Steam Press in 1814.

Steam Press in 1814. The founder tried types containing syllables and entire words, but it was not successful. His son, John the sec-ond, introduced the steam printing press. Experiments with it infuriated the pressmen and printers, who threat-ened to smash the machinery, but on the morning of the 29th of November, 1814, at 6 o'clock, the paper, secretly printed, was handed out to the astonished hands, whose jobs, however, did not suffer from the new invention. It printed the pro-digious number of 1,100 copies in one hour and contained a pardonably boast-ful announcement. The Times then had seven morning and eight evening rivals in London, and, being the only steam press, could go to press later and beat all its opposition.

"There is one problem in American life for which I foresee no solution. It is the race problem, the negro question." These words of Grover Cleveland are recalled by the Louisville Courier-Journal in its editorial discussion of the sudden and appalling flareup of mob fury and race hatred in Tulsa. In this Oklahoma city, which according to one of its journals "has the highest per-capita wealth of any city in the world," the rumor that a colored boy was to be lynched brought a crowd of armed negroes to the jail to prevent it. With the white mob and the black confronting one another, somebody fired a shot, and the result was a pitched battle with scores of casualties, the burning of the city's negro section, and the addition, as the New York Evening Post remarks of "a ghastly chapter to the record of national disgrace."
