THE SUN AND THE EARTH.—The foundations of the Earth have been laid with consummate wisdom, at such a distance from the source of light and heat as is exactly suited to the organized forms upon its surface. If much nearer or more remote, animals and plants would perish, without some change of constitution, owing to increased heat or cold; and the blaze of light would be insufferable, or its amount too small to serve the purposes of vision.

It is obvious that a body must be of stupendous size to form such a conspicuous circle in the heavens as the sun, while at the distance of nearly a hundred millions of miles from us. The Sun's diameter is not less than 882,000 miles, or rather more than one hundred and eleven times the diameter of the Earth. It is difficult to conceive aright of this enormous magnitude; but it may be illustrated by the statement that the solar globe would fill up the entire orbit of the Moon, and stretch beyond it more than two hundred thousand miles in every direction. Were the sun a hollow sphere perforated by a thousand openings, to admit the twinkling of a luminous atmosphere without, then a globe as large as our own might be placed at the centre, with a satellite as large as the Moon, and at the same distance from it as she is from the Earth, and there would be present to the eye of the spectator on the interior globe a universe as extensive as the whole creation was conceived to be in the infancy of astronomy, and as splendid as the heavens appear at present to the uninstructed gazer. Supposing the Earth to be represented by a ball of one inch in diameter, another of 9 feet 4 inches would represent the size of the Sun. The loftiest of the Earth's mountains, one of the Himalayas, rises to the height of 29,000 feet; and for a mountain to rise upon the solar surface, bearing the same proportion to the solar diameter as the Himalaya peak to the terrestrial, it would require to have an altitude of nearly 600 miles.

The great orb has a circumference of 2,646,000 miles, in comparison with which, that of our own globe, twenty five thousand miles, is quite insignificant. If it were possible for a railway carriage to go round the Earth at the rate of thirty miles an hour, the journey would be accomplished in five weeks, travelling day and night; but a similar journey would require upwards of ten years on the surface of the Sun. The solar volume or bulk is 1,400,000 times greater than that of the Earth; and exceeds five hundred times the aggregate bulk of all the bodies of the planetary system. In other words, one million four hundred thousand earths must be rolled together, and the united volumes of all the planets and satellites be multiplied five hundred times, in order to form a body of equal size to the one Sun. The quantities here given afford an overpowering view of magnitude.

THE METEORIC SHOWER of November, 1866, which was so brilliant in Europe, and so insignificant or invisible in America, has led two eminent astronomers in Paris and Milan to form the same conclusions—each from his own observations and calculations. They agree in ascribing these meteors to one or more vast nebulous masses, moving in very elliptical orbits, which bring them at long regular intervals within the earth's attraction and the oxidizing and igniting influence of the atmosphere. Le Verrier judges that their orbit extends as far at least as to the orbit of Uranus; and both astronomers fix their period of revolution at $33\frac{1}{2}$ years. The orbit of the November meteors nearly coincides with that of Temple's comet, the first of 1866; while the August meteors have an orbit almost identical with that of the great comet of 1862

A Transit of Mercury over the Sun's disc will occur November 5. invisible in P. E. Island.

INTEMPERANCE AND CHEAP WINE.—Rev. E. S. Lacy of California, who favored the introduction of the wine culture in California as a means of abating the vice of intemperance, after spending six months in a country place in Switzerland among the vineyards, where cheap and pure wine is the common beverage, says there was more intoxication there than in any place where he had lived. Intelligent Germans informed him that this was the great social evil of their country, where wine is never adulterated, and where great quantities of it are drunk.

It takes a heap of wood to keep the pot boiling in this blustering weather; and then, you know, you can't afford to leave off work in summer to go and haul wood. Why not keep a year's stock of it on hand, and under cover? It's a shiftless way to get along from hand to mouth, as some farmers do, in this matter of the wood-pile. A good wood-shed pays, and it pays to keep it well filled. There are the chores, too, about the barn. Stock must be kept warm, and fed regularly, that is, at fixed hours, if you would have it thrive. It

depends almost as much on the manner of feeding as on the food itself. Some farmers are very careless about this, and feed just when it happens. That won't do. It keeps the cows in a constant worry. It is better to feed well, say three times a day, at regular hours, and then leave them quiet to chew the cud. How is it about that compost heap? Did you think to lay in a lot of muck or dry loam in a corner of the barn cellar last fall? It's a pity if you didn't, for you might just as well begin the biggest kind of a pile now, when you have time to fork it over, and do it well. There are the scrapings along the road, there is loam enough and peat muck, there are the old turfs along the walls and headlands that ought to be dug away, and they all work into the compost heap and make good manure.

