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Ontario Finances.

The following brief synopsis of the state of the finances of Ontario which is given in the Dundas Banner, will be of interest and benefit to our numerous readers in West Wellington, who are at present in the throes of an election contest. As such we commend it to their careful consideration, and feel satisfied that if they do so in an unbiased and fair manner, no other conclusion can be arrived at than that the utmost carefulness and good judgment has characterized the management of this department, which is in charge of Mr. Crooks. When the Reform Government took office in December, 1871, the financial position exhibited a surplus in invested funds of \$3,637,979, which was chargeable with the amount of Sandfield Macdonald's Railway Aid Fund, \$1,500,000, and with the large sum of \$764,694 representing unexpended appropriations, of which \$348,991 was for public works and buildings. Amongst these were the Agricultural College and Central Prison. The institutions thus undertaken by Mr. Sandfield Macdonald's Government became legacies for the new Government to complete. Out of the appropriation for public works and public buildings for the year 1871, nearly \$250,000 was not expended till the year 1873. The entire cost of constructing and finishing the Central Prison, with workshops and other appliances, and with accommodation for 336 prisoners, amounts to the sum of \$426,000, of which nearly \$300,000 was required to finish the prison upon the basis of Elliott's contract, entered into by the former Government, with accommodation for 34 prisoners less than can now be received, and no workshops, machinery or appliances required for the special industry of railway car building estimated for. The amount of invested funds on the 30th September, 1874, was, the sum of \$4,311,133, over and above the premium thereon. There had been paid to railways about \$3,000,000, and the surplus distributed to municipalities nearly \$725,000; making over \$1,500,000 for these purposes alone. And yet the invested funds on the 30th September, 1874, show an increase of \$700,000 over the amount invested on the 31st December, 1871—the close of the last financial year under Mr. Sandfield Macdonald's administration.

The Treasurer's statement of the assets and liabilities of the Province on the 30th September, 1874, shows an aggregate of assets of \$9,462,486, and liabilities of \$9,706,133, 11, or a surplus of \$256,353. The administration of the Railway funds is shown to have been judicious as well as impartial, from the fact that twenty millions added by Orders in Council, and granted by the Legislature, two years ago, have not yet made considerable progress, while seven have been completely expended. From the Railway Fund \$500 miles of railway have been added and more than half that mileage has been completed; while 100 miles have been added from the Railway Subsidy Fund.

The Peace of Europe.—A short time ago Cardinal Manning was waited upon by the Maltese residents of Britain and presented with an address of congratulation on being raised to the College of Cardinals. In reply the Cardinal said, "I am no prophet; but I think none needs the gift of prophecy to perceive that the armament of seven millions of men at least, with a power of destruction which has never been equalled in the annals of warlike nations, all portend to a greater and bloodier conflict in Europe than we have hitherto witnessed. I think it is a shame and a scandal to the Christian world to see the misery and the scourge the sins of governments have created and brought about by the apostles of revolution, who make their first and chief object to pull down the temporal power of the Vicar of Jesus Christ, and when they have accomplished that fact, I will venture to prophesy—and my prophecy is this: If the Christian world destroy, he will never again reign over it, but if the Christian world is to survive, the sense of justice will one day put him back again in his seat. But even that the Christian world will not be able to do without scourging itself by a European war which has prepared for itself. My words were not a threat, but a lament, and those who quote my words against me as a firebrand that would set Europe in conflagration, are among the chief apostles of the gospel of revolution, and the chief agents against the peace of Christian Government. As a man of peace and pastor of the flock, I pray that the Christian nations of Europe may speedily disarm in every country, and may turn to the gospel of peace, to the union of the Christian world."

The Collision of the "Manitoba" and "Comet"—A party who was a passenger on the Manitoba at the time of the collision with the Comet, in giving an account of the affair, says:—When within a short distance of the Manitoba the Comet suddenly shifted her course, whirled round on her beam and showed her red light, and crossing the Manitoba's bows, neither whistled, if they had, I should certainly have heard it. I heard the bells in the engine-room of the Manitoba ring. The mate of the Manitoba was in charge. Just before the collision Captain Syme came on deck, and seeing the position of the steamer, he jumped with lightning speed into the rigging to ascend to the pilot house, but ere any orders could have been executed the steamer collided with a fearful crash, the Manitoba striking the Comet near the fore-castle, and cutting into her from twelve to fifteen feet.

