Latest News From Dawson

Happenings at the Yukon Capital Told in Breezy Paragraphs.

Output of the Forty Mill Country Estimated at Million and Half.

From recent issues of the Dawson News which have just reached the Coast, the following paragraphs are taken as a summary of the latest happenings in the Yukon capital:

The output of the forty mill country this season is estimated at \$1,500,000 or double what it was last year.

The 10th day struck several weeks ago on 17th day of last month is being remembered by the miners, but all points along the stream, and many already are happy over the good luck of success.