SEWING MACHINES.—The inventor of the first Sewing Machine, Elias Howe, jr. began to study the matter in 1840, and to work constantly to put his ideas into a working model in 1844. The first machine completed in 1845, is still preserved, and works as well tho' not so fast, as the latest and most improved machines. With all his efforts, however, years passed before he could sell a single machine; in nine years—years of hardship, poverty, and trials innumerable—it began to yield him a subsistence. Now, the invention yields him a fortune every year. It is doing the work of millions of hands, and its benefits are enjoyed by every civilized country of the globe. Some 300 sewing machines, it is estimated, are now made in the United States every working day of the year—the fruits of a suggestion lodged in an American mechanic's mind, patiently elaborated for months in a garret, and heroically clung to for years, till the world was compelled to appreciate it.

It is time to be getting ready for spring work. It will soon be upon us with all its hurry, and it will be awkward to stop to mend a plough, to fix a hoe handle, or haul up a load of fire-wood. Paint over and oil up the carts and waggons. Is't there a missing tooth in that harrow? There's a gate that seems to sag, and a loose board in that fence. I hope the team is in good working order. Won't those horses bear a little more feed? It won't hurt them to go into the woods; now and then a day's work will fit them for hard labor

in Spring. There's a harness that looks as if it hadn't been cleaned and oiled up for six months. Now is the time to look after these little odds and ends. You know how to find the caterpillar's eggs, I hope. Just look around the trees near the ends of the small branches, and you'll see little round bracelets of eggs, clustered regularly around the twig. Cut them off and burn them. Look up against a clear sky, and they are plainly enough to be seen. By the last of April they'll be crawling worms, unless you nip them in the bud. Are you going to lay down any of the lots? Now is a good time to look after good seed and have it ready.

SIRIUS, OR THE DOG-STAR.—Astronomers are observing this brilliant star from year to year with close interest, to discover whether Mr. Clarke's "companion-star" is actually a neighbor of Sirius, a star or perhaps a planet revolving around Sirius—or a star very remote beyond Sirius, though to us appearing so near it. Mr. Goldschmidt claims to have detected five other minute stars, bearing the same relation to Sirius. The question of the possibility of detecting planets revolving around some of the stars is one of intense interest; but nothing can yet be decided respecting it in the case of Sirius.

PNEUMATIC RAILWAYS are proving successful, conveying letters and merchandize with great celerity and cheapness, and with perfect security—for collisions are impossible, and the cars cannot run off the track. The Pneumatic Dispatch Company of London has been carrying mails and parcels for three or four years, and has proved that passengers also can be safely conveyed.

BETTER clean out that cellar, and not leave that job to bother in ploughing time. Go over and pick up all loose stones on the mowing lots. If you take along a crowbar you can get out many a half-tight rock that will be sure to dull the scythe or the knives of the mowing-machine. It is strange how some folks neglect these rocks and mow over them year after year, when a half hour's work

would lay them out high and dry, or sink them beneath the reach of the plough. I can't bear to see a piece badly laid down. It makes more work than a little. I want to see it in a mellow condition, thoroughly ploughed and harrowed, and then carefully rolled, and the stones picked and carted off. Bear in mind that it may lie there as you leave it for some years, till its turn comes for another scratching; and you've got to run the risk of battering the scythe year after year. 'Twon't pay. I've seen a mowing-machine broken so as to cost five dollars to mend, to say nothing of the delay, by a stone that might have been got out in five minutes. Have your newly seeded lands got winter-killed here and there? Just go over such patches with a harrow, and a little more grass and clover seed. Hurry up the spring work.

