A London Riot Seven

In 1223 there were riots in London which showed the turbulence of the times, and the unsettled state of poouter feeling. These disturbances grew of wrestling matches between the doners and the men of Westminster, the tenants of the Abbot. The City men, having had the best of it, the Abbot's steward challenged them to a return match, and offered a ram as a prize. The day—August 1—ended in a sanguinary fight, the Abbot's men attacking the others with weapons of war and driving them helter-skelter to their walls. Such an outrage could not be allowed to end there, so the bell was tolled, and a public meeting held, when Serle Cotteras-the mayor-urged a pacific deputation to the Abbot, to demand satisfaction. But Constantine Fitz-Atherly-a rich man and a popular leader—called for an immediate attack on the premises of the Abbot and his steward, and forthwith led the people to the assault on August 2. But he gave a political character to the preceedings by sounding the French war cry-"Montjoie! Desaie! Louis!" The steward's house was wrecked, and the Abbot driven to escape by water. Good News From the Coal Fields.

Canadian Engineer Makes Favorable

(Trade Review) The news from the West Coast coal eams this week where developments are now going on, shows conclusively that there is abundance of coal there. The principal seams are a considerable distance from one another, and borings will be carried on now to find out the spot where these may converge into one body and then if found the work will be carried on. It Engineer from Canada who has spent two weeks on the ground making a thorough examination, has made his report to the Government and that it is as favorable as the owners of the property could desire. It is rumored that the Company has given an option to the Government to buy out at \$200,-000 and a royalty of 15 cents per ton for the first 100,000 tons and 10 cents for subsequent output. The shareholders in the claims are delighted with the prospect and shares are at premium. The discovery of this coal if it turns out as expected will revolutionize the trade and industry of New-

We have the iron at Bell Island and big smelting plant should not be started in our own country. The domestic supply for the household use of coal is not the least satisfactory feature of the discovery. It comes at an opportune time when even at \$18.50 to \$19.00 a ton it is not possible for our ships to get coal in North Sydney without long delays. 

During the summer months, and especially while on holidays, we shall probably find that freckles will appear on t he face a nd neck. Persons of a fine complexion, and







Some Results.

Press Conference were twofold-direct and indirect. Of the former one immediate result was the reduction of Press cable rates to practically every part of the Empire; what this has meant from the point of view of a clearer understanding and a closer co-operation within the Empire it is unnecessary to emphasize. Another direct result was the formation of a permanent body to carry on the work begun at the Conference. This body is the Empire Press Union; under the Presidency of one of the most able, experienced and Union have proved of the greatest benefit to the Empire's Press.

Perhaps the indirect results of the Conference, though harder to tabulate, were by far the most important. We brought to the Homeland men whose life's work was to mould public opinion in every secion of the Empire. We did our best to show these men something of Great Britain as she really is, from the inside. Canada's New Premier.

HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN. The man whom Sir Wilfred Laurier

described seven years ago as the "brightest mind in the Conservative Party" is now Canada's Prime Minis-

The Hon. Arthur Meighen is the first Westerner and the youngest Pre-mier Canada has had. He is described as a Westerner, for, although he was born in Ontario he went west at an early age, and it is in Manitoba that he built up his career.

The new Premier is only forty-four years of age. Sir John Thompson was forty-eight when he succeeded Sir John Abbott. Hon. Alexander Mackenzie was fifty-one when he be came Prime Minister; Sir John Macdonald, fifty-two; Sir Wilfred Laurier, fifty-five; Sir Robert Borden, fifty-seven; Sir Mackenzie Bowell, seventy; Sir John Abbott, seventyone and Sir Charles Tupper, seventy-

Born on 16th June, at Anderson Blanshard Township, Perth County, Ont., Arthur Meighen was educated at St. Mary's Collegiate Institute and at Toronto University. He graduated in 1896 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts winning honors in mathematics. For two years he taught school at Caledonia, Ont., and then went to Winnipeg where he used the teaching profession as a stepping

In 1903 he was called to the Manitoba Bar and began the practice of his profession in Portage la Prairie. He soon won success as a criminal lawyer, showing evidences of possessing a remarkable clearness of mind, and was created a Bencher of the Manitoba Law Society in 1908, becoming a member of the Upper Canada Law Society in 1914.

Returned as a Conservative for Portage la Prairie in 1908 Arthur Meighen's rise in Parliament was very rapid. It is said that after hearing the new member's first speech Sir Wilfred Laurier remarked. "Borden has found a man."

