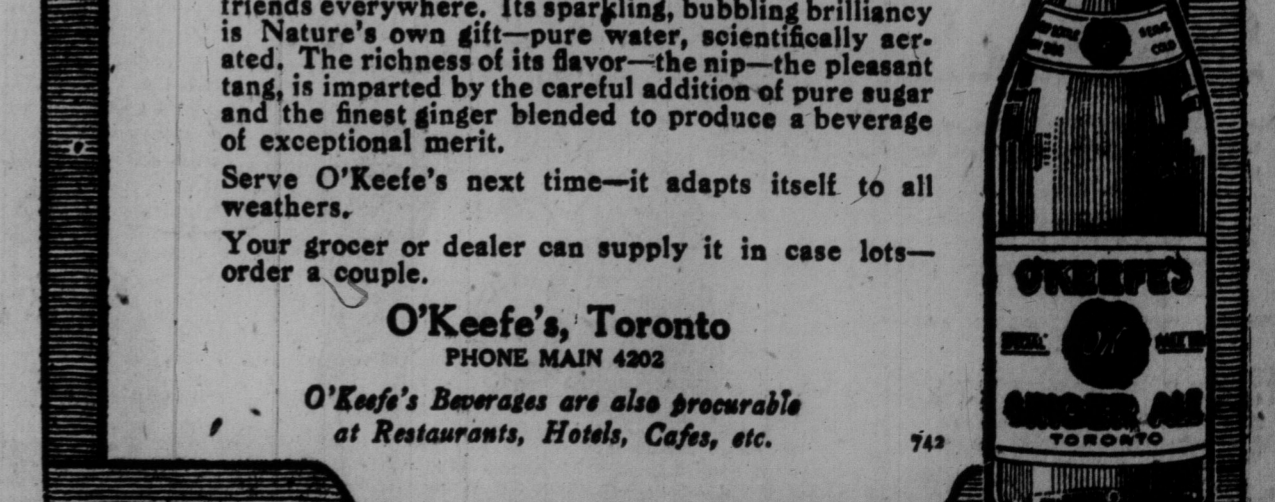

(Continued From Page 1). government of the United States. A second outburst followed quickly when he shouted that "there will be no bolt in this convention."

The appearance of Senator Lodge, introduced as "Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of the United States," was the signal for the first real demonstration of the day. Delegates on the floor and in the galleries stood cheering and waving flags as the senator made his way to the platform. For an hour and a half he held the attention of the great audience and brought forth cheering by sharp thrusts at all the policies of the Wilson administration.

After the keynote speech was ended the usual announcements were made and organization resolutions passed. Then on motion of Governor Beasick, man, the convention adjourned until 11 a.m. tomorrow.

The various committees went to work at once, the rest of the committee reviewing some of the delegates' contests decided last week by the national committee.

No attempt was made tonight to form a union of western state delegates under the auspices of the supporters of Senator Johnson, California. A meeting was called just after the convention adjourned by State Senator Frank P. Flint of California. It was attended by delegates from Utah, Washington, Nevada, Arizona and Oregon. Other meetings are to be held.

There were three nominations for the place of permanent chairman, Senator Lodge easily defeating Senator Beveridge of Indiana and Senator McCormack, Illinois.

cluded wets and dries, suffragists and anti-suffragists, economists, Irish sympathizers, labor leaders and many others who thought they could give the committee winning ideas for the platform. Some were heard today and tonight, but the majority, including the labor representatives and a delegation which demands "freedom for Ireland," had to be put over until tomorrow.

Labor and Ireland. Tomorrow Samuel Compers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is to present his program and a delegation headed by Frank Walsh will argue a plank advocating Irish freedom.

In spite of many months of work and weeks of conferences at Washington several troublesome platform problems remain to be solved. Foremost among these is the issue of nations plank. Others are anti-trust legislation and a long string of proposals by the farming interests. Prohibition and suffrage are other ticklish points.

The league of nations dispute is simply the old story of the treaty fight in the senate. Neither the irreconcilables nor the mild reservationists were ready tonight to take the middle-ground plank fashioned by the "platform builders," and each element was prepared to present a draft of its own. On the outstanding principles to be embodied in the plank, however, all the senators have long been in substantial agreement. At conference more than a week ago in Washington, it is understood all agreed that the platform must declare against the covenant of Utah, Washington, Nevada, Arizona and Oregon. Other meetings are to be held.

King George Confers Honor On U. S. Surgeon-General. London, June 8.—King George has conferred a Knight Commandership of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, on Major-General William C. Gorrie, major surgeon-general of the United States army.

