Saturday, knowing of this cut and fearing that at the place where the culvert is built the road might be in a danger ous state, slackened the speed of the iron horse. The little stream, however, had done work in a part where the driver did not expect it, having undermined it.

The iron horse came on slowly and had not gone but a few yards over the undermined road when it toppled on its side, pulling the tender and baggage car on top of it. The firemen, Wm. Cochran, was filling the furnace at the time, against which it is supposed that he was thrown. By the force of the fall the top was knocked off the steam chest, through which the pent-up steam made a rapid exist, and by reason of its heat prevented the passengers or train officials from coming to the rescue of the half buried engineer and

passengers or train officials from coming to the rescue of the half buried engineer and firemen. The former, J. Devaney, was seated on his post of outflook at the time of the accident, and was thus not brought in close contact with the fur-nace. He was the first to come forth from the pyramid of iron and seething steam and was soon taken care of by his friends. Mr. Cochran the fireman was somewhat longer, being delayed by reason of having to pass the steam chest ere he could reach the outer air. When he did arrive he speared like one who had been dipped in a boiling cauldron. His face and hands were literally cooked, and on raising the latter to his head, which seemed to cause him the greatest agony, they left behind them hideous marks. The sight was heart-rending and one long to be remembered by the spectators with horror. The unfortunate men were removed to a hotel at Beachville, where after three hours' intense agony Cochran expired. Devaney, at last reports, was said to be out of danger. 




