Government Has Sanctioned a Large Expedition AGAINST MAD MULLAH AND HIS TRIBES.

General Lockhart, Commander-in-Chief of the Punjab, Will Be at the Head. His Reputation and Fighting Qualities Will, It is Believed, Overawe the Rebels-Tribesmen in the Vicinity of Jamrud...

London, Sept. 3.-Confirmation has been given to the report that the Government has sanctioned the sending of a large expedition against the Afghans. It is reported that General Lockhart, commander-in-chief in the Punjab, will be recalled from England, where he has been on furlough, to command the expedition.

General Lockhart left Brindisi, Italy, to-day on his way to India, where he will arrive in good time to command the expedition, which will be ready to move about a fortnight hence. General Lockhart's reputation, military ability and skill in border warfare, which is great, will, it is believed, tend to overawe the tribesmen who have taken part in the uprising.

Notes From Constantinople. Constantinople, Sept. 3.-Since Tuesday of the present week about 3000 Turkish troops have been sent to the coast of the Malesk and forces in the protection of the road to Chitral and the territory of the Khan of Dir, the destruction of the hostile gathering under the Haddah Mullah, and such punishment as will deter the Afghans from repeating their British territory and our allies. The troops will return to Peshawar as soon as these objects are accomplished.

Athens, Sept. 3.-In response to the offer of the Government to cede certain revenues as a guarantee for the claims of the creditors, the reply of Germany, which was received yesterday, refuses to enter into any discussion of the peace conference shall have arrived at a decision upon the whole financial question.

Warned Against Klondike. An Englishman Advises His Countrymen to Go to the Klondike in Preference, Yet He is Returning to the Yukon. London, Sept. 3.-[Montreal Star special cable.]-The Englishmen now returning from the Klondike are earnestly warning the public against an English rash there. "The Klondike," says one, "is a lottery. The blanks are now about one hundred, to one prize," yet this man himself has netted \$30,000. He returns to the gold fields in the spring. The papers continue to warn investors not to touch the Klondike companies, but to extend their preference to Koyana, where the returns are sure. The insurance companies are refusing to insure those going to Klondike. It is a well-equipped expedition. The papers, however, publish advertisements inviting men with \$250 to join an expedition in November by a short and secret route to the northern gold regions.

Mr. De Barry said this afternoon: "Whoever devised the original story was a liar. There has never been such a man as Wilson deported. The Canadian news papers have evidently got into a bad way, and they are seemingly helped by correspondents from this side. It really does not matter to me. I have been simply carrying out the laws of the country as they are laid down in the statute books."

HOW TO MEET A SELFISH POLICY.
Each day and almost every act of fiscal legislation makes it more plain that the settled policy of the United States is to sell all their vast surplus produce of wheat, cotton, tobacco and the like in Europe, chiefly to Great Britain, while absolutely shutting out of their own country by hostile tariffs the commodities for disposal in Europe. This again chiefly concerns Great Britain, placing her people at a serious disadvantage. This is neither fair nor desirable at the present. For instance, she may purchase from the United States this season, say, 150,000,000 bushels of wheat, while by reason of their invidious tariff she cannot sell them in return goods to a fourth of the amount. Such a situation can only become possible under the British blind adherence to free trade principles, irrespective of the conditions to which the theory is at present subject. This theory must now perforce come under review. Were it of universal practice there might be something in it, but as matters now are between Great Britain and the United States, the whole thing is absurd and untenable.

If it be taken as admitted that the present status of trade between these countries is unfair and undesirable, then comes the question, can it be remedied? Let Great Britain and the other nations affected—Great Britain—simply impose cognate imposts on American wheat and other products until our grasping and unfriendly neighbors are compelled, in self-defence, to lower their obnoxious tariff. Let Great Britain, for instance, put a duty of 15 cents a bushel on American wheat, and we should soon see the hostile and blustering people crouch under the well-deserved and reciprocal blow, and ready to deal fairly—under compulsion. All that can be urged against this is that it might temporarily raise the price of bread in England. This would possibly be so for a short, but very short time, and were such a thing taken Canada would, under the stimulus given, produce all the wheat England needs within three years at the furthest, while meantime our imports of English goods would be trebled as our paying power increases. And even if, as a first result of the imposition of such a duty, it was found that the price of bread was slightly raised, the money gained by the duty itself would provide a fund from which some other impost could be reduced to the extent that the price of bread had increased, and meanwhile Canada would have become, almost at a stride, the great source of supply for Great Britain in food products, and the market once gained, neither the United States nor any other country can deprive us of it, producing, as we do, the finest wheat in the world, with meat, fruit, cheese, butter, etc., of a like quality. And it would be a lesson worth teaching to the grasping and insolent demagogues who control and direct the affairs of the neighboring Republic, who miss no opportunity for injuring Great Britain or Canada by legislation specially directed against us, or of scheming and proclaiming their hatred of, and hostility to, us and our Mother Land. They have deprived England of the power of selling to them of her manufactures. Let English legislators have the power to furnish her with grain, and we throw their financial position is already about as bad as it can be, but should they be unable to sell their surplus produce in Europe it would be worse.

