Royal Canadian Academy

Report for the Year 1899

HE Academy, during the past year, has to record with deep regret the death of one of its earliest and most distinguished members, L. R. O'Brien, R.C.A. His occupation of the Presidency at the time of the Academy's foundation and for many years after, and his constant and deep interest in its welfare, are too well known to the members to make comment necessary here.

At the Annual General Meeting the vacancy declared for an Academician was filled by the election of F. S. Challener, painter, of The voting on the names of those proposed as Associates resulted in the election of Maurice Cullen, painter, of Montreal.

At the General Meeting also the final revision of the Constitution was confirmed.

C. J. Way, R.C.A., having returned to Canada, has been placed on the list of Active Academicians by the Council.

The Annual Exhibition was held in Montreal in the galleries of the Art Association, arrangements having been made with that body It was opened on the evening of the 7th of as in previous years. April by His Excellency, the Governor-General, who, with Her Excellency, came from Ottawa to be present. The number of works exhibited was as follows: 151 oil; 109 water-colors, pastel, archi-The attendance was tectural and other drawings; sculpture 1. The exhibition appears to have been generally considered 4,040. as one of the best yet held by the Academy.

The grants placed at the disposal of the Resident Academicians for disbursement in supporting Free Life Classes have been made as heretofore, where reports and audited accounts have been sent in to the Council.

It will be remembered that during the previous year a Memorial was presented to the Dominion Government inviting attention to several matters of importance in the field of Art, prominent amongst which was that of representation of Canadian Art in the coming Paris International Exhibition, the other subjects being an increased grant to the Academy with the object of permitting it to extend the scope of its usefulness as to holding exhibitions, etc., and the foundation of Art Scholarships. Some months ago the Committee placed in charge of this business by the Council had an interview with the Premier on these subjects and also on other questions on which the Academy, in conjunction with the Ontario Society of Artists and the Art Association of Montreal, had approached the Government, namely, Art lotteries as then permitted by law and a specific duty on pictures. To leave the Members of the Academy to infer that the not inconsiderable time and trouble which have been thus taken in endeavoring to obtain from the Government any consideration of the claims of Art in Canada, have so far been fruitful of any result, would be to create a wrong impression.

With regard to the Paris Exhibition, the surprise which those interested in Canadian Art will feel and the disappointment of Artists that no representation is attempted, warrant a statement of the whole case here.

The Memorial presented considerably over a year ago to the Government embodied amongst other matters a request that application might be made in good time for space for a representation of Canadian Art in the Paris Exhibition, and it was pointed out that if this were not done early, difficulties would be likely to arise. As the urgency of the case was thus dwelt on in the Memorial, it was inferred after the acknowledgment of its receipt that something would be done, or that at least we should have been informed if no action were taken. To the surprise of the Committee, on going to Ottawa by appointment, it was found that nothing had even been attempted. After learning that a regulation of the Exhibition authorities prevented any Colony exhibiting as such in the building devoted to the Fine Arts, we requested the Government to make immediate application to the English Fine Art Commission to grant us a part of In case of the failure of this applithe space allotted to the Empire. cation, the Minister asked whether we would care to make an exhibit in the ordinary Canadian section. This we assured him the Academy would not do, considering that it would be better for Canadian artists not to exhibit at all than to do so elsewhere than in the Fine Art building. In this the members of the Committee feel sure that the self-respect of the Academy and of every Canadian artist of repute will uphold them. Application was then made by the Govern-The replies ment to the English Fine Art Commission for space. were that the space granted to it being altogether inadequate (and indeed it seemed to be absurdly so), no concession could be made, that the Fine Art Commission had decided to confine its operations to the Art of the United Kingdom, and that it was not possible to devote any portion of the space to Colonial works of Art. Thus the matter stands. Our hard position is evident. Debarred from exhibiting by the authorities of the Exhibition because we belong to a Colony, and should by their regulations exhibit as part of the Empire ; by the Empire we are also shut out from any share of the space allotted to it because we belong to a Colony.

The next Annual Exhibition will be held in Ottawa, and will be opened on the fifteenth of February. The Council decided on this as the best date, for though inconveniently early in some respects, it interfered least with the wishes of the Art Societies in Montreal and Toronto to hold their exhibitions in March. To arrange a date perfectly satisfactory to all when Exhibitions in the three cities come in the same year, appears to be impossible.

Attention may be here called to the fact that owing to the unusually small hanging space available, the Exhibition being this year in Ottawa, the Council trusts artists will see the necessity of limiting their contributions accordingly, otherwise disappointment is sure to occur. This need not be to the detriment of the Exhibition if there is a general inclination to substitute quality for quantity and size in the works sent in.
