

### ANNOUNCING THE NEW LOANS

How President Harriman Led up to His Request for \$103,-000,000---When the Climax Was Reached.

A summary of the mass of statistics given out by President Harriman of the Union Pacific-Southern Pacific system on Thursday in connection with the proposed financing of those two companies shows that his announcement had been carefully planned. It was first pointed out that the Southern Pacific's estimated surplus for dividends this year was \$25,763,000, against \$19,192,647 for 1906. While the Union Pacific will show \$36,324,000 for 1907, against \$31,764,674 for 1906. The figures showed that in 3 years the balance for dividends on the Union-Pacific increased \$19,726,000, and the surplus after dividends \$4,060,000, whereas Southern Pacific had earned an additional \$16,890,000 for its stock and \$13,107,000 after payment of dividends. That statement in itself reflected to a remarkable degree the prosflected to a remarkable degree the pro-perity secured by the system; also the far ing for a constantly increasing volume

After mentioning the increase in earnings, President Harriman then stated that the book value of unpledged assets owned by the Union Pacific amounted to \$243, 000,000. The Southern Pacific showed assets of \$140,668,000, against which no securities had been issued. Such remarks were suggestive of what was coming, and suspicious as to the object of the interview were strengthened by the next state-ment that the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific had floating debts of \$63,-683,000 and \$32,000,000, respectively, ac-




