ONDON, May 8 - In a message printed in the government strike paper, The British Gazette, Lord Oxford and Asquith condemns the strike movement, and says that while a settlement is earnestly desired the anti-social weapon which has been so | unadvisedly drawn must first be sheathed.

The massage reads: "There could be no greater misunderstanding of the attitude of our people at this moment than to suppose it implies any hostility to the right of combination in industry."

"Strikes and lockouts, though they always inflict a certain amount of in-convenience on the public, may be, and often are, in the last resort, justifiable and even necessary.

PLUTOCRATS UNTOUCHED. "But the challenge which has now been thrown down and taken up is of a totally different kind. A general strike such as that which it is being sought to enforce is directly aimed at the daily life of the whole community. The people who suffer least from it are the capitalists and plutocrats. arrived. It is serious, determined, purposeful and well organized. Britain is the real home of trade unionism. In this country it commands a more numerous, better disciplined and more efficiently equipped army than in any other land. Most workers who are engaged in vital trades-all except agriculture and domestic service,-are enrolled in one union or another and obey its orders up and over the brink of hunger, if necessary. Coal mining, transport of all kinds by sea and land, iron and steel and metal industries, printing, textiles—all these industries essential to modern civilization are run by trade union workmen. All the unions have not yet been called out. But those who are engaged in the performance of services which are indispensable to the working of all industrial systems under present conditions are now standing idle at the word of command from the Trade Union Council. Factories and workshops are deserted and millions of workers are making holiday in the streets of our industrial towns. Until the order comes from union headquarters, that is how things will remain. A few trains may be run here and there but for all practical purposes the rails are out of business. The complicated business of signal-ling and shunting cannot be learned and worked by the improvisation of enrolled amateurs-certainly not for months.

The same observation applies to our sca transport. Britain is almost iso- dustrial upheaval last-how long will tated from the outside world. The continental service has been cut off. Food distribution and hospital service are alone privileged. The nation is not to be allowed to work but neither is it—to be permitted to starve. Mr. Crippen's cross-examination by Dr. F. R. Taylor, K.C., was continued immediately after the resumption of the Transel of the Stevens of the Cape Breton coast. She is bound to Sydney in ballast. Evidence in the case of the City of

Questioned as to the total value of the Moneton power equipment the witness estimated it as worth \$423,731 replacement value. He valued the power house and apparatus there as worth more than \$87,500. Among other items were 4,000 service connections worth \$15 each, street lighting equipment, \$5,423, and pole line labor, \$10,828. His companies, he stated, operated systems in United States cities, but this was his first experience as an operator in Canada.

Mr. Kribs said that he regarded the figure of \$423,731 placed on the plant by Mr. Crippen as greatly in excess of its actual value. He would judge the replacement value to be in the vicinity of \$200,000, or allowing for the usual depreciation about \$120,000.

This concluded the evidence. Dr. Taylor, for the City of Moncton, was desirous of proceeding immediately with the argument but after a brief discussion the case was adjourned until June 8.
