A few years ago the vaulting of Orleans Cathedral collapsed, and the drastic character of some of the restoration work we see on the Continent makes us inclined to be thankful that in this country the care of our old churches has hitherto been left to those who use and love them. Probably nowhere are the cathedrals and parish churches more better cared for than in England: this has been accomplished without any State aid or official interference. Our Cathedral bodies usually retain a consulting architect, called sometimes the "surveyor to the fabric," whose anty is to examine the building a stated intervals and to direct the nec sary repairs, which are carried out either by a staff of workmen under a resident clerk of works, or by a local uilder.