HEIGHT OF THE ATMOSPHERE.—Observations on several bright auroras in 1865, occurring at a very early morning hour, led to the belief that these phenomena in the upper air were modified by the light of the rising sun tinging them long before it came near the earth's surface. Yet these auroras, as well as the incandescence of aerolites or shooting-stars, occur, as repeated observations prove, at heights varying from a few miles above us up to 100 or more; and as they are all believed to prove the presence of an atmosphere where they occur, they appear to prove that too low a limit has been fixed for the earth's atmosphere—which is commonly regarded as terminating at the height of about fifty miles. The mean altitude of the shooting-stars of Nov. 13, 1863, observed at Washington, Philadelphia, &c., was 92 miles. Prof. Newton thinks that none have been observed at a greater height than 125 or 150 miles.

UP early and down late. There's plenty to do in this busy month. Have you finished sowing the spring grains? Barley and oats, you know, ought to be in as soon as the ground is ready, and the earlier potatoes are in the ground the better; but, in many places, the ground is not fit for them till May. Other roots ought to go in now, if they are not yet sown. Carrots must have land clear of

weeds, mellow and rich; and the sooner they are sown, now, the better. Parsnips ought to have gone in last month; but, if you failed to get them in, try them now. As for mangolds and rutabagas, they'll do if sown next month. A cellar full of roots is worth a pile of money, for the cows and oxen, the horses and the sheep, in winter. Corn, too, must go into the ground this month; it wants rich or well-manured land, and clean cultivation. The best way to guard against the crows is to tar the seed. Dash hot water on a peck or half bushel of corn, and drain off quickly; then pour on a pint of hot tar, and every kernel will be thinly coated over, when it may be dusted over with lime or plaster, or ashes, and then planted. A little Pacific guano, or a little poudrette from the henery, in the hill, will give it an early start. Kill the caterpillars.

EUROPEAN ARMIES.—Could an arrangement be effected between the governments of Europe to dismiss one half of their military force, nearly two millions of men would be at once transferred from the consuming to the productive class; and over \$300,000,000 removed from the burdens of European taxpayers—a sum which would suffice to add over 6,000 miles to the existing railroad tracks, and to establish a free school in every country commune. Such a disarmament is powerfully urged by the example of the United States, which many of the best foreign statesmen enthusiastically commend.

PETROLEUM AS A FUEL.—Boilers have been prepared for the generation of steam by petroleum, and the experiments in its use are reported as resulting so favorably as to suggest the probability that this substance will be largely used instead of coal for steamers, especially on long voyages.

CLEARING UP.—It is to be taken for granted that however late the season, the manure has been hauled out, and, except small quantities of rich compost for especial purposes, or the recent accumulations of fertilizing materials, the barn yards and manure sheds are quite cleaned out. Barns ought long ago to have been swept and cleaned of hay-seed and litter of all kinds; Old hay and

straw compactly packed at one side, yet conveniently come-at-able, and and the whole establishment put in order for the coming crops. If this has not been done, do it the first rainy day.

CATTLE STALLS, COWBYERS, AND CALF PENS are empty now, for the most part, and it is a good time, and good wet weather work to lift the floors, renewing them, cleaning and drying the beams and sills, painting those parts where wood becomes moistened by manure, when quite dry, with hot coal tar, sanding thoroughly before relaying the floors. Make gutters at the same time to carry off the liquids. These should be one part cement and three of good, sharp, clean sand. The more time cement gutters, floors or walls have to harden before frost, the better.

PASTURES.—Look to the water supply in pastures. Nothing dries up the fountains of milk like a lack of water. See also that the grass is not fed off too close, for any rain may be the last for some weeks, and then permanent damage would be sustained by over-stocked land.

MOWING LAND.—Early in the month it is usually well to go thro' the meadows and pastures, and pull or cut up with a spud the rankest of the weeds, or those most damaging to the grass and hay.

ANCIENT MASONRY.—A recent traveller in Egypt, in speaking of the immense size of the pyramids, says that the great pyramid of Cheops, covering more than twelve acres of land, and rising nearly 450 feet, contains 85,000,000 cubic feet of stone; enough to fence in 3,500 farms of 160 acres each, or enough to build over 37,000 houses, 30 by 40 feet: so that this single monstrous tomb would furnish building stone sufficient for comfortably housing the population of Boston, or four times that of this Island.

