# Arrested as Burglar, Youth Shoots Policeman Frank O'Leary; Condition Serious; More Breaks, Lads Arrested

# "I'll Shoot," Says Jack Bramen, "If You THREE CRUSHED TO Arrest Me," And He Carries **Out His Threat**

O'Leary's Deposition Taken; Then He Goes Under Operation--Prisoner Pluckly Held After Shot Was BRYCE SAYS BRITAIN Fired--Admits Breaking Into Mowatt's and Implicates Another--Meanwhile News of Several More Robberies Comes Out

Special Officer Frank O'Leary was shot in the side about eleven o'clock of age after he arrested him in Clarence street on a charge of breaking and

entering H. J. Mowatt's drug store, Haymarket square.

The shooting took place opposite an alleway leading into Bramen's house in St. Patrick street a few yards from the corner of Clarence street. As a result of the injuries he received, O'Leary is in a critical condition in the hos-

Pluckily, though so desperately wounded, and with blood already surging through his clothing, O'Leary clung to his prisoner until help came. Then it was found that he had his man handcuffed and it is thought he snapped the iron wristbands on after the shot was fired. Bramen admitted the Mowatt burglary and implicated Thomas Petrie, for

whom search now is being made.

The shooting of O'Leary caused a sensation about the city and there were many to express regret about it and to voice a hope that he would come through all right. He has won good opinions of late because of his effective

It is worthy of note that the day also brings out news of several more burglaries in the city.

O'Leary's Sworn Deposition

Magistrate Ritchie, Police Clerk George Henderson and the prisoner, Jack Bramen, the later in charge of Sergt. Hastings, went to the hospital about moon today for the purpose of taking Policeman O'Leary's deposition. With great effort O'Leary was able to tell briefly the story of the shooting. On account of his weakened condition the hearing of his testimony was confined only to a few minutes. Commissioner McLellan and Rev. Myles P. Howland were also present while the deposition was being taken.

The substance of Policeman O'Leary's deposition was as follows:

"I am a special police officer in the city of St. John. I' arrested Bramen this morning in Clarence street. I told him what he was being arrested for and warned him that anything he said might he used against him. He admitted breaking into Mowatt's drug store together with another man named Thomas Petrie. He said to me: 'If you arrest me, I'll shoot you, so help me, God.' I proceeded to arrest him and he shot me in the side and then fired again."

This concluded O'Leary's deposition and Bramen was asked by the magistrate if he had any questions to ask. The prisoner replied in the negative, and the party left the room in which the wounded man lay.

Soon afterwards O'Leary was taken to the operating room and about one o'clock he was placed on the operating table and a start made in an attempt to locate the bullet.







RHEUMATISM

Ottawa, July 4—Legislation providing for the reform of the penitentiary system in Canada will be introduced next session by the minister of justice if the study which he is now giving to the question can be completed before parliament reassembles. This legislation will probably affect all penitentiaries in Canada, both as regards the system of discipline and the employment of prisoners, the classification of convicts, and the treatment of the criminal insane.

It is hoped that some system will be found under which convicts undergoing sentence in the penitentiary can be employed and their earnings applied in part to the maintenance of those dependent upon them. In the adoption of such a system care would be taken to provide against any unequal competition with industries. In England, it is understood, a method has been devised whereby certain commodities used in the government service are manufactured by prison labor. It is thought that this plan might be adapted to conditions in Canada. It is not the view of the minister of justices to talter the penal system as to provide desirable resorts for the criminal classes, but while institut-
