Canada has room for hundreds of thousands of respectable, thrifty immigrants, but there is a doubt as to whether the thousands and thousands, who are daily expected to arrive, belong to this class. These people are from Russia and are a religious sect, having all things in common. They are also described as paupers and likely to become more objects of public charity instead of capable citizens of the soil.

The attention that is being directed to the "Anglo-French situation at Fashoda," quickly discloses the great value of the Nile basin to Great Britain. Not only is the territory now under dispute the natural and former recognized complement of Egypt, and of great commercial value, but it is to be the country through which that great projected British railway from the Cape to the Mediterranean is to run, and consequently must be held by Britain at all hazards.

United States general elections take place next Tuesday and both parties are closely figuring on their chances for a majority. From the outlook opinion is generally dependent upon, it appears that the Democrats stand a strong chance of making substantial gains, and even the Republican houses admit that their opponents are likely to figure advantageously in the results.

The race riots in the Southern States are getting so frequent, that unless some effectual effort is made to check them, a war between a united colored people and their white persecutors, may be expected. It seems strange that these conflicts, which have extended over years and have resulted in the loss of hundreds of lives, should be permitted to recur in a highly civilized country, where race and religious freedom are among the strong points of the national constitution.

The French press is adopting a much more conciliatory tone regarding the Bahoda affair, and is evidently encouraging the new ministry to retreat from an untenable position rather than risk the consequences of a war with Great Britain. It is a notable fact, in this connection, that the French government, which is so often accused of being a weak government, is now showing a determination to stand firm.

The London and Paris stock exchanges are decidedly panicky, and as these constitute the war barometers of the business community, a reaction is to be expected. The London market is particularly nervous, and it is not surprising that the market is showing a decided tendency to the downward.

The Grand Division Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia met in annual session at Halifax, on Tuesday, 29th ult. The report of the grand scribe, Mr. Saunders, shows the order now numbers 12,658, a loss of seventy-six during the past three months.
