Interstate Commerce Inspector Reports on Accident in Which 19

Were Killed

Washington, July 17—In holding Conductor Kuhn responsible for the accident which occurred on the Ligonier Valley R. R., on July 5, resulting in the death of mineteen jersons and the injury of twenty-eight, Chief Inspector Belnap, in his report to the Interstate Commerce Commission says in part:

"No record is kept of train orders, no train register is maintained, and the road has no printed rules of any kind governing train operation. No block signals system is maintained, the movement of trains being governed by orders given by the dispatcher, either verbally or by telephone to the conductor, who in turn conveys them to the engineman and other members of his crew.

"The method of train operation in this road is extremely faulty and until some adequate rules governing train operation are adopted and enforced accidents of this character are liable to occur."

CHURCH CIRCLES ARE AGITATED OVER CREED

Germany Exercised About Its Position in Their Liturgies

Berlin, July 18-Church circles through postles' Creed in their liturgies.

Both the Nicene and Athanasian creeds ave long been regarded, especially in the hurches of the reformation, as containing atter which historically or scientifically ducated Christians cannot wholly accept is binding, but until recently the Apostles' reed, or the "Apostolikum," as it is called here, has escaped hostile criticism owing to its extreme simplicity, its scriptural haracter, and its comparative freedom rom dogmatic assertiveness.

A number of ecclesiastical organizations ave, however, felt it incumbent on them ecently to protest against the use even for this simple creed at confirmations and aptisms, but more especially at the orinations of young clergymen, and a movement of great strength has set in to abolih it from the services of the church. This movement has gained strength by he accession of Doctor Lahusen, of Bern, a man who is highly respected on the trhodox side. PARDONED AFTER FORTY

Notorious Brigand Chief of Italy Is Given His Liberty

Milan, July 18-After more than fo seven years' imprisonment, one of the most notorious brigand chiefs of Italy the middle part of the nineteenth centure has been pardoned by King Victor Enmanuel. Giuseppe Bellettieri, as he is called, was regarded as a born criminal. He came from the Neapolitan provinces, an as a boy he proved himself a cunning in cendiary and a cattle thief. Later he served a sort of apprenticeship to brigandage in the dreaded bands captained by Croco Donatello and Ninco Nanco, which wenten overrunning Calabria and the provinces of Apulia and Basilicata.

He next became a full-blown chieftain with a following of a dozen terrorists who after a long run of good luck, finally found themselves hemmed in by Italian soldiers. Seeing his freebooters captured Bellettleri surrendered on his own accord. He was ourtmartialed and sentence of death was assed upon him, but this was eventually ommuted to penal servitude for life at livita Vecchia convict quarries.

Reference to Bellettieri's crime-sheet nows that he was condemned for no fewer than sixty-five murders, blackmail cases and other deeds of violence. In prison, powever, the ex-chief distinguished himself vunfailing good conduct, and by hard ork was able to make a little hoard of vings.

Montreal, July 18—While the board of governors of McGill University have not yet ratified the plans, it is understood from an authoritative source that the disposition of the million dollar property on Fletcher's Field presented to the institution by Sir William Macdonald has practically been arranged for.

The plans provide that the big property forming the new campus of McGill will contain as fine an athletic stadium as is on the continent. Dormitories capable of housing the majority of undergraduates non-resident in the city are certain. A closed ice hockey rink and a magnificent gymnasium are also to be constructed.

It is not known when the work will begin but it will be impossible to have those plans put into execution before the fall of 1913. Preliminary surveys are now in progress and it is quite possible that the athletic field may be available for the approaching college session.

The realization of the possibilities involved in the new property has been deferred owing to the scarcity of funds, which during the last few years has more than once endangered the efficiency and reputation of McGill, Montreal's famous rally last fall afforded the university ample facilities to clear off outstanding liabilities and proceed unhampered with existing equipment but beyond this it could not go. Hence for almost a year there has been nothing done with the new property. Now, however, funds are in sight and the university authorities are carefully considering plans for the disposition of the property.






