



Too often children are unable to explain the difference between caution and cowardice. or bravery and reckless bravado. If complicated apparatus. Have it fixed they were properly informed on these points a long step would be taken in the direction to avert street accidents, in which, unhappily, the majority of victims are young children.

DEPENDENT ON AGE. The best method of instruction will depend largely upon the age, habits and previous training of the children hemselves. Younger pupils need specially care full instruction, supplemented by practical training in safe ways of crossing the street. Older boys must be convinced of the danger involved in stealing rides, and in throwing stones or other missiles, and n tampering with unattended vehicless, and in using the street in exercise roller skates, coasters and sleds. Foreign born children require special study, and so also do defective children. adhesive labels used on correspond ence for charitable, political, and social odvertisement purposes, common ly called "stickers" by schoolboys. They are really "souvenir" labels.

They are usually larger than postage stamps, and being meant to attract attention, are generally more striking in design, prettier, and more widely interesting. A good collection of "stickers" gives far more pleasure to ordinary people than one of post-

age stamps. We Invented the Stamps. Almost always printed in colours, they are produced by every kind of process. They are attractively designed and printed to tempt people to use them, sometimes to buy them,

and always to keep them. Originally, they were chiefly to advertise International Exhibitions. The authorities would give them to exlibitors, who put them on their letters. This was first done at the first International Exhibition held in Australia, at Sydney, in 1879.

Great Britain, however, was the inventor of these souvenir stamps, the earliest known being that issued in 1864, to commemorate the third centenary of Shakespeare's birth. Other nations followed us. The

United States issued a fine set in honour of Columbus, and to commemorate his discovery of America. Pertugal followed with a set o labels celebrating Vasco da Goma's first voyage to India. Gems of Art and History.

This means of postal propaganda has been widely used by societies and "movements" to advertise themselves and collect funds. Hundreds of well-known manufact

urers have used these tiny postal labels to popularise their wares. It is impossible to give here an adequate idea of the wide appeal of a rentativ collection of these gems of art, history, and commerce.

Montreal, July 24.—That the people of this Province are drinking considerably less liquor than are the people of the "dry" Provinces under the prescription system, appears on figures just issued. Total of sales by the Quebec Liquor Commission for the past year was valued at \$15,000,000 In British Columbia with a population about one-fifth that of Quebec and where the liquor situation is much the same as here, total sales for the year reached \$14,000,000. Further, it is said, there are many more visitors to the Quebec Province than to British Columbia.

Counting the thousands of Americans who come by road and rail into Quebec, a sale of about \$3,000,000 of liquor, the proportion sold to foreigners does not represent a great deal at an average charge of \$4 a bot-




