CONSTITUTION
OF THE
MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called THE MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY and its object shall be to co-operate with the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

II. Conformably to the principles of the Parent Society, the Bibles and Testaments circulated by this Auxiliary shall be without note or comment.

III. All evangelical ministers shall be, ex-officio, members of this Society. Any person subscribing two dollars or upwards per annum shall be a member of this Society. Any person subscribing forty dollars at one time shall be a member for life.

IV. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, two Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than twenty members, all of whom shall have paid two dollars, with power to add to their number. All evangelical ministers of the city of Montreal and suburbs who shall signify their willingness to serve on the Committee shall be members ex-officio of the Committee.

V. The Committee shall have the power of nominating persons who have rendered essential services to the Society as Honorary Life Members of the Society.

VI. The Committee shall meet once every month, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves, unless otherwise determined.

VII. The whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society, and not required for its own operations, shall from time to time be remitted to the Parent Society.

VIII. For the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in their grants for the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to inquire what families or individuals are in want of Bibles and Testaments; and it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them forthwith at prime cost, reduced price, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

IX. A general meeting of the Subscribers shall be held annually in Montreal, when the accounts, having been duly audited, shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon to be printed under the direction of the Committee, and circulated among the members.

X. Regulations may be adopted, rescinded or amended from time to time by the Committee, and, when required, may be printed with the Society's General Report.

XI. No alterations shall be made in this Constitution, except at a general meeting of the Society, called by special notice, to be advertised in two of the Montreal newspapers one month previously.

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REGULATIONS.

MEETINGS.

I.—The Committee shall meet in the Bible House on the first Thursday of the month, at half-past four o'clock in the afternoon, or as business may require.

II.—The General Meeting of the Society shall be held annually on the fourth Thursday in the month of January.

III.—The General Agent shall send notice of the first three meetings to all members of the Committee at the beginning of each year, and thenceforward only to such as have attended at least one meeting; and that a printed copy of this resolution be forwarded to each member, with the first notice, annually, and a list of the monthly meetings of the year.

IV.—At the first meeting of the General Committee after the Annual Meeting, the following Sub-Committees shall be appointed:

SUB-COMMITTEES.

THE AGENCY COMMITTEE, which shall consist of the President, the Treasurer, the Corresponding Secretary, the Recording Secretary and at least five members; five shall form a quorum.

THE BIBLE HOUSE AND STOCK COMMITTEE.

THE COMMITTEE OF PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS AND IMMIGRANTS.

THE COMMITTEE OF COLLECTIONS AND FINANCE.

THE COMMITTEE FOR ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE.

Each of which shall consist of not less than five members, three whereof shall form a quorum.

GRANTS OF SCRIPTURES.

V.—Mission Churches and Schools under denominational auspices are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of this Society; but Missions among Indians, French Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this rule.

VI.—In the case of Denominational Missions and Schools whose work is conducted in the English language, applications for grants of Scriptures shall be accompanied by:—

First: A statement of the facts shewing the destitute condition of the Mission or School for which grants are desired, and that no provision is available for the purchase of Scriptures desired.

Second: An endorsement of the application by the President or Secretary of the Branch in whose territory the Mission or School is situated.

VII.—That grants of Scriptures shall be made only in such cases as shall appear to the Committee to be really necessitous; and there shall be further required from the recipients of such grants a report of their distribution, and the payment of any moneys received by the sale of any copies from said grants. In any case wherein these conditions shall not have been complied with, no application for a second grant can be entertained.

VIII.—That when denominational Agencies make due returns of their sales of Scriptures quarterly, no demand shall be made by this Society for the proceeds of such sales.

COLPORTEURS.

IX.—The classification of Colporteurs shall be as follows:—To be known respectively and indicated on the Monthly Report as:—Class I.—Class II.—and Class III. That promotion be made from one class to another only on account of fidelity, success or length of service, and by vote of the General Committee; that the Monthly Allowances be for Class I., \$40.—Class II., \$35.—Class III., \$30, with addition of fifteen dollars per month where the Colporteur, by direction of the General Committee, uses in his work a horse and conveyance.

X.—Colporteurs are required to carefully keep within the limits of the District assigned to them as their field of operations, and not to labor beyond them without the sanction of the Committee.

XI.—They are expected to visit, as far as practicable, every family within the limits of their field, in order to ascertain whether or not they are supplied with copies of the Scriptures, and, when these are found to be needed, to supply them at such prices or on such terms as may from time to time be ordered by the Committee.

XII.—In the case of poor families or persons, Colporteurs may, in the exercise of due care, supply copies, either at reduced price, or by loan, or by gift; but all transactions must be recorded and reported to the Committee.

XIII.—Sales on credit are made without the sanction of the Committee, and at the sole risk of the Colporteur making them.

XIV.—The Committee require that a daily record be kept of the places visited, of the number of copies sold, and of the moneys received for the same; and further that a monthly report of these and other matters properly belonging to their work be made by each Colporteur. For this purpose blank forms are supplied, which the Committee expect each Colporteur to carefully study and fill up.

XV.—All monthly reports should be made up to the 25th of each month, and on that date mailed to the Corresponding Secretary for presentation to the ensuing Monthly Meeting of the General Committee.

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XVI.—All days that are not reported as spent in the service of the Society, due allowance being made for sickness or bad weather, will be deducted in the payment of the monthly stipend, unless leave of absence has been before obtained from the Committee.

XVII.—When in the neighborhood of Branch Societies, Colporteurs are required to report themselves to the officers of the same in order to receive from them such co-operation and advice as they may be able to give; and also to report themselves to the District Secretary whenever he may visit any part of their district, that they may have the benefit of his suggestions, and may assist him in his public meetings should he need assistance.

XVIII.—Colporteurs, when on duty for the Society, are required to abstain from taking part in public political meetings or discussions, and also to avoid, as far as possible, points of controversy between different Christian denominations or Churches.

XIX.—The general work and duties of Colporteurs are, to circulate the Word of God among all classes and creeds of the community, and, as opportunity offers, to read the Scriptures, hold religious converse and prayers with families or individuals. When the great object of the Society can be promoted by religious services and addresses to public assemblies, these may be held. But in proceedings of this character the Committee specially desire that Colporteurs seek the countenance and co-operation of ministers of the Gospel without distinction of denomination.

XX.—Colporteurs will be allowed the following holidays:—New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Dominion Day, Christmas Day, and Thanksgiving Day.

COLLECTION.

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REPORT FOR 1899.

To present in a Report anything like an adequate statement of the work accomplished by your Society in any given year would be obviously impossible. We cannot measure what has been done by moneys collected, Bibles distributed and homes visited. Since the moral and spiritual forces which these material agencies set in motion are creative and accumulative, we must be satisfied if we have been, under God, able to open channels through which His spirit can operate and leave the results with Him.

Your Committee report with deep regret and sorrow the loss by death during the year of our esteemed President, Sir J. Wm. Dawson. For several years he had been laid aside from active service, and God has seen fit to take him to his reward. He had been identified with your Society for over forty years, and, as President, presided at its Councils since 1889. A profound student of the Word of God himself, he gave of his best, both of mind and body, to the work of your Society. A suitable resolution, expressing our deep sympathy, was sent to Lady Dawson.

We are happy to say that His Lordship Bishop Bond has consented to be placed in nomination at this meeting, at the unanimous request of your Committee, as successor to the late Sir J. Wm. Dawson.

In the general working of your Society little that is unusual has occurred. We are pleased to report an increase in the distribution of Scriptures of 6,000 over last year and an increase of \$940 in collections. This has been due largely to the augmented activity

of our friends in the country, who, by their generosity, enable us this year to double our donation to the Parent Society, and also to enlarge our work among the French Canadians.

During the year an effort has been made to interest the young people of our churches in the Society's work. This effort will, we hope, bear fruit in the future.

Your Committee note with pleasure that the year 1898-99 has been one of the most successful years in the history of the Parent Society. The issues of Scriptures last year exceeded that of any previous year by 60,000, the total for the year being 4,479,432. The cash disbursements were about \$1,125,000, and an increase in the contributions to the Society from Auxiliaries of \$17,000.

We have pleasure in referring to the recent action of the British and Foreign Bible Society in the appointment of Mr. Edward Stacey, our General Agent, as Honorary Governor for life, he having been an Agent for the Parent Society in the Kingston Auxiliary and also in the Montreal Auxiliary for many years.

Your Committee recommend that the following changes be made in the constitution ;—

(1) That Article III. be amended to read as follows :—

“All evangelical ministers shall be, *ex-officio*, members of this society. Any person subscribing two dollars or upwards per annum shall be a member of this society. Any person subscribing forty dollars at one time shall be a member for life.”

(2) That Article IV. be amended to read as follows :—

“The business of this society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, two Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than twenty members, all of whom shall have paid two dollars, with power to add to the number. All evangelical ministers of the city of Montreal and suburbs who shall signify their willingness to serve on the Committee shall be members *ex-officio* of the Committee.”

In accordance with the regulation a circular has been issued to all the ministers and clergy of the city and suburbs, requesting them to state their willingness to serve.

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The Ladies' Bible Association has continued its usual good work.

Your Committee have again to thank Mr. D. Torrance Fraser, Honorary Auditor, for his continued kindness.

Your Committee are glad to be able to recommend that the sum of £300 sterling be voted to the Parent Society in aid of the general operations.

The following is a *résumé* of the operations in the several departments :—

ISSUES OF SCRIPTURES.

DISTRIBUTION.

During the past year twenty-one thousand five hundred and eighty-two (21,582) copies of the Scriptures have been issued, namely, 6,619 Bibles, 6,453 New Testaments and 8,510 Portions, and total value, \$5,463.74. These were distributed in English, French, German, Gaelic and other languages. In French, 705 Bibles, 2,712 Testaments, 1,830 Portions—5,247.

The Gratuitous Distribution has been 853 Bibles, 1,308 Testaments, 1,465 Portions, 3,626 total copies; \$593.57 total value. These include *Scriptures in French*, supplied to Missionary Societies and others, viz., 488 French Bibles, 1,123 Testaments, 1,219 Portions, 2,830 total French copies; value, \$397.15, and to the Hospitals, Asylums, Chinese Mission, Immigrants and through the Branch Bible Societies and Colporteurs.

At the present time so many Bibles are given as premiums with newspapers and magazines that a demand for a certain class of Bibles is less than formerly, but there is no diminution of calls for Bibles of large type and good cheap binding, as shown in the large number issued from the Bible House.

COLPORTAGE.

Six Colporteurs have been employed during the past year, five of them French and one English; although it was regrettable that some of them could not continue their labors in the country on account of ill health, but in favorable months of the year they have all worked successfully in the districts and parts thereof of Compton, St. Johns, Bagot, Chambly, Hochelaga, (East Part and

West Part), Stormont, Argenteuil and Berthier. They have made 22,551 visits to families, the majority of whom were French Roman Catholics.

