

THE Times-Star was officially informed last night that the Canadian International Paper Company had purchased timber limits aggregating 490 square miles from the Chaleur Bay Mills

#### QUEBEC MAN FACES TRIAL FOR MURDER

Committed by Magistrate a Three Rivers in Death of Daughter

THREE RIVERS, Que., Aug. 31—Alexandre Lavallee, of St. Etienne Des Gres, was committed for trial yesterday on the charge of murdering his daughter, Rose Anne Lavalee Vaudreuil, on August 14. He was committed here by District Magistrate F. X. Lacoursied and will appear at the next sitting of the assizes at Three Rivers in March. Lavallee is 72 years of age.

Evidence at the inquest into the death of Rose Vaudreuil and at the preliminary hearing into the charge against her father was to the effect that the woman had been brutally murdered in her room after a fierce fight for life. Witnesses testified that there were blood spots on Lavallee after his announcement that his daughter had been found dead. THE INTERPROVINCIAL ASPECT

"As I have already said, I do not look upon the exhibition as catering to only the city of Saint John, but as catering to the whole of the Maritime Provinces. 

Of course the most important barometer indicating good or bad times is the crop yield, with market conditions affecting its disposal. Last year was a good one for the farmer, and the prospects this year are excellent. The crops are flourishing, and market conditions appear to be favorable. When the farmer has the produce and can sell to advantage the result is better business for the merchant and manufacturer. It is a matter of regret that the lumber industry, which has meant so much to the province in former years, does not improve. The obvious remedy is to get on with the work of turning the forest product into paper.


The fisheries of the province have been yielding fairly well, and particularly well in some cases. This great field is not exploited beyond the fringe of its capacity, but some progress is being made. Better means of getting fresh fish to market, and more attention to the trade in dried fish, will improve this industry.

A most satisfactory development is the increased interest in turning out standard dairy products, such as will hold their own in any market. Real progress is being made, if still rather slowly, in this direction. The like is true in regard to live-stock, poultry and egg production. A speeding up of the activities of the agricultural department of the province is recognized as good business.

When we speak of immigration, there a little to be said except that a numer of good settlers have been placed luring the last year, and assurances ave been given that in future a reater effort will be made to secure or the Maritimes a portion of the tide that has been flowing west.





THERE is something pathetic about the decay of a great industry, which in a sense has been a part of the life-blood of a community.

Not least of the troubles Saint John has had to face, and indeed is facing today, is the decline of the saw-mill industry. Ere long not a wheel will thru in a sawmill of the kind that flourished here, and of which 30 years ago there were more than a dozen in and close to the city, giving employment to thousands of men in the woods, on the streams, in the mills and along the harbor front.

The day when sailing ships lay tier upon tier, side by side, and the later day when 10 or 12 tramp steamers might be seen in the stream, hesides sailing vessels at the wharves, all taking lumber cargoes, are now forever a memory. Those for whom the industry ment work and wages, homes and comfort, have been forced to seek other avocations, or follow the mills and the traffic to other places.

AT INDIANTOWN

Nowhere is one more impressed by the changed conditions than at Indiantown. Straight across the basin the grass is green on the site of the old Jordan mill and its yards; and while the Moore mill still stands in good condition, there is not a stick of lumber in the yards, or a log in the booms. The wharves beside these mills, where schooners formerly lay taking cargo all through the season, are utterly bare.

Farther down the basin the old Miller and Woodman mill is gone, and the great Cushing mill. Through the Narrows. On the Strait Shore, below the bridges, were the Warner, Hamilton and Hillyard mills; and on the opposite shore the Clark, Purvis and Dunn mills. Not a wheel is turning on those shores today.

The old raftsman already quoted had something to say about the difference between the logs of the former days and those of today. He recalled a tree taken to the old Cushing mill that made a thousand feet of lumber, and a pine log that rose nearly to his chin when he stood at its base. In those days a million feet of logs was only a bite for the clamorous teeth of the saws, and the lumber turned out was worthy of the name.
