

Will Include Complicated Financial Relations Between Britain and United States, and Also Adjustment of Mexico Difficulties.

Washington, Aug. 13. - Questions arising out of the peace settlement which Bonar Law announced in the house of commons today would require the attention of Viscount Grey, he new British ambassador to the United States, are understood here to include a readjustment of the com-plicated financial relations between Great Britain and the United States growing out of loans and credits ad-Great Britain and the United States growing out of loans and credits advanced by America. There also must be an almost immediate recasting of many existing treaties between the two countries, necessitated by the radical changes following the war. Many of these conventions date back for more than a century and were said by officials to have been applied to modern conditions only by the exercise of the greatest liberality of construction. The La Follette shipping law swept away completely one treaty relating to the rights and duties of sailors and port authorities and this never has been replaced.

In the early days of the war there were many issues between the state department and the British foreign office growing out of interference with American commerce by British warships and British orders-in-council and the many claims for damages by American shipowners and merchants pending when the United States entered the war still technically are open. Lord Grey was the British secretary for foreign affairs when these issues arose and conducted the negotiations for his government.





A prominent tanner wrote the fol-lowing statement for The World: "Articles have appeared in the daily press stating that the embargoes re-cently placed on hides and leather by: the Canadian government have had the effect of reducing prices. The facts of the case are that prices of hides more searing all over the world. facts of the case are that prices of hides were soaring all over the world, and reached undreamed of abnormal prices. Such prices were bound to stop somewhere, and they did within the last ten days or two weeks. These top quotations only lasted for a short time and were not obtained. Hides are now being offered at from 5 per cent. to 10 per cent. lower than was previously asked, but even at present figures they are abnormally high and not attractive to tanners. Leather only partially responded to the rise in prices of hides, and altho selling at high prices, has not yet been sold at prices equal to within 10 per cent. or 15 per cent. of its cost if made out of today's asking prices, which as previously skated, are now from 5 per cent. to 10 per cent. lower than last week's quotations.

Absolute Nonsense. A Front street leather dealer said: The government's embargo has had effect whatever, and that stuff om Ottawa in the papers this morn-as about prices of hides and leather ropping was absolute nonsense. We to a large export business and are till doing it, and I see no prospect f an early cut in the price of leather.

We are selling leather now lower than we can replace it at the present price of hides. The government as one department urging the manu-lecturers to strike out for the export trade and another department trying to hamper exports. Interference with legitimate trade is bad for both the ade and the country. There is a orld shortage of hides and the preent prices will remain until that hortage has been overcome."