The Colporteurs had many opportunities to offer the precious Gospel and to find their way into homes, where other Christian workers seldom have the opportunity to enter, with the Word of God in their hands.

A number of Bibles and Testaments in English and French and Gaelic were thus distributed in remote districts, many of them sold, and some loaned to any who needed them.

FINANCE.

The following abstract of the *Treasurer's Report* includes the special cash transactions for the past year.

The total of the *Receipts*, including the balance from last year, amounts to the sum of \$17,518.39, being considerably in excess of last year's total receipts, in part owing to some liberal bequests from late very valued friends of the Bible Society, which deserve more than a brief passing notice for very kind remembrances. These were as follows :—

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MONTREAL LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION.

The following abstract of the Annual Report has been received from the Secretary of the Ladies' Bible Association, Mrs. Harry Hague :—

“The work of the Association during the past year has been unmarked by any special features.

“The Bible-Women have quietly labored day by day among the poor, the sick and the suffering, in noisy streets and lanes and in quiet hospital wards, bringing to all ‘the Gospel of the Kingdom’ revealed in God’s Holy Word.

“The record of the year shows how faithfully the Bible-Women have carried on their work. During the year they have paid 11,161 visits, occupying 3,704 hours, the average length of each visit being from fifteen to twenty minutes.

“In connection with the work of our two French Bible-Women, it is interesting to notice that while they have knocked at 4,265 doors, only in 1,436 cases has that door been opened to receive and admit them. This shows some of the difficulties of work among the French. But when we remember that God’s Word was read and explained and prayer offered by the Bible-Woman in every house to which she was admitted, who can estimate the harvest that may be reaped from the small seed sown.

“This year we have to chronicle a great bereavement in the death of Sir J. William Dawson, the honored President of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society. In giving our heartfelt sympathy to our Vice-President, Lady Dawson, we cannot but feel that the Association itself has sustained a heavy loss. In times of perplexity and difficulty we had no truer friend and counsellor than the late Sir William Dawson.

“The thanks of the Association are due to our Honorary Treasurer, who, assisted by her able band of collectors, has again brought our financial year to a satisfactory close.

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JOURNAL OF THE REV. THOMAS BENNETT.

1899.

I enter upon the duties of District Secretary of the Montreal Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society this second year, encouraged by the results of our first year's work, and assured that the appeal for this great missionary enterprise is more clear and strong, and ought to be more popular this year than ever before.

The pen of the historian showing how Spain that excluded the Bible has gone down, and how Great Britain and America, that circulate it more freely as the years go by, are arising and reigning more widely; and the daily newspaper, showing the weakening or overthrow of all the organizations that exclude the Bible, and the strengthening and building up of all that do, these are making apparent to many in even India, Africa and China, that the Bible is a power to raise the fallen, save the lost, right the wrongs of a sinful world, and exalt the nations.

So, the Lord God of Hosts is opening all the world to our easy access, and making it hopefully possible for us, through His grace, to increase the circulation of His Word, so as to reach many who would otherwise be in darkness, and so as to add this year another bright chapter to the modern "Acts of the Apostles."

JANUARY.

I regretted exceedingly that owing to "la grippe" I had to forego the real pleasure of beginning the year's work with the warm friends of Cote St. Henry.

4th—Hudson and Como—Meeting in the Model School Hall at Como. The night was very dark, the rain was falling, everything exposed was sleet-covered and slippery, yet a faithful few gathered.

Mr. W. F. Halcro, President, was in the Chair. A letter was read from the Rev. J. Carmichael, our faithful Secretary, excusing his absence, as he was out of town. The Rev. E. S. Morrison, a helping friend, was also unavoidably absent. So, not from principle but from necessity, we were without any "clergy reserve." But the Secretary-treasurer's report, slightly in advance of last year, manifested the unflinching interest of this people in the Bible and its cir-

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ulation, and brought cheer to the meeting. After several falls I was glad to reach the hospitable home of Mr. Park that night in safety.

5th.—Point Fortune.—Meeting in the Methodist Church. Mr. John Middleton, who takes an active interest in the work, occupied the chair. The attendance was good. The Secretary-treasurer's report of increased contributions gave gratifying proof of warm friends in Point Fortune. Mr. Wm. Brown, the President, arrived from Montreal in time to make a genial speech, in which he conveyed greetings from the Rev. James Green, which were heartily reciprocated.

6th.—North Nation Mills.—Mr. A. Perrotan was chosen Chairman. Mr. A. E. Schryer, the Secretary, moved that as the contribution of this Branch is annually diminishing because of the dwindling away of the Protestant population, until now it is very small, and as the Branch is far from any other of the Montreal and among those of the Ottawa Auxiliary, that therefore we withdraw from the Montreal to unite with the Ottawa Auxiliary. The motion was carried. As it is duty to economise time and strength, I gladly gave up the pleasure of any further visit here for the profit of more work elsewhere, and sadly said to these very kind friends "Good-bye."

8th.—L'Orignal.—On the previous day we had a satisfactory settlement with our good depositary, Mr. Neve. Sunday morning we had a pleasant anniversary in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. James Bennett presided, having previously prepared for a good meeting. The offering was \$53.71. This re-assurance that the Branch was well officered and in a healthy condition, together with the kindly hospitality of Mr. E. Abbot Johnson, leaves a visit here one of the pleasantest of memories.

Sunday evening.—**Hawkesbury.**—A mistake was made as to the place of meeting, and therefore our gathering was not large for a Sunday evening. Mr. J. W. Higginson presided in his usual graceful manner. Our faithful Secretary, Mr. Jas. G. Higginson, reported a free contribution of \$48.51, short of last year's only by the contribution of one, who, since then, has been called home.

9th.—Vankleek Hill.—Our Banner Branch! The Depository is in most willing hands that handle more Bibles than any other.

The meeting in the Presbyterian Church was well attended.

Our President, Mr. Malcolm McCuaig, of a long-time justly honored in our records, ably presided according to his previously well-prepared programme.

The Choir was in its place and rendered valuable aid.

The Reverends Messrs. McRitchie, Rainy, Cameron, and J. McLeod each advocated the cause in a few well-chosen words.

And this wide-awake anniversary was crowned by our efficient Secretary, Mr. J. S. Mackintosh, giving a report of collectors, model in that their work was done and well done, whose collection, with that of the evening, amounted to \$186.56, which has since been increased by \$9.60, making in all \$196.16. Veteran workers! "May their hands be steady till the going down of the sun," that where there is no night they may meet many more saved through their circulation of the word that giveth the light of life heavenly and eternal.

10th.—Lochiel (Kirk Hill).—The meeting was small in attendance owing to bad roads and extremely cold weather.

Our devoted President, the Rev. J. W. McLean, presided. Our persevering Secretary gave a partial report which has since been increased to \$66.96; and our good depositary, Mr. J. D. McGillivray, sold \$15.94 worth of Bibles.

11th.—Riceville.—Meeting in the Methodist Church and well attended. The Secretary, Mrs. Nicholson, reported a free contribution of \$5.50 more than last year. We rejoice in the hope that this Branch is on the up-grade.

12th.—Plantagenet.—This Bible Society meeting was said to be its "best in attendance." The President, Mr. A. W. Anderson, in the Chair.

The Rev. J. R. Elmhurst, proved a real friend and helper, as did Mr. W. A. Chamberlain and family also. The sales and free contributions were \$9.49 in advance of last year.

We regret that during the year death removed Mr. Wm. Rodden, whose name was of a long time honored on our list of officers.

13th.—Pendleton.—The meeting was small; the canvass was incomplete. The cause still languishes. We hope that the new officers by a timely start in collecting and a persevering push in the work in all parts of their field will show results surprising to us and more pleasing to God.

15th.—Sunday morning.—Dunvegan or Kenyon.—I preached to a fair attendance of the strong Presbyterian congregation of this Branch in their church from Isa. 11:9. Mr. N. McL. Murray, our indefatigable secretary had all things in readiness, and handed me for sale of Bibles \$18.31, and from his faithful collectors and collection of this morning's meeting \$48.03 free contributions.

Sunday evening.—Maxville.—The fifty-ninth annual meeting of this Branch was held in the Presbyterian Church, which was fairly well filled. The Congregationalists kindly gave up their service and united. An important meeting was held in St. Elmo at the same time. It is difficult in a Branch so large and widely scat-

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tered to keep up the interest by one annual meeting, which is pretty sure to collide with some local meeting in one part or the other which cannot well be given up.

Our Secretary, Mr. J. P. McNaughton, had in all the returns from his unusually large field, except that of Sandringham, amounting in all to \$67.75.

The business meeting was held on a week-day, and its recommendations approved of by this meeting. The Revs. J. Cormack and the Congregationalist minister were present; the former presided and conducted the devotional exercises. The meeting expressed its sense of the great loss sustained by the decease of Mr. John McEwan.

17th.—West Roxborough—(Moosecreek).—The President, Mr. John Johnson, presided.

The Rev. John McKenzie led the devotional exercises and gave a spirited address, emphasizing the study of God's Word. The President also gave a stirring address, tracing the blessings of civilization to the Bible, not to the standing armies, and to its teaching the settlement of national disagreements by arbitration, not by drawing the claymore.

The Secretary-treasurer, Mr. A. V. Begg, reported contributions well up to the average, showing that officers and collectors here do their work at the proper time and faithfully.

18th.—Avonmore.—A union meeting, except that the Rev. Mr. Richards was absent. The Rev. George Weir made a very efficient Chairman.

The offering, \$30.89, surpassed that of last year. The Branch, except a twig or two, is in a healthy condition.

19th.—South Finch.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. One hundred present. The Rev. T. Richards aided, and the Rev. S. Maudsley gave a speech full of fire and eloquent in facts. The free contribution of \$43.70 shows that the Bible has warm friends in this well-officered and vigorous Branch.

20th.—Chesterville.—The President, an ever-true friend of the Society, Mr. H. W. Moad, presided over the small meeting, which was especially saddened by the absence of the resident Minister and other officers. We removed the Depository to Mr. Melvin Durant's, returned old, and ordered new stock, and having done our best leave the responsibility for the life and usefulness of this Branch with others.

22nd.—Morewood.—Sunday morning. A large meeting in the Presbyterian Church. One section of this Branch failed to attend or otherwise aid, and so there was a falling off in its contribution. We felt the loss here and at Chesterville of the kindly oversight of the Rev. J. Kellock, because of dangerous illness in his family.