CLOVER, if cut early when just coming into blossom, and given a light dressing of plaster, or of any fine compost, will, if the stools are strong, make a vigorous second growth, and ripen a paying crop of seed. Every Farmer might raise his own clover seed in most parts of the country.

WEEDS.—Suffer none to go to seed, is easily written, but very hard to carry out. Still, the nearer we can live up to this injunction, the easier will it be to carry it out, year after year. Many weeds, pulled or cut up in blossom, will ripen and seed while dying, but few, the seeds of which are not fully mature, will survive the hog pen, in root or seed. It is never too late to pull docks in the mowing. Canada thistles, cut a few times below the surface, will disappear.

SHEEP are distressed by the gad fly this month and next, and should be protected by tarring their noses, extending up, where they will not rub it off in feeding. The fly lays eggs in the nostrils, which hatch, and, the worms ascending, cause the "grub in the head."

GRASS AND CLOVER.—If the object in bringing any field under the plough is to get it in good grass

again, it is often best to sow the seed by itself as soon as the land is in proper condition. Grain detracts from the subsequent grass crops. Timothy may be sown by itself in August or September. Use an abundance of seed, bush it and roll it in, with a light dressing of ashes, guano, or fine compost. Clover may also be sown now, but spring sowing is usually preferred. Roll clover seed in gypsum, and sow both together or separately; one ton to ten acres is the common rule.

SEED GRAIN.—The selection should be made at harvest time, when the best grain is allowed to get fully ripe before cutting. If this is not done, select at once the sheaves, have them thrashed, and cull out the best kernels by repeated winnowings.

MILCH COWS need regular feeding with some green fodder as the pastures get dry; yarded and thus fed in the evening, the gain in manure, to say nothing of the milk, pays well for the trouble.

WOUNDS upon animals, at this season of flies and quick putrefaction, need the most prompt attention. We know of no better application than hot pine tar, (not hot enough to burn.) It may be put on alone, or as a plaster upon a piece of cotton cloth. Look especially to the heads of rams.

MINUTE DIVISION OF PARTICLES.—A drop of water will take a perceptible blue tint from one millionth of a grain of indigo. Sea water contains silver only in the proportion of one part of silver to every 100,000,000 parts of water; and yet its presence is proved by chemical tests. A grain of gold may be divided into 95,000,000,000 parts, each visible under a microscope. Iron has been rolled into sheets so thin that it would require 200 of the sheets to make the thickness of note-paper.

ANIMALS, in general, need little care, except good pasturage or feeding. Fattening Bullocks that are to be finished off for the autumn trade, need a gradual increase of grain, as the weather grows cooler.

Sheep, also, that are to be sold, should be separated from others, and fed a little grain. Examine any that it may be necessary to have in moist pastures to check the very first appearance of foot rot. Shelter all during storms, and give access to water and salt. Swine, to be fattened this fall, will do much better if fed a little ground grain now while at grass, or being kept on thin swill, as is usual.

COWS AND BUTTER.—Fall Butter may be nearly as good as that made in June. As the pastures fail, feed a little grain, with turnips.

ROOT CROPS.—All kinds of root crops having become well established and full of leaf, keep on growing until freezing weather, and often swell with prodigious rapidity, as the season becomes moister and cooler. Keep the weeds down, and the ground open and loose, and pull for cow feed wherever they stand too thick.

THERE is a greater variety of labors to employ farmers in September than perhaps in any other month. We have manuring, plowing, sowing—if winter wheat is grown—harvesting, thrashing, feeding, marketing, all upon us at once, yet the labors are seldom pressing and of an anxious kind, except perhaps a little anxiety in regard to early frosts.

THE BLUE COLOR OF THE SKY is owing to the moisture in the atmosphere, this aqueous vapor partially absorbing the red and yellow tints of sunlight, and leaving the blue rays to be transmitted to us.

FATTENING ANIMALS of all kinds lay on flesh very rapidly as the weather grows cooler. Keep beeves and sheep in pasture as long as the feed is good, but yard them at night, and feed twice a day with grain, if they are to be marketed soon; otherwise simply feed so as to be sure they are constantly gaining. Pigs should have cooked food, and plenty of it. Push forward their fattening as rapidly as possible, for at no season will they gain faster. Keep them clean and give warm sheltered nests. Poultry also gain very rapidly, and it is best to fatten them on scalded meal, with wheat screenings, and other food in addition, at daylight in the morning, and late in the afternoon.

