EASTER VESTRY.

Minutes of the annual vestry meeting of the Church of St. George the Martyr, held in the schoolhouse on the evening of Easter Monday, March 31st, 1902, at eight o'clock.

Present—The Rector, the Rev. M. Hare, M.D., Messrs. R. B. Street, Henry F. Duck, E. H. Cave-Browne-Cave, F. F. Payne, L. L. McMurray, L. S. McMurray, H. F. Wyatt, C. C. Baines, S. B. Harman, Huson M. Murray, E. H. Keating, H. L. M. Weller, Harry Winsor, J. C. Milne, R. A. Baines, Edmund Phillips, C. D. Heath, Harry Smith, R. Crashley.

The Rector in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Street read the report of the Wardens showing the receipts and disbursements for the year ending March 31st, 1902.

Moved by Mr. Duck, seconded by Mr. McMurray, that the report of the Wardens be received for discussion.—Carried.

After discussion it was moved by Mr. Harman, seconded by Mr. Duck, that the report of the Wardens be adopted.—Carried.

The Rector then appointed Mr. Henry F. Duck as one of the Wardens for the ensuing year.

Moved by Mr. Harman, seconded by Mr. Murray, that Mr. R. B. Street be the People's Warden for the ensuing year.

Mr. Street intimated that he did not wish for re-election.

Moved by Mr. C. C. Baines, seconded by Mr. L. S. McMurray, that Mr. E. H. Keating be elected People's Warden for the coming year.

Mr. Keating expressed himself as unable to accept the position if elected.

Moved by Mr. Street, seconded by Mr. McMurray, that Mr. H. L. M. Weller be elected as People's Warden for the coming year.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Weller was unanimously elected.

The following gentlemen were then duly elected as sidesmen for the ensuing year: Huson M. Murray, K.C., Chairman; Chas. D. Heath, A. C. Bedford-Jones, Allen Baines, M.D., C. C. Baines, L. L. McMurray, L. S. McMurray, H. F. Wyatt, C. R. W. Biggar, K.C., F. F. Payne, R. B. Street, Frank Kenrick, E. M. Spragge, M.D., A. Clubb, A. M. Browne, E. H. Cave-Browne-Cave, Geo. P. Reid, J. C. Milne, E. H. Keating, S. Bruce Harman, George Pringle, M.D., Harry Winsor, G. F. Harman, Frank Cayley.

Moved by Mr. C. C. Baines, seconded by Mr. L. L. McMurray, that Messrs. Huson M. Murray, K.C., Geo. F. Harman and C. R. W. Biggar, K.C., be the Parochial Tribunal for the ensuing year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duck, seconded by Mr. Weller, whereas the business affairs of the Church having assumed such proportions, and whereas the Wardens desire advice from the members of the congregation, therefore be it resolved, that the Rector, Assistant Clergy, Wardens and Sidesmen be and are hereby appointed a Committee of General Purposes, to meet quarterly or as occasion may require, at the call of the People's Warden.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. L. S. McMurray, seconded by Mr. Duck, that Mr. H. F. Wyatt be appointed

Vestry Clerk and Secretary to the Committee of General Purposes.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. S. B. Harman, seconded by Mr. Huson W. Murray, that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Mr. R. B. Street for his very faithful and untiring services as People's Warden for so many years.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duck, seconded by Mr. Harman, that the thanks of the Vestry be tendered to the Organist and Choir for their artistic and valuable services during the year, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Organist to be read to the Choir at the first convenient opportunity.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Street, seconded by Mr. Winsor, that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered by this Vestry to the Woman's Auxiliary, to St. Agatha's Guild, to the Chancel Guild, and to the officers and teachers of the Sunday School.—Carried.

The Vestry meeting then adjourned and at a meeting of the congregation, held immediately after, it was moved by Mr. S. B. Harman, seconded by Mr. Street, that Messrs. Huson W. Murray, K.C., C. R. W. Biggar, K.C., and E. D. Armour, K.C., be Delegates from this congregation at the Synod of the Diocese.—Carried.