Winchester.—Sunday evening in the beautiful Methodist Church, fairly well filled. The Rev. F. C. Reynolds and his splendid choir, led in the devotional exercises. We regret a falling-off in the sales and contributions of this strong influential Branch. We hope, however, that as the objection—English colportage—is removed, we shall again have hearty meetings, good returns, and the unity of the Spirit to glorify the Living Word by the circulation of the written.

23rd.—Inkerman.—A good attendance and a good meeting. The choir sang some beautiful pieces with power. The spiritual tone of this meeting, the pastor's address, and all that went to make up this meeting seem to indicate that the pastor, the Rev. Wm. Service, is a workman that "needeth not to be ashamed."

24th.—South Mountain.—The Rev. J. F. McFarlane was in his place and led the devotional part of the meeting. Vice-president W. Bailey presided.

The attendance was good, the offerings better than for some years. Well done, South Mountain!

25th.—Heckston.—The annual meeting was in the Methodist Church, and fairly well attended.

Mr. A. J. Cumming in the Chair. The choir rendered valuable aid. Mr. J. Magee reported work not completed, but progressing and promising. The Treasurer, Mr. H. Hughes, handed me more than formerly, but it involved more trouble to him and others than if collected before the meeting. We trust that this Branch is on the up-grade, and that the timely remarks of Mr. J. McCaughey, and past experiences of scattered work may cause officers and collectors to have all in readiness for their next annual meeting.

26th.—Hallville.—The Rev. J. H. Higgins, President, took charge of the meeting. Nothing had been done. But gentlemen, not to be hindered by storms or bad roads, nor to be put off, as little girls, too frequently, with five or ten cent contributions, undertook the collecting. So, since then we received from Treasurer Clark Hyndman \$24.58, instead of nothing last year, and they receive God's smile and blessing more richly.

27th.—Kemptville.—The officers met at 7 p.m. and arranged the business of the meeting. President Brownlee made a capital chairman. The meeting was larger, and the contribution more than iast year. 31st.—Merrickville.—Meeting in the Methodist church. The Rev. T. B. Conly conducted the devotional exercises. It would seem, from the long time spent in securing officers and collectors, that their work is not popular here. Yet the offering this year was greatly in advance of last year, and the meeting, though small, was sympathetic.

Death visited the officers of this Branch, and the Rev E. Aston is no more with us in this work.

FEBRUARY.

1st.—Easton's Corners.—Small-pox cast a gloom over this neighbourhood, having invaded one home, removed a dear brother, and threatened others. Therefore, all public meetings were prohibited. Ours was neither announced nor held. We received from our kind host and secretary \$8.50.

2nd.—Jasper.—We are specially indebted to Messrs. William and James G. Connerty for the working of this Branch. The Depository was transferred from Mr. D. Hoffmann's, at his own request, to the store of Mr. George Cross. The Rev A. H. Visser heartily supported what was said in the meeting on the Bible Society as the absolutely necessary ally of all missions.

3rd.—Wolford.—The President, Mr. George Hutton, said, "No work can come before us with stronger commendation than that of the Bible Society." The attendance was good. Mr. Wm. Chalmers reported contributions better than last year. The spiritual tone and

enthusiasm of the meeting were best of all. Everything came off well, and will long remain a pleasant memory.

5th.—**Lombardy.**—Here I enjoyed, as my predecessors always, the kind hospitality of Mrs. J. Kenny and family. I also found Mr. John Rabb to the forefront in the work of this Branch, with contributions about double those of last year. The large, warm-hearted Rev. N. B. Topping urged me to give his people my usual address on Sunday morning, just before Communion in the Lord's Supper. The self-sacrifice which the circulation of God's Word called for seemed uplifted and urged on by the teaching of the sacred emblem about to be partaken of by us. This anniversary meeting was a most impressive one.

Toledo.—**Sunday evening.**—Meeting in the Methodist Church; every seat was filled. A good choir greatly aided. Contributions were, in amount, nearly twice that of last year. We shall miss our good Secretary, Mr. Derbyshire, who is about to take up his residence in Smith's Falls.

6th.—**Chantry.**—This Branch has been existing at a poor dying rate. My kind host thought that no one would attend the meeting. I went, determined to go through my lecture even if none were present. Soon we had an agreeable surprise in the arrival of a goodly number. The boy, Wesley Chant, brought his usual \$3.00 and 87c more. We re-organized; we received many expressions of thanks, and promises that they had done with the sleep of the past and would take hold vigorously next year. We sowed in tears, hoped with fears, but reaped with joy.

7th.—**Phillipsville.**—After we addressed a small audience, it was moved by Mr. W. B. Philips, seconded by Mr. Alfred Willows, that the Phillipsville Branch Bible Society be re-organized, which was carried and accordingly done.

8th.—**Forfar and Portland.**—Mr H. S. Toffey presided over a goodly gathering. The Rev. G. S. Clendinning came down specially from Newboro to attend the meeting. With such a minister we had, of course, a good meeting. Mr. C. T. Hales reported free contributions amounting to \$29.40, over \$7.00 more than last year. The choir, by three well-sung voluntaries, added much to the profit of the meeting. We found the depositories well kept. Altogether this is a well-officered Branch.

9th.—**Westport.**—Our west-most Branch met in the Methodist Hall. The bitterly cold night, and sickness darkening some homes with the shadow of death, greatly reduced the attendance. The President, Mr. W. H. Fredenberg, ably filled the chair. The Rev. A. C. Bryan gave good aid.

The meeting appointed, for the most part, new officers and collectors, hoping that they may be the means of reviving the interest in Bible Society work, which has drooped in this neighbourhood for several years. Since then I received \$18.50 free contributions. Well done for the new staff!

Morton.—**Sunday evening.**—A good attendance in the Presbyterian Church. After the sermon Mr. A. E. Slighter, the President, took the Chair. Our faithful Secretary, Mr. B. Henderson, reported contributions slightly in advance of last year, and we parted feeling that we had a good meeting.

13th.—Lyndhurst.—Meeting in the Methodist Church. The Rev. T. Brown ably filled the Chair, and spoke good words. The meeting was a good one, though somewhat depressed by a falling off in the free contributions, and by a small attendance. We regret that there was a concert in the Episcopalian Church at the same time as our meeting, where the attendance was made small by our meeting as was ours by their meeting. Lesson: Watch against two village meetings in one night.

14th.—Delta.—The Rev. A. G. Robertson presided. The Secretary, Dr. C. N. Mallory, had the best possible excuse for not fully looking after the work of the Branch, that was impossible for him; other leaders did not take hold, and therefore the attendance was small, and the returns only about half what they were last year.

15th.—Athens.—A very good attendance and the best attention at this meeting, the praise for which is specially due to the President, Mr. Robert Thompson.

19th.—Spencerville.—The Depositary, Mr. A. Carmichael, agreed to return the old stock of Bibles and we ordered new ones.

Dr. S. C. McLean, who has long been a tried friend to whom the Society is deeply indebted, had the business meeting in his house on Saturday evening, when he was elected Treasurer as well as Secretary. He handed me \$47.40 free contributions. In this Branch, officers do their work in a systematic way, and the collectors, men as well as women, do their work thoroughly.

Sunday morning we had a good and pleasant meeting of Methodists and Presbyterians in the Presbyterian Church. Altogether this is a strong, willing Branch, which it is a real pleasure to visit.

Ventnor.—Sunday evening.—Every seat of pulpit as well as pew was filled. Mr. James Dobbie reported that the people's liberality for the circulation of God's word was considerably in advance of last year. The attendance, interest, and enthusiasm of this meeting form a bright picture in our memory.

24th.—Colquhoun.—President Wm. Kyle in the Chair. The Rev. H. Carmichael, at considerable inconvenience, was present, led in the devotional exercises, and spoke appreciative words. The attendance was fair, the report good, and the spiritual tone and interest all that could be desired.

26th.—Grantley.—Sunday morning.—The first anniversary of this Branch was held in the Methodist Church. Secretary Eli Robertson deserves praise in that, though removed to N. Williamsburg, he attended to the work here. The attendance and interest were good, and several assured me that had they known the work of the Society better their contributions would have been larger. With Mr. Jas. Cunningham as president, and Miss Lillie A. McEwen, as Secretary, we hope for better results this coming year.

Newington.—Sunday evening in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Curtis kindly gave his church at the regular hour of service for this our first Bible Society meeting here. The church was filled with attentive hearers. After my usual address it was agreed to organise a Newington Branch Bible Society. The following were elected officers:—Mr. James Martin, President; Messrs. Leslie Foster and Jas. Duvall, Vice-Presidents; and Mr. Charles A. Steen, Secretary-treasurer.

27th.—Northfield.—The Secretary, Mr. James Raymond, determined to make this a good meeting. He secured an organ, a choir that furnished voluntaries and led grandly, and he had, in short, a programme. Therefore, the church, said to seat 250, was packed with expectant hearers. In the absence of the President, the Rev. L. D. Buro ably filled the Chair. Though our last year's visit was only two months ago, yet the people's offering, though not large, was more than three times that of last year.

With the love people in general have for the Bible, even one faithful pushing officer can make a Branch successful.

28th.—Gravel Hill.—We regret that the President's health did not allow him to be present at the pleasant anniversary gathering of this Branch.

Mr. James Begg, our persevering Secretary, had a good report through the faithful work of Mr. Mathew Marjarrison and Mr. Hugh Furgeson. This Branch pursues the even tenor of its way, which looking back not one year, but several, we find to be progressive and encouraging.

MARCH.

1st.—Apple Hill.—Mr. John W. Kennedy presided in an agreeable manner over a goodly gathering in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. R. McCuaig reported \$37.00 free contributions. We cannot sufficiently praise the officers and collectors of this Branch, so missionary in spirit. The President collected, and another hastened home from Alexandria to complete her work. All was in readiness. The Rev. D. D. McLennan spoke manly words; these linger in our memory: "I often preach on missions. My congregation will never go back on me, because I preach on missions." No, but they therefore rally round the Master and also around you.

2nd.—Alexandria.—The Rev. D. McLaren led in the devotional exercises, and gave a very instructive address, showing how many millions may be reached by the Word as now published in the several leading languages.

Through the faithful work of Misses Cattenach, Cole, Cartwright, and Ostum, Mr. W. J. Simpson, the Treasurer, handed me \$37.50 free contributions. Well done, Alexandria!

3rd.—Glensandfield and Brodie.—The meeting was held at Brodie and fairly well attended. The Rev. Charles Clyde occupied the Chair, and gave a stirring, helpful address. The Secretary-treasurer, Mr. W. S. Jamieson, to whom the Society is deeply indebted, reported \$28.75 collected. This, we think, is good, though formerly they did better.