A daughter of Mr. Joseph Lockard, 3rd con. Wallace, about 13 years of age, recently took sick, fell into a kind of fainting fit, and died. Although nothing definite is known, poisoning from potato bugs is suspected as the cause. Hon. George Brown is a passenger by the Moravia, which arrived at Peterborough yesterday.



VICTOR MOREDANT
OR
THE LOST SHIPS.

CHAPTER IV.
AN UNSUCCESSFUL ESCAPE.

Wild and piercing was the shriek which burst from the lips of the Moredant when he was thrust out of the ship and felt himself falling through the air into the sea. Through the previous phases of the drama, having been too stunned by the magnitude of the danger to realize it; but now that immediate peril was upon her, she felt a rush of horror, and she was conscious of the period occupied by her headlong descent to the water, ere she reached it, her senses were leaving her, but were recalled by the shock of immersion and the cold, whirling sensation of sinking beneath the waves.

Down, down she sank, for what seemed an age of time, and leagues and miles of depth; and the sounding rush in her ears, and the pressure on her brain, and the absence of air from her lungs made her again partially insensible. Yet she was likewise dimly conscious—conscious of the burning ship—conscious of her struggling and abortive efforts for breath—conscious that she was drowning, and was soon to die. Suddenly light shone again on her strained eyeballs—faint at first, then stronger, then with lurid brightness, and she perceived that she had come to the surface, for high above was the blazing ship, the noise and the shouting. She saw, too, for a moment the white foam of the waves on which she was tossed, and helplessly, hopelessly, yet desperately she flung her arms upward, and another gurgling cry escaped her, which was at once stifled by the rushing water, for she was beginning to sink again. All at once she felt something clutch and grasp her, and her head was brought back to the surface with an energy which caused her to look up; and there, close to her, was the round, bushy-haired face of a sailor, with a cheery smile upon it, and a kindly, encouraging glance in his soft blue eyes.

This man had been close by her side on the deck when she was so suddenly sent flying from the bowsprit, and she instantly disappeared he sprang over her, alighting in the water a few yards from where she fell, where he kept waiting till she came to the surface, when he grasped her as she was related.

"Up, up, miss," he said, in a voice whose very tones were calculated to give confidence. "Don't struggle now, and I'll get you into the boat yet. Let's love ye, miss, don't struggle, or we shall both go down. Hold still, and don't fear but I'll keep ye afloat."

With a wonderful self-possession, born of the confidence with which the honest face of the sailor inspired her, Olive restrained herself passively to his support; and he, holding her with one arm, began to swim with the other, and to look about for the boat, to which he meant to take her. But, oh, horror! it had by this time been cut off from the ship, and was already with its full freight of human beings passing into the distance.

He looked and listened till he grew weary with his vigilance, but, tremendous as were the waves to which he gave vent, they would not be heard and the babel of sound and confusion which prevailed, and he had the latter mortification of seeing the boat, which he had so long sought, disappear from his sight.

The burning ship had also drifted away from their vicinity, so that it could not be seen; but even as he gazed he saw despairing forms leap from its flaming deck to find a fatal death in the sea. It was useless, therefore, to try to regain the ship, which so many were contending to abandon.

The position of the two was desperate in the extreme, and seemingly hopeless. The boat, which was their only chance, being out of sight, there was no other means of deliverance. Hope died out of the brave sailor's heart, for he knew now that he and the maiden whom he supported must both perish.

Yet he continued to swim and to breast the waves, and Olive lay as still on his supporting arm as if she had been insensible. But she was perfectly conscious, as he could see by the mute glare of her eyes, which were turned toward him with a grateful yet questioning look far more eloquent and expressive than words could indicate. He had not courage to meet that silent, fast gaze, lest his own eyes should reveal the overwhelming truth; and it wrung his honest heart to think that one so young and fair must die.