REDUCTIONS ARE MADE IN PRICES OF SHOES

St. Louis, June 8.—Reductions in the wholesale prices of various styles of shoes of from 25 cents to \$2 a pair, were announced today by officials of three of the largest shoe manufacturers here. A. C. Brown, president of the Hamilton-Brown company, asserted that "tight money" and the resultant difficulty met by retailers in borrowing money, was the chief cause of the lowered prices.

VETERANS ENTITLED TO GOOD POSITIONS

Says Col. Price, Re Vacant Crown-Attorneyship—Too Much Government.

A general review of the legislation passed at the session of the Ontario legislature just prorogued was given to Parkdale G.W.V.A. last night by Col. W. H. Price, M.L.A., member for Parkdale. In commenting his address, Col. Price said that he would only touch upon matters that were non-partisan, and that were of importance to the returned men "As a matter of fact, practically all legislation passed affects returned soldiers directly or indirectly, as they are such a large body, but there were several bills passed which were of vital importance."

In referring to the bill passed, which cancelled old veterans' grants, the member for Parkdale characterized it as a wise move. These grants were ones which had been made to veterans of the Boer war, Fenian Raid and other battles in which Canadians figured. Veterans had not held them in many cases, but had sold them to speculators, who were holding large blocks of fertile land for exorbitant prices.

Need for Reorganization. One member raised the point as to whether a man who held one of these grants and had worked it for a number of years as a legitimate farming enterprise was to be deprived of it now without any remuneration. The colored answered by saying that he would not lose it, as the bill only applied to lands which were being held for speculative purposes.

He also thought that there should be a general reorganization in the province of the work done for returned soldiers. He was of the opinion that this should be handled by the province solely and not by the federal government. "The whole trouble has been that with so many boards, such as the D.S.C.R., the soldiers' aid, and other bodies doing this work, the province has felt that they could not do much. This is not the right attitude."

Positions for Veterans. That bigger positions in the province should be given to returned men was the speaker's contention. "I think that the vacant post of crown attorney should go to a veteran," he stated, "and I heartily endorse the resolution of your branch in that regard. There is no reason why a returned man should not have it, and the attorney-general would be wise to appoint one." He also thought that he would see the day when a re-

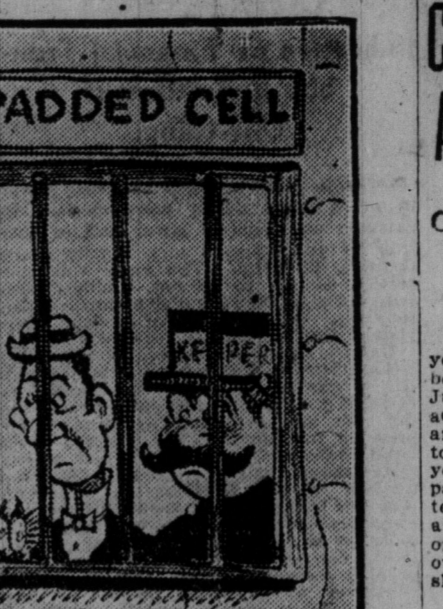

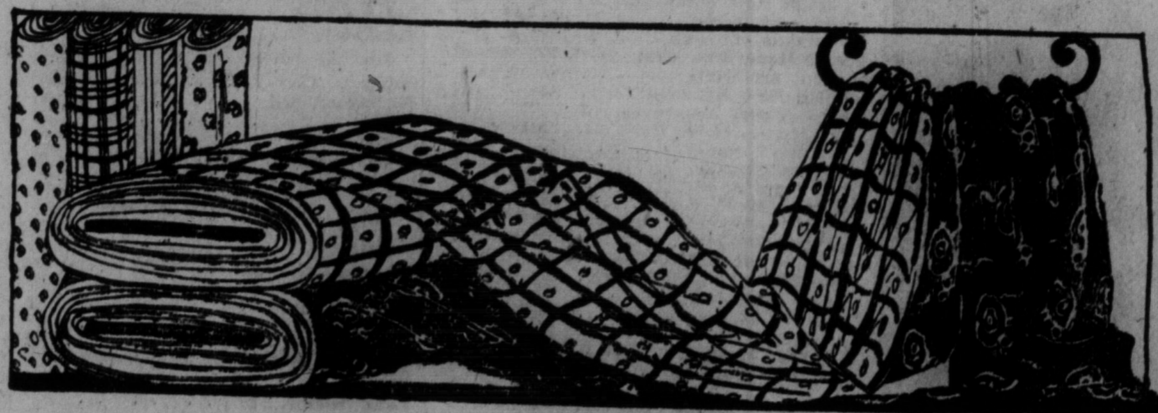