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6th.—Cote St. George.—Sunday morning.—The Rev. John McKinnon took a kindly interest in the work, and it was done. There was a good attendance considering that the roads were "breaking up." Returns amounted to \$23.56.

Dalhousie Mills.—Sunday evening.—Notwithstanding rain and roads almost impassible, a goodly number gathered, and we had a good meeting and the handsome free contribution of \$23.58 from this part of the same congregation. A word of praise is due to the Rev. J. McKinnon for granting these best opportunities of presenting our cause, viz., his pulpit here and at Cote St. George at the regular hours of Sunday service.

7th.—Glen Gordon.—At a meeting last November new officers were elected. I was neither present nor informed of the election. Notices of this meeting were sent to the old officers and were not passed on to the new. Our long, dreary drive in a borrowed buggy for this unannounced meeting would have been a failure were it not that Mr. Malcolm McGregor and his large singing class kindly gave way to our meeting, and with the new President, Col. D. B. McLennan, in the Chair the spiritual nature soon swayed the fun-loving nature in a fine audience of young people and we had a good meeting—the last one of a series conducted during a remarkably "open winter," in which about one-fifth of the road was destitute of snow, and "la grippe" alarmingly and fatally prevalent.

26th. Sunday.—Montreal.—I was glad for an opportunity to speak to Westminster congregation on the work of the Bible Society, for I had learned that it gave a free-will offering to our Auxiliary. The attendance was large, the words of the Rev. M. S. Oxley, the pastor, were inspiring, and the interest and spirit of the meeting intensely missionary, reminding of the Master.

APRIL.

2nd.—Sunday, 11 a.m. at North Georgetown.—As usual the church was well filled. This, and the cordial sympathy of the Rev. George Whillans, the pastor, and the calm attentiveness of the people make it a real pleasure to visit this congregation.

English River, 3 p.m.—We had not the presence of the pastor, the Rev. J. McLeod, but we had the benefit of his kind pre-arrangement, a fair attendance of the people, and altogether a good meeting.

Howick at 7 p.m.—We had a large hearty meeting. This is the third congregation of this branch, whose last report—12.44 for sale of Bibles and \$111.65 in contributions—furnishes praise-

worthy evidence of efficient officers, faithful collectors, and the continued interest of all in the circulation of God's Word.

9th.—Sunday, 10.30 a.m., at **Chateauguay Basin**.—The little Chateauguay River swollen by the spring freshet to a great river, swirling around the huge, upheaved blocks of ice, crossing the road in places and threatening the homes close by, made our meeting small. The collectors had received more, but the collection at our small meeting was likely to cause the contributions on the whole to be less than last year. Therefore, two or three young friends joined together and put in what they supposed would make it more, which was found to increase it by \$5.00, or to make the creditable contribution of \$29.70. In this day when the cry for God's Word in all languages and in all lands is ever waxing louder and longer, would that we had more Branches bound to surpass their former creditable record year by year.

Beauharnois, 3 p.m.—The Rev. J. D. Anderson came, through snow which in places proved to be literally "up to the hubs," assisted in the morning meeting, and kindly conveyed me to this second Branch in his congregation. The attendance at the meeting was good. A creditable collection was taken up, which, with subscriptions since received, make \$34.59 free contributions.

7 p.m.—The Rev. J. D. Anderson gave an interesting address on "The Finding of the Bible."

16th.—Sunday morning we enjoyed the largest congregation and best choir we ever met in this Presbyterian Church at **Valleyfield**. The Rev. J. Duclos, after preparing for our meeting, had departed for Ontario.

Afternoon at 3 o'clock the Rev. Mr. Beattie gave the Bible Society the time usually occupied by the teaching of the S. S. lesson. I had an appreciative audience.

Evening.—I preached on the circulation of God's Word in the Methodist Church, whilst its pastor, the Rev Mr. Hodgson was supplying the Presbyterian pulpit. Monday evening a few met and had an election of officers for the first time during some years.

23rd.—Sunday morning at **Laprairie**.—A bright, beautiful morning, and though the roads were bad, twenty-one persons out of the fifteen or sixteen families of the Branch were present at the meeting.

Our warm friend, the Rev. T. C. Perry, gave a report short of last year, for "Friend after friend departs," and here others do not take their place.

26th.—**St. Lambert**.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The President, Mr. H. Bragg, filled the Chair and made timely remarks.

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The Revs. W. J. Dart and W. S. Lennon were present, and added much to the interest of the meeting. Mr. D. Scott Bruce reported collected from the Methodist and Presbyterian congregations, \$34.15 which we hope to have augmented by the Episcopal congregation, so as to make a good average contribution for St. Lamberts.

28th.—St. Louis de Gonzague.—The President, Mr. James Black, was in the Chair. The attendance was very good for a week-evening and the neighbourhood. The people also expressed their interest in Bible Society work by a collection at the meeting of \$8.25. The good collectors do their work without failure in the fall of the year. A word of praise is due to the Rev. S. F. McCusker for helping in a variety of ways.

30th.—Ormstown.—The Rev. D. W. Morison had arranged with the officers before departing for an extended European trip, that I should preach in his church morning and evening. In the evening the Methodist congregation united in the Bible Society meeting, and its pastor, the Rev. Mr. McConnel, led in the devotional exercises and gave good help. Reference was made to the removal by death of the long-time public-spirited President of this Branch, Col. McEachren, C.M.G. In an after-meeting Messrs. James Brodie, Wm. Elliott, M. Kee, Dr. Bazin, and others, spoke approvingly of all the work of the Auxiliary, especially of its French colportage work.

MAY.

1st.—St. Chrysostom.—The President, Mr. Wm. Creasor, deserves praise, not for presiding at the meeting so much as for previous preparation of music, and attending to other preliminary arrangements necessary to a good meeting.

The Secretary, Miss Jeannie Ritchie, did her work faithfully, and through the timely collecting of Misses Crowe and Brown, had a report slightly in advance of last year.

The Rev. C. Young, among other good things, said: "The newspapers have been warning us lately against giving our money to private mission schemes not having the approval of the Church; but the Bible Society scheme has the approval of the church of all denominations. The test of many years brings it out more clearly as the absolutely necessary ally of the missions of every church."

2nd.—Russeltown.—The Rev. C. Young presided. The attendance and offerings were small but slighter better than last year, and we were pleased to find that Secretary Wm. McDowell and his collectors had their work done and in readiness for the meeting.

3rd.—Hemmingford.—Meeting in the Methodist Church. The

President, Mr. F. S. Proper, made a good chairman. A union choir was an incidental manifestation of the harmony of the three congregations of this Branch. The Revs. W. N. Chantler and R. J. McKay gave bright, brief addresses and brotherly aid. The meeting was attentive, spirited, and lacking only in attendance.

4th.—Roxham.—A large attendance, presided over by the Rev. Samuel Mick, who gave an address memorable for its evangelical tone and forcible thought.

5th.—Covey Hill.—I found the Depositary well kept by Mr. J. W. Curran. The President, Mr. G. B. Edwards, presided over a large and happy meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. W. T. Curran reported a contribution increased by one third more than that of last year. The President summed up an after-conference as expressing dissatisfaction, but only in this one thing, that their offering for the work of the Society was not more.

7th.—Rockburn and Rennie.—Sunday morning I preached in the Rennie Church, which was well filled. The Rev. James Beatt, to whom we are specially indebted for his successful guidance of this Branch, in its organization and first year's existence, with his congregation, united in the Methodist Church and aided in the service. Col. Arch. McLaren reported that this first year's return from this Branch was \$27.37, and Mr. W. G. Gibson returned \$9.44 for sale of Bibles. Well done, for the first year!

Anderson's Corners.—Sunday afternoon.—Meeting at the Gore. The ministers of the Branch—the Revs. James H. Beatt and W. P. R. Lewis were present. We missed the Rev. T. B. Jeakins, but soon learned from an earnest, forcible address by the Rev. W. P. R. Lewis that he is a worthy successor. This was a pleasant anniversary meeting, and one that resulted well financially. "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

8th.—La Guerre.—Our kind host and Depositary, Mr. J. D. McDonald, sold a large number of Bibles for the neighbourhood. The meeting was not large, but excellent in spirit. The Rev. Mr. Stewart presided. The work of collecting was begun probably too late to add to the cheer of our meeting by a good complete report.

9th.—Dundee Centre.—A beautiful evening, but in the rush of the seed-sowing season, therefore our attendance was small. Mr. James Colquhoun filled the Chair. How delightful to hear our Secretary-treasurer, Mr. Jas. A. Arnold, say, "All the books are in, and total a good average in free contributions!"

10th.—Kelso and Kensington.—Meeting in the Methodist Church, Kensington, the President, Mr. J. Tanahill, in the Chair. The Rev.

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Quinn opened the meeting and also gave an earnest address. Miss Elder reported \$41.10 free contributions, which is a slight fall below that of last year.

11th.—Franklin Centre.—A small but attentive and sympathetic audience. The Rev. Mr. Johnson presided and addressed the meeting.

The Secretary, Miss A. Rowe, and her collectors had their work well done at the proper time, before the meeting, and Mr. Craik gave her report, which was above that of last year.

14th.—Sunday morning I preached at Kelso.

Sunday afternoon we held the annual meeting of the Athelstan Branch, the Rev. A. Rowat, one of our heartiest supporters, was present, and, having previously said his good words for the Society and this meeting, a large congregation assembled. This Branch scarcely more than a part of one congregation, year after year, surpasses in attendance and free contributions large Branches consisting of several congregations. Dr. W. M. Rowat received from the faithful collectors \$50.23 free contributions. Reference was made to the loss the Branch sustained in the death of Mr. James Cameron, one of its Vice-Presidents, faithful in this and every good work to the last.

Sunday evening at Huntingdon.—Through the friendship of the Rev. Wm. Pearson, I was permitted to present the work of the Bible Society in the Methodist Church. The church was about two-thirds filled with attentive listeners. As collectors had not been appointed, instead of the \$70.00 or more of former years, we received only a collection of \$12.26. In an after-meeting called to elect officers, over which the President, Mr. W. S. McLaren presided, Mr. James McGregor, the Rev. P. Hutchinson, and several others took part.

21st.—Grand Freniere.—Sunday morning.—The Rev. D. Hutchinson drove fourteen miles and back to be present at the anniversary of this one of the three Branches of his congregation. The audience was not large, but a good average contribution showed that the Bible and its circulation still hold their long-time and lofty place in the hearts of this people.

St. Theresa.—Sunday afternoon.—Here also the Rev. D. Hutchinson was present with hearty sympathy and help. We had a goodly gathering and a better contribution than last year.

St. Eustache.—Sunday evening.—We had a large, hearty gathering, marked by the special presence of the Master. Mr. S. Stevenson reported a free contribution even surpassing the last one of last year.

