Ale imported last year amounted to 327,216 gal-lons, and the duty collected to \$65,245; spirits and wines 1,396,136 gallons, duty collected \$2,406,259. The excise returns from malt were 6,840,335 pounds, duty \$4,-(226,652; spirits 27,825,148 gallons, duty \$4,-(32,506. The revenues received from these sources, therefore, were : Customs, \$2,471,-775; excise, \$5,759,138; or a total revenue of \$8,230,933.

LIQUOR LAW CONVICTION.

Release of a Prisoner Ordered-Alleged Undue Influence Brought to Bear on the Magistrate.

THE FLOOD AT SHAWNEETOWN.

Loss of Life Not so serious as Reported. But May Reach 160.

But May Reach 100. Cairo, Ili., April 5.—The flood which oc-curred at Shawneetown, Ili., on Monday, is not as serious as at first reported. The break in the Government levee is 100 feet wide and the water is from 10 to 15 feet deep throughout the town. It is known that from 45 to 50 persons have lost their lives, and 50 more are missing, so that it is thought the loss of life will reach 100. The homeless inhabitants of Shawnee-town are suffering greatly from exposure. Provisions are very scarce and have to be brought in from neighboring towns.