ROOTS. — Beets, mangolds and carrots, may be dug as soon as the tops show that there is no longer vigorous growth; at all events, before severe freezing. Preserve in cellars after topping, drying, and laying in heaps, protected by the tops or bagging, a few days, to sweat. If not stored in cellars put them in dry trenches covered with straw, and banked over with earth. Cabbages may be preserved in the same way. Rutabagas and turnips may stand out longer, but not until the ground freezes. The tops of all these roots are worth feeding to stock.

BUILDINGS. — Certain repairs ought to be done before frost, such as require work upon walls, brick laying or plastering. If such work is not greatly needed for the comfort of the family or one's stock, we advise delaying until spring, for it will be rare good luck if it has not all to be done over next season. Done after this month it will hardly stand at all.

ANIMALS—Keep them always im-
proving. Comfort for the animal is
money in the purse of the proprie-
tor. Take them up early for the
animals' sake, for the pastures' sake,
and for their manure. Provide
warm, sunny sheds for young cattle,
close sheds or boxes for colts, open
but warm sheds for sheep, where
they can have the range of a dry
yard.

BARNs AND STABLES.—A clap-
board loose or gone, or a great crack
under the door, lets in the cold, and
the horse or cow must have more
fuel for the fire within the body to
counteract the cold from without.
Pure air is essential, but let it not
come in chilling currents upon man
or beast. With ventilators above
for the escape of bad air, there will
generally be enough good air steal-
ing in almost insensibly through
the seams and crevices; if not, ad-
mit it from some point where it will
not blow directly upon the animals.
Every stable should have one glazed
window, and better several.

HORSES need clean, well ventilated
and well lighted quarters. They
are fastidious in regard to food and
drink. The nervous, high-strung
nature, which gives the horse his
energy, endurance, spirit, and docil-
ity, cannot be maintained without
constant and judicious care. Young
and old horses should be brushed
clean or curried daily, blanketed in
cold weather, using light woollen
blankets in-doors and warm gener-
ous ones after exercise and out of
doors, especially if exposed, even for
a few minutes, to wind, or cold
drafts of air. These blankets should
cover neck, breasts, and flank well.
No animal takes so quickly the tem-
per of his master or driver, as the
horse; so be firm and gentle with
him.

FEEDING RACKS AND TROUGHs
should be substantial, sheltered, un-
der roof if possible, always kept
clean.

Cows in our climate and in the system of farming usually followed, are during the winter in a delicate condition: early preparation should be made so that an injured or sick cow may be removed from the rest to the hospital (a box-stall in an adjacent apartment). This is best even for slight injuries, for a cow may

unexpectedly slink her calf and others "follow suit." Throw earth on slippery paths about the water-trough in freezing weather. Milk young Cows to within five weeks of calving, to fix a long milking habit. Feed generously, for not only the size and character of the calf is affected, but the amount of milk during the entire season following.

MANURES.—It is best to keep manure under cover and enclosed, so that a slow fermentation will be constantly going on. Too active fermentation is very injurious; it may be checked by packing it very close by the treading of animals, spreading level and keeping hogs upon it, or working it over. The latter secures an evenness of fermentation, while it prevents burning or fire-fang.

FRUIT either in the fruit-room or cellar should be kept at as low and uniform a temperature as practicable, without freezing.

ACCOUNTS.—The present is of all times in the year the best to establish a thorough method of farm accounts. Mature a simple, easy and accurate plan, and between this and the 1st of January, old accounts may be at least got out of the way, so that their settlement need not interfere with taking a new start with the New Year. Well kept farm memorandums and accounts will be a source of no small actual profit, besides settling facts, proving dates, preventing prosecutions and lawsuits, and oiling the machinery of social life. Book-keeping is a simple art, though generally made a mystery.

FARMERS' CLUBS.—He who neglects opportunities to meet and talk over agricultural matters with his brother farmers, loses much. See to it if possible, that there is some regular neighborhood meeting of farmers, and their wives and adult children, to secure improvement in farming and kindred things.

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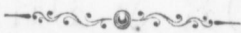
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