22nd.—Lachute.—Meeting in the Methodist Church. We were glad to see in the Chair our esteemed President, Dr. Thomas

Christie, who, though always with us in spirit, has oft times been absent owing to Parliamentary and other imperative duties. The attendance was small for Lachute, probably owing to too early and insufficient timely notice. We regret the loss of our efficient Secretary, Mrs. Massiah, who has gone to reside in Montreal. Miss Graham, who kindly became her substitute for the remainder of the year, had a good report so far as returns were made by collectors. The offering has since been increased to \$56.40, below last year, but a fair average contribution. Mr. H. Fraser sold \$22.79 worth of Bibles for the Society.

23rd.—Brownsburg.—Here a farewell meeting with one who was to depart for B. C. prevented a good attendance at our meeting. Mr. Wm. Polson deserves special praise for the contributions of this Branch.

24th.—Dalesville.—Here the unusual occurred to the praise of this people: an observed national holiday and a large attendance at a lecture on the Bible. Mr. J. Murdoch filled the Chair in an efficient manner. Mr. Deloss Moore ably assisted. Mr. John Campbell reported free contributions slightly in advance of last year. The meeting was one in which the power of the spirit was specially felt.

25th.—Harrington.—We had a well-attended and very successful meeting in the Upper Presbyterian Church; The Rev. Houghton presided. The Rev. Jas. E. Pengally emphasized the world-wide work of the Bible Society as that which enlarges the heart and prevents our narrowing down on the missionary enterprises of our own denomination to end finally with "I, myself." This Branch was organized one year ago. Mr. Robert Dobbie reported returns amounting to \$24.52, almost five times more than those of last year, showing the wisdom of doing the work by officers and collectors rather than by collection at public meeting only, or in any other way.

26th.—Grenville.—All denominations were represented. The Rev. Mr. Bochart presided over the meeting with great tact. When one expressed his sense of loss to the meeting by the absence of the Rev. Mr. Mallinson, now in England, at the immediate request of the Chairman he led in prayer for his prosperous visit to the scenes of his Home-land and "a safe return. This and the unity of the meeting gave a touching proof that the Bible Society is not only "inter-denominational, but also super-denominational," lifting above the denominational lines into loving brotherhood in Christ. The Rev. Messrs. Canes, Land, and Hamilton, gave brilliant and arousing addresses. Mr. T. H. Williamson, our pushing Secretary, returned from his faithful collectors \$43.55, or \$7.40 more than last year.

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28th.—Sunday morning at Cushing.—The good attendance and fair average contribution show that the interest in the Society's work is well sustained in this Branch. The Rev. James Fraser, president, was with us, and much credit is due him for the systematic, timely way in which the work of this good Branch is done.

Evening at St. Andrews.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. D. Patterson, D.D., a true and tried friend of the Society, gave a clear and concise statement of the work of the parent society, of the Montreal Auxiliary, and of St. Andrew's Branch, and presided over an attentive audience. The Rev. J. McAdie led in prayer, and the Rev. Day gave a brief, forcible address.

30th.—Lakefield.—The attendance was good, but would have been better had some officer not allowed the announcement of the meeting to be overlooked in one of the churches. The President, Mr. Copeland, occupied the Chair. The Rev. B. Pierce and the missionary student, R. G. Escah, conducted the devotional exercises and addressed the meeting. The Secretary, Mr. Henry McDonald, reported that the collectors had only partially done their work. As is usual, the returns from collecting done partly after the annual meeting were small. The total is slightly below that of last year.

31st.—Mille Isle.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. In the absence of the President, the Rev. Robertson presided over a godly gathering. The Rev. Dennis gave a capital speech. He rejoiced in the Bible Society as an Anglican, knowing that its founder was of the Church of England; and as a Eriton, knowing that wherever the British flag goes the Bible accompanies it, and there the poorest can secure justice.

The meeting was a real enjoyable one in which the best Spirit prevailed.

JUNE.

1st.—Shawbridge.—"History repeats itself," and so the meeting was announced, the collecting well done, and everything in readiness. The President, Mr. Joseph Stevens, presided. The spirit and attention of the meeting were all that could be desired. Owing to the departure of some contributors, the Secretary reported contributions slightly below those of last year. When the Benediction was pronounced, a boy, Master Alvin S. Shaw, gave one dollar, and Mr. McAllister the balance required to bring up to the good record of last year.

4th.—New Glasgow.—Sunday morning I preached in the Presbyterian Church to a fairly well-attended meeting.

The President, Mr. John Murray, for fifty-one years an elder in

the Presbyterian Church, and for many more years a warm friend of the Bible Society, was called home during the year.

Mr. Robert Simpson was elected in his stead, and so we hope that the good work of the Branch will go on.

Rawdon.—Sunday evening.—This Branch held its even more than usual wide-awake anniversary in the Anglican Church. The attendance was estimated at 250. The Rev. W. Dales with his assistant, Mr. R. Blackgrave, conducted the devotional exercises. The singing, led by the organist, Miss B. Davies, was grand, and the responsive reading very hearty. After the District Secretary's sermon, and the good report of the Branch Secretary, Mr. George Irwin, the Rev. W. T. Keough, remarked, "We are said to have done well; but that is only relatively. Few, if any, have denied self to give the Bible to others. We merit 'Well done,' only when we have done our best. If all did their best soon instead of 340 golden seals on that map of the world, representig as many translations of the Bible, there would be as many as there are languages and dialects, and 'earth would be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.'"

5th.—Kildare.—The President, Mr. Thomas Porter, filled the Chair; the Rev. W. T. Keough gave valuable aid. Mr. Peter Sarazin was elected Secretary-treasurer. The meeting was a good missionary one, which may help the people to look around and above and go on in the good work.

6th.—Joliette.—The attendance was as good as could be expected in the circumstances. Mr. R. J. Patterson presided. The Rev. Giroux led in the devotional exercises, and aided in other ways. There was a falling off in the contributions, but several expressed a desire to do better next year.

7th.—Mascouche.—The Secretary-treasurer and Depositary of this Branch, Miss Hattie Alexander, worked with exceptional enthusiasm, and as a result the free contributions were \$10.73 in advance of last year, and the sale of Bibles was large. The meeting was well-attended, and the presence of the Master felt.

Mr. Holland, supplying the Anglican pulpit, came from Terrebonne, performed the duties of Chairman in a masterly manner, and gave a clear, beautiful address. Everything came off well.

8th.—Terrebonne.—The officers were present, and the attendance good at the meeting in the Anglican Church. Mr. T. B. Holland here also gave good aid. Great praise is due to Miss Hamilton for collecting from this little Branch so faithfully that Mr. C. S. Wallace handed me \$22.25 free contributions, to which one in his home added a personal gift of \$10.00 more for the glorious work. We felt the branch is indeed in Terrebonne a good land and fruitful.

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12th.—Beech Ridge.—Despite the wet weather there was a good attendance for the neighbourhood. The Vice-President, Mr. John Orr, in the Chair. The Secretary, Mr. N. Stuart, had a good average report of free contributions, the credit for which is chiefly due to the thorough bicycle canvass of Messrs. Wm. Hope and Chas. Stuart. A hearty vote of thanks was given them, and Miss H. Thompson, of Montreal, for her admirable singing of two sweet hymns.

13th.—Napierville.—Neighbourhood of the Grand Ligne Mission, where the French Roman Catholic population is gaining, but where modern thought is also gaining over mediaevalism with which it is in daily conflict. It is delightful to note how well the Society's interest is sustained here. The President, Mr. Wm. Marceau, presided over the meeting in an agreeable manner. The Rev. S. A. Mills came from Lacolle, conducted the devotional exercises, and gave a capital address. In the unavoidable absence of the Secretary-treasurer, Mrs. L. T. Marceau, Miss Stuart had a good report of free contributions collected by Miss M. A. Marceau and herself. The meeting was a pleasant one.

14th.—Lacolle.—The Rev. C. D. Baldwin and the Rev. S. A. Mills were present, and took part in the meeting. There is but little progress and but faint encouragement in trying to cultivate this Branch.

15th.—Noyan.—Rural Dean Robinson presided over the meeting in his church in a most efficient manner. The attendance was good, pleasing and promising in that most orderly and attentive boys and girls formed a large proportion of it. The Secretary, Mrs. Naylor, had the work done and all in readiness for the meeting. Such a faithful, timely performance of work is delightful.

16th.—Clarenceville.—The Rev. W. Howitt presided over the meeting in the Methodist Church in an efficient manner.

Miss Gertie Chilton gave a beautiful reading on "The English Bible." The choir sung appropriate selections. The attendance was said to have been twice as large as that of the previous year. The secret, which we record for the benefit of any other Branch desirous of having a good meeting, is the pastor got up a programme which was talked of in the congregations, which drew, and which caused the people to go away saying, "We had a good meeting."

18th.—Mystic.—Sunday morning in the Methodist Church. The attendance was not large, but through no failure of our Secretary, Mr. Wm. Pendlebury, to send out the pulpit and other notices. He evidently did his work well, as also did the collectors, Miss Gage and Miss Pendlebury, and so we received five-fold that of the previous year. Mystic is looking up! the clouds are vanishing.

18th.—Mapledale.—Sunday afternoon. A fair congregation assembled in the Methodist Church. The officers were present. The Rev. G. H. Porter presided and gave good aid. Messrs P. M. Hitchcock and E. H. Morgan and the collectors, Mrs. Brady and Mrs. Stewart, merit our thanks for work well done and in good time, so that we received \$3.23 more than last year.

19th.—Philipsburg.—Meeting of "two or three" in the Schoolhouse. Secretary L. F. Streit did his part, and Misses Denel, Borden, and Guthrie collected a small amount; but the Branch is languishing at a time in the world's history when it should be most vigorous and active.

20th.—Bedford.—Meeting in the Forresters' Hall. The President, Rev. H. W. Nye, presided in a very agreeable manner. The audience was not large but sympathetic. The Secretary, Dr. J. F. Rollit, did his work well, and the collectors returned an amount which, with the final touch of Rural Dean Nye, was in advance of last year. The Depositary, Mr. D. Connor, reported an average sale of Bibles.

21st.—Stanbridge East.—The President, Mr. L. K. Palmer, presided in an efficient manner over a goodly gathering in the Methodist Church. The Revs. Messrs. Harris and Humphrey were present, and added much to the interest of the excellent meeting. Mr. E. L. Hodge, our faithful Secretary, had returns from Mrs. Palmer, Miss Stanton and Mr. Harris, quite in advance of last year. With such hearty support from the ministers and such efficient officers and collectors, this Branch is pleasant to visit.

