Fortunes Made From Clay

How Aluminium Has Helped Industry Fifty years ago the common metal which we call aluminium was so rare that it cost nearly £20 a pound, and was used almost solely in the making of jewellery.

Now it costs rather less than a shilling a pound, and is made into thousands of different articles, from teapots to motor-car parts; from wire-less masts to nutmeg graters and soup plates!

Many years before anyone could claim to have seen aluminium, its existence was suspected. The metal is obtained from a white powder, not unlike soda in appearance, which is one of the commonest chemical properties of the earth's crust. Known as alumina, this substance is the basis of clay, and its identity was first established not quite a century ago by a German chemist named Woeiler.

Later a French scientist named De Ville succeeded in producing aluminium on a considerable scale, though

not in sufficient quantities to justify its use outside jewellers' shops, where it was made into ornaments.

For fifty years after this the chemists of the world concentrated on the problem of obtaining aluminium in bulk, an American scientist, Charles Hall, whose laboratory was in the back kitchen of his lodgings, finally being successful in the quest. Hall carried out numerous experiments, and was on the point of giving up when he found at the bottom of his crucible a tiny disc of the new metal, produced by a method that was both simple and cheap.

The discovery was made thirty-seven years ago, since when aluminium has been put to an astonishingly wide variety of uses. The part which this wonderful metal will play in the future is incalculable, for its lightness, durability, strength, and cheapness render it one of the most valuable substances of the kind known to man.

Aluminium will neither rust nor tarnish, and it is so adaptable that it can be hammered into sheets no thicker than cardboard, or drawn out into very fine wire. One of its most remarkable characteristics is that it is a rapid conductor of heat, while it is also non-poisonous.

Our preserves, including meat and fruit, will one day be packed in aluminium containers instead of in tin. Aluminium cooking utensils are already becoming a feature of modern domestic life, and aluminium tea and dinner services are being put on the market in rapidly increasing numbers.

The metal also plays an important part in the iron and steel industries, being used in both as a means of purification. Small quantities of aluminium added to steel in the furnace disperse the gas and ensure the elimination of certain defects which at one time greatly hindered the production of first-class steel.

Election Campaign has Begun.

Baldwin Makes a Bid for Agricultural Support—Germany Ceases Payment of Reparations—Bank Robbers Kill Messengers and Seize \$43,000—Ruhr and Rhineland Cast Adrift.

RETURN EX-CROWN PRINCE'S RETURN DEFERRED.
PARIS, Nov. 14.
The Allied Council of Ambassadors failed to consider at its meeting today the question of what action should be taken in connection with the return of the Crown Prince to Germany and as to Germany's attitude toward the resumption of Allied military control. It is understood that the Council avoided mentioning one of these burning questions because the Allies are not in accord as to proper course of action. France bringing strong pressure to bear on Great Britain looking to joint action for the expulsion of the former Crown Prince from Germany. No action will be taken until the Cabinet has examined the problem from all angles in the light of Premier Ribbentrop's latest overtures.

COOPERATION BETWEEN LIBERALS AND LABOUR WOULD DEFEAT PROTECTIONISTS.

LONDON, Nov. 15.
Premier Baldwin's further position of his Protectionist Policy, which will be made in the course of a debate on Labor's motion in the Commons to-morrow, political interest is wholly absorbed in active preparations in various constituencies for the sharp election campaign. There is a general belief that the Protectionists would be defeated. The Labor Party, however, has consistently refused to co-operate and, as a consequence, the Liberals are fighting laborites and which gives seats to conservatives on minority votes. The striking parliament was elected on authority vote of the electorate for the reason. "The Liberal press is making appeals to labor leaders to agree to some sort of election concord on the ground that Liberals and labor have equal interest in defeating Protectionism."

Having no details of Premier Baldwin's plans, the opponents are contenting their oratory on suddenness of his conversion to protection and the fact that many of the biggest trades, shipping, mining, engineering, and cotton industries which, it is said, constitute ninety per cent. of the total unemployed, cannot possibly bene-

able that this will fail to appease the farmers.

MANY WOMEN WILL CONTEST DISTRICTS.