to make it an easy matter for us to get the same foothold in England for our fruit that we already have secured for our cheese and bacon.

MORE EVIDENCES OF THE BOOM.
The export and import statistics for July last confirm the evidences of returning prosperity that greet us on all sides. Particularly satisfactory are Canada's exports. In July, 1897, we exported \$17,424,786 worth of goods, being an increase of \$5,448,000 over the exports for the same month last year. The increases are principally in animals and their products, forest and agricultural productions and manufactures.

This increase in the country's business accounts for increasing receipts and growing traffic of the railways. So large a volume of traffic awaits the Canadian Pacific that it has been obliged to place an emergency order in the United States for freight cars. Five hundred such cars are now being constructed in Michigan and will be ready for delivery next week.

MEN AND THINGS.
It's a pity to Americanize our language. An otherwise educated and thoughtful minister of one of our large Methodist churches displayed a very noticeable fondness last Sunday for purely Yankee idioms. He seemed unable to keep out of them, using them as if they were part of his mother tongue. He reminded his hearers that they were now home from their vacation, pronouncing the latter word as if it began thus "rav." In his sermon he "located" a temple, "located" a stage in it, and "located" a statue on that stage in the compass of one sentence. The nation to which such words are used to be called great, has invented new pronunciations and words without number, but we should set our faces against them when they are pronounced in the dictionary and the ordinary rules for the construction of words.

It ought to be part of our assessment commissioner's duty to lay out a scheme to manage our Island on a comprehensive basis. Any visitor can suggest one or two broad lines which would transform that delightful seaside resort. In the first place sanitary regulations of the most complete and stringent sort should be issued and provision made whereby the Island can and means to keep the surroundings clean and sweet. This is the first and best commandment. Then a ferry along the north shore from east to west should be maintained and provision made for the transport of provisions and all articles at a cheap rate. If a 50 cent parcel is to be sent to the Island it costs 20 cents to have it delivered. Any company that can transport provisions and other articles to and deliver them at the Island for 5 or 10 cents will make a fortune.

It seems a shame that so little effort is really made to beautify and utilize the Island. The city corporation is largely to blame for this. Sequestration of tenure is an essential if improvement is desired. The rents should be fixed at a reasonable rate—lower rather than higher. If there is to be any difference, and the city should do as other ground landlords, and give long leases with the option to buy, they will buy the improvements (with a maximum limit of say \$1000) if they do not renew. Renewals should be easy and reasonable, so as to encourage improvement. In a word, the city should be a liberal landlord and stimulate expenditure instead of making people afraid to spend a cent. At present tenants will not do so because they know that the city will pay for the improvements, nor will they bind themselves to renew by arbitration. Either course is absolutely necessary if money is to be spent on the houses and their surroundings.

R. J. Fleming will, perhaps, make a good assessment commissioner, but he will not be a very good one if he expects to make the public forgive his method of getting there. It was human nature, of course, but that is something that representative government is supposed to leave to demagogues. We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that he was our Mayor, and that he sold his elective position for the assessment department. He might as well get it as a piece of wood that he should be a liberal landlord and stimulate expenditure instead of making people afraid to spend a cent. Much of the telegraphic news that we are being treated to from day to day is looked at as if there were a revolt by the people of Great Britain in India. So far from this being the case there is not a native regiment that is not intensely loyal. None of the outlying tribes who have taken up arms are under British sway. They are the fringe of savages that our frontier touches, and the very seriousness of the situation is the necessity for conquering and occupying outlying positions in advance of our own territory. They must be punished, but it is not rebellion, it is a foray.

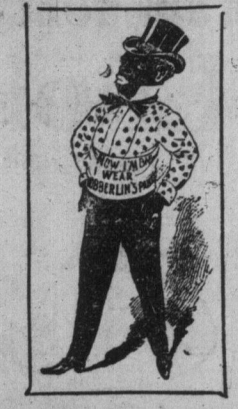