22nd.—Dunham.—The attendance was a decided improvement on last year. The President, Mr. R. P. Small, presided. A choir gave good assistance. The Rev. Sanderson said, among other good things, "We have a fair gathering this evening, but if the people realized the crying need for the work of the Bible Society, and what a calamity its failure would be, the Church would be full of interested people." The Secretary, Miss H. W. Baker, made partial returns which promise well if the collecting is completed.

23rd.—Frelighsburg.—Meeting in the Town Hall and very small. The District Secretary read a letter from the long time warm friend of the Society, the Rev. Canon Davidson, its President, expressing regret for his unavoidable absence.

25th.—Abbott's Corner.—Sunday morning.—A good, quiet meeting in the Baptist Church. Miss Sadie Bridge had collected, but local demands upon the Christian liberality of the people caused a falling off in the free contributions.

Afternoon at **Abercorn.** The Rev. Dr. Tucker presided over a small but appreciative audience. The free contribution, though, slightly below last year, was a fair average one.

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Evening at Sutton in the Methodist Church. A word of praise is due to the Rev. Dr. Tucker for assisting in arranging the hours of meetings here and at Abercorn, for beginning the meetings sharp on time, and presiding over them.

Here the meeting was a real union one and largely attended.

The Rev. H. Fowler showed himself with us. The Rev. E. Capel gave an earnest, helpful address.

The Rev. J. J. Theckston said that he laboured in Russia for some time; that there he was not allowed to preach, but was allowed to act as colporteur of the B. and F. Bible Society, and arrested and persecuted, but only on suspicion of spreading Nihilistic doctrine under covert of circulating the Bible among the people. A personal witness to the fact that oftentimes the Bible, the silent messenger, is allowed to remain where the living Teacher is not.

We received \$28.24 free contributions; for several years before the last two Sutton gave about or over \$45.00 a year. Mrs. Albert Dyer and Miss Bertha Cassel were chosen collectors for the coming year.

26th.—Brome Corner.—The President, Col. O. C. Patton, presided over the meeting and gave good words.

The collectors had done their work well. Here and elsewhere the Branch succeeded largely through the kindly oversight of the Rev. Edgar P. Judge, a hearty supporter and generous friend.

27th.—West Brome.—Here on our platform a chair and several musical instruments draped in mourning touchingly expressed the feelings of the community on the evening before the funeral of a noble young man suddenly called home. In these circumstances our meeting was not large. The Rev. J. Nelson was unavoidably absent.

Mr. O. Shufelt filled the Chair in his usual happy manner, and Mr. F. C. Petter, our esteemed Secretary, had a fair average report. The Rev. G. A. Mason came from Iron Hill to our meeting, and gave good assistance.

JULY.

2nd.—Three Rivers.—I preached in the Presbyterian Church in the morning, and the Branch held its usual wide-awake anniversary in the evening. The Rev. J. Watson kindly gave the use of his church—a favourable announcement.

The attendance was good, and the best spirit prevailed. The Presi-

dent, Mr. Alexander Houliston, was with us. The Rev. J. R. McLeod, an ever-true friend to the cause, kindly co-operated with the collectors, Misses L. Houliston, N. Ritchie, and B. Roy. therefore Mr. S. Trenaman, the Secretary, had a report that gave gratifying proof of continued and even increased interest in Bible Society work, for its free contributions of \$42.89 surpassed even those of former years.

AUGUST.

16th.—Farnham.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. D. M. Coburn came, but for good reason could not remain. Mr. T. A. Halpenny, pulpit supply for the Rev. W. Henderson, had a meeting at East Farham. Rev. Canon Mussen, the President, held aloof. "No man stood by me" on the platform, but twenty-eight were with me in the pew, and the Saviour above all. Two women of missionary spirit who had given handsomely themselves, undertook by collecting to increase the amount Mr. G. E. Lond, our good Treasurer, had to give me.

17th.—Farnham Centre.—A social the night before, a funeral that day, and another to be on the morrow, a number away at Bolton Springs, and general indifference were said to have thinned out the attendance at our meeting. The Rev. D. M. Coburn assisted, and the work of the Branch partly done and left in his hands has since been completed with good results.

18th.—East Farnham.—Mr. Joshua Bull, the President, presided in an agreeable manner over an appreciative audience. Mr. C. Stevens, our good Secretary, reported that his faithful collectors, Miss R. M. Griggs and Miss K. M. Allen, had secured \$12.62 free contributions. This Branch is commendable for being systematic and timely in its work.

18th.—Cowansville.—The President, Dr. C. L. Cotton, presided in an efficient manner over what was said to be the largest Bible Society meeting for several years. The Rev. 20th.—**Adamsville.**—Sunday morning, by the kind arrangements of the Rev. Irwin, I presented the work of the Bible Society to a congregation largely made up of summer visitors. There are so few Protestants left in and about Adamsville that it may be more Christian not to seek the returns of a Branch here in the future.

Evening at **West Shefford.**—A large attendance in the Union Hall. The President, the Rev. Emmet, and the Rev. Elliot heartily announced the meeting, were present, and gave good aid. Much praise is due to Mr. T. H. Kennedy for bringing about this real union meeting at this hour, and for pushing the work of collecting to a successful issue before the time of meeting.

Mr. G. Tait reported a decrease in the sale of Bibles, but \$30.68 free contributions, being an increase over last year.

21st.—**Knowlton.**—Judge Foster presided over the very small meeting in a genial manner. The meeting had not timely publicity to prevent other engagements, and the collectors were not informed in time to do their work. But we forget the present two-fold disappointment, as the Rev. P. W. Chambers agreed to look after the work of the Branch, and that so by the Spirit of the Lord, this cultured people, not leaving it to others, but each for himself, will manifest in this one opportunity of the year, his appreciation of the Bible. 29th.—**Beebe Plain.**—A good attendance in the Baptist Church. The Rev. O. M. Kilborn conducted the devotional exercises. The Rev. C. W. Finch presided. Both spoke warmly of the work of the Society. Mrs. Stropheles, through another, reported an offering which all felt was far below what Beebe Plain ought to give, and therefore we hope for better next year.

30th.—**Stanstead.**—The Meeting-room of the Congregational Church, Rock Island, was fairly filled with an appreciative audience. The President, Dr. Cowles, who, with his household, for many years has given devoted service and invaluable help to the Bible Society, came a long distance from his camping ground to give countenance and help to the meeting, and was appreciated.

The collection was double that of last year; and Mrs. Cowles and Miss Hubbard have since returned \$37.32.

31st.—**Cassville.**—A fair and harvest-threshing close by, thinned the attendance at the meeting, but a few earnest souls gathered. Mr. L. L. Knowlton presided. Mr. Bartlett, our Secretary, had removed to the U.S., but Mrs. L. L. Knowlton saw that the work was done, and more than merited the thanks given for contributions above the average.

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SEPTEMBER.

1st.—**Ayer's Flat.**—Our President, Depositary and kind host presided, and reported a very large sale of Bibles. The fair, just closed, and the heavy rain reduced our meeting to a very few. Contributions are in advance of last year.

In it not in Germany's, Russia's, America's, or England's power and policy lies the hope of the regeneration of Africa, India and China's millions. Every dollar you give the cause gives wings to the Bible Society—the angel of Apocalypse—to carry the gospel to the ends of the earth." Then followed a quartette by representatives of St. Mat- thew's Church Choir. Secretary Barton's financial review, in the cir- cumstances of a Bank failure, involving the loss of much of the savings of the people, was very encouraging, as it told of \$40.67 worth of Bibles sold, and \$112.69 free contributions. I desire also to record my gratitude to God for keeping me safe in all my travels, for enabling me to fill every appointment of the year but one, for inclining the people to give, so that I received of free contributions \$900 in excess of the previous year.

Reviewing all, I move forward to the meeting of dear friends, to the delightful missionary meetings, and to the sweet sacrifices of 1900 with joy and expectation.

REPORT.

The work of the Association during the past year has been unmarked by any special features.

The Bible Women have quietly labored day by day among the poor, the sick and the suffering, in noisy streets and lanes and in quiet hospital wards, bringing to all "the Gospel of the kingdom" revealed in God's Holy Word.

The record of the year shows how faithfully the Bible Women have carried on their work. During the year they have paid 11,161 visits, occupying 3,704 hours, the average length of each visit being from fifteen to twenty minutes.

In connection with the work of our two French Bible Women, it is interesting to notice that while they have knocked at 4,265 doors, only in 1,436 cases has that door been opened to receive and admit them. This shows some of the difficulties of work among the French. But when we remember that God's Word was read and explained and prayer offered by the Bible Woman in every house to which she was admitted, who can estimate the harvest that may be reaped from the small seed sown?

This year we have to chronicle a great bereavement in the death of Sir J. William Dawson, the honored President of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society. In giving our heartfelt sympathy to our President, Lady Dawson, we cannot but feel that the Association itself has sustained a heavy loss. In times of perplexity and difficulty we had no truer friend and counsellor than the late Sir William Dawson.

The thanks of the Association are due to our Honorary Treasurer, who, assisted by her able band of collectors, has again brought our financial year to a satisfactory close.

The reports which follow speak for themselves, and will doubtless be read with interest.

EDITH McLEOD HAGUE,
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ST. MARY'S WARD.

For thirty years this district has been visited by the same Bible Woman without a break, except when sickness laid her aside, and once a broken arm for a longer period. This means quiet, patient work, in a loving, hopeful spirit, not often cast down, knowing that for every case there is laid up in the heart of the Saviour all-sufficient help and guidance. The great need as it is brought to Him is always and abundantly supplied. There are many in very humble circumstances, who daily look up and seek counsel from God in things that pertain to this life, and they find what they seek, for they are known of God. There are many too, so poor that they can only buy coal by the basket or bag, and food also in small quantities, which is the most expensive way. Clothing they can never buy. This is provided sometimes by friends a little better off than themselves, or by friends of the Mission, who know how gratefully such gifts are received. Many have died during the year, giving clear testimony to their faith in the Saviour. One young girl dying of consumption the Bible Woman was asked to visit. "I saw the flush of fever on her cheek and as I entered she had a spell of coughing; her sister brought her a glass of water which seemed to refresh her. The 42nd Psalm came to my mind, and as I read it her soul was refreshed and strengthened and she exclaimed, 'How beautiful!' 'I will trust in the Lord.' After prayer she thanked me and requested me to come soon again."