LONDON, Nov. 14.
One of the outstanding features of the election will be the number of women candidates. As yet it is too early to give anything like a complete list but it is estimated that between thirty and forty women will seek admission to the House of Commons. Lady Astor will again appeal to her Plymouth electorate and Mrs. Wintringham will ask Louth constituency to return her. It is less certain that the third woman at present in House, Mrs. Phillipson, will contest her seat in Berwick. It is expected she will retire in favor of her husband whom she was chosen to succeed when he was unseated. Miss Williams, daughter of Annetta Williams, a former Parliamentarian will probably be the youngest woman candidate. She is twenty-seven. The fate of Lady Warwick in a bye-election has now been postponed until the general election. In the meantime, she and her opponent in Leamington continue their campaign.

BANDITS KILL TWO BANK MESSENGERS AND SEIZE \$43,000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.
Two bandits shot and killed two bank messengers in the subway station at Fifty-fifth Street and New Otrecht Avenue, Brooklyn this morning and escaped with forty three thousand dollars.

RUHR AND RHINELAND MUST SHIFT FOR THEMSELVES.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.
After Nov. 25th Germany no longer will be able to meet the drain upon her Exchequer for payment of unemployment doles in the Ruhr and the Rhineland, and will then set both these regions adrift permitting them to shift for themselves. This statement was made at official quarters here to-night.

GERMANY CEASES PAYMENT OF REPARATIONS.

LONDON, Nov. 15.
Complete cessation of every kind of reparation payment by Germany was semi-officially announced to-night, according to despatches to Central News from Berlin. This action was taken on the ground that the Treaty of Versailles had been violated by France, and that therefore it could not be observed by Germany.

Roberts, now in Vienna; John and Jehu, in Toronto; Dr. Will, Nathan and Job, of this city, and Mrs. John Ledrew, of St. Grace, who is now on a visit in Toronto.

The Public Payroll

The high cost of government in the United States is demonstrated by figures compiled by the National Industrial Conference Board, which is making a survey of taxation including the relation of the public payroll thereto. According to the Board's preliminary figures, 3,400,000 persons are now on the payrolls of the Federal Government, states and the municipalities and other public bodies. This means that out of every 12 persons over 16 years of age who are wage or salary earners, one is drawing recompense from a public payroll. The amount paid in wages from these public payrolls is \$3,329,000,000 a year, which is calculated by the Board as representing an annual cost of \$31 per year to every person in the United States over 16 years of age who is receiving salary or wages. In other words, the tax-paying class in the United States is required to pay \$31 per year per capita merely for the salaries of persons who are on the public payroll.

Equally impressive is the Board's assertion that the amount paid to public employees equals 46 per cent. of the sum paid in wages to the employees of all factories in the United States producing more than \$5,000 worth of goods per year. Other figures stated a non-productive class in the United States is drawing almost half as much money for its services as a much larger class whose work is largely the basis of United States national wealth and prosperity.—Financial Post.

If we were changed so much a head for sunsets or if God sent round a drum before the Hawthorne came in flower, what a work we should make about their beauty.—Robert Louis Stevenson.

Happiness is what everyone wants. It can be gotten in many different ways.

Some of these methods are dependent upon circumstances, and some kinds of happiness can be had only in limited quantities and by certain people who have been lucky enough or clever enough to corral the means.

Other kinds of happiness are limitless in supply and can be had by anyone who will take them.

The happiness of the educated eye is this kind of happiness.

No One Can Take It From You. By the educated eye I mean the eye that is educated to see beauty and to draw joy from it.

The happiness that comes from loving certain people, or travel, or luxury of any sort is conditioned by one's power to get the people or the travel or the luxury for one's own.

But he who loves beauty does not need to have the beauty for his own, nor does he depend on reciprocated affection.

If he will open his heart to beauty and to the habit of being made happy by it, he will have a constant source of joy that is not at the mercy of circumstance.

If he will train his eye to apprehend beauty, he will see it everywhere.

Where To Look For Beauty. In the grace of the lengthening shadows of an autumn afternoon.

In the pure curve of a white hill side on a winter day.

