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PLACES OF INTEREST.

The Crystal Palace, or the Provincial Exhibition Building, designed by Messrs. Fleming and Schreiber, of Toronto, is a miniature copy of the famous structure in Hyde Park. It is principally constructed of cast-iron and glass, and the roof is covered with tin. Length, 256 feet; extreme width, 144 feet; total, area, 22,000 square feet. The total cost of the building was about \$22,000.

The University of Toronto is beautifully situated at the head of the College Avenue. The grounds and park are tastefully laid out, a portion being used as a garden. The Magnetic and Meteorological Observatory is within these grounds, and is under the management of the University. The cost, including library and museum, about \$400,000.

Upper Canada College, King Street west, on a site containing nine acres, was endowed by the provincial government. The buildings were erected in 1830, and the cost, including the grounds, was \$80,000.

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Trinity College, in connection with the Church of England, on the north side of Queen Street, near the Exhibition Grounds, is a handsome building. The park contains twenty acres. Cost \$32,000.

Knox's College, in connection with the "Canada Presbyterian Church," is situated on Grosvenor Street, north of the College Avenue.

St. Michael's College, Roman Catholic, situated on Clover Hill, between the city and Yorkville, is a fine building. Cost, \$80,000.

St. James' Cathedral, corner of Church and King Streets, is a large and handsome edifice. It is the fourth church which has been erected on the same site. The two immediately preceding were destroyed by fire. The style is that of the early English Gothic. Cost \$68,000.

St. Michael's Cathedral, Roman Catholic, corner of Church and Shuter Streets, is the largest church in the city. It is built in the early English Gothic style. Cost, \$80,000.

The St. Lawrence Hall and Market. This building is erected on the site of the old City Hall and Market. It is built of white brick, but the front is of cut stone. The

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The Post Office, on Toronto Street, built in 1852, in the Doric style of architecture, is a handsome and imposing structure.

The Mechanics' Institute, corner of Adelaide and Church Streets, erected in 1854, at a cost of \$40,000, is a fine building. The Music Hall belonging to the Institute is 76 feet by 56.

The Toronto Exchange, on Wellington Street, was built in 1855, at a cost of \$63,000. The city merchants transact their business here. The building contains a news room, committee rooms, the office of the Montreal Telegraph Company, the Board of Trade Rooms, &c.

The County Court House, Adelaide Street east, was erected in 1852-3, at a cost of \$35,000.

Osgoode Hall, where the supreme courts of Upper Canada hold their sittings, is a splendtd building, well worthy of a visit. It is beautifully situated on Queen Street, at the head of York Street.

The new Hospital, on Don Street, is a massive structure, occupying a space of 176 feet by 120. It was opened for the reception of patients in 1856. Cost \$68,000.

The House of Providence, Power Street, is a Roman Catholic institution, intended as a home for destitute children and a hospital for the sick poor. It cost \$100,000.

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
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