Before the week was out she passed away joyfully, in expectation of being with Jesus, and very desirous for all, especially her mother, to meet her in heaven. A man, afflicted all his life, not able to attend Church since his childhood, was constantly visited. He had learned the way of salvation in Sunday School. For the last four months he was confined to his bed, not able to sit up. The Bible Woman enjoyed her visits to him, he always was so thankful, and on leaving he would ask God to bless her. The last time she saw him, a week before he died, she sang, "By faith I see the Saviour dying. On the tree, on the tree." When she finished, he said, "I wish I were in heaven." She told him to plead the precious blood a little longer, and he would obtain sweet rest. When she went again, it was only to see the lifeless form. Truly he had glorified God through suffering. A woman who had lived in the district, but moved away, died very suddenly, leaving a baby of three months and five other helpless children. The poor husband is greatly distressed, but he can say, "God knows what is best. He makes no mistakes." A very kind woman who knew her has taken the baby for a while, though she is a widow with eight children, not one working when the husband died. Since then, four have gone to

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work and the rest are at school. She told the Bible Woman, God never allowed them to want. It is wonderful what the poor do for one another! They know what it is to want, and they are willing to share their last loaf with a poorer than themselves. We hear too of men working in the factories giving out of their small wages to a case of great need when it comes before them. As Dr. McCosh says, "The poor have done for them for love what the rich have done for money." A little bit of God's government of the world. Many new families the Bible Woman has been asked to visit this year, at least twenty, and they are glad to see her come in. The poor and struggling ones give her a warm welcome, so thankful to pour into her sympathizing heart all their difficulties and trials, and help and comfort will come through faithful prayer. She is urged to go as often as possible, as one and another will say, "I am sure God has sent you."

The Mothers' Meetings have been held weekly during eight months of the year, and have been well attended. The Clothing Club has always been greatly appreciated, and often the remark is made, "We could not get such things for our families but for this." It is a stimulus to save wisely, and to spend wisely, and to waste nothing; a lesson not always easily learned! But we do trust that the Bible lesson is the chief attraction of these meetings. God speaking His own Word to their hearts, so wonderfully adapted to their need and circumstances. Many go home cheered and strengthened to meet the difficulties and perplexities of another week. There are many who come who cannot avail themselves at all of this Clothing Club, and others who cannot even come to the meeting. We have to thank our many kind friends who have so liberally helped us with clothing for these families. There are still those who are greatly in need just now.

The Sewing School is going on as successfully as ever, with a very large attendance. The work done is always improving. What a boon it is to all these children to receive a training and instruction which will go so far in making their homes comfortable and happy in after life. The work must bring its own reward to all who carry it on so faithfully, and we desire still to offer them our warmest thanks.

ST. LAWRENCE WARD.

St. Lawrence Ward being in the commercial part of the city has many residents who are employed by merchants and tradesmen. As a rule they receive such small wages that, after paying house rent and taxes and buying fuel, little is left for provisions. It is often hard to explain to them that the same loving Father who looks after those in better circumstances, cares also for them. There are

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some, however, who in the most uncomfortable circumstances express their trust and confidence in His wisdom and goodness.

Though sickness has visited many homes during the past year, employment has been more regular, and the complaint of hard times has been less frequent. Some disappointment has been met with in finding intemperance where it was least suspected.

The Mothers' Meeting has been fairly well attended. Every member has been spoken to concerning personal salvation. Some have shown signs of spiritual life. About a year ago an old man who took care of a school-room was kindly spoken to and treated with respect and confidence. He had been formerly a business man, but fell away through intemperance. His friends gave him up, and no one cared for him, but he was persuaded to give his heart to God and to change his ways, and has proved an honest, trustworthy Christian man.

A widow, who cared nothing for anything good, and knew very little about God, was also converted. Her faith was sorely tried, when on a cold day her son was sick and out of employment. A man called to collect the payment due on her cooking-stove. She had no money to pay, and told him so, whereon he put the fire out and took the stove away. She prayed to God for help and was directed to a lady for whom she had worked. The lady gave her a small stove, allowing her to pay for it in work. This answer to her prayer has greatly strengthened her faith in God, to whom she gives all the glory.

God has been very gracious to the Bible Woman. Her health has been mercifully preserved, and she has been favored with constant spiritual blessings. She has access to fifty homes in the district, where the Bible is read and prayers offered. The confidence placed in her by those visited brings her into close sympathy with their many and various needs.

Though at times discouraged, her faith is strong, and she feels more each day the need of "abiding in Christ."

FRENCH POPULATION.

(Madame Desjardins.)

Your two French Bible Women, supported by the Parent Society, have continued their work during this year, as in the past, with the same faithfulness, without being discouraged by the persistent obstacles in their way.

Their work is to go from door to door in French and Roman Catholic districts, as Montreal East, Hochelaga, Maisonneuve, St. Jean Baptiste St. Cunegonde, Point St. Charles, and offering the Bible, not as a gift, but for a sum of money, small it is true, and that

amongst people constantly warned against that book on the ground that they cannot understand it, or that it is a bad book.

Happy are they when permitted to come in and read a few passages of the volume so ill-treated, and enabled to show the value of their goods.

Miss Dougall ordered from England illustrated Portions, and got printed short prayers. Of these, Lady Dawson has placed a certain number in the hands of the French Bible Women, which have helped the sale of many copies, as the people, attracted by the illustrations, are ready and anxious to listen to the reading of the story. The printed prayers have become very precious to those who receive them. Your Bible Women always offer first the New Testament complete, but if refused, or if money is lacking, then they offer Portions—St. John, St. Luke or the Acts—sold at one or two cents, and thus have succeeded in placing quite a number during the two last months of the year.

The following extracts from your Bible Women's reports will give an idea of the obstacles and encouragements met in their work:—

Roman Catholics having no better hope than purgatory are generally very unhappy and anxious.

Madame Desjardins says, "On Richmond Street I found a very sick woman, very much discouraged and who feared death, saying, 'If I have not done enough good works to merit heaven, I will never be able to enjoy the happiness of the blessed, unless the torments of purgatory be powerful and long enough to earn for me everlasting happiness.' I told her that Jesus had suffered for us, why should we suffer ourselves to expiate our faults; Christ then died uselessly."

"A nun called on me," said Mad. Desjardins, "and began to talk about death." "It is frightening," she said, "never to be sure of our salvation." Mad. Desjardins told her how she had been at death's door and was not afraid at all, depending entirely on Jesus.

"Well," said the nun, "continue your work and God bless you."

"A woman said, 'Two years ago I bought a Bible; they made me burn it; I wish to have another. I showed the Bible to the husband, and he said, 'later on perhaps I will take one,' 'but, taking the Bible and raising it high, he said, 'If there is a good book in this world, it is this. I do not see why they forbid us so much to read it.'"

"A priest called on Mad. Desjardins one day and speaking of our Evangelical Churches, said, 'A headless body is useless, and your Churches have no head, no infallible men to whom the preaching of the gospel has been entrusted, such as Pope and Bishops,' "Then I turned to a passage from their own books of masses, where he could read that the preaching was entrusted to men

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sinner, subject to infirmities, bodily and spiritually. He seemed very uncomfortable, and said, "Oh, I do not come to discuss."

"A woman asked me," "Why the cup has been taken from the people? but is the partaking of the wafer not sufficient?" "Oh, yes, because bread and wine is contained in the wafer after the consecration." "Then why are the priests not satisfied with it? and why do they take the wine?" "Don't you see that they do not believe what they teach?" "Is it not strange that the people do not see through it?"

"One woman said," "The priest warned us against you and advised us to put you out, closing the door behind you in a way to humiliate you; as the books you are selling in our home will be a curse." "Notwithstanding all that is said against us, I do not find them more ill-disposed, on the contrary, their curiosity is excited."

"A woman told me, 'Last Sunday my son went to Church, and as he had only three cents instead of five cents for his seat he was ordered out. Now you know that it is a mortal sin not to attend mass. Who is the guilty party, my son or the priest?' She added, 'I know that you will succeed, a great change must take place before long.'"

"A woman told me that she was so busy that she had no time to read or pray, but that the priest comforted her by saying that her work was a prayer which daily rises before God. I told her that work can never take the place of a prayer, but that we can pray while working. She pressed my hands and said, I feel that what you said is true. I never have been spoken to like that before."

(Madame Piche.)

"Entering a home I found a sickly woman, well disposed, who asked me to read from the book I was offering to her, so I read from Matthew, and she soon gave signs of a deep emotion, as she could not keep back her tears as she said, 'read on please, read on,' and commenting on Jesus' kindness, she said, 'Oh, I wish he would be here, I would go and touch the hem of his garments.' 'Well, Madame,' said the Bible Woman, 'hear His word, and He is the same kind Saviour, able to heal body and soul. Will you not go to Him, will you not buy His book, to know Him better?' 'Oh yes, she said, 'I will, and read it every day.'"

"A woman said, 'I had a Bible once, and the priest took it, wishing to compare it with his, and never returned it.' She took a New Testament and pressing it in her hands, she said, 'I shall be so happy to read it; I have been so long deprived of it; I will redeem the time lost; it will be my daily bread and my poor soul will relish it.' She begged of me to call again and pray for her. I left cheered in my work."

In one house they told Mad. Piche that the Protestants were nearer the Apostles' teaching than Roman Catholics, and pointing to the gospel, a woman said, "Our priests are aware that if we read that book we would find out that our religion is not in accordance with its teaching." Another said, "How is it that since I read the gospel, I have not the same confidence in my religion. I cannot repeat my beads, and when I go to mass I feel out of place." "It is," said Mad. Piche, "because a spark of light is coming to you, and you cannot be happy in darkness any more."

"A woman to whom I had sold a New Testament five years ago, said, 'I cannot believe in the Roman Catholic Church any more, as for me I have done with it.'" Mad. Piche says that the printed prayers are very well received "In several homes women told me, 'you have given a beautiful prayer, when you pass again I will buy a New Testament.' Another says, 'I have learned my prayer, so did my daughter, and I repeat it while doing my work.' A woman said, 'I have a Bible, but dare not read it any more, as the priest told me to burn it and not let the children see it or read in it. I did not burn it, but ceased reading it.' Mad. Piche reminded her that its reading was encouraged by the Pope. She said, 'How glad I am now to be able to read it in good conscience, as I feel the good effect of its reading.'"

POINT ST. CHARLES.

In looking over the monthly reports of the Bible Woman for South Point St. Charles for the past year, I find nothing either new or striking to record; it is just the same work done in the same way, with no very marked spiritual results, and yet with a sufficient record of tender and loving ministry appreciated, sad hearts in adversity cheered and lifted up by Christian sympathy to help and hopeless ones pointed to "the Lamb of God who taketh away the sin of the world," to encourage the workers to continued effort in His name and for His sake. The health of our Bible Woman has not been good of late and she has been compelled at different times in the last twelvemonth to give up her work, once for a full month, on other occasions for several days, but she seems now to have quite recovered and is pursuing her ordinary round with vigour. She is most faithful in presenting the Word, in reading and pressing it home to those who receive her into their houses (and there are many I believe who do receive her gladly and as a most welcome visitor) and this year she has disposed of 40 Bibles and 38 Testaments to those in her district, quite a large number when one considers the purchasers and the homes. We hope and pray that

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the Word thus bought may prove rich in blessing, bringing light and life, strength and comfort to those who have given out of a scanty purse to secure it. May they find in it "hidden treasure."