In the lovely sky line of a big city etched against the orange sunset.

In the symmetry of a single perfect tree.

The Industrial Outlook

People in a position to form the opinion state that compared with last winter the general industrial condition of the country has improved about 10%. Although certain sections of the country particularly in Placentia and St. Marys Bay the pinch is felt by a number of people, the major problem of providing relief for thousands which the country had to face the past two winters is eliminated. The H. J. Crowe operations at Hampton Cove, White Bay, is providing employment for about 500 families. The Dr. Moorey project is also getting under way and good progress is being made in erecting the necessary sheds, houses and stables. Quite a number will find employment at the company's logging operations. The problem with the Crowe proposition is to find accommodation, as all the men have brought their families with them. It is learned that pit prop cutting will also be undertaken this winter and permits to cut in different localities have been granted, but it is anticipated that this form of relief will not have to be on anything like the scale of last year. It may be of interest to learn that as a result of these operations, 18 cargoes of pulp wood and pit props were exported during the summer. The cargoes ranged from 1800 to 3500 cords each. Another avenue of employment is afforded by the lumber, and in about 10 days time logging operations will start. The Armstrong Co. will have three sawmills in operation near Bay of Islands preparing the lumber for construction work. The Grand Falls operations will be on a big scale this winter. The company has imported about a dozen tractors which will be used in logging operations. Experiments conducted during the past three winters have proved the usefulness of the tractor in this connection. It has been demonstrated that a tractor could move a load of over 100 cords where a cord was the maximum load for a pair of horses.

The German Government has sent a despatch to the British Government, in which it repudiates the Treaty of Versailles and asks for a new treaty.

White Indians in Panama

ROCHESTER, N.Y.—Recovery of a race of white Indians, with flaxen hair, in the almost impenetrable jungles of eastern Panama, is reported by Richard O. Marsh, of Brockport, an explorer, just returned from the Isthmus. Mr. Marsh, the first white man to advance into that unexplored region of Central America since Balboa, brought back with him photographs to substantiate his claims.

The story of the discovery is told by the Rochester Journal and the Post Express in a copyrighted article. Mr. Marsh is now preparing a second journey. He will be aided by the University of Rochester, Governor Morrow of the Canal Zone and President Porras of Panama.

Mr. Marsh said: "I was in a native village when I noticed three girls passing into the jungle. They had bodies as light as a sunburned white girl and decidedly light hair—a startling and incongruous sight among these black and rag-clad negroes."

"It was then I was told they belonged to a white race living up the Chucanaque River. The negroes told me these whites all had light-brown or yellow hair and were wild and warlike."

In describing the girls Mr. Marsh said: "The skin of their faces was tanned but free from that colored pigment so distinguishable in all brown and darker races. The features of the eldest girl were of a high oval face, thin lips, well-shaped cloth and aquiline nose. They spoke no Spanish."

The subject of forecasting seasons or considerable periods has long engaged the attention of meteorological scientists, but thus far weather experts here say, no laws or sequences have been discovered. Only long-range forecasts of a general character can be made.

Responsible scientists throughout the world agree that the science has not reached the point where that can be done. Thus the government's forecasts throw down the predictions of those who have weather prophets and forecasts appear in almanacs and calendars a year in advance.

For instance, the feudal quit rent plot of land in Shropshire, granted to the City of London in 1213 by King John, consists of a new hatchet, a billhook, and two fagots. The articles must be presented to the King every year by the City Corporation, and it is a fact that the two fagots are solemnly chopped in pieces by the City Solicitor at the Law Courts in the presence of various dignitaries. The "chips," together with the hatchet and billhook, are handed to the King's Remembrancer.

The ceremony is preceded by another of similar character, for six hammers and sixty-one nails are presented to the King's representative, who represent the rent for the plot ground now occupied by the Law Courts. This plot was occupied at one time by a farrier, whose duty it was to shoe the horses of the knights who fought in the tournaments held close by.

King George's feudal status is again marked in the Channel Islands, when the Sovereign visited Guernsey some time ago, the seigneurs knelt before him.