Nine years after he had been first elected to Parliament Arthur Meighen had held five important offices. He was appointed Solicitor-General of Carada on June 26, 1913. He was sworn as a member of the King's Privy Council for Canada on September 30, 1915. He became Secre tary of State for Canada and Minister of Mines on August 23, 1917, and was sworn in as Minister of the Interior and Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs on October 2, 1917, on the formation of the Union Government. He was again elected for Portage la Prairie at the general election of December 17, 1917.

Mr. Meighen was one of the Cabinet Ministers who accompanied the Right Hon, Sir Robert Borden to England to attend the last Imperial Confer-

In debate the new Premier proved himself particularly strong in attack, with a biting sarcasm. His mental processes appear to be extremely rapid but very logical, which is only natural when it is borne in mind that he was particularly brilliant at ma-

thematics when at College. Fifteen years ago Arthur Meighen married Miss Jessie Isabel Cox, of Birtle, Man., daughter of the late Charles Cox of Granby, Quebec. Miss Cox was a teacher in the public school at Portage la Prairie when she met the Premier who was a Collegiate

Their eldest boy is farming in Manitoba, while the other boy and girl are attending school in Ottawa. Mrs. Meighen has been described as being devoted to her husband, her home and her children, and as little caring for those semi-public activities in which wives of public men in dulge in Ottawa.

Quebec's New Premier.

The Hon. Louis Alexander Tascher au, the new Premier of Quebec, and the Dominion of Canada, are of like age, for both began life in 1867-fifty three years ago.



LABOR'S ASSURANCE.

ST. JOHN, N.B., July 30. and the link between Canada and Great Britain will suffer no change with the increasing power of labor party in England, S. T. E. Naylor informed the Imperial Press Conference delegates and their hosts at a civic luncheon in St. John to-day. Naylor is the representative in the conference of the printing trades of Great Britain, and is chairman of the London Labor Party.

WILSON AND THE MINERS.

WASHINGTON, July 30. President Wilson, through the United Mine Workers of America, tonight appealed to striking mine laborers in Illinois and Indiana to return to work. Inequalities in the exsting wage scale, held by strike leaders to be the cause of the walk out, which has closed most of the bituminous mines in two States, may exist, Wilson said. He added that he could not recommend the correction of any inequalities until strikers returned to their jobs, but that when they did so he would invite a joint scale committee of operators and miners to meet for the purpose of adjusting any such inequalities.

CLERICAL ERROR ONLY.

HALIFAX, July 30. Dr. Macaulay, Chairman of the Health Board, to-day characterized as 'a most unfortunate occurrence, due to a clerical error", the insertion of an advertisement in the public press containing a statement that few mild cases of cholera had developed in this city. He said that in an advertisement appearing to-night, the word diarrhoea would be substituted for the word cholera.

VICE-ROYALTY AT SYDNEY.

DECLINE IN GRAIN PRICES.

CHICAGO, July 31. For first time since the ending of Federal government control of the wheat market, wheat has been sold in Chicago at less than \$2.23 per bushel, price which last year was guaraneed by Congress. Corn. oats and provisions declined in sympathy with wheat but kept within normal limits.

CANADIAN CHALLENGE MOOTED.

SYDNEY, N.S., July 31. The Yacht Clubs of Nova Scotia will challenge the defender of America's Cup, if the suggestion as laid down by A. C. Ross, former M.P. of Victoria and North Cape Breton, but now of Montreal, is followed out. Mr. Ross would like to see yacht clubs of this province combine and secure a challenger and place their defiance in the hands of the New York Yacht Club.

HISTORIC FORT BURNED.

BELFAST, July 31. Charlemont Fort, erected in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, on the first entry of English soldiers into Tyrone, was burned by armed raiders early this morning. The building, which overlooked the River Blackwater, was long occupied by the Charlemont family, members of which founded the Irish Volunteers at the time of the American War of Independence. It was used latterly by the Government as a military stronghold.

DISARMED MILITARY PICKET. DUBLIN, July 31.

Three soldiers and three Sinn Fein ers were wounded Thursday night when a body of the latter disarmed a detail of military police in the heart of Dublin. The coup was said to have been the most audacious an dspectacular that the Sinn Feiners have accomplished in the matter of disarming military. Military police are posted at Trinity College and at the Bank of Ireland, opposite the center of Dublin traffic, and within view of the principal Dublin Police Station. In the disorder last night, about ten Sinn Feiners held up a picket at the Bank and mpletely disarmed them, took away heir revolvers, and then mingled unncernedly in the crowds emerging rom the Theatre Royal. 