HOCHELAGA AND MAISONNEUVE.

During the past year and in several cases, the joy and blessedness of God's forgiving love have come to many souls through the blessing of God upon His own word, given in weakness and yet in faith and prayer by the Bible Woman. In many homes great has been the change, and very different the reception given the Word of God to what it was some eight or nine years ago. One home, where she is now heartily welcomed, eight years ago when she first sought admission she was coldly received, and on asking if they should have prayer together, was answered, "Pray if you like." During the prayer the mother remained seated in her chair and played with the children. The Lord has wrought a great change in that home; both mother and father now trust in God, and seek to bring up their children in the fear of the Lord. Of another case, the Bible Woman says, "where when I first called I asked if they had a Bible, the mother said, 'they used to have one in the old country, but didn't know whether they had one now or not.' As I took out my own Bible and asked if I should read some of its truths, she said, 'If I wished to do so I could, but that she had neither time nor disposition to read, as it took all her time and thought to try and keep things together, so that they might have a little food and clothing.' Special verses were selected and read, and before I had read many she had seated herself beside me, and when I closed the Bible, she said, 'I don't think that was in my Bible, I never saw it.' and at last said, 'well, if He loved me like that, I am going to love and trust Him.' These are but a few of the many cases where the Bible Woman's efforts are blessed by God.

Sickness, poverty and distress abound, but somehow the Light of God seems to dispel much of the darkness, as the truth is fulfilled, "My God shall supply all your need."

The Mothers' Meeting, held every Tuesday afternoon, is a source of great spiritual good; from twenty-two to twenty-six attend regularly, some bringing two and three children with them. Four names have been added to the roll since the beginning of this year. The work, too, among the children is very encouraging. We have an average attendance at the Friday night meetings of about eighty-two, and the Bible lesson will, we trust, be both helpful to those who attend, and will enable them also to influence others for good.

GENERAL HOSPITAL.

A review of the last twelve months, with its revelations of the unlimited mercies of our Father, in answer to the many prayers offered by all those interested in the work of the Hospital, fills our hearts with gratitude to God. The Gospel has been presented with earnest simplicity, and we can truly say has been received with reverence and gratitude by both old and young.

Much time has been spent with the children in their pretty ward, and the opportunities to teach these little ones of Him who said, "Suffer little children to come unto Me and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven," resulting from these pleasant hours spent together have not, we trust, been altogether lost, but will bring forth fruit in due season.

Of the older patients, we are thankful to be able to say that we have noticed a gratifying earnestness on their part—an earnestness to hear, and with many to receive God's message.

In a hospital like the General, where new faces are constantly met, where people come and go daily, many are the opportunities which present themselves to the attention of the Bible Woman. It would be impossible to grasp them all, but by the pleasing testimonies of many of the transients, sailors, laborers, etc., we know that the Word of God has been powerful in them, bringing forth the fruits of repentance. We know that much comfort has been imparted to those who, by the nature of their illness, have been detained for some length of time in the hospital. The regular visits of the Bible Woman are eagerly looked forward to and much appreciated by them.

Not the least interesting part of our work among such is the Prayer Circle, whereby, when any special case comes under our notice, the facts of the case have simply to be mentioned and there will be continuous and earnest prayer ascending to the Throne of Grace. The youngest member of our Prayer Circle during the year was a boy of twelve, who with another, a good Christian lady, pleaded daily with the Lord for four people who were seeking Jesus. The lady was removed to her home, the little boy went home to God, but both had the joy of knowing that the four people left the hospital rejoicing in their Risen Lord. That God may bless the work more abundantly during the New Year is our earnest prayer.

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REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR AGENTS.

(A)—THE DISTRICT SECRETARY.

1. The District Secretary is charged with the oversight of the various Branches, Depositories and Agencies of this Auxiliary.
2. He has to make periodical visits, once a year, if practicable, to the Branches, for the purpose, in conjunction with the Office-Bearers of the same, of holding public services, at which services special information touching the operations of the Parent Society and of this Auxiliary is given by him ; and any necessary public business between the Branches and this Auxiliary is despatched. On such occasions he is also expected, in such ways as he may deem proper, to encourage and stimulate the people to greater zeal and effort in the work of Bible circulation.
3. He has to make annual visits to the several Depositories and Agencies connected with this Auxiliary, for the purpose of inspecting the books or stock therein contained, and of taking account of the same with the Depositories.
4. He is authorized to receive, and to give receipt for the same, any moneys due to this Auxiliary on purchase account, or offered as free contributions.
5. He may take orders for supplies of Scriptures, should such be tendered him.
6. All receipts of money and orders for Scriptures are to be duly recorded by him, and reported to the General Agent.
7. Timely notice must be given by him to the General Agent of his intended visits to Branches or Agencies, in order to the preparation by the latter of the necessary statement of accounts for stock-taking and settlement with the Depositories.
8. Any omissions or discrepancies that may be found in the statement so furnished and the books of the Depositories must be reported in writing to the General Agent, with a view to the immediate rectification of the same.
9. A monthly Report is to be prepared and sent by him to the General Committee of the Branches and Depositories visited by him, of the public services held, and of moneys received, and also of colportage operations, should these in his judgment call for special notice.
10. He is charged with the preparation of an Annual Report to the Committee, giving an account of the work and condition during the year, of the various Branches, Depositories or Agencies that are comprised within the Society's field of operation ; and also with

preparation for publication in the Society's Annual Report, of the list of Branches, etc., with their Office-Bearers, together with the Subscription Lists of the same.

11. New Branches or Depositories may be organized or opened by him in or for such districts as may be found desirable to occupy as new centres of operation.

(B)—THE GENERAL AGENT.

1. The General Agent is charged with the management of the business of the Society, as conducted in and from the Bible House of Montreal.

2. He has under his care the stock of Scriptures and other property belonging to the Society in the Bible House, and is held responsible for the safe keeping and good condition of the same.

3. It is his province to attend to the retail sales of Bibles at the Bible House, and to keep account of same.

4. A Monthly Report must be prepared by him and submitted to the General Committee at its regular Monthly Meeting of :—(a) the condition and amount of stock on hand, or required ; of the number of copies sold during the month at the Bible House, with an account of cash received for the same, together with a statement of the same items in the corresponding month in the previous year ; of the state of account between this Auxiliary and the Parent Society, or other parties ; of applications for grants of Scripture ; and, generally, of any other matters he may deem of importance to bring under the notice of the Committee. (b) Of receipts and disbursements made at the Bible House during the month.

5. Special Reports may be called for from him by the General Committee or any of the Sub-Committees.

6. Notices of all Meetings, whether of the General Committee or of the Sub-Committees, are issued by him ; and he has charge of the place of meeting of the same.

7. On the receipt from the District Secretary of the programme of his intended visits to the Branches or Depositories, the General Agent is required to furnish him with the accounts of the several Branches set down on the programme, at least one week previous to his, the District Secretary's, departure on his tour of visitation, in order that time may be afforded for examination of these accounts by both Agents together if found necessary.

8. Copies of the Monthly Report and of the Abstract of the Annual Report of the Parent Society, as also copies of all other publications sent to the General Agent, which may contain information useful to the District Secretary in his visits among the Branches, are to be promptly and regularly sent forth from the Bible House to such places as he, the District Secretary, may designate.

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9. All mistakes, omissions, or irregularities that may be reported by the District Secretary, as existing in the books or statements or accounts appertaining to any Branch or Depository, are required to be placed on file and promptly attended to ; and such file may be called for at any meeting of the General Committee or Agency Committee.

10. Orders for supplies of Scriptures from the Branches, the District Secretary or Colporteurs are to be carefully entered and promptly executed ; and in case of any unavoidable delay occurring of the kind of books ordered not being in stock, notification of the same must at once be made to the persons sending the order, and further instruction sought from them.

11. An account current with each Colporteur employed by the Society is required to be kept of all books sent to his order, of cash received from him, of time spent in the service of this Society reported by him, and of payments on account of stipend made to him.

12. The General Agent has to prepare for the Corresponding Secretary all statistics or other details appertaining to the department of the General Agent that may be called for in the preparation of the Annual Report of the Society or of any Special Report.

13. On the publication of the Annual Report, the General Agent is required to distribute, without unnecessary delay, copies of the same to subscribers entitled to receive them, both in the city and country districts.

14. The General Agent has the oversight of such Assistant or Assistants as may, with the sanction of the Committee, be employed in the Bible House.

RULES RECOMMENDED FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES AND BIBLE ASSOCIATIONS.

The following Constitution of a Branch Society and Bible Association is inserted for the purpose of facilitating the formation of those useful institutions. Persons in the country are particularly invited to form themselves into Auxiliary Societies. Besides discharging the duty of assisting in disseminating the Word of God (which is incumbent on every Christian) they would consult their private advantage, and thereby be enabled to obtain Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, whereas at present they purchase from country merchants at a higher rate.

1. That the object and Constitution of the British and Foreign Bible Society have the cordial approbation of this meeting.

2. That a society be formed to be called "The Branch Bible Society, for the purpose of co-operating with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Montreal

Auxiliary Bible Society, in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scripture, both at home and abroad.

3. That, conformably to the principles of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by the Society shall be without note or comment, and those in the language of the United Kingdom of the authorized version only.

4. That all persons subscribing one dollar per annum or upwards, or ten dollars or upwards at one time, shall be members of this Society.

5. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries and a Committee consisting of not less than three other members; and that three members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

6. That every clergyman or other minister who is a member of the Society shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meeting of the Committee.

7. That the Committee shall meet once a quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

8. That the Committee divide this neighborhood into districts, and appoint collectors for each district, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations and collecting the annual fees of the members.

9. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be remitted yearly, after deducting incidental expenses, to the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal, on condition of the Society granting to this the same privileges which the Parent Institution grants, in such cases, to the Auxiliary Societies.

10. That the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within the several districts, are in want of Bibles or Testaments, and unable to procure them; and that it will be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced prices, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

11. That a general meeting of the subscribers be held at _____ in the month of _____ each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee elected.

12. That these resolutions be published in such a manner as the Committee may direct; and a copy of them, signed by the chairman, transmitted to the President of the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal.

NOTE.—Branches or Depositories selling Scriptures on credit, do so at their own risk and responsibility, as it is contrary to the rules of the Society. There is no need for it, as other provision is made for the poor.
