## DEATH DUTIES DENOUNCED

AS A TAX ON BRITISH INVESTMENTS

IN THE COLONIES. Mr. Balfour Assails the Plan as a Tariff on Foreign Enterprise-A Motion to Reject the Graduated Duties Defeated by a Majority of 103-Parcels Post

London, June 4.—In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Arnold Morley, Postmaster-General, in replying to an inquiry by Mr. J. Henniker Heaton, said the Postoffice Department had heard nothing of an alleged refusal on the part of the officials in the British postoffices in China to send parcels for the Dominion of Canada by the Canadian Pacific line instead of via England.

The postoffice authorities in London, he said, would place no obstacles in the way of direct delivery of the mails by the way of Vancouver.

Graduated Death Duties Upheld, During the debate on the estate duties proposed in the Budget, George Richard Bethell, Conservative, submitted to the House of Commons an amendment directed against graduations of the duties in accordance with the size of the estate to be taxed.

The amendment was defeated by a vote of 208 to 105.

A Tariff on Colonial Investment,
The principal speech against the budget was made by Mr. Arthur J. Balfour, leader of the Unionists. He protested that the budget put a double death duty on the English property belonging to Colonists and on colonial property belonging to Englishmen. Such a duty, he said, must entirely discourage foreign colonial investment in England and English investment abroad. It was a policy of high tariff upon the transfer of capital to and from the Mother Country. He was amazed that a free trade Government would sanction such a proceeding. 




