in local operations have made further progress north of Epehy, in the operation which has for its purpose the driving of a wedge midway between Cambrai and St. Quentin, and also have successfully sust ained heavy counter attacks by the Germans near Gouzeaucourt, where the Germans are trying hard to hold back the British push towards Cambrai. North of the St. Goadditional slight advances, notwithstanding the bad condition of the terrain and the strong forces of the enemy aligned against them in an effort to prevent the turning of this important position from the west. Heavy artillery activity is in progress all along the front and likewise on the sector northeast of Soissons and between the Aisne and Vesle Rivers the operation on which have a direct bearing on these north of the St. Gobain Forest. The British have been successful in local encounters near Armentieres and in the region of La-Bassee Canal. Additional American troops have landed at Archangel, Northern Russia, to aid the other Allied troops in the putting down of the disturbances in that region. A troopship carrying American soldiers to the front has been torpedoed off the coast of England. All the troops reached land safely and the vessel was beached.

GETTING OUT OF DOUAL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11. Systematic evacuation of the town of Douai, one of the important forward bases of the present German line in France, is described in official advices received at Washington today. A vast amount of war material is being taken out of the town the report says, including the equipment of the arsenal there which was the largest establishment of the kind maintained by the enemy in the northern region of his advanced lines. The advices state that the removal of this equipment at the Brayelle airdrome near Douai also was being taken further to the rear. The same precautions have been taken with equipment at an enemy aviation field at Lacelles near Stamand. The field there, the report says, was specially estab-German aircraft along the English and Cambrai that the British have broken through the first defence of the Hindenburg line, and this detailed statement of the German withdrawal of material from Doual ap-pears to bear out previous reports that the enemy was preparing for the abandonment of this section of his great fortified line which has been imperilled by the British advances.
