GREAT BRITAIN'S POLICY WILL NOT BE CHANGED BY WRANGEL INCIDENT

Nothing Yet Determined Regarding Proposed Conference With Premier Millerand-Lloyd George Makes Significant Statement Regarding Present Crisis -National Safety and Honor Imperilled Alone Can Justify War.

London, Aug. 12. — A significant reference to the present crisis was made by Premier Lloyd George, in addressing a meeting of Coalition Liberals today. After expressing fervent hope for co-operation between Great Britain and France, which, he said, had been "sanctified by the common sacrifice," the premier continued, ap-parently alluding to the possibility of war with Russia:

"When the terriyle question of peace or war has to be decided, our first duty as a government is to the people, who trust us not to commit their treasure to any unjustifiable adven-ture. Nothing but the most imperative call of national honor, national safety and national freedom can ustify war. Before this country is committed to it, even in the most lim ited form, we must be satisfied these are in peril."



MUTILATED NOTES

Public Warned Against Fraud -Bills Being Presented in

Some little time ago it was announced that fraudulently mutilated notes of several of the Canadian banks, principally \$20 notes but sometimes of the \$10 denomination, were being circulated in various cities in this part of Ontario.

Such notes are still being present-

ed from time to time, and the public ronto; first vice-president, Dr. Clarke, are warned against this form of Goderich; second vice-president, Dr. fraud. Occasionally the mutilation consists of removing one end of the note and then no adhesive tape is used. 

METHODIST CHIEFS


