THE MAIN PART STANDING, THOUGH MUCH DAMAGED. THE LIBRARY, OIL PAINTING AND FURNITURE SAVED--INSURANCE AND OTHER PARTICULARS.

Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland:

1. That the owner, keeper or harbourer of any Dog or Dogs in the front lots of the Middle District of the Parish of Chatham...
