I think, however, that most women overdo their duty to their children, and underdo their duty to their husbands. They sacrifice their husbands needlessly and causelessly to their children, which is one of the main reasons why, in the end, so many husbands default on their marriage obligations.

IT GENERALLY begins with the first baby, when a young woman is so anxious to be a good mother, that she forgets that she has any obligation to be a good wife. Before the arrival of the little stranger who is to be her husband's fatal rival she has spent her time catering to her husband. She has dolled herself up so that she may look good to him. She has spent her evenings amusing and entertaining him, and going about with him. She has been lover and comrade. But with the advent of the baby only too often all this is changed. She fits herself get slouchy and sloppy because baby pulls at her clothes and musses her hair. She has no interest in anything but the baby, no con-versation about anything but baby. Wild horses couldn't drag her away from the cradle, and she is frankly relieved when husband goes out by himself of an evening and leaves her to perform her rites of infant wor-min in peace.

Now, these cases, and they are plentiful, of the sacrifice of the father to the child are unnecessary. It does a child no good for a mother to sit and watch it sleep, while her whole happiness and the ultimate welfare of the child depends upon her watching her hus-band and seeing that he does not stray away from his own firebide in search of the societv his wife is too much absorbed to give him. Many a wife forgets that, while she can hire a reliable woman to take care of her children, there is no woman she can trust to take care of her husband, and while she is in the nursery holding little Johnny's hands some vamp is generally holding hands with her husband.

FURTHERMORE, this process of making father a goat for the children does not end with the cradle. It continues. Women justify themselves in shutting up their houses and going away for two or three months at a time in the summer and leaving their húsbands alone in the city by saying that they do it for the children. The children must have country air and coolness and room to play in, and so the mothers, calmly hugging this alibi-to their breasts, go forth to summer hotels with their offspring and then feel themselves grievouslv ill-used because their husbands finally rebel at being sacrificed to the children and console themselves after the fashion of summer widowers.

We all know housesholds in which the husband is the shabbiest member of the family; a person pushed about from place to place, his happiness and pleasure never considered; nothing but a bill payer.

If it comes to a showdown between the two, a woman's duty to her children is greater than it is to her husband, but it is not her duty to sacrifice her husband needlessly to her children. Gener-ally speaking, the better she does her duty to her husband the better she does it to her children. For in that way she keeps her home together, as she does not do when she is so absorbed in her children that she forgets she has a husband at all and leaves him either to grouch over being neglected, or to be stolen by some other woman. He thought that this was a just de-mand on the part of the Maritimes and that it would be recognized as such by any Government having the right policies for the development of the Dominion. J. Starr Tait made the first address.