The meeting, upon motion, then adjourned.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The 16th annual meeting of St. George's W. A. was held on Wednesday, 19th March, over fifty members being present. Mrs. Wyatt, the President, presided. The Rector opened the proceedings with prayer. Addresses were given by Miss Tilley and Mrs. DePencier. The following is the report read by the Secretary:

The meetings of this branch for the season 1901-2 were begun on October 14th, and have been held each Monday afternoon with the exception of December 23rd and 30th. The attendance has been very good, averaging 18, and much work has been accomplished. Twenty-four meetings have been held since the last annual meeting, and only on one occasion has our President been absent. We have 112 members to report, as against 108 last year; and this is very satisfactory, as from change of residence and

other causes we have lost 10 members from last year's list. We had the pleasure of welcoming a former member, after a prolonged absence from Canada, and a committee was formed to visit new members of the congregation, with the object of securing their help and interest in our work, the result being the addition of several new active members. Four bales have been sent during the year, two with the usual summer and winter outfits for 4 Indian boys in the Gordon School, and one each to Mr. Lord at Apsley, and to Mr. Allman, Emsdale. The two last contained gifts for Christmas trees principally, several being generously provided by Miss Acton and Miss Bennett, formerly of our number.

Many useful gifts of material and good second-hand clothing have also been received, and a roll of flannel purchased from special contributions, the Branch funds being thus saved for other uses. A fifth bale containing summer clothing will be sent to the Gordon School next month. In response to an appeal made by Mrs. Broughall at the triennial meeting of the W. A. to all the Branches, on behalf of the pressing needs of Algoma, each member was asked to contribute 25 cents. Our Branch gave \$31.00, four dollars more than was asked from us, and it was obtained at the suggestion of our President, by each active member offering to collect from four others.

Our 4 pledges for the year are fully paid, \$75 to missions in the diocese of Toronto, \$25 to Temiscamingue, and \$15 each to the maintenance of the Blackfoot Home, and the salary of the matron there. We hope to have the further privilege of contributing \$10 to the work of the Toronto missionaries in Japan and \$400 to the Central Rooms. This year our funds were materially helped by the gift of half the proceeds of a very successful concert held in the schoolhouse in February, and arranged by a new member of our congregation.

Three members of our Branch went to the semi-annual meeting held in Aurora in January, and Mrs. McMurray read a report of the proceedings at one of our Branch meetings.

There are now 50 subscribers to the *Leaflet*, a large increase on other years.

Mrs. Moore and Mrs. W. B. Baines have again this year kindly undertaken to serve tea each week at the close of the meetings, and our second vice-president, Mrs. Macbeth, efficiently took charge of the work department during the temporary absence of Miss Street.

Mrs. Egerton Baines, our Recording Secretary, has furnished a very full report of the proceedings of the board meetings each month, and

from her careful entries of all matters connected with our Branch this report is compiled.

Parish Notes.

The efforts made during Lent to pay off most of the floating debt of \$1,500, have been very successful, and only \$370 now remains to be raised. On Palm Sunday the Rector read an offer made by a member of the congregation, to double his subscription of \$25.00 should \$1,000 be raised. All Holy Week subscriptions poured in, most of them small ones, and on Easter Day the announcement was made that over \$1,000 had been subscribed, and accordingly the second cheque was appropriated. During the absence of Miss Gosling in England, Miss Ethel Nash has kindly offered to act as Secretary of the Sunday School.

The Treasurer of the Sanctuary Guild acknowledges the sum of \$3.00, one year's subscription, from Mrs. J. W. Beatty.

The services during Lent were on the whole well attended. The Sunday congregations showed a marked increase. The attendance on Friday afternoons, if not so large as formerly, was more regular than ever before, and affords only another proof that conventional church-going is a thing of the past. Nowadays people go to church because they care. Mr. Kenrick's addresses were much liked, and helped many to realize the deep spiritual meaning of the "I ams" of our Lord. On Good Friday the three hours' service was conducted by the Rev. F. H. Hartley, whose opening address took place at the conclusion of Matins. Easter Day dawned brightly, and everything contributed towards the Great Festival. The church was decorated in white and gold, the music was excellent, the congregations and offertories larger than usual. Best of all,

the number of communicants was nearly fifty more than usual for many years.

Three weeks ago St. George's was broken into and every cupboard and drawer forced open and ransacked. Nothing of any value was found, and all the damage done was to locks and bolts. On the same night another church in the neighborhood was entered, and a few days later the thieves were discovered, one of their friends turning informant. They are all in jail now, and will, we hope, start a better life when released. They are all under 20 years of age.

BALES FOR THE NORTH-WEST.

The final meeting of the St. George's W. A. will be held on Monday, 14th inst. At this meeting arrangements will be made for sending off the bales to the Northwest Missions. An earnest request is made to members of the congregation for clothing suitable for the boys of the Gordon School. Goods may be sent to the Rectory during the week. Groceries, medicines, boots and shoes will be most particularly useful and acceptable.