His own fate had also in it much bitterness, for the thought of a loving wife who was looking for his return, and who would be left in poverty as well as grief, and all the happy past, with its love and joy, passed through his recollection, till the rising sobb threatened to betray him.

Prize Live Stock for Canada.
It is interesting to learn, which we do from the Canadian News published in London, that an unusually large number of Canadian stock raisers, farmers, &c., are at present in England making purchases of prize stock. Among others are the Hon. M. Cochrane, of Compton, Quebec; Hon. G. Brown, of Bow Park, Ontario; Messrs. G. Hope, S. Beatty, J. Johnston, Schneider and Douglas. The Hon. Mr. Cochrane, it is stated, has already secured the Grand Duchess of Barringtonia, 3 years, 600 guineas, from Mr. E. Oliver; another from Mr. Sly, 500 guineas; and another from Mr. Lennox, 200 guineas. Mr. Douglas has purchased several very fine Clydesdale horses—one, the Marquis, 5 yrs., for 400 guineas. Time o' Day, 5 years, which took second prize at the Highland Agricultural Society's show at Glasgow, in July, is also destined for Canada, his owners having entered him for the Ontario Provincial Exhibition at Ottawa. Messrs. G. Hope and S. Beatty, in addition to several fine horses and short-horns, have secured 100 very superior Cotswold sheep in the West of England. Messrs. Schneider, of Brantford, three Clydesdales and a number of sheep and Berkshire pigs at Driffield show. The most valuable purchases were expected to be made at Lord Dunmore's sale of short-horns, at Stirling, on the 25th of August, and at the entire sale of the world-renowned short-horn herd of the late Mr. Torr, to be held on the 10th of September in Lincolnshire. THE CORPORATION OF THE COUNTY OF WELLINGTON
By-Law No. —
A By-Law to aid in the construction of the Reading and Orangeville Gravel Road in the Township of East Garafraxa, and for raising debentures to the amount of twelve thousand dollars for that purpose.

Whereas the Council of the Corporation of the County of Wellington heretofore by By-law duly passed and in force, authorized the raising of a sum of twelve thousand dollars, to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned. And whereas it will require the sum of one thousand nine hundred and twenty dollars to be raised annually by special rate, for payment of the said sum of twelve thousand dollars and interest.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest or income from the said road, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investment of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, was, according to the last revised and equalized Assessment Rolls of the said County of Wellington, \$18,874,302.

And whereas for paying the interest and creating an annual sinking fund for payment of the principal of the said sum of twelve thousand dollars, it will require an equal annual special rate of one-sixth of a mill on the dollar, to be levied in addition to all other rates.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Municipality of the County of Wellington is the principal of the said eighty-five thousand two hundred and fifty dollars.

And whereas there is no interest in arrears. And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in this Municipal year contracted any debts or loans, over and above the sum required for extraordinary expenses, which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed the sum of twenty thousand dollars.

And whereas a copy of this By-law hath been duly published, according to law, therefore the Corporation of the County of Wellington, in pursuance of the powers in that behalf vested and by the Council thereof, enacts as follows:—

That the Warden of the said County, for the time being, be, and he is hereby empowered, authorized and required for the purposes aforesaid, to issue, in due form of law, the sum of twenty thousand dollars in Debentures of the said Corporation of the said County, in sums of not less than one hundred dollars each, payable within ten years at farthest, from the day on which this By-law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such debenture shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at the said office, and shall be assigned by the Warden and countersigned by the Treasurer, for the time being, of the said County, and shall have attached thereto Coupons for the payment of said interest, which Coupons the Warden is hereby authorized to negotiate and dispose of.

And he is authorized for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said Debentures and interest an equal rate of one-sixth of a mill in the dollar, in addition to all other rates, be raised, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said County, during the continuance of the said Debentures.

And he is enacted that the proceeds of the said Debentures shall be applied for the purpose hereinbefore mentioned.

No person lending money upon, or purchasing said Debentures, shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

And he is enacted that this By-law shall take effect upon, from and after the fifteenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-law, to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at Guelph, in the said County, on the fifteenth day of September, 1875, at the hour of two o'clock, in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
