New York, Aug. 19—Lewis Morrison, an actor, whose work as Mephisto in Faust gained him fame, died suddenly of shock on Saturday afternoon in St. Johns Hospital, Yonkers, after undergoing an operation for stomach trouble. Mr. Morrison was 61 years of age. He was born of English parentage in Kingston, Jamaica, in 1845. He came to this country at an early age and enlisted on the Union side in the civil war. He rose to the rank of lieutenant and on his honorable discharge at the close of the war he received the rank of captain for distinguished service. During the siege of Vicksburg he swam the Mississippi under fire of the batteries with dispatches for the Federal army.





and a number of persons were killed or injured. The towns of Rengo, San Fernando, Quillotta and San Antonio, and many villages are in ruins. All railway service in the central zone is either interrupted entirely or greatly delayed, and commerce is practically at a standstill.

In the city of Santiago much damage was done. Many public buildings were practically destroyed, and several churches were dismantled. The buildings of congress, the municipal buildings, the Normal School, the courts, the Peruvian legation, the residence of President Risco, the central market, the prefecture of police and the national telegraph offices were all seriouscly damaged. The lines of the electric tramway system and the electric light wires were short circuited, interrupting street car travel and plunging the city into darkness.

The scenes at the hospitals and prisons during the excitement were distressing in the extreme. The prisoners tried to escape, and prison guards were obliged to fire in the air in order to intimidate and quiet their panic-stricken charges. There have ben several return shocks of slight intensity. These shocks have served to continue the public alarm. The astronomical observatory, however, has given out a statement to the effect that it does not appear to be likely to be a continuation of the severe shocks.
