These annual reports give us from year to year a clear indication of the condition of our province from an ed-ucational point of view and show us what progress we are making in this grand work. In view of the severe shaking up which our educational system has of late been receiving in the press, we turn to the educational report with more interest than usual with a the people of this province are receiving for the sacrifices they are making, and the effforts they are putting forth, in behalf of

The total amount voted by the sections for school purposes shows a healthy growth, viz:

There has been a slight change in the course of study during the past year and ral were as high as six per cent and some course of study during the past year and several subjects have been dropped from the common school course with a view of lessening the amount of memory work of the pupils. This change makes the course of study of this province less advanced than those of some of the other provinces, but it is hoped that it will result in increased thoroughness.

Those who may have formed the opinion that the present course of study contains

that the present course of study contains that the present course of study contains too many subjects, that too much of the time of the teacher is taken up with branches of secondary importance to the neglect of the primary and fundamental studies, will be deeply interested in carefully perusing the superintendent's remarks on the point of "How the Teacher's Time is spent in the School," beginning on page xii of the report. One of these new subjects is Calisthenics, or exercise for health. Of this subject the superintendent, among other things, says: "When the pupil is wearied from the memorizing of his spellings or the solution of his arithmetic problems, attention to this side of his training for a few moments adds nothing to his nervous exhaustion, or his load of books, or his home studies. On the other hand it is a nerve restorer, a glint of light in the darkness, an hour of life won from the dead. While it is as desirable to employ a veterinary surgeon in cases of severe sickness or dangerous injuries as it is to employ the family physician at times, it is well to know what to do in what hospitals calls "emerdone in less time than it would take to get a regular doctor to the spot.

One of these cases is that of choking, which frequently bappens when roots are fed without having been cut. If the obstruction is not large enough and has passed well down, it is often possible to move it farther along by gently pushing down with a stick. A whip handle rounded a little at the end is a good instrument for this purpose. One person should hold the animal's head so as to bring the mouth and throat in a straight line, and another should use the obstruction from the outside, rubbing it downward. Push firmly, but gently on the

Another method is to put a stick about as like a bridle bit, and tie it fast so as to oblige it to keep the mouth open. This obstruction will be thrown up, or will facilitate breathing until mucous enough has gathered around it so that it will pass downward. If the obstruction is not far down, the animal's mouth may be kept open by horse shoe, or by blocks between the jaws, and one with a small hand can reach down and withdraw it. Unless something is done soon the animal must choke to death, and

time is of more importance than skill. Cuts that cause profuse bleeding are another sort of cases that need attention before a surgeon can be secured. If the blood comes in jets at about the interval of a heart beat, it is from an artery, and a tight bandage be tween the wound and body should be applied, then a stout stick placed below and twisted until the blood flows but slowly. If the one who puts it on knows enough of the ectly over it, it will hasten matters, and this

should be part of the education of a farmer.

If the blood flows in a continuous stream put a wide bandage directly over the wound to keep the edges together, drawing it tight ly as can be done with the hands. A handful of cotton, or even of green grass, unde the bandage will assist, or one may hold the edges of the wound together while anothe goes for the doctor. We have seen a horse' life saved in this way when the leg was badly cut by a mowing machine, and a man's life saved by the first method when a bulle had cut the artery of the arm above the elbow. In neither case could a surgeon have been brought in season.

The Hyams Brothers on Trial For Murder.

Toronto, Feb. 27.—The Hyams Bros. were brought up in the police court this morning on remand on the charge of murdering W. C. Wells on Jan. 16, 1893. The case promises to be one of the most sensational ever tried in Toronto. Over forty witnesses have been subpœned for the prosecution and it will be hardly possible to conclude the hearing at one session. The most interesting witnesses will be Mrs. Harry Hyams, wife of the younger prisoner; Uriah Jones, uncle of the dead youth, and those who were first on the scene when the alarm was given. It is anticipated that the defence will present some new and startling developments hitherto unsuspected by the public.

Toronto, Feb. 28.—Yesterday afternoon Mr. Aylesworth was cross-examined on the Hyams' statements relative to the condition of the hoist. Just previous to the fatality the deceased, Wells, was, deposed the witness, continually dunning Harry Place Hyams for the \$1,200 due him.

The sensational character of the examination was enhanced by the entrance of Mrs. Aylesworth, the next witness, sister of the deceased Willie Wells. When asked as to her brother's death she commenced to sob and broke down completely, the proceedings for a time having to be suspended until she recovered her composure. Then she deposed that she had an intuitive knowledge that something was wrong. She knew of the insurance policy and was suspicious.

Miss Latimer deposed to an entirely new account of the fatality as given by Harry Place Hyams. She testified that she returned on the morning of the so-called accident from her unnecessary trip, with letters which could better have been mailed, and found to her surprise that the ordinary door was locked. She tried another door, which had not been secured, and on entering found Harry Place Hyams greatly excited. He told her a terrible accident had happened; that his brother, Dallas, had dropped the elevator weight from the third floor on to the head of deceased, killing him instantly. This story conflicts with Harry Place Hyams' other accounts of the tragedy.

The next witness called was Mrs. Pengelly, tormerly a domestic servant. She was called to prove the presence of Dallas at the warehouse at the time of the alleged murder. She deposed that Dallas drove home in a cab, and was too much overcome by the fatality to command control of his feelings. He said that was why he drove home.

Toronto, March 1.—Although the evidence was as gruesome as that of Wednesday afternoon it was not so encouraging for the prosecution. Dr. Edmund King, a well known and eminently respectable medical authority, gave the most important testimony. He deposed that he was called so promptly after the fatality that the body was still warm and flexible and death could not have occurred more than twenty minutes before his arrival. Nothing said by Harry

not have occurred more than twenty minute before his arrival. Nothing said by Harry Place Hyams or his behaviour was calculated

before his arrival. Nothing said by Harry Place Hyams or his behaviour was calculated to arouse his suspicion, and he was convinced at the time that the fatality had happened in the accidental manner described to him by the accused. He made a careful examination of the body, the wounds being described in detail. The examination confirmed his opinion that death was the result of an accident.

A plumber named Wright, a friend of deceased, testified to having examined the premises and hoist, his evidence eliciting no new facts.

At yesterday afternoon's session an expressman, named Fox, described his visit to the warehouse on the morning of the fatal day and the appearance of things there. The body of young Wells was lying near the elevator shaft with the head crushed in and covered with blood. The elevator weight was leaning again the elevator, detached from the rope. The hook produced in court was like the one then on the rope, but he could not swear that it was the same. The coroner was called and made a careful examination of the premises, and then gave a certificate of burial to the undertaker. He had heard Harry Hyams warn deceased to be careful of the elevator or he might get hurt. He believed the weight came off once before, letting the cape down with a run from the first or second floor.