They placed their hands between his feet and the oath of homage in French, "Je suis le Roi's King," from a card held by the King, confirmed each seigneur in his privilege. The holder of one of them was a man who, for the land he held, presented the King with a pair of shoes.



Remains of Paleolithic Man in America

SANTA BARBARA, Calif.—Proof that paleolithic man lived on the Southern California coast at least 25,000 years ago, is afforded by recent excavations of human remains near Santa Barbara, Calif., in the belief of Dr. J. P. Harrington, head of a party of Smithsonian Institution investigators which made the find.

Dr. Harrington said the discoveries proved theories "formerly held by scientists to be incorrect by at least 15,000 years, and possibly more." That the Santa Barbara man was an inhabitant of the Pacific Coast at the same time as, if not earlier than, the Neanderthal man, roamed Paleolithic Europe is established, according to Dr. Harrington by a number of features of the skulls found here. Chief of these is the thickness of the skull, the almost complete absence of forehead, the bovine characteristics of the teeth, and the construction of upper and lower jaws, which resembles that evident in the lower orders.

The skull of the Santa Barbara man possesses a pronounced supra-orbital ridge without depression between the eyes, as does the Neanderthal man. The thickness of the skull, more than one-half inch, is almost the same. Even more striking proof of the Santa Barbara man's era, according to the Smithsonian archaeologist, is found in comparison of the teeth and jawbone structures with those of the Heidelberg man.

The skull of the Heidelberg man, one of the few primitives of whom any trace remains, was found with teeth in a perfect state of preservation, and is virtually the same as that of the Santa Barbara man, he said. The long crushing jawbone, the powerful flat top, and bovine teeth, are all unmistakable signs of the antiquity of the find, according to Dr. Harrington.

The discovery of the skulls, he said, will bring about a complete revision of the theory now held by scientists as to the date of man's first appearance on the North American continent. Hitherto it has been accepted as a fact that primitive man originally came to North America, from Asia, via the Behring Strait, about 10,000 years ago, and gradually worked south. The discovery of the Santa Barbara man, according to Dr. Harrington, established the fact that Burton's mound, scene of the excavations and once the site of a fashionable seaside hotel, felt the tread of man 15,000 years earlier.

Newfoundland

RECOVERING FROM WAR DEPRES-
SION AND REVERSES OF FOR-
TUNE.

(Financial News, Oct. 18.)

The financial situation in New-
foundland, the oldest British colony,
at the present time is similar to that
of most other countries in the world
just now. The colony is recovering
surely, if slowly, from the effects of
the post-war depression and the re-
construction rendered necessary
thereby. Whereas Newfoundland during
the war enjoyed a state of prosper-
ity probably greater than many
other countries, and enhanced by the
fact that the dried codfish, which is
the principal article of export, was
consumed very largely in Southern
Europe and fetched enormous prices,
she has since suffered from the re-
action which those very conditions
brought about; in other words, those
customers who, during the war per-
iod, had to have these foodstuffs re-
gardless of cost, found themselves,
after hostilities ceased, so financially
embarrassed that they were unable
to pay anything like the prices which
were imposed upon them during the
war time, and this in turn brought
about the conditions that the New-
foundlanders, who had enjoyed a
ready sale at high prices for this com-
modity up to the end of 1913, had
found themselves faced with declining
prices and reduced markets, so that
heavy losses were made and the suffer-
ing, which was inevitable in getting
back to normal conditions, became
very widespread and severe. Now,
however, it is believed that bottom
has been reached, and that the coun-
try is on the upgrade again.

Newfoundland has had reverses of
fortune in the past comparable with
what she is now suffering, but has
made an amazing recovery in every
previous instance, a fact which just-
ifies the expectation that she will have
similar good fortune now. Thirty years
ago the free banking institutions then
doing the country's business, and
supported entirely by local capital,
failed the same day, causing almost
universal ruin and paralysis of trade
and commerce, but within five years
the worst effects of this catastrophe
had been overcome. From 1900 to 1908
the Administration of Sir Robert
Bond, who was a prudent and far-
sighted statesman with a strong bent
for economy, resulted in his being
able to accumulate from surplus
revenue a cash reserve of \$500,000,
designed for a protection against the
proverbial "rainy day." Again a period
of depression came, and this amount
helped considerably in coping with
its evil consequences.

Large Cash Reserve.

Then Sir Edward (now Lord) Mor-
ris succeeded as Premier, and
launched a progressive and far-reach-
ing policy for the stimulation of the
formant resources of the island in
timber and minerals. The result in
his case was that after ten years of
good times, assisted admittedly to a
substantial degree by the boom per-
iod of the closing years of the war,
there was accumulated a cash reserve
of over \$3,000,000, besides which the
annual appropriations for the various
public Departments had been very
considerably increased. When, again,
a period of depression ensued, this
amount was also found very useful,
and while it was inadequate, and large
loans had to be raised to aid in the
same direction, it is confidently hoped
that history will repeat itself, and
that within the next few years the
country will be on an even keel again.

During the past three or four years,
because of these conditions, there was
a shortage in revenue and a sub-
stantial outlay had to be made for re-
lief and other purposes, but, despite
these facts, the Public Debt at this
moment does not exceed \$60,000,000,
or, roughly, \$240 per head for a popu-
lation of, say, 250,000. This amount
covers every form of public obliga-
tion, and is less than half the total
burden borne by the people of the
neighbouring Dominion of Canada in
the form of Federal, Dominion, county
and municipal taxes, so that, all
things taken into account, the position
is not unpromising. The annual
expenditure for all forms of public
services is about \$5,500,000, and the
latest estimates are framed with the
idea of securing a revenue of at least
that amount.

onial railroad system, previously op-
erated by a contractor and the subject
of frequent and vexatious litigation,
has been acquired for a figure of
\$2,000,000—which is included in the
above total of \$60,000,000—and it is
hoped shortly to make arrangements
for the operation of the system under
a new management, whereby the cost-
ly deficits of the past may be avoided,
and the railroad system, which in-
cludes as auxiliaries some eight or
ten steamers, serving sections of the
coast not touched by the railway,
may be worked on a more profitable
basis than heretofore.

Peculiar Trade Position.

As Newfoundland raises 90 per cent.
of her revenue by duties on imports,
and as her exports consist chiefly of
fishery products, "newsprint" paper
and hematite iron ore, it necessarily
follows that, in order to enjoy a
bounteous revenue, there must be good
prices obtainable for these com-
modities in the foreign markets.

Another peculiarity of the New-
foundland trade is that her fishery
products in the main go to countries
from which she imports very little,
and that her imports, which cover al-
most everything that her people re-
quire to eat, wear and use in every
way, are obtained from Great Britain,
Canada and the United States, coun-

tries to which her exports are com-
paratively small. They would, indeed,
be much smaller but for the fact that
virtually the entire output of the pa-
per mills finds its way to England—
say, 60,000 tons a year—and that
much of the iron ore is taken to Can-
ada, where it is smelted and made
into iron and steel.

In the boom period of 1920 the im-
ports from the United States ad-
vanced, roughly to \$16,000,000 and
those from Canada to about \$11,000,-
000, while those from Great Britain
remained almost stationary. Latterly
there has been an attempt to revert
to old conditions, as it is found that
the superiority of quality, etc., in the
British products is as marked as it
was in old times, but most yet remains
to be done in this direction of restoring
British trade to its former position in
the colony, and one of the expectations
is that at the coming economic con-
ference further steps in the direction
of being about this very desirable
result will be taken and schemes will
be worked out which will have a gen-
erous measure of success in that re-
spect.

MARCONI. Guglielmo Marconi, born (1874), Italian electrical engineer, was born at Trilovato, near Bologna, his mother being an Irishwoman. His first experiments in wireless telegraphy were made in Italy in 1895, then put to practical use in England in 1896. In 1898 he established connection by the same means across the English Channel; in 1901 between Cornwall and Newfoundland, and in 1902 between Canada and Newfoundland. In 1904 he entered into an agreement with the British Post Office for the commercial transmission of wireless messages, and in the same year, through the same means, the first ocean daily newspaper was started on the ships of the Cunard Line. His system is in use in the British, Italian and other navies, and is at the present time established throughout the world.
